very strong player.

Surprisingly, the tournament turned out to be a hard fought contest from beginning to end. Sheets and Joachim were definitely the favorites, and were expected to breeze through the other opponents with little effort, but both were given a rough time from the first round on. Sheets drew with Tweeddale, and Joachim with Taro in the first round. Tweeddale had a clear win over Joachim, and Taro over Sheets in the second round, but the two experts came through to win lost games. In the third, Sheets had another lost game with Brandstrom, offering a draw at several points, which Brandstrom, unfortunately for him, refused. Sheets won. Joachim lost to Brandstrom in

Joachim lost to Brandstrom in the fourth round after having had a clear win. Wade gave all of the leaders a bad time, losing to Tweeddale in 102 moves, and drawing

Taro.

Brandstrom was the surprise of the tournament, and would have had a fine score had he finished winning his "won" games. Hebert played good chess throughout in his first major tournaments and gives promise of being a tougher opponent with more seasoning.

All in all, the tournament showed the increase in strength of a
large number of players in the
state in the past year. It was regrettable that strong players such
as Crain, Neale, Nourse and Enochsen could not compete, lending additional prestige to the tournament...still the results were favorable.

#### EDITORIAL

Tournaments have played a tremendous part in the growing interest in chess in the various sections of the country. The stimulation given is something only tournaments can give. They are necessarily of wide-ly varying importance, from the smallest club tournaments to the World Championship itself.

They automatically bring out the best in the men taking part, and do a great deal to improve their game. Strong competition is the only way to improve the strength of players

in any given area.

I venture to approximate that the strength of players as a whole in the Puget Sound Area has improved 100 percent in the last year.... it is a direct result of competition in the Puget Sound League and the few tournaments held during that time, and they were few indeed compared to those in other sections of the country. Few of the tourna-ments held had entries from outside of the individual clubs themselves. The Washington State, the Washington Speed, and the Northwest Washington Tournaments were the only ones with outside players, and with the recent Seattle City Tournament, the only ones to be classed as Major Tournaments in this state.

Plans for a Washington State Open Tournament, to be operated under the Swiss System, are under way and should create a wide interest as it will be open to all, and will be completed in two or three days.

A Pacific Northwest Expert's Tournament is also in the planning stage, with two players each from British Columbia, Washington and Oregon to be invited. Ulvestad has promised to play if Dake is persuaded to compete; with the presence of the two masters, the tournament should receive national recognition.

The Washington Chess Federation is taking the first steps....... the member clubs must carry on from there.

Defending champions of the Tacoma Chess Club won their opening

Chess Club. The fact that Kitsap
is a combination of last year's
Bainbridge and Bremerton teams may
indicate that Tacoma is even stronger this year than they were before.

#### YMCA

The Scattle YMCA Chess Club is the newest club to join the league, and is apparently the most active at present. They meet weekly at the YMCA, and are now conducting a perpetual tournament under a modified Short System. (Modifications cal-culated by R. P. Allen.) In addi-tion they have played an outside match with the Whidby Island Chess Club.

A great step forward for the club are the weekly classes for advanced players being conducted by our own well know master, Olaf Ulvestad, Room 238, Friday evenings. The course will consist of lectures and demonstrations including analysis of the ten most widely used openings with commentary on traps, middle game strategy, and tactics of the end game. The second half of each period will be given over to practice and study of the procoding material so that the student will loarn by playing.

Mr. Ulvestad recommends that beginners take the elementary chess course taught by Mr. R. P. Allen on Wodnesdays, which is preparatory to the advanced course given the fellowing term. The fee for either course is \$3.50 for YMCA members and service men, \$8.00 for married couples, \$5.00 for general enrollment for the eight sessions or \$1.00-

per session. All in all, the YMCA should be a credit to chess in this area.

8. Standings in league will be by matches won. A tie for first will be played off after season closes.

9. Lists of players in order of their strength should be mailed to the Secretary immediately.

This game is a good example of the principle of getting the 'mostest there the furstest'. White managed to get more pieces into play along unimpeded lines of attack. Black lost precious time on moves 11, 12, 13, and 17. Also, it is usually better to leave the K-side pawns on original squares as long as possible.

This being the first issue of the Washington Chess Letter, it is probably well to outline the scope and purpose of the publication.
