

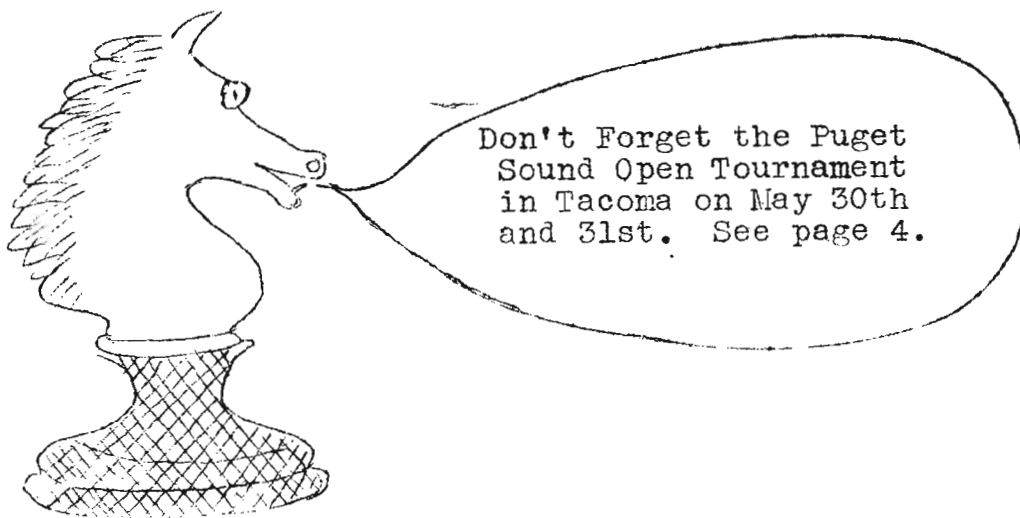

C O T T O N A L

Memorial Day weekend should long be remembered as a notable milestone for Washington Chess. The Puget Sound Open tournament provides the first opportunity for a large number of Washington chess players to meet under ideal conditions, being just a two-day tournament. The event will receive national publicity, and full coverage in Chess Review is guaranteed.

As yet the entries have not been coming in--a usual occurrence in this type of tournament. Most players wait until the last minute to enter, sometimes even the morning of the tournament. However, the work of the Tournament Director will be made much simpler if the players will send their entries in advance, giving him time to make out the individual cards, charts, etc., and prepare for a efficient, smooth-running event. The tournament is truly an "Open" event and is not limited to players of this area. Players from B. C and Portland are particularly welcome.

Jim Schmitt of Portland has already signified his intentions of competing, as have V.W. Bever Seattle Chess Club champion, C. C. Crain and V. W. Holmes of Tacoma.

Each club should strive to have as many players as possible attend the event--remember, in a Swiss System, players will be matched against players of their own strength after the first two rounds! This should provide incentive for those who feel they have 'no chance' of winning the tournament, as they still may make a respectable score.

National publicity will make this an event of real importance regardless of the strength of the tournament. Recognition by the Washington Chess Federation as a 'Major' tournament will be a deciding factor, and will rank second only to the Washington State tournament in importance.

The meeting of the Washington Chess Federation being held at the same time will make the affair practically a chess 'Congress', and if attended by Oregon and British Columbia representatives may bring many important changes in Pacific North west chess.

WASHINGTON CHESS LETTER

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The lethary of the average chess player is always a source of wonder to me. Mental giants when it comes to outsmarting another chess player over the board or through the mails; yet we cannot make the public believe that chess is worth while. Furthermore most of us apparantly don't care whether or not chess is promoted.

Maybe after all chess should be regarded as a strictly parlor game and not be looked upon as a sport such as baseball, football etc.

In fact I don't believe that the American public will ever care for chess to the same extent that Europeans do.

This is perhaps too gloomy an outlook on my part. I hope that it is not a true outlook. Yet how may people do you know who wax enthusiasm when chess is mentioned? How many who do not?

As pointed out previously in this column the daily newspaper editors are the ones to whom chess must first be sold. If they are not convinced of the value of chess then we might as well cease efforts to promote the game in a hurry.

Of course we do gain converts' from time to time and eventually chess will have its place of honor in American circles.

If we live long enough, that is.
