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Another season of Puget Sound League play is about to begin, and undoubtedly, a great number of surprises will come about before the schedule is completed. In the hope that what I say in this column will be forgotten by next May, I am going to stick my neck out, and attempt to predict the outcome of the next year's play.

To begin with, Tacoma will win again, and become champions for three years. Led by Crain and Holmes, they need not take a back seat for any top board players in the state, and I predict these combined two will not have a minus score against any team. Guthrie Hewitt, Hultman, Collins, Coubrough and Martin bring their total to eight of players who can rotate and still win. All these men can play on top boards against the rest, and so, with their available reserve strength, I feel they should be definitely picked to repeat for another year.

For second, Seattle should come in strong,--if! Last year they fell far below their true class, but should come back strong if enough of their strong players turn out to support the team. Joachim has been the standout of the team, along with Bickford; but they need Sheets, Wallock, Weissenborn, or some of the rest of the strong players to bring back their lost prestige.

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On paper, Kitsap should be next. Nourse, Danskin, Magerkurth and Rehberg are all very strong players, and combine to make one of the best balanced teams in the league. They made a splendid showing during the larger part of the last season, and, I believe, should be more consistant during the next.

Fourth, or better, should go to the University. Bollman was one of the best players in the league, and backed by Schain, Ballantine and Nippell should be tough competition.

Everett may come in fifth, but they need an outstanding player to seriously challenge the top teams.

The dark horse will be the new entry, Bellingham. Headed by Bader, who may be one of the strongest players in the state, they may go far.

With all this, I feel I should depart, and perhaps at a later date I will fee far wiser, and leave star-gazing to the experts.

BRITISH COLUMBIA*WASHINGTON TIE B.C. RETAINS TROPHY

After a torrid struggle in which the decisive games rested with the adjudicators, the Fifth Chess International ended in a tie in the Class A event. As British Columbia is the defending champions, the Peace Arch Trophy will remain with them for another year.

The Canadians also scored a decisive victory in the Class B event, winning the Consolation trophy which has resided in Washington for the past year.

The match was played in the Stanley Park Pavilion in Vancouver, and truly, it would be difficult to find a finer setting. There was plenty of room for the extremely large gathering, and the Pavilion's restaurant provided a fine meal for those who wished it. A group of finer hosts would be difficult to imagine. A large number of chess clocks were available, and helped enormously to make the event a success, keeping adjucations to a minimum.

Washington held a commanding lead throughout most of the match, leading 11-7 at one point, and 14½-12½ when time was called! This left the all important three games for adjudication. But the Canadians were given two wins, with third called a draw? The margin for one of the wins was a pawn, with most of the pieces on the board---the draw was the game on first board between Helman and Joachim in an exciting middle game position, which undoubtedly would not have ended in a draw if it had been played out---somebody would have lost---but who? However, the game was analized as well as possible, and material could not be won by either side, and held. It would have been a splendid game played out.

Part III
MIDDLE GAME

A. Strategy

1. Centralize the action of all pieces. (Efficiency, Power)
2. Integrate moves into definite plans, changing plans as expedient but never play aimlessly or mark time. (Efficiency)
3. Adopt the habit of looking for a weakness to spark the attack. (Attack against strength is foredoomed.)
4. If your opponent has one or more pieces exposed, look for a combination. (Exchange protecting pieces while attacking protected pieces)
5. Be sure a piece brought up to support an attacked piece or position can not be forced away or exchanged. (All combinations are Based on a double attack)
6. In cramped positions free yourself by exchanging. (In general, exchange evenly rather than retreat from an untenable position)
7. Try to limit your opponent's choice of moves by setting up series of problems demanding immediate attention for his safety. (Increase your probability estimate accuracy)
8. When ahead in potential, material, force, whichever you prefer to call it, exchange evenly as much as possible. (To increase relative advantage)
9. Never sacrifice without a clear and logical purpose in mind. (Sacrifice is justified only when a powerful attack on the King is made possible or where retention of the initiative enables future advantage, recovery or safety)
10. Unless there is a net advantage when capture is threatened, defend or interpose, move away or capture evenly elsewhere, pin the attacker or counter-attack--anything but allow a net power loss. (The best defense is a good counter-attack)

B. Tactics

1. Do not expose your King while the Queens are still on the board. (Advanced pawns create weakness, particularly on the castled King's side, inviting attack)
2. Try to open up a file or diagonal for attack by your heavy pieces on the King.
3. Avoid pinning the opponent King's knight before he is castled, especially if your King is castled on the King side. (This might result in the opening up of a file on your castled King for rook mobilization)
4. Do not always take a free pawn in front of the King; it may obstruct attack by heavier men)
5. Avoid discovered check; it is usually the channel for combinations resulting in loss of material or worse.
6. When checked, defend the King if possible with a piece that counterattacks.
7. Lining up the rook and King on a long diagonal invites a pinning attack by a bishop with a resulting loss in material and power. (The Queen is even more vulnerable to this type of combination, acting on the file or rank as well as a diagonal)

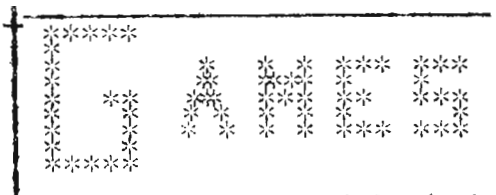
8. Don't give checks to the opponent King unless by such tactics he is forced to move and forfeit the right to castle. (A series of checks and even the sacrifice of a piece is justified if the King can be forced out into the middle of the board where he is vulnerable to attack on all sides)
9. When castled on the King's side, avoid the posting of an adverse knight on KB4. (Vice-versa, develop QN to KN3 via K2 and QB3, threatening posting at KB5)
10. The knight can attack a non-knight without being "en prise" and a man can not interpose. (This usually means stability and a gain in time if the threat is material and relevant to a combination)
11. Quite often a piece or pawn is left "en prise" by the Queen to enable a fatal attack combination in her absence.
12. Never attack or defend a point with the Queen if the same work can be done with a subordinate.
13. When possession of an open file is threatened by an adverse rook, back up the defending rook with its mate. (The rook works best in the middle game when open files can be taken, and connected rooks work at highest efficiency)
14. Avoid doubled, isolated, and backward pawns. (Double pawns are not necessarily a disadvantage if united with other pawns--worst when doubled in rook file, best on King's file)
15. Exchange pawns toward the center except to support an isolated pawn. (Strong center)
16. When two pawns are abreast, the King and Queen's for example, and one is attacked by a pawn, it is usually better to advance past the attacking pawn or to support with another pawn instead of capturing.
17. Pawns become increasingly weak as they approach the eighth rank and paradoxically more valuable or dangerous according to point of view.
18. As a general rule, do not advance the knight pawns as it invites the Queen's bishop to your KR3, a dangerous flank attack on the castled King on the one hand and the powerful King Bishop's fianchetto on the other.
19. In a diagonal line of pawns, preserve the one at the head, by a piece if necessary, to avoid isolated pawns. (Usually defend pieces and especially pawns with pawns)
20. The pawn's attack like the Knight's can not be interposed.
