

Well, here we are on the cve of the 1948 Washington State tournament. It always has been, and still is the classic tournament feature, and regardless of the competition of Open and Experts events, the state championship will still be the event the experts and dubs alike will point for. Will you be able to say--"I played in the State Tournament"?

An added incentive for competing is now offered to players who compete this year--in fact, two added incentives. First, the winner will be officially recognized as a Chess Expert, just one step below a Chess Master. The man placing second will achieve his first step in doing so, needing only to place similarly in another tournament of equal importance. Second, the winner will be one of the two Washington State platers to be invited to play in the Pacific Northwest Experts tournament at Tacoma. The other position will be based on past performances, and also on his place in this

tournament. It is unlikely that any player will be invited who does not compete in this tournament. Then too, it is possible for other players being invited in the event some of the British Columbia or Oregon players are

unable to compete.

J. Leanard Sheets, defending, and many times State Champion, plans to be on hand to defend his title; Carroll Crain, Chess Expert from Tacoma has promised to compete; and Charles Joachim, Chess Expert and Seattle City Champion is expected to vie for top honors. Aside from these recognized experts, Bob Neale and Dean Bollman, and V. W. Bever are expected to play, and all will be distinct threats for top honors. Other notable contenders will be in the offing, some will be unable to make it. But the strength and success of the tournament is assured.

U. S. Open Champion Weaver Adams gave two interesting exhibitions in Seattle, a lecture and two exhibition games at the Seattle Chess Club, and a simultaneous exhibition at the Seattle Y.M.C.A.

His lecture at the Scattle Club was based upon a novel idea of his own---ne played two exhibition games against two of Seattle's leading players, Charles Joachim, Chess Expert, and Burge Bückford. During these games, he explained his strategy in making each move, incidently in the hearing of both opponents, and still won both of his games.

His simultaneous exhibition at the 'Y' was extremely successful, that is, for Adams. He game up one draw to Sego of the YMCA club.

REHBERG RESIGNS

Unable to continue both his work and his chest duties our long-time friend and colleague, George Rehberg resigned his positions as a Feature Editor on the WCL staff, and as secretary of the Kitsap club

His work for chess, notably his contribution as editor and publisher of the Puget Sound Chess News will long be remembered by chess fews in this area.

His position with the Kitsap club will be filled by Jack Mourse, Rt 1, Box 787 Port Blakely, Wash.

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Plans are under way to hold an open tournament in Bellingham, with the possibility that it may become one of our most important tournaments; its proximity to Vancouver could give it International flavor.

At the recent meeting of the Washington Chess Federation, a new constitution was approved.

The papers were presented by a committee headed by Dick Allen then revised and adopted by the Directors of the W. C. F.

Articles in the constitution provided for new types of memberships in the V.C.F., League, Club, and Individual; V.C.F. approved major tournament, including the Washington State, Pacific Northwest Experts, Puget Sound Open, Northwest Washingen and Seattle City; Oscar Award to chess organizers for each year beginning in 1945; rules in awarding the title of Chess Expert.

Individual memberships were created to give each chess player in the state the opportunity to become a part of the organization, regardless of affiliation with any chess club.

The membership fee will be 1.50 annually, and will entitle the member to a membership card, a free subscription to the Washington Chess Letter, right to participate in any WCF competition, and guest priveliges in any member chess club outside his own city.

The title of Chess Expert is given to players winning, or placing second twice in the PNV

Experts, State, PS Open, or by twice winning the Seattle City or Northwest Washington.

Jim Schmitt of Portland, J.L. Sheets of Seattle, Carroll Crain of Tacoma, and Charles Joachim of Seattle are now officially recognized as Chess Experts.

The Oscar Award will be given annually by vote of the Board of Directors to the man deserving the honor for his outstanding and meritous service in the promotion and organization of chess.

As the organization is new, and of recent origin, it was considered fitting and proper that the awards be pre-dated to the beginning of the recent organization, so awards were voted for 1945, 1946, and 1947.

The Oscar Award for 1945 was given to R. C. (TOM) CARNON, of Mt. Vernon, for his magnificent accomplishment in organizing the grandiose Chess International. This event is still considered by far the most important of its kind by the national chess publications.

The Oscar Award for 1946 was given to JACK NOURSE for the splendid part he played in the foundation and organization of the P. S. League, for which he served faithfully in its pioneer stage, inspiring his colleagues.

The Oscar Award for 1947 was given to GEORGE REHBERG for his outstanding work as editor and publisher of the Puget Sound Chess Mews. The importance of his work played a leading part in bringing chess to where it is at present.

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Part III

Our hotel rooms, beds, and conveniences did not begin to match in quality those of first-class American hotels; still, who were we, as guests, to be over-critical; we received the best they had. The night passed in pleasant rest, and the next morning we were toured about the historic city. We visited an unusual museum which is called the museum of the Nazi Siege. It had many interesting exhibits showing graphically the siege and its lifting. The citizens started the museum, we were told, three months before the German armies departed.

About moon another meal was served on the same scale as the one on the preceding evening. I counted twenty-one courses in all--fourteen courses of hors d'oouvres and seven main courses! Unfortunately, we were unable to Sinish that "Olympian" repast; a plane was being readied to cake us to Moscow, and there wasn't sufficient time to do justice to such a dinner. We broke off dining when about two-thirds through; our passports were returned to us; we boarded the plane, and headed for Hoscow.

While on route I had a remarkable view of the Pripet marshes from thousands of fest up. The land is very backward between Leningrad and Moscow, but there are signs of cultivation here and there.

Most of the Soviet chess masters, along with representatives of "VOKS" (Society for Cultural Advancement) and of the press, were waiting to greet us at the huge Moscow air-field, which is thirty from the city. We were given quite a reception with rany bouquets of flowers for the wives of American team members and press photographs taken right and left. Chess events of any immortance always "make" the front page in the USSR. Chess has become, through government promotion, the favortic Russian pastime.

The outskirts of Moscow were a crazy-quilt patchwork of various types of dwellings: shacks, frame-houses, peasant huts of mud with thatched roofs, and even a cave(!) gave a motley aspect to the landscape through which we passed. Signs of Nazi shelling were still evident a few miles away, but as we entered the street networks, those signs disappeared. The Nazis never came closer than within thirteen miles of Moscow, but they wreaked utter havoc on the outlying towns. War-driven people from outside the metropolis came in droves to be sheltered by its untouched buildings from the chilling Russian winter. Their numbers swelled the four-million pre-war population to nearly eight million. Muscovites are living as many as eight to a room because of the increase; such congestion prevents any semblance of private life in most cases; yet, the congestion does not end there. Is many as three families to a single kitchen is a common condition.
