Now the dispute arises as to whether not players finishing so low are entitled such a large cut of the prize money. It maintained on one side that an open tow should be based on a winner-take-all sw of prize distribution, with possibly a to prize for Class winners. That is that majority of the prize money should be gi to the players that prove to be the stra in the contest.

The other side bases its arguement the fact that more clocks contribute to ter tournaments. 'lso that prizes for weaker players will encourage a larger ( out at the tournaments, and that the st er players are not necessarily entitled the majority of the prize money.

# ULVESTAD TOPS

Olaf Ulvestad scored 6 - 0 to win the 1959 Inland Empire Open. This six round event was held April 25 -26 at the Desert Hotel in Spokane. Twenty-Five players came to this tournament, with all but five from out of town.

Dr. David Groenig scored  $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$  to take second place and win the Inland Empire Championship title, which is awarded to the top finishing player from the Inland Empire.

Third place and the junior title went to Richard Jerome of Yakima who also had a  $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$  score.

Five players scored 4 - 2 to tie for fourth place. Don Eilmes of Seattle had top tie-breaking points. Others with 4 - 2 were Richard Schultz of Seattle, Danny Towne of Prosser, Wash. John Barto from Great Falls, Mont. and William Hoge of Yakima.

The tournament was directed by Dr. Greenig, and the pairings were made by Priebe, using Harkness pairings instead lettery pairings used in former I.F.O.s.

The tournament had wide representate as among the twenty-five players there six from Montana, five from Idaho, six Seattle, and three from Yakima.

The tournament was played withrnow control, but requiring the players to exfinish their games within 2½ hours or has their games adjudicated. Olaf Ulvestad the adjudication except in his own game Richard Schultz which was handled by D Groenig.

Wallace High School Chess Team of Wallace, Idaho, romped through the Inland Empire Chess League competition undefeted to win the title and the trophy. Paced by Jim Wil. with an 11 + 1 season's record, Stephen Sola with  $12\frac{1}{2} - 1\frac{1}{2}$ , and Donald Britt with 12 the Wallace quint had no trouble in stomping each of their rivals, in succession.

There seemed to be little doubt in the minds of the Wallace players, at the begin of league play, that they could and would take the 59 trophy. Although some were skept because of the club's poor showing against Sandpoint in previous matches, they fulfi their expectations to the hilt.

We try to properly record the completion of the postal games but sometimes a report of the completion of a game gets mislaid or overlooked or gets permanently filed in our round file or fireplace. This probably happened in the case of the first three games listed above. It is our aim to inquire for completion of games if it seems by the passage of time that all games in a particular section should have been completed. If the players will also help us in this respect and call our attention to a lack of a report, it will help to keep our records up to date. Thank you.

We hear by the underground sources of our information that both Wade and Weaver are in a dither waiting for the conclusion of their games in Section 58A-7A & 7B to see who is to win top honors in the section. As it now stands, Wade has won 6 games to 2 lost, and Weaver has  $5\frac{1}{2}$  to 1, with a game with Bishop to be finished. If Weaver should win from Bishop he will win the section, if he draws he will tie with Wade for top honors. Should a tie result it will be broken by totaling the points each has won in this very interesting section. More next month, we hope.

We are indebted to Howard Weaver for the design of the front cover of this and last month's issue. It is hoped that he will continue to let us have the benefit of his talents along this line. In fact he has furnished a new design which we expect to use for the August issue cover.

One of the best ways to improve your chess skill-and to have a fine time doing it-is to play chess by mail. If you have not yet taken part in our Postal Tournaments you are missing a lot of fun and valuable experience.

Postal Chess players are issued numbered ratings. Eventually, your rating will depict your chess ability, compared with other players'. We keep track of your wins, draws and losses, adjusting your rating accordingly. Rating listings are published
