

DAMES MCCORMOCK WINS 1960 WASHINGTON CHAMPIONSHIP

JAMES McCORMICK won the 1960 Wash. State Championship with a perfect score, by defeating all of the other players in the tournament. Jim finished second last year behind Elmars Zemgalis; Zemgalis did not participate this year.

The tournament was from the opening gun a two-man contest between McCormick and his arch-rival Viktors Pupols. Both Pupols and McCormick won all of their first four round games.

In the championship deciding game, in the final round, McCormick had the Black pieces. Pupols was certain McCormick would play the Sicilian Defence in response to P - K4, and had a line prepared for the game. McCormick got wind of the preparation from Pupols' notebook, and did a quick brush- up on the lines himself. So going into the game both Pupols and McCormick were aware of the opening line to be used, with Pupols having the advantage of more extensive analysis.

The Sicilian defense is based on Whites King-side attack versus Black Queen-side attack. The side whose attack developes first almost always wins. In the championship game McCormick's Q- side attack came home a full three moves ahead of White's K- side attack. (See games). So for the sixth time Viktors Pupols placed second in the Washington State Championship, and he has yet to win the title.

Only six players of the qualified 13 turned out for the tournament. The possibility of three days of play held some of the players out, while the ten dollars entry fee kept others from entering.

The tournament was held at the Seattle Chess Club on February 20 - 21. Since only five rounds were required the tourney was completed in two days instead of the previously announced three.

Viesturs Seglins played only the 1st day, and forfeited his three games on the second day due to ill health.

There were no mojor upsets in the tournament. Only one game had to be adjourned; the McCormick - Franett game. Franett resigned within thirty seconds after the resumption of the game.

The pairing for this tourney were by lot, Al Livingston directed.

MCCORMICK WINS: Pacific Northwest Open BRALEY SECOND

James McCormick, of Seattle, won the 1960 Pacific Northwest Open with a $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ score. He defeated Charles Geary, of Eugene, S. M. Poulsen, of Salem, John Braley, of Seattle, Richard Schultz, of Seattle, and Arthur Wang, of Berkley, California. He had his single draw with Julius Loftsson, of El Cerrito, Calif. in the final round.

Surprise of the tournament was John Braley, who scored 5 - 1 to take second place. Braley lost only to McCormick in the third round. He downed M.C.Skarsten, Duane Bowans, S. M. Poulsen, and Deane Moore. In the final round he defeated defending champion Richard Schultz, to capture second place.

Two strong California players, Art Wang and Julius Loftsson placed third & fourth. They each scored $4\frac{1}{2} - 1\frac{1}{2}$, with Wang ahead on tie-breaking. They had a draw with each other in the fourth round. Wang lost in the fifth round to McCormick. Loftsson drew McCormick in the final round and had a first round draw with the other California entrant, Richard Shorman.

Richard Schultz, Gerry Singer, Henrik Lundh, and Mike Franett each scored 4 - 2 to place fifth through eighth, in that order.

Another surprise of the tournament was the poor showing of Clark Harmon, who after winning three tournaments, only scored $3\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$ in this event. Harmon lost to the two California players Loftsson and Wang, and drew with S. M. Poulson. Harmon defeated Wang in the California Junior tournament last summer.

The tournament was held March 12-13. The first three rounds on Saturday were

held at the Oregonian Hostess House; on Sunday the tournament moved to the Portland Y.M.C.A., as the Hostess House was not available.

Twenty-eight players entered this event. Nine were from Vashington, five of these from Seattle. Fifteen were from Oregon, five from Portland and four from Salem. Three players came up from California, and one came from Milwaukee, Wis. The tournament was U.S.C.F. rated.

Only one player, S. M. Poulson, of Salem, had not previously played in an open tournament. Toulson scored $3\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$.

This was a six round tournament, with a 45 moves in two hours time control. Fred Byron directed and did on excellent job.

Only two games were stopped for adjudication. The Poulson - Braley game and the Kendill - Cairneross game, both in the fourth round. Chirneross was awarded a win over Kendell. No decision could be reached in the Braley - Poulson game, so it was decided that game would be played out later. When the game was resumed Poul on resigned what appeared to be a drawn position.

Cash prizes were awarded to the top four finishers, book prizes were donated and awarded to the middle and last place players. There were no class or junior prizes at this tournament.

Clark Harmon handled the publicity and made the arrangments for the tournment. He did a fine job on both.

Seventeen new members were signed up for the U. S. C. \mathbb{F} .

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GLEN BUCKENDORF RETAINS ODAHO CHESS TOTALE VANDENBURG

GLEN BUCKENDORF, of Buhl, continued his domination over Idaho chess players by pesting as Idaho Chess Champion at the nuel Idaho State Chess Tournament, played on January 16 - 17 et the Rogerson Hotel Dick Twin Falls. His final round loss to Vandenburg, who usually wins the title when Glen doesn't compete, was the first tournament game he has lost to an Ideho player since 1952; and other Class "A" entries hope that this means the beginning of the end of the complete mestery he has shown these past years. Even this losing game was almost turned into a draw that could have kept the pérfect record intact.

The results of the last round brought four out of the ten players in the Class """ section into a tie for first place, all with $n \ 3\frac{1}{2} - 1\frac{1}{2}$ score. Ti's were broken under the solkoff system giving Buckendorf first, Vandenburg second, Lloyd Kimpton third, and C. H. Stewart fourth. Adjusted tie-breaking scores were not used, as the withdrawing participant, Ed Pederson, probably was not Class "A" ability, and it would be unfair to assume his winning half of his last games. Bill Clark, another newcomer to the Class "A" ranks, proved that he will have to be watched in the future as he plays regularly.

The hard luck story in the Class "A" section goes to A. B. Ellis, Canyon County Champion. He played all the top players except Stewart, scoring 15½ solkoff points, highest in the section. His play, as judged by his competition, was very strong and it was just the fate of a couple of games shifting the wrong way that gave him his low score. All in all, Class "A" competition was very close and the games very exciting.

The Class "B" division, as usual, drew the largest turnout and was won, the second year in a row, by Nick Skirmants of Boise. Boise players did pretty well in the tournament taking 2nd and 4th in Class "A", 1st and 3rd in Class "B", and 1st and 2nd in the

Junior Class. Skirmants, in winning the Class "B" two times, now moves up to Class "A" for next year's tournament. Nick's only draw was with third place Max Wennstrom. Second place was won by W. C. Jackson, of Glenns Ferry, who lost only to Skirmants. Skirmants had to be awarded the bye in the first round since his name was inadvertently left out of the original drawing list and most players had started their first round games before the mistake was discovered.

The Class "C" and Junior division, this year was composed of all Juniors, was won by the two oldest players- Bob Funder-burg and Bob sanford, of Boise. Funderburg best Sanford in the fourth round to decide the contest between the two.

't the annual business meeting, held following the banquet between the second and third rounds, George Rasor, of Poise, was elected President to succeed R. K. Hart of Poatello. Dick Vandenburg was elected Treasurer and Editor of the Idoho Chess Bulletin, and Eugene Cowan, Ted Hartwell, Roy Parker, Mel Shubert, and Bernice Millar were elected committeemen to represent their respective clubs. It was voted to hold next year's State Tournament Twin Falls, the third week-end in February. This is to take advantage of better February driving weather. It was also to continue the U.S.C.F. rating of the Class "A" section of the Idaho Open, a motion by Bernice Miller to U.S.C.F.rate the Class "B" section was turned down the "B" players represented.

REMEMBER the upcoming Idaho Open to be held Mcmorial Dry week-end, Mry 28 - 29. This will be held at the Boise Y.M.C.*. in Boise. Two sections Class "A" and Class "B". The Class "A" section will be USCF rated and will require U.S.C.F. membership, the Class "B" section will not. "ime control will be 50 moves in two hours.

10 YEARS AGO IN WASHINGTON CHESS

March 8, 1950 was the date of an exhibition by Weaver Adams, well known Chess Master and analyst, in the Central Seattle Yam C A. He played 29 simultaneous games and won all but two, which were drawn.

On March 9 the Washington Chess Federation held its annual dinner meeting for the purpose of presenting the Puget Sound League trophies, Washington State Championship and State Youth Championship awards for the year. Weaver Adams was a guest at this dinner and entertained with a demonstration of his unique System Demonstration in which he played two games simultaneously vs Robert C. Stork and Carroll Crain. While playing he discussed the tectics and strategy of the games in advance of his moves. Crain won his game and Stork drew his. This was only the second time that Adams had not won his games in similiar demonstrations on 35 occasions on a tour of the country.

At this meeting Robert C. Stork was presented the 1949 State Championship trophy. Charles Ballantine was awarded the youth Championship trophy and George Rehberg was awarded the "Oscar" award for 1948. Rehberg was to have received his award at the International Match the previous year but could not be present at that time. The Seuttle Chess Club was awarded the Puget Sound League Trophy. Other clubs at the meeting included Tacoma, Bellingham, University of Wash., Olympia, Seattle YMCA Everett, Kitsap County, West Seattle and Seattle Women's Chess Club. The 1949 University of Washington Championship was won by Ken Mulford, one time President of the WCF and Publisher of the WCL. His opponent in the final and deciding game was Gerald Schain a past Editor of the WCL.
