It was brought to the attention of the president that last year's Oscar winner AL LIVINGSTON had not yet received his Oscar and the treasurer was instructed to buy it. Dick Schultz and Dick Parsons were nominated for this year's Oscar a.ward for meritorious service. Dick Schultz won in the subsequent voting. The treasurer was also instructed to pay the dues for affiliating the WGF with the USCF.

At the conclusion of the elections， editor Dick Schultz read a letter from DICK VANDENBURG，USCF Regional Vice President，exhorting stronger Washington support for the United States Chess Federation and its ac－ tivities．The well writton argument for closer relations with the USCF made an impression on the gathering． After some discussion，it was moved． and seconded that an all－USCF tour－ nament be held in the Northwest， and the motion was carried II：2． It was then determined that the Pu－ get Sound Open be designated as an QIl－USCF toumament．（See advertise－ ment）。 If this toumament proves to be successful in promoting USCF mem－ bership，another Washington tourna－ ment will be made a USCF toummament this year．Because of the increasing work load upon the ratings statisti－ cian，it was made clear that hence－ forth USCF tournaments would not be pated by Northwest Ratings，but only by USCF ratings．It is the purpose of Northwest Ratings to supplement the National Ratings and not to com－ pete with the National Ratings or pe a substitute for them．

It was moved and seconded that Mr．Husby be reimbursed the amount of 10.00 for binding the year pooks．Only one PSL club paid for Its year book and as a result there vere a number of extra books on hand．Anyone interested in securing a．copy should contact $R$ ．R．Merk．， 1026 NE 7 Ist St．，Seattle 15，Wash．

It was moved and seconded that
the Century 21 World＇s Fair tourna－ ment be held as a separate tourna－ ment of its own rather than displac－ ing an annual toumament．The motion was carried by majority vote．

It was moved and seconded that the World＇s Fair tournament take place at the latter end of the season，possibly on Labor Day weekend．The motion was carried by majority vote．

It was suggested that the Seattle Chess Club should arrango weekly tournaments for Fair visitors．Mr． Reh took this under advisement．

It was moved and seconded that each club in the Puget Sound League be limited to having three masters and／or experts on its team．The mo－ tion failed to carry a majority．

It was moved and seconded that Puget Sound League matches be al－ lowed to take place prior to the scheduled Sunday of play，upon a－ greement between the two competing teams．The motion was carried．

Other subjects were brought up for discussion without any vote resulting． It was recommended that the tourna－ ment director follow the rules laid out in the USCF Blue Book as a guide when conducting a chess tournament． However，the decision as to whether he should follow any stated．rule in a．particular case would lie entirely within the option of the director． It was expressed that tournament conditions would be improved through the election of the two assistent directors this year．－

Dick Vandenburg＇s stirring letter made us all realize that we weren＇t doing nearly enough to promate na－ tional chess and the goals of the USCF．Many people have asked＂What can the USCF do for me？＂Perhaps it is not too trite to suggest that they also ask themselves＂What am I doing for the USGF？＂If chess is to ever gain the national recognition wo sincerely believe it deserves it is up to all of us to support the USCF in any way we can．

The meeting was adjourned at 4：15．
