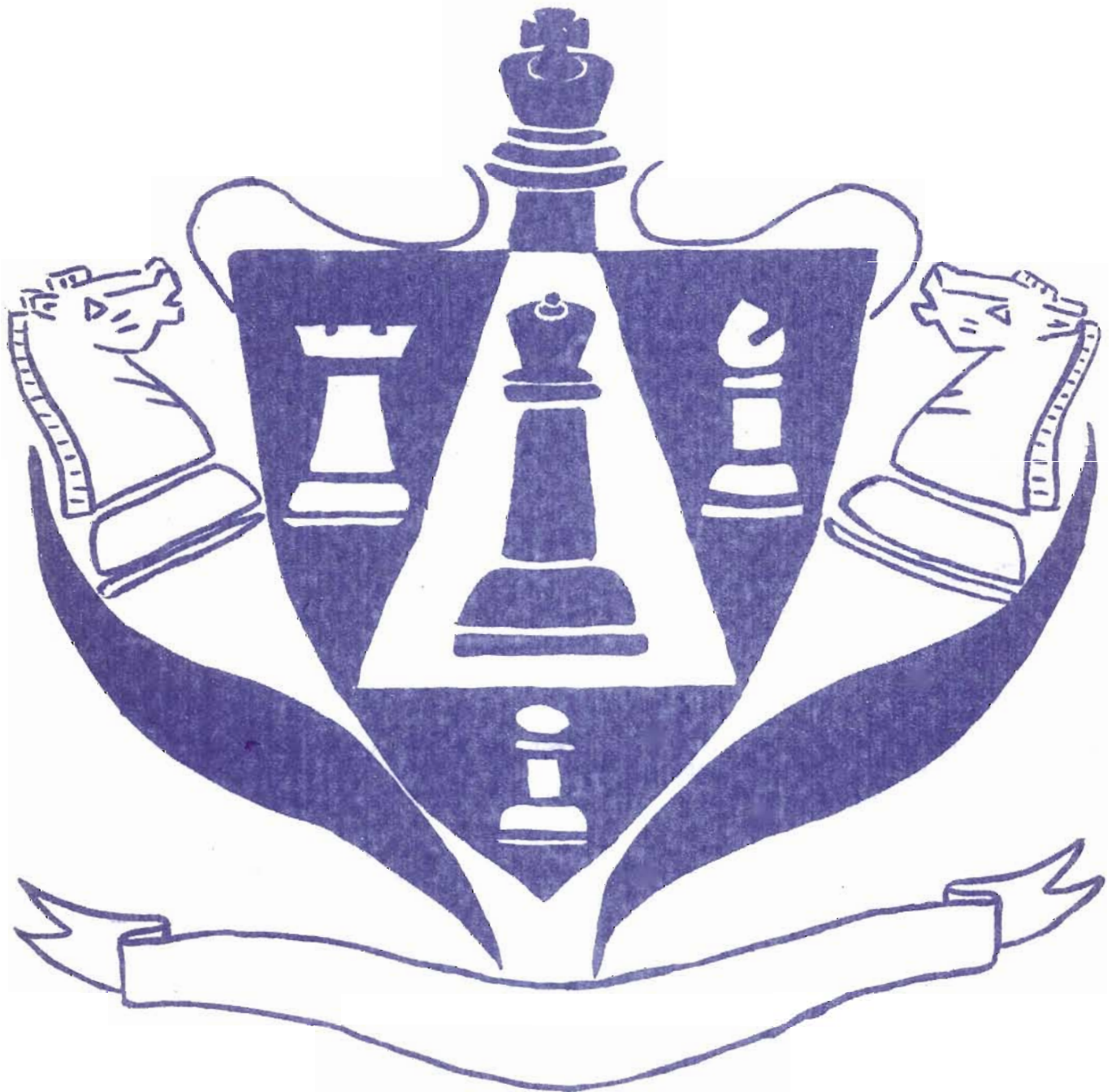

MCCORMICK WINS RUSE DE GUERRE OPEN

JAMES MCCORMICK of Seattle won the first annual Ruse de Guerre Open, held at Camas, Washington on the weekend of October 3rd and 4th. Jim finished a full point ahead of his closest rivals scoring $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ in the 24 player, six round Swiss. McCormick slipped a $\frac{1}{2}$ point out of the lead in round three when he drew with third place MIKE FRANETT, but finished strongly with wins over Portland's IVARS DALBERGS and Seattle's ANDY SCHOENE.

The result left McCormick the winningest player in northwest tournament history.

IVARS DALBERGS, MIKE FRANETT & Troutdale's JERRY WOLFE all scored $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ ending on tie-breaking in the order mentioned. The second prize was \$50 and the third prize was \$25 so each received \$25, only a quarter of the first prize money of \$100 McCormick received for his successful efforts.

Class prizes consisting of ceramic chess sets were presented to WILLIAM KIP-LINGER for class A, with a 4-2 score, to WILLY BRANDAL for class B, with a score of 4-2 and to LEWIS HENRY for class C, with a score of 2-4.

Esther Schrader of Salem, Oregon won the best woman trophy with a score of $1\frac{1}{2}-4\frac{1}{2}$.

Though only 24 entered in the USCF section, it was a strong tourney with 2 masters and 4 experts entering.

Most of the games were hard fought with only one upset, that being LEWIS RICHARDSON winning his first, and only, game against 3rd place JERRY WOLFE. Lewis received a Ganine peg set for his upset. That was Wolfe's only loss of the tournament.

It was disappointing that more women did not enter and that no juniors were there. It was a bad weekend for chess in that it was opening of the Oregon deer season and college had been under way for only a week or so and these boys were unable to attend.

The reserve section was very disappointing with only seven entering. It therefore was played as a round-robin.

R. V. HORN of Klamath Falls took a solid first with 6-0. HUGH GREGORY of Bellingham had a solid second with 5-1 and JIM FROST of Camas tied ART ANDREWS of Portland for third, both scoring 3-3. Tie-breakers gave Frost third place while Andrews was fourth.

Ceramic chess sets were given as prizes to the top three. Art Andrews took home the best junior trophy.

(To Dan Wade, editor of the Washington Chess Letter) Again there were forfeits. Lewis Richardson forfeited the 6th round for reasons unknown, but rumored. Ye old editor of Ruse de Guerre, Bill Jessett, forfeited his 4th round game, as usual, because he had to work. He was just sitting down to start the 5th round when the Crown-Zellerbach fire whistle blew. Being a C-Z fireman, he took off for what he thought a routine papermachine fire (15-30 minutes). IT WASN'T. Instead it was a \$200,000 roll storage fire covering an area of 250 ft. x 400 ft. which was still smoldering a week later. Jessett was relieved of fire duty at midnight which didn't leave much time for the last two rounds if he had had the strength to play anyway. It was a good fire though.

(Editor's comment. The promoters of this tournament should not have to apologize for this tourney. A grand total of 31 players cannot be sneered at and look at the strength! I see Viesturs Seglins back after a long absense winning only 1 game. There are at least a dozen players I would rather not be paired against too!)

Answering Mr. Merk's query, there IS a chess olympiad every other year. The Havana, Cuba event will be in 1966.)

BLACKMORE AND PULLEN 'WOODY' CHAMPIONS

The last two Washington Woodpushers events had ended in first place ties so the writer decided to expand the tourney to a two day, five round affair in order to produce a winner. However, if the usual four rounds had been played, KENT PULLEN would be the lone winner but instead we ended up with not one, not two, but THREE winners! Even tie-breaking systems could not break up the tie between WILLIAM BLACKMORE and Pullen and TERRY NELSON (for the third year in a row!) ended only one Median point behind but received a one third share of top prize money.

Reduced to the simplest terms, Blackmore upset Nelson in the second round (see games pages), Pullen downed Blackmore in round three and then Nelson defeated Pullen in the last round to create the three-way snarl for the top spot.

In the last round DAVE FULTON was giving CAL BERTRAM a licking (according to an eye witness account by Blackmore) but blew the game causing Blackmore to flip since a Fulton win would have given Blackmore clear first place on the tie-break.

Because of the tardy date the tourney was decided, the CHESS LETTER was only able

to give this year's Woodpushers two or three days notice. As the Woodpushers is supposed to be a one-day "fun" affair, the expansion to a two day event may also have hurt the turnout. Only 14 entered, a very poor showing. If kept to only one day and given ample notice, at least twice as many players probably would have played.

Nelson was the big favorite to win as his rating was far higher than any other.

MELVIN HORMAN finished fourth, 1 point behind the leaders, with a 3-2 score. He won his first three but lost his last two to Pullen and Blackmore.

For cross-table purposes only, the T.D. used a fifth tie-breaking system, secondary Solkoff (after Median, Solkoff, S-B, and secondary Median) that placed Pullen ahead of Blackmore. (Ed. note: Pullen won the individual encounter against Blackmore but you cannot discount his upset of Nelson. A way out is to list unbreakable ties alphabetically which is standard and would place Blackmore number one.)

The tourney was played at the Boeing Cafeteria & the WCF is very grateful for all the Boeing people have done for chess.

Trophies for first plus high class B and C. Also upset awards. One section for all players. Time limit 30 moves an hour. The Boise Club will serve coffee and donuts during play. Dick Vandenburg is director. Round starting: One- 9:30 a.m., two- 1:00 p.m., three- 4:30 p.m. and four- 8:00 p.m.

BILL BILLS, who once won the Washington State Championship, and DUNCAN SUTTLES, who won the Seattle Seafair and other tournaments, tied for first in the 164 player LAS VEGAS OPEN. Both scored 6-1 and had 35 Median tie-breaking points. A toss of a coin gave Bills the first place trophy. Other northwest or former northwest players in this tournament were O. W. MANNEY, who placed 14th with a 5-2 score, DON BENGGE, 69th with 4-3 and DON SEITER, 80th with a 3-4 score.

GASTON CHAPPUIS won the 1964 Salt Lake City YMCA Chess Club Summer Rating Tourney. Chappuis won four in a row and then drew his last round game with 5th place JOHN ARCHBOLD to clinch the title with a $4\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ score. DICK HEILBUT finished second with 4-1, losing his opening round game to 7th place ERIC SUNDSTROM. Thirteen players were in this.

The long 1964 Boise Club Championship was finally concluded in September after a six month's run. Idaho State Champion DICK VANDENBURG won out with a 13-1 score, losing only to third place finisher MAX WENNSTROM. W. C. JACKSON of Glenns Ferry, who is a member of the Boise Chess Club, finished second with 10-4. NORMAN LEE, who finished tied for third and fourth, won a trophy for showing the most improvement. S-B. points gave him fourth.

SANTIAGO WINS AT KLAMATH OPEN

37 players were at Klamath Falls' Winema Hotel November 7th and 8th for the Klamath Falls Open Chess Tournament. 16 of these were in the USCF-rated section where the navy's REYNALDO SANTIAGO (U.S.S. Talladega) and Portland's DEANE MOORE tied for first and second. Both scored 4-1 in this five round Swiss with Santiago winning 3 & drawing 2 while Moore won 4 and lost 1. The Median tie-break favored Santiago by one point . They did not play each other. Santiago drew with 5th place DENNY JENQUIN & 10th place REUBEN V. HORN. Moore lost a third round encounter with third place KENT MCGILLICUDDY. McGillicuddy took home the third place trophy. He went into the final round with a $\frac{1}{2}$ point edge ($3\frac{1}{2}$ to 3) over Santiago and needed a draw to cinch a first place tie with Moore or a win to

cinch the title outright. He got neither as Santiago won this crucial.

Other prize winners in this event were MICHAEL SCHEMM, Class A - VINCE BRICHER, the Class B trophy, DANIEL CILLIS, the Class C trophy and DENNY JENQUIN - Junior trophy.

The only player finishing with a perfect score was Cottage Grove's GARY BRICHER who won the 21 player reserve section event with a 5-0 score.
