

EARNs THIRD LEG AND GAINS TITLE AT LONE PINE


A quartet of great players won the 1979 Statham Masters Plus tournament held in Lone Pine, California, from March 25 to April 4. Grandmasters Gligoric, Hort, Gheorghiu, and Liberzon each scored 6 1/2 of a possible 9 to finish tied for first place in the world famous event. Many consider Svetozar Gligoric the finest Yugoslavian player ever. Vlastimil Hort is Czechoslovakia's leading player, and Florian Gheorghiu is a many-time Romanian champion. All three are consistent winners on the international circuit. Vladimir Liberzon was born in the Soviet Union, but emigrated to Israel in the early seventies. He won the Lone Pine tournament in 1975.


The top American player was Grandmaster William Lombardy, who was a half point back at 6. Lombardy was the World Junior Champion in 1957, and has been a leading force in United States chess for many years. At Lone Pine, he defeated Viktor Korchnoi in an interesting endgame. Korchnoi, the world's second ranked player, was the pre-tournament favorite. Many thought his sharp style would be ideally suited to Lone Pine's Swiss System format, but he lost to Lombardy and Liberzon and had to settle for 5 1/2 - 3 1/2. Tied with Lombardy at 6 were Grandmasters Bent Larsen of Denmark, Gennadi Sosonko of Holland, Dragutin Sahovic of Yugoslavia, and International Masters Hans Ree of Holland and Yehuda Grunfeld of Israel.

Yasser Seirawan, the current US Junior Champion, finished with 5 1/2 points, a spectacular result in view of his opposition. Seirawan faced eight Grandmasters in the 9 rounds, and scored 4 1/2 points against them. His opponents included all four of the eventual winners; he drew against Gligoric, Gheorghiu, and Liberzon, but suffered his only loss to Hort. Seirawan stunned the tournament with his second-round upset of Danish Grandmaster Bent Larsen, currently the seventh ranked player in the world. Seirawan, of Seattle, Washington, scored victories also over British Grandmaster Anthony Miles and San Francisco star Paul Whitehead. Seirawan drew with Grandmaster Gennadi Sosonko of Holland, and with Grandmaster Samuel Reshevsky, 68, a living legend of the United States for the past sixty years.
