

We received our chess set and board recently from R. F. D. DISTRIBUTORS, P. O. BOX 11 PARKCHESTER STATION, NEW YORK, N. Y. 10462 and found them superior to what we imagined. The set was 1½ times the size of any wooden set I've ever seen for \$10 in any store and you just cannot buy a board for \$5 (or even twice that) in any Seattle store. They sold us the board and set together for \$14.50 less 20% or only \$11.60! Since they want to give away such fine chess equipment, we have sent for more. Our front cover shows a picture of their \$10 set plus their chess clock.

Incidently, we were not asked to advertise for them. This is completely on our own initiative. Looking over the above paragraph of course you can buy a chess board for \$5 or less - but not like the board R. F. D. is selling!

## FIRST ANNUAL GRAYS HARBOR OPEN MAR. 6-7

The Grays Harbor Chess Club, with the help of a group of Hoquiam businessmen, is sponsoring the First Annual Grays Harbor Open.

The dates are Saturday and Sunday, March 6th and 7th, 1965. The location is the Hoquiam Y.M.C.A., corner of 7th and "K" Streets, Hoquiam, Washington.

Registration is between 9 a.m. and 10 a.m. on Saturday, March 6th.

This is a five round Swiss with three sessions on Saturday and two on Sunday. The first round is scheduled for 10:30 a.m. Round two is scheduled for 3 p.m. The third round is scheduled to start at 7:30 Saturday evening.

Sunday's schedule calls for round four to begin at 8 a.m. and the fifth and final round is scheduled for 12:30 p.m.

This is a one section tournament and will be directed by the incomparable BUZ EDDY.

The time control will be 45 moves in two hours. Entry fees \$3.50 past 18 years old & \$2.50 not yet 18. (Ed. note: If you ARE 18, what then?) No memberships required.

First prize is \$100 plus trophy. Second prize is \$35 plus trophy. Third prize is \$15. There will be a trophy for best junior (under 18), best woman player, highest class A, highest class B, highest class C and highest unrated. Only one prize to a person except upset prizes - one for each round.

## ADAMS WINS 1965 SPOKANE OPE

Story from notes by G. Priebe

DOUG ADAMS won the 1965 SPOKANE COUNTY OPEN held January 30-31 in Spokane. 17 played in the six round Swiss event. Adams scored 5-1, losing no games but drawing place finisher DR. DAVE GROENIG in the third round and drawing third place finisher FRANK ASHLEY in the final round.

Dr. Groenig lost his only game to Ashley in the fifth round while Ashley was the victim of a first round upset at the hands of PAT HERBERS.

GORDON CORNELIUS, always favored to be on or near the top in Spokane events, finished with a 4-2 score in fourth place. He lost to both Dr. Groenig and Doug Adams.

GEORGE W. PRIEBE ( whom we haven't had any word of for some time ) and ROBERT KIT-TREDGE both played and directed.

LARRY BRENTON got a notice to go to work after the third round on Saturday eve. So he slept in on Sunday morning after working all night. He said it didn't bother him one bit losing by forfeit to Cornelius. The pairing was unfortunate, but rather unavoidable, since the fourth round pairings were made Saturday night before leaving the hall.

What happened to PAT HERBERS who finished 11th shouldn't happen to a serious enthusiast. Pat defeated FRANK ASHLEY, third place finisher, in the first round and consequently had to face some pretty stiff competition. Enclosed is Pat's win over Ashley which was given the biggest upset prize for the tournament.

Spokane has some greatly improved young players this year. RICHARD VROMAN, O'KEEFE and PAT HERBERS were all class "C" players on the January rating list and the tournament winner, DOUG ADAMS, was only rated class "B". As can be seen by the crosstable, they gave some competition to the older more experienced players. Doug Adams' fourth round win over Richard Vroman was on time, but the last dozen moves of the allotted 45 in two hours found both players under time-pressure. Except for this game and Dr. Groenig's draw with Adams in the third round, the 45 moves in two hours time limit did not

work any hardship on anyone. In that third round game, Dr. Groenig was in considerable time-pressure and might have been able to pull his game out if he had had more time for the final moves of the game. This was an interesting end game with the doctor's two rooks and position against Doug's queen and minor piece.

The tournament was played in the gymnasium of the St. Francis of Assisi School in Spokane.

The top six players qualified for the annual Spekane Closed Tournament to decide the Spokane City Championship.

### INLAND EMPIRE OPEN DATE UP IN THE AIR:

Doug Adams, in a letter last month to Mr. Merk, wrote that the Spokane Club wanted April 17-18 but now it has been discovered that this is Easter weekend. The Spokane Club does not want to hold the tournament on Easter. The Spokane Chess Club officers want a different date for the annual INLAND EMPIRE OPEN. There was some discussion about holding the tourney on the following weekend, April 24-25, but it was felt this would interfere with the CENTRAL WASHINGTON OPEN on May 1-2.

A possible date is May 29-30 but this is not official yet. Anyway, scrub the April 17-18 date for the Inland Empire Open from the tournament calendar.

The fourth annual MARCH OF DIMES BENEFIT held in Camas, Washington January 23-24 ended with a traffic jam for first place. 4 players finished the 22 player tourney with 5-1 scores leaving it up to the tie-breaking to decide the prize winners.

SEIF POULSEN of Salem, Oregon won out on both Solkoff and Median Points to take home the first place trophy while MILT COLPRON of Vancouver, Washington won the second trophy.

LEON SAGE of Burns, Oregon and JENQUIN of Portland also scored 5-1 and also had the same tie-breaking points.
