MCCORMICK WINS 13TH INLAND EMPIRE OPEN

JAMES McCORMICK, of Seattle, won the 1966 INLAND EMPIRE OPEN with a $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ score. He won his first five games and drew in the last round with VIK PUPOLS. This was McCormick's silver tournament as it brought his number of tournament wins to 25! (V.Pupols has won 21, and I. Dalbergs 19.).

The final round draw was enough to secure a clear second for Viktors Pupols, of Seattle, with a 5 - 1 finish. Pupols won four games and yielded a third round draw to Colin Aykroyd.

Aykroyd finished an uncontested third at $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$. Besides his draw with Pupols, he had only a fourth round loss to the tournament winner to mar his record. Colin had to play McCormick and Pupols in successive rounds, and played the black pieces in both games. (Aykroyd has maintained for years that there is something seriously wrong in the system your writer uses to assign colors.)

Besides the top three cash awards, a set of three class trophies were presented at the event. Winner of the class "A" award was GORDON CORNELIUS (4 - 2). The "B" trophy was won by H. K. ZORNES, of Richland, The class "C" and Unrated award was won by Mike Murray, of Missoula Montana. Larry Allyn, of Menatchee, finished with the same 3 + 3 score, but was edged out on tie-breaking. They shared the \$5.00 class money.

RUSSELL MILLER donated four books to be awarded as prizes in the event, and they were awarded to the highest finishing junior, and to the top three upsets of the e-MIKE MURRAY had the best and also the third best upset of the tournament, but elected to take the class "C" prize. HERBERS was the top junior and had the 2nd best upset, and in taking the upset left the junior award for DOUG ADAMS. The other two Upset awards were won by NORMAN ABRAHAMSON, of Seattle, and ROBERT HOLZING* ER, also of Seattle. (Herbers beat Holzinger in round one; Abrahamson won from Adams in round six, and Holzinger dumped WILLIAM KIPLINGER in the final round.)

This was Kiplinger's first northwest chess appearence in a year, as for the past 12 month he has been serving with the U.S. Army in Korea. His last tournament was the 1965 State Championship, where he tied for third, and won his game from VIK PUPOLS, and drew with ANDY SCHOENE.

Russell Miller wanted to support this tournament, but found he had an Air Force Reserve meeting the same week-end there in Spokane. After the event had started Russ learned that he would be able to meet his commitment in the mornings and be able to play in the afternoon and evenings.

Jotting down some of the hi-lites of the event your writer noted the following:

ROUND - 1 Pupols appeared to have his hands full with ED REEVES, of Drummond, Mont. Reeves although down a pawn saddled Pupols with a lifeless position, then evolved sharp combination winning back the pawn.Pupols then appeared to be gaining the control of the lines with possibilities of transposing to a favorable endgame, when Reeves blundered badly, permitting a back rank mate. Pat Herbers posted a sharp upset over Holzinger. The game was well played, but Holzinger found himself in time-pressure with 15 moves to go. Herbers had hard to meet tactical threats, and Holzinger_offered draw which Herbers declined. Holzinger then quickly worked his way through the tactical threats, but appeared headed for a lost endgame, when Herbers made a suspicious looking move. Holzinger did not have time to check the threats, and simply reacted, whereupon Herbers played his one move mate. Colin Aykroyd consumed his usual 1 hour and 55 minutes for the first 25 moves in his game with Robert Kittredge, and found that with 23 moves yet to make he had a shade less than two minutes. The game itself was clearly won, but the question remained making time control was a physical possibility. Kittredge resigned after move forty, and on timing the flag it was found that Colin still had at least 45 seconds. Jim McCormick won handily from Rod Espey. After the game Espey mentioned that he had

read McCormick's resolution in last month's "Letter", and figured it wasn't any use. Mc-Cormick then informed him of Mike Schemm's resolution breaker two weeks earlier.

ROUND - 2 MIKE MURRAY posted his second upset of the event, by downing defending champion Doug Adams, of Spokane. Murray established his 1564 rating in the 1964 Montana Open, but since that time has improved considerably. The tournament contenders all won their second round games, and left six perfect scores at the end of round two. (J. McCormick, V. Pupols, W. Kiplinger, C. Aykroyd, G. Cornelius, and M. Murray.)

ROUND - 3 Murray continued his impressive demonstation, by holding northwest expert Kiplinger to a draw. The Pupols - Aykroyd game appeared headed for the usual time-pressure scrammble, as Pupols had less than ten minutes for 25 moves, and Aykroyd was approaching twenty minutes. Aykroyd was

on the attack, but it was doubtful that under the pressure anything concrete could be evolved. Aykroyd missed his best chance, and the game was drawn. At the other end of the room, Gordon Cornelius and Jim Mc-Cormick were involved in an equally tight time scrammble. McCormick established an outside passed pawn, then played a quick series of checks to make time-control. The pawn won easily in the second time period. Of the six perfect scores after round two only Cornelius was dropped from serious 1st place contention.

ROUND - 4 "The Latvian Gambit is dangerous, damnbit." sings Vik Pupols on frequent occasion. Getting into the same line as did Bob Lundin in the State Championship, (involving a double rook sacrifice) Mike Murray found that over-the-board analysis of the white side of the Latvian is next to impossible and that preparation (story continued on page 13.)

CLARK HARMON WINS 1966 INTERSTATE

CLARK HARMON won the 1966 Interstate Open with a $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ record. Harmon drew his first round game with Dave williams, of Seattle, and won his remaining five games.

RICK GANONG, of Tortland, and JAMES McCORMICK, of Seattle, tied for second at 5 - 1. Ganong lost his final round encounter with McCormick, and McCormick was upset in round one by MIKE SCHEMM, of Corvallis. (It is interesting to note that last month we published McCormick's resolution not to lose to or draw with a fish in 1966 ((Anyone rated under 2200)) and in the next tournament game he played he lost.) Schemm deserves full credit for a fine win in the game, as he worked McCormick into serious time-pressure, then found a sharp combination involving a queen sacrifice and leading to mate.

Thirty-one player entered the open U. S.C.F. section. This was the first USCF rated event in Portland in several years. Fifteen players entered the reserve section bring the total to 46.

DONALD TURNER, of The Dalles, took a clear fourth place with his $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ finish.

Four players tied for 5th spot at 4-2. They were MIKE SCHEMM, of Corvallis, adding yet another class trophy to his collection; JERRY WOLFE, of Troutdale; TERRY NELSON, of Seattle, and LARRY ALLYN, of Wenatchee. Allyn has been absent from the northwest chess scene for some 15 years, he played in the 1948 WASHINGTON STATE CHAMPIONSHIP. He has not played in a northwest rated event since the rating system was established and was therefore unrated, thereby collecting the tournament unrated award.

Harry Demarest, of Portland (and Summit, N.J.) rated 1891 northwest and 1586 USCF won the class "C" award with his 3-3 finish. Demarest stated that this was his second class "C" trophy in two weeks as he had won a similar award in a New Jersey event the week before. When asked by your

to compare the playing strength of the two areas, Demarest said that New Jersey would seem to be the stronger of the two.

Prior to the fifth round of the event Russell Miller made a pitch for the USCF operation HI-GEAR, and passed the hat collecting in excess of 15.00.

JAMES USELTON, of Portland, won the reserve section with a 5 - 1 record. Also finishing with 5 - 1 was BARRETT McMAUGH, of Portland, but finished second on tiebreaking. Uselton was undefeated in the event, drawing his fourth round game with Ken Dart, of Everett, and his fifth round game with Steve Loyland, of Portland. Mc-Maugh won five, and lost his single game to the winner in the third round. STEPHEN STRAND, of Centralia, won the junior award for the section, finishing a clear third at $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$.

The reserve section field of fifteen, included seven newcomers to tournaments. Among these were RON FEUERBERG, younger brother of Gary Feuerberg, and Edward and Sharon Addis, brother and sister. Sharon stated that she as 11. All three won two games in the tourney. In her third round win from Mike McGriff, Sharon played P-K4 and the game proceeded: 1...P-K3;2. B-B4, P-Q3; 3. Q-B3, P-K4; 4. QxP mate.

The tournament was conducted on the week-end of April 2-3, at the Oregonian Hostess House, and was sponsored by the Portland Chess Club.

Eight Portland players participated in the open section, and ten others in the reserve. There were eight Washington players in the top section, and three more in the lower. The balence of the field was comprised of Oregon players.

Time control was 45 moves in two hours, with 25 moves per hour thereafter. Tournament director for the event was Buz Eddy. (Posted on the board as "The late Buz Eddy."

PORTLAND METROPOLITAN CHESS LEAGUE by Lewis Richardson

The Portland Metropolitan Chess League has completed its first season of play. 29 chess players competed in the four team single round robin series of matches. The Black Knights, captained by CLARK HARMON, won the league with a perfect 3-0 match score. They also piled up an impressive $20\frac{1}{2}-9\frac{1}{2}$ total games record. The name of the winning team, and the players playing on it, has been engraved on a four year plaque to be kept at the Portland Chess Club.

The PMCL was organized on an individual entry, rather than team entry, basis. Each player interested in playing in the league paid a small entry fee (50¢) to be listed on the players roster. After the registration period was over the PMCL coordinating committee met and decided that there enough players to form four teams. They appointed four team captains; Greg Kern, Clark Harmon, Deane Moore, and Lewis Richardson. The captains then chose the rest of their teams by means of a rotating draft. The idea behind this method was to provide an opportunity for match play to all levels of players, and at the same time keep the strength of the teams approxamatly equal.

Polugaievsky of USSR won the 28th Beverwijk Chess Congress in Holland $11\frac{1}{2}-3\frac{1}{2}$ without losing a game. Next were Szabo 11, Bilek $10\frac{1}{2}$ and Ivkev 10. In the master group Ghitescu of Roumania was first $8\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$. Nona Gaprindashvili Woman World Champion scored 6-5 to place 6th.

Ivkov won a small tourney at Fersel Holland 5-0.

Najdorf won another Argentina

tourney $8\frac{1}{5}-2\frac{1}{5}$.

East German Pietzch won a tourney at Leipzig 10½ with Liberson (USSR) and Kavalek (Czech) 10 out of 15.

Portisch won Hungarian Championship moves. Fridrik Olafsson won a tourney in Reykjavik, Iceland 9-2. Vasiukov USSR grandmaster was next 8½ then O'Kelly Petrosis and Palmason 7.

New Israeli Champion is Aloni who also won the title 21 years ago.

Parma of Yugoslav won the annual tourney at Reggio Emilia, Italy 9-2.

At Venice Ivkov, a very active grandmaster, won a small but strong tourney with 5 pts, Rest were Antoshin (USSR) 4½; Lengyel (Hungary) & Tatai (Italy 4; Golembek (Great Britian), Schmid (West Germany) and Hamann (Denmark) 3½ plus Fletzer (Italy) 0.

Nineteen year old David Friedgood won the XX11th Charnwood Tournament in Cape Town. South Africa 8-1.

In a Malaga, Spain tournament 1-2 were O'Kelly and Jimenez 8; 3 Sabonido $7\frac{1}{2}$; 4 Tozan and Wade 7; 6-7 Medina and Ziner $5\frac{1}{2}$; 8 Ulvestad 5. Olaf Ulvestad is a former Seattle

player and US master.

The following comments (thanks goes to Vic Pupols for supplying me with these) were made before the start of the World Championship match between Tigran Petrosian and Boris Spassky April 11. O'Kelly: "It is no accident that the World Championship is held in Moscow for the eighth time. Indeed to achieve such results the efforts and support of the entire state were necessary." Petrosian: " I am getting a headache from advice and prognosis. I believe the same for Spassky. My main desire is that the match be interesting, that the games be good even if all end up draws. If the whole match ends up drawn I will not object." He wins in that case.

There will be a meeting of NWICL team captains sometime during May for the purpose of electing officers for the 1966-67 season and working out a tentative schedule and deciding League policy for the coming year. We have also received correspondence from Yakima Valley College and Wenatchee Valley College. Since all of these schools are widely separated it will not be possible to construct more League

divisions unless several more schools in eastern Washington and Idaho join

tne League.

OURNAMENT) RTHVVEST BY BUZ EDDY

This is the last of this series by your present editor, as tournament administration and tournament policy are now the responsibility of the new WCF Tournament Director. Eugene Fomin. We hope to have a similar artcle from him next month. In asking Mr. Fomin if he intended to use the "Buz Eddy" rule of mandatory recording, he replied that this will not be in force in events that he directs, and that recording will not be mandatory per se, but only to establish validity of claims.

One last word about color assignment that your writer used during his tenure as the top rated player in an event was the man to beat, and started each event by giving him black in the first round to increase his prospects of white in critical games. In subsequent rounds, where colors played were the same in previous rounds, we used the idea of the player furtherest from the middle continued to alternate. (Higher rated player in the top score groups, lower rated player in the bottom groups.) In the center score group we gave white to the

higher rated player to offset the fact that the first round policy made the event black top heavy. Until late 1965 ticed that this was inconsistent with some of the above ideas, and ceased that practice late last year.

Your writer has agreed to direct the B.C. tournament this year, and that shall be our last appearence in that capacity. (Assuming Fomin will direct the E.E.O.) 

Meeting called to order at 1:30, Sunday March 27, 1966.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as read.

Mr. Parsons, Editor, introduced new ideas and the president endorsed the improvements in the publication system planned for the coming year.

The rating director explained the working of the rating system used in Washington. (See the April 1966 NCL page 11 for a summary, Ed.)

The tournament director rendered his report, emphasizing the fact, that the quality of the Washington State Championship tourn - aments had improved tremendously during the last year. An appeal was made for more assistance for the tournament director during the US Open to be held in Seattle this year. Mr. Eddy announced that the Labor Day tournament will be held in Seattle and Portland under equal conditions, to avoid hurting either city. The profit of the last Wash. Open tournament will be held to safeguard next years prizes.

Mr. Weaver, the current postal director, gave his report. About membership in general, it was mentioned that there are 310 individuals and 27 clubs belonging to the Wash Chess Federation (NWCL), of which 15 of these clubs are from the State of Washington.

The treasurer's report was read and approved. Mr. Christopher reported that the cash balance is about equal in size to that at this same time last year, but assets have increased substantially. This was due in main to the purchase of a new reproducing machine for about \$100. Postal chess is self-supporting still. It was pointed out that the funds of the US Open are held seperate from those of the Wash. State Chess Federation so there would been legal connection that could involve the Federation in case of a shortage during the US Open.

Moved by Mr. Pullen that the tournament director should be granted 5% of the gross proceeds of the tournament he directs, if the net receipts so allow it. Carried. This is left to the discretion of the Director, but he is in his rights to request this, especially if the distance or other circumstances make his job more difficult than ordinary.

Moved by Mr. Joachim that the Seafair tournament should be not held this year due to the US Open, but that it should be continued again in 1967. So carried.

He defeated Vitanyi, Veszely, and A. Panayotu among others and drew with R. Zuk and C. Aykroyd. Zuk, Macskasy, and Aykroyd finished in a triple tie for second with 5\frac{1}{2}\display \text{Young Zuk was the sensation of the tournament; a swift and sure positional player, he had both Suttles and Macskasy against the wall but was only to draw despite being a pawn up against both. By the time this issue reaches you, our new Postal Director, address above, will have returned from his vacation, and will be ready to receive game reports and to fill requests for assignment in new sections. Late correspondence that has gone to Howard Weaver will be forwarded to Ward along with certain recommendations on policy that has worked well for Merk and Weaver in the past, such as:

TIME LIMITS and FORFEITS. We try to be reasonable about this. Some players are content to play without strict adherence to the 48 hour rule, on a give and take basis, but the rule is there if anyone wants to insist on it. If players report undue slowness, we ask them to make it clear to their opponent that they expect compliance with the time rule, and then if there is another occurrence of unexcused slowness we do not hesitate to forfeit out the player, and award a minimum of 10 points for each remaining game, or full points for obviously won positions. Ward can consider this past policy, and make his own future policy. You are invited to write to him with your views on this and other matters.

The ratings on the back cover now include all of the Northwest Prize Tournament 65BlOA Holmberg wins 38 from Keating players, except for three who withdrew and forfeited all games. Some of these players rated themselves too low, but are moving rapidly up to their proven class. One of the "C" entries asked to be revised to "A" where he belonged, and another we moved up in justice to opponents with long-time earned ratings. On the other side of the coin there have been some easy points taken from new players who have gone in too high not realizing that club-player tactics do not always meet the test of the more careful analysis found in postal chess.
