# SPASSKY WINS

## 2ND PIATAGORSKY CUP

International Grandmaster BORIS SPASSKY of Russia, won the 2nd Piatagorsky cup tournament with a score of  $11\frac{1}{2}$ - $6\frac{1}{2}$ . Spassky was the only undefeated player with 5 wins and thirteen draws. Our own champion Robert J. Fischer scored only  $3\frac{1}{2}$  points in the first half of this ten man double round robin. The second half was a very different story. He scored a fantastic  $7\frac{1}{2}$  points. Fischer won 7 games, lost 3; (these were in a row!) to Najdorf, Larsen, and Spassky; plus eight draws.

Bent Larsen, of Denmark, was 3rd at 10 points. He won seven, but lost five.

Eajos Portisch, of Hungary, and Wolfgang Unzicker, of Germany scored  $9\frac{1}{2}$ . World Champion Tigran Petrosian, and Samuel Reshevsky both had 9 - 9. Miguel Najdorf, of Argentina, scored 8, followed by Borislav Ivkov, of Yugoslavia, at  $6\frac{1}{2}$ ; and Jan Donner, of Holland, at 6.

After 16 rounds Spassky and Fischer were tied with 10 - 6, and they played each other in round 17. There were over 900 spectators, and they turned people away. Fischer tried for a win, but with Spassky satisfied to draw it was not to be, so the game was drawn in 35 moves. Spassky went on to beat Donner in the final round, and Fischer could only draw against Petrosian.

So Spassky took \$5000.00 first prize, and Fischer the \$3000.00 2nd.

The many spectators at the tournament were well taken care of. Each game was projected on a large screen behind the players. Also large clocks controlled by the ones the players used were mounted along side the screens. A separate lecture room was set up with various masters, and after their games were finished the grandmasters discussed their recently concluded game.

## BOISE CHESS CLUB HOLDS HANDICAP RAPID TRANSIT TOURNAMENT

The Boise Chess Club periodically holds a Handicap Rapid Transit Tournament, and this type of event has been a big hit with the members. It could be that it might be of interest to other clubs looking for new ways to keep up members' interest. In the latest games, NICK SKIRMANTS came out on top 9-1, followed by MAX WENNSTROM 7-3; and DICK VANDENBURG, DAVID HALLOCK, M. W. WRIGHT, and JOHN COSHO, all with 6-4. Eleven players competed during the one evening of play at Vandenburg's home on Aug. 17.

The way to set up such a tournament is to assign each player a time limit for his play depending upon his ability as a rapid player. These limits for his play fluctuate up to 10 or 11 minutes as the most time allowed any player. A round robin is played although a swiss tournament could be played if too many were in attendance for a round robin. Colors are drawn at each game, and players play whomever they wish until all games have been played.

Let's say your time limit is five minutes, and your opponents is ten minutes. Each game must have a clock so you set the time on your clock at five, and on your opponents at ten. The game begins and it must end in a mate or a book draw before either flag falls, or the man whose flag falls automatically loses, regardless of the position. If you are ahead on time, you always continue until the end because your opponents flag might drop. After one or two evenings of this type of chess each players time can be quite accurately figured and everyone is virtually on the same plane, whether he be a master or a class "C" player. In our club the times range from between 2 to 10 minutes for this last event. Most players were somewhere in between. At the conclusion of the tournament we adjusted the times, depending on the results so we could be ready for the next time. Skirmants was the winner, and his time had been six minutes so we cut him to five. One player scored 1-9, and had seven minutes so we increased this to nine for the next play. One older player will be given 11 minutes next time. This type of event has proved to be very popular. For more details write to Dick Vandenburg.

## VANDENBURG RETAINS B.C.C. CHAMPIONSHIP

Dick Vandenburg, Idaho's top ranked player handily won the 1966 Boise Club Championship with a perfect 13-0 score. Earlier in the year he had lost the state championship and the open title, but finally retained the

local crown. The deciding game was a victory over Max Wennstrom, who at the time of the game was only one point behind. Wennstrom lost only one other game and placed 2nd 10½-2½. George Razor lost to the leaders, but won the rest to hold down third place, 9½-3½. The tournament director was Dick Shropshire.

This is a three mover, but it isn't very hard. From now on we will have a problem corner in each issue, and your answer must be postmarked by the 18th of the month of the issue. As yet we haven't figured out

any prize system but this is being worked on. Last month we had a good response and varied results. The correct answer to Problem No. 1 was .... R-B2. A couple of players said R-B7, which was the wrong end of the board, but I will give them the benefit of the doubt this time, but no more. Always remember that in problems White's side is at the bottom of the board. If you look again at No. 1 you will see that the answer has to be R-B2 and not R-B7.

We had three players that gave the answer as N-R5 dis. ch. These were the only incorrect answers that I received. Here you have to realize that the mate must occur in exactly the number of moves specified. If, after N-R5 dis. ch. Black plays KxB or K-R2, R-R3 indeed mates. However, what if Black throws in a couple of nuisance moves such as R-N2, followed by B-N6? I'll admit that either throws away a piece, but both delay the mate by one move, and thereby do not permit mate in two. Be up. In order to be proper, nothing can stop mate in 2 (or 3).

Those that answered with R-B2 (or B7) were ED SMITH (Idaho), Mike Schemm (Oregon), and MEL HORMAN, CHARLES JOACHIM, RUSSELL MILLER, ROBERT LUNDIN, ZACK WESTER, and DAVID FULTON (Washington). Congratulations to the solvers, it was nice hearing from you! Let's hear from even more this month (by the 18th). A lot of you are working the problem and not sending in an answer.

COOK ?

Two months ago we published a letter from reader Mel Horman containing what he thought was a "cook" in a published chess problem. We present it here again with a few additions.

The Problem

I found a "cook" to a problem by Kasparian which is given on page 28 of "Techniques in Chess" by Gerald Abrahams; Citadel Press, 1965.

The solution is:

- 1. B-N5                      P-N6
- 2. R-Q2 ch                      K-R8
- 3. P-B7                      RxB                      7. R-Q2!                      RxQ
- 4. P-B8(Q)                      R-N8 ch                      8. R-QN2                      R-R7
- 5. R-Q1                      R-N7                      9. R-N1 mate
- 6. Q-R3 ch                      R-R7

The "cook" is at move 7. as: 7. ...P-N7ch

July 18 - .... Mr. Horman's cook ... is not a cook at all. ... I'll include the main line in which Black's replies are all

pretty clearly forced: 7.R-Q2, P-N7; 8. QxP, RxQ; 9.RxR, P-R6; 10.R-N1, K-R7; 11.R-N8, K-R8; 12.K-B2, P-R7; 13.K-N3, K-N8; 14.R-KR8, P-R8(N); 15.K-B3, K-R7; 16. R-QN8, winning the knight and the game. After move 9 it is probably a book win, but it does not appear explicitly in my book. I suppose Mr. Horman missed White's 10th move since any other move leads to a book draw or a win for Black. - Charles Ballantine

July 31 - The time has come to eat 'umble pie. ....I had shown the cook to several players stronger than myself, and all agreed. Yesterday I recieved a letter from Gerald Abrahams, author of "Techniques in Chess", in reply to a letter in which I informed him of this cook. His letter begins; "I like a bold man, and you're brave to try to cook the uncookable Kasparian, needless to say you've failed. Just try: 8.QxP, RxQ; 9.RxR, P-R6; 10.R-N1, K-R7; 11.R-N8, K-R8 12. K-B2, P-R7 (if 12...K-R7; 13.R-QR8) 13.K-N3, K-N8 14.R-KR8 wins." I would appreciate your publishing this instructive sequel.

# ROBERT BYRNE

## 1966 UNITED STATES

201! The third largest U.S. Open, and the eighth largest chess tournament ever conducted in the United States was held last month in Seattle.

The 1966 U.S. Open was won by two grandmasters, ROBERT BYRNE, and PAL BENKO. The USCF does not break first place ties, and the two players are United States Open Co-Champions. Byrne and Benko each scored 11 - 2 in the thirteen round event, Byrne was undefeated, but was held to four draws in his games with Arthur Bisguier, Anthony Saidy Duncan Suttles, and Co-champion Benko. Benko was upset in round four by Californian master Peter Cleghorn, and drew with Byrne and Suttles.

Duncan Suttles took a clear third place in the tournament with a 10- 3 record, losing two games to William Lombardy, and Anthony Saidy; and drawing each of the champions.

A six way tie developed for fourth place in the  $9\frac{1}{2}$ - $3\frac{1}{2}$  score group. In order of tie-breaking Anthony Saidy, Arthur Bisguier, Peter Cleghorn, IVARS DALBERGS, Touradj Saidi and Ronald Gross. Saidi won the top expert award.

Seven players finished the event with 9 - 4 records. They were William Lombardy, Edward Formanek, Andrew Kalotay, Jerome Hanken, Viktors Pupols, James McCormick, and Viesturs Seglins. This group included three experts, and 2nd expert prize money was pooled with the 9th thru 15th place prize money with each of the players; regardless of rating receiving an equal share.

The class "A" competition was closely contested, and when the smoke cleared at the conclusion of round 13, no less than nine players were tied at 8 - 5 for first "A". ROBERT HOLZINGER, won the title on tie-breaking. Holzinger won five of his first six games, posting wins over expert Jerome Hanken James McCormick, and master Elod Macskasy.

The class "B" competition was a walk-a-

way for Robert Erkes, of Baltimore Md., as he posted a  $8\frac{1}{2}$ - $4\frac{1}{2}$  record a point and a half ahead of his nearest competition.

Micheal Murray, of Missoula, and Vince Gillis each posted a  $7\frac{1}{2}$ - $5\frac{1}{2}$  record to share top class "C" money. Murray took the trophy on tie breaking.

The turn out of 201 at this event must be considered an overwhelming success, and yet we might have done considerably better had it not been for two uncontrollable occurrences. The airline strike apparently held many eastern players home, and the fact that the Paitogorisky Cup Tournament was still in progress as our tournament began held nearly a dozen L.A. players away as they were busy supporting that event. But the success of any tournament is not the outside draw, but the local support it receives. In this the 1966 U.S. Open stands alone. 96 of the participants were from the state of Washington. Never in the history of this tournament has there been such a large representation from a single state.

The tournament itself was quite successful as U.S. Opens go, as no major complaints were registered at any time, and the tournament committee received numerous compliments on the preparations and arrangements. The excellent playing conditions were reflected in the fact that the tourney suffered only ten drop-outs, again a record for the Seattle U.S. Open.

The northwest representation in the upper eschelons did extremely well in the tournament, taking five of the top sixteen places. Suttles, expectedly, led the N.W. contingent taking third place. Ivars Dalbergs placed seventh, and Viktors Pupols, James McCormick, and Viesturs Seglins were 14th, 15th, and 16th respectively. In the  $8\frac{1}{2}$  -  $4\frac{1}{2}$  group were three more northwest players, Dr. Elod Macskasy, Elmars Zemgalis and Peter O'Gorman. McCormick got off to a very bad start scoring only  $3\frac{1}{2}$  out of the first six rounds, but came back with  $5\frac{1}{2}$  in

in the final seven rounds, including a final round draw with Arthur Bisguier to finish in the money. Pupols played steady sharp chess throughout the event, although clipped for an early draw by Greg Kern, of Portland, and upset by young Dennis Fritzinger, of San Francisco. His famed Latvian luck did not make its appearance until the final round when his opponent, Alex Panayotu, of Vancouver, failed to fill in his 30th move on his scoresheet and mistakenly thought that he had completed the required 50 moves when he had in fact only completed 49. Panayotu, thinking he had made time-control, let his flag drop in a reportedly won position.

The struggle for first place developed into an interesting strategic battle, as R. Byrne went into the final round a  $\frac{1}{2}$  point ahead of the field. Byrne needing only  $\frac{1}{2}$  point to cinch a first place tie played for and offered Suttles an early draw, hoping Lombardy would hold Benko to at least a draw. Suttles neither accepted nor rejected the offer immediately, but simply watched the other games develop; for if Benko could be held to  $10\frac{1}{2}$  or less a win against Byrne would give him a share of first place. But Benko was not to be stopped. In the 11th round he beat Saidy, in the 12th he beat Bisguier, and in the final round he needed a win against Lombardy with the black pieces. Benko played a sharp line of the Sicilian and emerged victorious. As Suttles saw the win for Benko developing he accepted Byrne's draw offer taking a clear third.

The tournament was directed by George Koltanowski, of San Francisco, Calif. He handled the event very well, and no major disputes arose during the run of the event. In acting as assistant T.D. your writer was able to watch the intricacies of Mr. Koltanowski's work, and was much impressed with the efficiency with which he handled the tremendous job. We found that we held divergent philosophies in regard to recording moves in competitive chess. In this event no recording was actually required, whereas in any event directed by your writer record-

ing is mandatory as each move is played.

The most vociferous objector during the tournament turned out to be Dr. Anthony Saidy. Saidy was in a more or less make or break situation. He could only gain a slot on the U.S. team with a win of this tourney. The morning following his draw with Byrne, Saidy came to Koltanowski's room at about 8:00 AM. "It's your fault!" said the good doctor, "If you'd have given me white instead of black I would have beaten Byrne. If I'd have beaten Byrne I would have gone on to win this tournament. If I won this tournament Spann would have no choice to pick me for the U.S. team. If I played on the team I would have won 22 games and become an international grandmaster, and then gone on to win the World Championship."

"And," said the indomitable Mr. Koltanowski, "if your Aunt had four wheels she'd be a cable car!"

The tournament brought many of our former northwest players back for a visit. Jack Nourse and Robert Edberg came up from California to play in the event. Ted Warner and Sgt. Robert Karch stopped by for visits. (Karch is on leave, and will be in the N.W. for about a month and a half before departing for Viet Nam.)

All in all your writer, and apparently every participant, enjoyed himself completely. Our particular high point was at the awards banquet the morning following the tourney. Working straight through the night before computing tie breaking we found ourselves in rare form, handing out awards and bars with equal vigor.

Games and further reports of the tourney will be available in months to come. But we will close this first summary with a salute to the volunteer help that made this event the success that it was. Thanks to Bill Gillette, Pete Olson, Pat Hickey and others for the fine set of board numbers, to Chris Oder, Cherie Mathewson, Kathy Eddy, & Linda Sweetman for the fine work on the desk

improvement of services. This increase, however, has another aspect regarding the local organizers ability to promote national chess. The prospects of the 1967 Washington Open being a success similar to the 1966 tournament seem a bit difficult considering: \$10 entry fee plus \$10 USCF membership plus \$3 WCF membership. With this particular in mind, and the future of national chess promotion in this area an important consideration, the WCF is launching a campaign to sell as many USCF Life memberships at the present rate as possible. A 20% percent discount is allowed each affiliate for memberships that affiliate receives, Normally the WCF has used this to pay tournament expenses particularly national rating fees. During the next three months, however, this 20% will be returned to the member. The current cost of a USCF Life membership is \$100.00, but for any WCF member that takes advantage of the present offer the cost is only \$80.00. Your writer along with several others took advantage of this at the US Open, we hope many of you will do the same. After Jan. 1, 1967 Life membership raises to \$200.00.

Our primary intent in this campaign is to form a core of permanent members from which we can build and continue to promote national chess in the northwest. The 1966 US Open showed clearly that we are a strong chess area, as strong per capita as any in the nation. We know this from our national membership, from our regional membership, as well as from the amount of local and club activity existing in the area.

Naturally we wish to continue to prosper and grow, that is to avail organized chess to as great as segment of the population as possible. This end is partially achieved in cooperation with the national chess organization. The support through publication and ratings of our regional events is important, but we feel equally important is the existance of a national organization acting as a central exchange for ideas an programs of chess promotion. With these services available it becomes far easier to evolve a working program of chess promotion on the regional and local scale.

For these reasons the WCF is intent on supporting and enlarging the USCF representation in the area.
