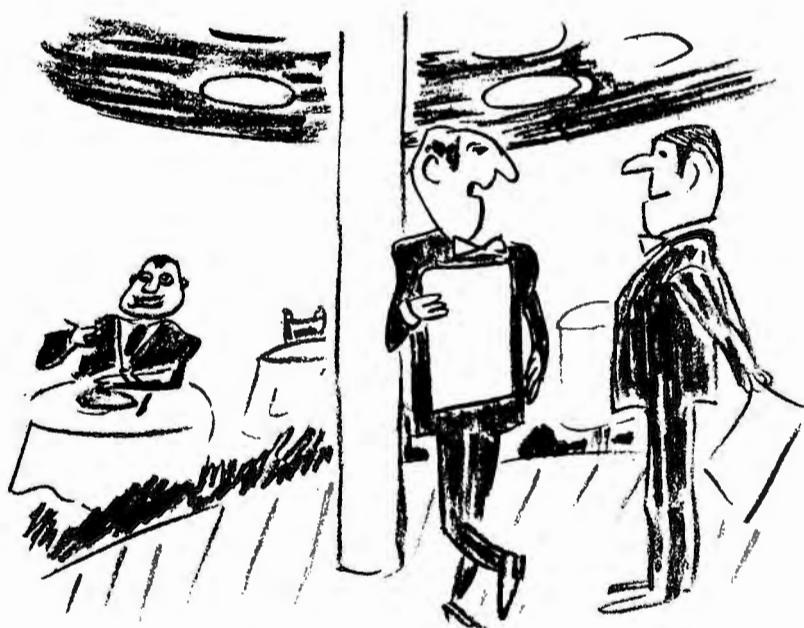

It's getting to be a familiar comment around here: Bob Zuk Wins Again! In his unique but consistent style Bob went undefeated to win the Seattle Open, accepting a draw with Viktors Pūpols. Viktors came in 2nd with a 5-1; he also was undefeated, but drew with Kent Pullen besides drawing with Bob.

There were only twenty-nine players entered at the start of the tournament, and this rather small turn-out may have been due to sports events scheduled the same day. Anyway, the question was asked if there could be only five, instead of six, rounds and a vote was taken. Six rounds. This extra round, only five rounds needed to give a clear winner with twenty-nine players, caused some rather tough pairings for the bigger guns in the final round of the tourney. The late hours Sunday evening didn't bother the Canadians for a change, as Monday was a Holiday for them.

The Canadians brought down a newcomer, Richard Pomfret. Richard is from England and is presently studying at Simon Fraser Univer. lty in Vancouver. His play seemed to improve as he adjusted to our time control and he won all three games on the second day, ending up with a 4-1's to tie for 3rd Place. Not bad, not bad.

Bruce Harper, another Canadian, was unable to repeat his fine performance of the WJ Open. This time he could only muster a 4-2 which placed him seventh in the final standings.

HOW ABOUT IT DON TURNER, DAVE WIGHT AND WHO EVER IS PRESIDENT OF ICA TWO TOURNAMENT ORGANIZERS IN THE NORTHWEST INSIST ON USING USCF RATINGS FOR PAIRINGS AND PRIZES IN THEIR EVENTS EVEN THROUGH WE HAVE VIC KEISER DOING NORTHWEST RATING EACH MONTH. WE HAVE TRIED TO USE THE SAME FORMULA FOR NORTHWEST RATINGS AS USCF USES FOR THEIR RATINGS BUT RECENTLY USCF HAS CHANGED THEIR METHOD SOME HOW TO WHAT AS YET I DON'T KNOW. I SENT IN THE SEATTLE SEAFARIR TO BE RATED BY USCF WITH JUST NAMES OF PLAYERS AND WHO THEY PLAYED THEY SENT IT BACK WANTING TO KNOW TO WH OM EACH PLAYER HAD WON OR LOST. THIS WAS DULY SUPPLIED USCF HAS PROMISED MONTHS AGO TO HAVE AN ARTICLE ON RATINGS IN CHESS LIFE AND REVIEW BUT I HAVE YET TO SEE IT. IN FACT CLAF HAS VERY LITTLE ORGANIZATION NEWS BUT THAT IS ANOTHER MATTER. NORTHWEST RATINGS ARE MUCH MORE UP TO DATE THAN USCF AND WE PRINT THE CHANGES EACH MONTH WHERE AS USCF PRINTS CHANGES EVERY FOUR MONTHS. IT IS NOT FAIR TO THE PLAYER WHO HAS BEEN PLAYING FOR SOME TIME AND HAS A WEEL ESTABLISHED RATING BOTH USCF AND NORTHWEST AND USUALLY THEY ARE QUITE CLOSE TO BE PLAYING FOR SAME PRIZE IN AN EVENT AS A YOUNG PLAYER WHO AS WELL ALL KNOW PROGRESS QUITE RAPIDLY WHEN THEY FIRST START TOURNAMENT PLAY. I SHOULD HAVE DONE SOME STATISTICAL WORK BEFORE STATTING THIS ATRICLE. A GLANCE AT OREGON OPEN CROSSTABLE ON PAGE 14 OF OCTOBER NWC WILL SHOW YOU WHAT I MEAN. OWEN DVORSHAK IS ABOUT 1900 ON NORTHWEST RATING LIST BUT ON USCF LIST USED FOR PAIRING AND PRIZES IN OREGON OPEN HE IS LISTED AS 1734. SAME IS TRUE OF DON GRISHAM BOTH OF THEM YOUNG PLAYERS BUT LOOK OLDER BETTER ESTABLISHED PLAYERS LIKE BILL KIPLINGER AND GREG KERN, GLEN BUCKENDORF AND ROBERT MITCHELL. THIER USCF RATINGS ARE QUITE CLOSE TO THIER NORTHWEST RATINGS. SALLY PUPOLS WROTE NOT TO LONG AGO IN NWC THAT MAYBE PLAYERS LIKE PLAYING WITH AN OLD RATING AND BEING ABLE TO PLAY WITH IT FOR A LONG TIME. I FOR ONE LIKE TO SEE MY RATING CHANGE EVERY MONTH AND SEE HOW MY FRIENDS AND OPPONENTS ARE DOING BUT IF ORGANIZERS DON'T USE THEM WHAT IS THE USE OF RATING EVENTS BY NORTHWEST RATINGS. RUSS VOGLER WILL BE THE FIRST TO TELL ME THAT NORTHWEST RATINGS ARE REASON BCCF HAS JOINED UP WITH NWC, SO IF WE DROP THEM BCCF MGITH WELL DROP NWC AS PART OF MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENT IN BC. ALSO SPOKANE DOES NOT HAVE USCF EVENTS SO NW RATINGS ARE ALL THEY HAVE. I HOPE THAT NEXT TIME YOU PLAY IN AN EVENT USING USCF RATINGS FOR PAIRINGS & PRIZES YOU WILL TELL THE TD THAT YOU PREFER THAT NEXT YEAR HE OR SHE USE NW RATINGS FOR SAME. HAVE HEARD IT SAID THAT NW RATINGS ARE INFLATED BY ABOUT 100 POINTS, MAYBE THAT IS TRUE. ONE WAY TO TAKE CARE OF THAT WOULD BE TO AWARD PRIZES IN 100 POINT RATING GROUPS RATHER THAN 200 AS IS NOW DONE.

One of the strongest events ever held in B.C., the B.C. Masters although small in numbers was never-the-less a great tournament. Peter Biyiasas, who has been a runner-up in tournaments of late, put out one of his finest efforts todate, winning this strong event 5-0 to take first place. Bob Zuk, who has become the terror of the North West, had his sword a little dull for this one, but not too dull, taking second place all to himself with a 3½-1½ score. Bruce Harper ( what again ?! ) tied Dave Shapero for 3rd - 4th, both with a 3-2 score.

Ernest Krzyzowski, seeing his chance for some loot, regained his former self and demolished the Woodpusher Section with a 5 - 0 result. Ernest donated the trophy for use at the Vancouver Junior Open, thanks Ernest. Richard Pomfret who was unrated at the time, but I see now is a N.W. Master, stubbed his toe on Ben Kruger in the first round, but quickly recovered to take second with a 4 - 1 score. Vince Skabeikis took 3rd on tie-break over Peter Peto, another new face to the Area, both with a 3½ - 1½ score. I personally think Vince morally won the tournament, considering both the 1st & 2nd finishers were out of class, but that's chess! Ken Baker could also claim the same thing, as his two loses were to the No.1 & 2 finishers, better luck next time Ken.

I believe from talking to the players that they like the idea of class tournaments, but would have preferred no bottom limit to the top sections. Two players, I know for sure, didn't play at all, because they were not eligible for the top section. So unless I hear something to the contrary, I won't put any bottom limits to sectional tournaments in the future. That is - higher rated players will not be allowed to

play in lower sections, but lower rated players can have their choice, as we've been doing in the past.

Bennett of Victoria who made all the pre-tournament preparations. The next qualifying tournament will be the New Westminster Open in January. T.D. - Russ Vogler.

## HARRY SATANOVE WINS VANCOUVER JR. OPEN 1970

With a field that had three of the six B. G. Jr. finalists entered, the top section of the Vancouver Jr. Open, held Nov. 14th at the Renfrew Community Centre, became a strong junior event. Bruce Harper, the newly crowned B. G. Jr. Champion, Harry Satanove and Bob Irwin, who both came in third in the Finals, had entered. The turnout of nineteen players out of an expected thirty was a slight disappointment in terms of the advanced notice given to all known juniors. The one bright fact was the turnout of eight new juniors for their first tournament.

Bruce Harper, obtaining nothing more than a draw against Nigel Fullbrook in the first round that was followed by another against Bob Irwin in the third, seemed inclined to play without exerting himself. In the fifth round, his hasty play against Harvey Wong resulted in a position in which he was very fortunate to obtain some compensation. Another quick move dissipated his chances and he soon found himself in a lost position. Bob Irwin is rapidly becoming to be known as the "drawing master". All his games against Harper and Satanove in the last two tournaments have ended in draws. Harry Satanove, a perennial high finisher in all junior events, has finally captured that spot that has eluded him for two years. His last win was the B. C. Jr. High School Championship two years ago. In this tournament, Harry combined careful positional play against the stronger opposition with unbalanced tactical play against the weaker opponents. Consider his play against Garry Rapanos, where he employed the Danish Gambit and alertly finished the game with a brilliant tactical stroke.

Second place went to Bob Irwin on a tie-break with Harvey Wong. Wong captured first 1800 and under and the upset prize. Earl Kong, playing in his first tournament, took first in the unrated class and came in fourth overall.

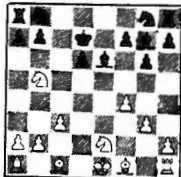

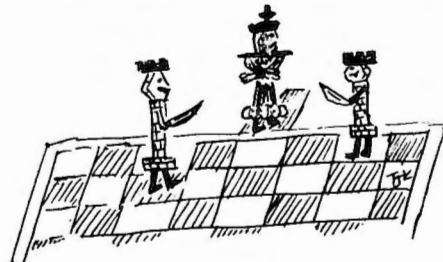

# HARRY GLIDDEN

BIDS FOR 1971 U. S. JUNIOR OPEN  
REQUESTED

Harry Glidden has been officially appointed as the new CHAIRMAN FOR USCF JUNIOR CHESS for the coming year. That in itself is not too hot but the effect is. It means the 1971 USCF JUNIOR OPEN (a national event) will be held on the Pacific Coast.

As USCF Junior Chess Chairman, Glidden, has the authority to place the location for the USCF Junior Open. How is it done???

Bids to hold the Junior Open in your locality will be accepted by Glidden from now till Feb. 1, 1971. If your club or group desires to hold the event in your town send me your offer as to operation, funds to back the scholarships and various other awards, facilities available, housing and food cost for players entering the tournament.

To get good national publicity the time is short for getting your bids in to me but the national deadline for the first story on where and how much, forces the story to leave me by February 10, 1971.

I will take care of the national publicity for any club entering a successful bid.

Any organization interested that writes me will receive the complete requirement details by return mail.

This occurred on rather short notice, due to Mr. Karch, the former chairman, having to move to Okinawa.

I would like the following persons to join me on the Junior Chess Committee: Mr. Russell Miller (he will have a letter from me before this goes to print), Mr. Robert Mitchell ( he has already agreed to help), Mr. Jerry Weikel (already agreed), and Mr. Martin E. Morrison of California ( I have not as of this writing contacted Mr. Morrison.).

With such an event as this being assigned it is not possible to prevent some persons to hear of it prior to others. I have already been approached by Portland and Hillsboro. Pat Maloney of Hillsboro advises that the Hillsboro Chess Club is already working on soliciting donations toward backing the event in their town.

In order to get this in to Skubi in time for the Dec. issue I do not have time to lay out the complete details for a successful bid. However here are some of the basic points. To be successful for your location:

1. Will require a bid of between \$500 and \$1000 in cash to be posted with the Oregon Youth Chess Fund, as on such short notice, that is the only way we can go out with a nation wide announcement of a guarantee of awards. This is a USCF affiliate so any donations are income tax deductions. The USCF is an Internal Revenue authorized non-profit organization.

2. Guarantee a reasonable (approximately \$25 - \$30 ) room and board charge for the traveling entrants during the tournament. Do the best you can on this.

3. Guarantee: Trophies for 1st, 2nd & 3rd overall, also for 1st place age 16, 15, 14, 13, 12 and younger. Suitable awards for Greatest Upset and Shortest Victory. Some sort of prize for a reasonable number of the upper half of the cross-table of non-other prize winners.

4. Entry fee approximately \$7 (\$5 to \$10 OK)  
5. Furnish a tournament director, acceptable to the USCF Junior Chess Chairman, plus an assistant director for each 50 entrants. (This group of directors would constitute a tournament committee.).

6. Date of the tournament: If in Washington or British Columbia - July 31, August 1 thru 4. If in Oregon or California dates may be altered to Aug. 1 thru 5. (Reason for dates is to give time for those interested to make the scene for the U. S. Open at Ventura on one round trip cost.)

Paper supplies, game scores, paper chess boards and pairing cards, sealed move envelopes and result charts will be furnished. Chess sets can also be arranged for. Being in a hurry to get this out I am probably overlooking some things. Get your questions in and answers will be fired right back.

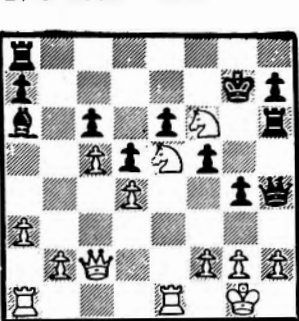

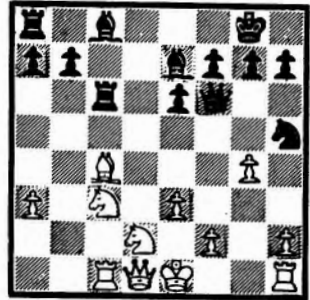

2. "Any measure voted on by the Board of Officers, whether approved or not, must be printed in the first or second issue of N.W.C. following the date it was sent to the officers and shall contain the following: 1) a statement of the text of the measure, 2) a brief summary of its impact unless obvious from the text and 3) the name of each officer eligible to vote followed by whether he voted yes or no, abstained or failed to return a ballot. Further, until this statement is received by the editor, the resolutions shall not be in force.

3. "Shall the editor of N.W.C. be authorized to accept advertizing for the magazine, provided that 1) all money received is turned over to the WCF Treasurer 2) fees shall be proposed by the editor but must be approved by the WCF President 3) the editor will determine where and how much advertizing will be in any given issue and 4) no fees shall be charged to include any material which is now generally included without charge, e.g. tournament announcements, unless the purchaser wants more than the usual amount of space."

**Minutes of  
1971 High School Branch Meeting  
(by Howie Chin)**

The 2nd annual HSB Meeting was held on Nov. 15. Its purpose was to (1) coordinate the schedule of all prep interscholastic chess events, (2) regulate basic team rules, and (3) affiliate all high school leagues and school members into the WCF High School Branch. As the HSB Coordinator and Chairman of this meeting, I can rightfully say that the results were very satisfactory. Every league was represented by its director or a representative. (Only one representative was a high school student.) Here is a roster of the attendants:

(The number of schools is not yet confirmed for all leagues, but on the whole, each league received one vote for every four schools. So the number of votes and schools were approximated at the meeting--in order to assure proper representation of each league.)

After the schedule was decided upon, the rules were hashed out--and finally agreed upon. Here they are: Four-man teams receive equal status in ratings. And leagues with 4-man teams are allowed membership into the WCF High School Branch, as affiliates. But, schools must have 5-man teams at State Tmt. And a 5-man team may forfeit one point off a 4-man team, if the five board team wishes. Next, the State Tournament will use a Swiss System, with the number of rounds flexible as to number of entries. State Tournament will be played at Seattle University. All entries will be advanced entries. And QUALIFICATIONS FOR ENTRY INTO THE STATE TOURNAMENT ARE: (1) THE SCHOOL AND LEAGUE MUST BE WCF HIGH SCHOOL BRANCH MEMBERS AND (2) THE TEAM MUST RANK IN THE TOP 1/3 of its league, or if a non-conference independent team wants entry, it must play at least 6 matches, and win 2/3 or more. This applies to 4 or 5 man teams. (more on minor rules next issue.)

After the rules were decided upon, the league directors present signed their respective leagues into WCF High School Branch as affiliates, making their league members HSB entries. There were certain conditions met. Spokane and Tacoma leagues did not have their directors present. They had representatives.

After several organizational points were discussed, the meeting was adjourned. Once more, speaking as the meeting chairman, I feel that the decisions made by us directors were sound, and in the best interest of interscholastic chess. As long as I am Coordinator, I shall seek to guard the high schools from special interest groups,--especially those groups who want to "professionalize" prep chess. By offering cash prizes, breaking down qualifications to nothing, and destroying the school team ideal, professionalization can come about. It has in other states. (See Oct. and Nov. "Chess Life.") The league directors are behind me in the school team ideal. And the only two ways to safeguard this ideal are either (1) make the HSB sovereign from the WCF by not allowing them to make rules for us, like Resolution 4, OR (2) turn the HSB under the auspices of the WIAA.

## Kings and Pawns in Soviet Russia

(written by Olaf Ulvestad, one of the N.W.'s contributions to International chess, and reprinted from the Washington Chess Letter)

provided them by government subsidy according to their standings in local, national and international tournaments and matches. American masters, however, receive no such subsidies., their playing strength depends entirely upon individual success in developing their chess skill as best they can while earning their livings.

The reception over, players and officials filed on the stage to the applause of the spectators. The din was terrific, the Soviet audience was very enthusiastic and demonstrative. Movie cameras clicked and speeches were made for the duration of the brief opening ceremonies. The applause to the last speech died down, and the masters took up their seats before a quiet, expectant crowd.

Time control for all twenty games of the match (two games to each set of opponents) was set at forty moves in two and one half hours. On each table were special timing clocks., one for each player. These were arranged with switches and levers in such a way that a player, upon completing his move, could stop his clock and start his opponents, with this system of time control, a player who fails to make the stipulated number of moves in the allotted time is forfeited. Since each contestant had two and one half hours the entire session lasted a maximum of five hours. Uncompleted games were adjourned and finished in later sessions.

### PART V

My opponent was David Bronstein, champion of Moscow, 3rd. in the All-Russian championships of 1945, and a master of international repute. Twenty one years of age, prematurely bald, quiet, polite and reserved. . . he gave an impression of self confidence for one so young in chess. His impressive successes undoubtedly had a maturing influence upon him. My surprise was only the greater when he took fifteen minutes in answer to my first move. I decided that if he were using psychology, it couldn't be good. As it developed, his slowness got him into serious time difficulties later on, and he missed an opportunity for a crushing advantage against me under time pressure. This first game was adjourned twice, was the last of all 20 games finished, lasted 118 moves, and took fourteen and one half hours playing time. Unfortunately, I made a losing slip on the 98th. move, and had to concede an absolutely hopeless position twenty moves later. (Games in important tournaments are rarely played out to checkmate) ("cornering" of a King.) Bronstein resigned (conceded) our 2nd. game after 40 moves. The Soviet team won the match with a final score of twelve and one half to seven and one half.

After the match we had a few days of relaxation and entertainment. Two formal receptions were given us. . . one by the American Embassy and one by the Soviet Society for Cultural Advancement (Voks.) On Sept. 19th. a Russian plane flew us to Stockholm.

The Swedish Chess Federation did much to make our sojourns in Stockholm convenient, interesting and pleasurable. It arranged two "Speed" tournaments for Swedish masters and American team members. Time control in these games were set at 7 minutes for each player. This means that the player whose clock registers 7 minutes first loses unless he has either checkmated his opponent or claimed one of a number of "draws" legally possible in chess. 1st place in both these tournaments was taken by Samuel Reshevsky.

After 2 enjoyable sea voyages from Sweden to London, and from Southampton to New York, I arrived in America feeling that I had profited all around.

KINGS AND PAWNS IN SOVIET RUSSIA  
by Olaf Ulvestad  
Part IV.

We walked quite a distance down the parade avenue, past a beautiful old Russian church now a Soviet museum, along with other churches and the Lenin-grad stock-exchange, to the river which bounds the Kremlin on two sides. The night was clear and moonlit, accentuating the atmosphere of mystery enshrouding the impregnable-looking fortress-city.

It wasn't until after the match that we were shown the palaces of the Csars within the Kremlin. I will never forget that experience. Regal splendor was everywhere, in the royal reception hall, the chapel, the living quarters of the royal family, and in the halls where matters of state under the czarist regime were dealt with. The present Soviet Congress convenes in a long hall which was converted from two huge rooms of the palace.

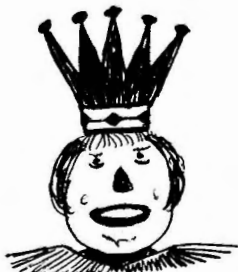
Across a wide square from the Hotel Metropole is the Bolshoi theatre, which has the largest theatre stage in the world, I believe. The stage can hold several times the number of persons the average opera house stage holds.

Still another such example is the Building of Trade Unions, in which is a large auditorium called the Hall of Columns. Soviet "absolute" chess championship tournaments were held in this hall, which was also the scene of our 1946 USA=USSR chess team match. Rectangular in shape, the hall takes its name from two rows of columns, which run its length, one row on each side. Enormous cut-glass chandeliers hang from the ceiling.

At all rounds of the USA=USSR match, the Hall of Columns was filled to capacity with 1500 seated spectators and 500 standees. Just outside the doors of the auditorium and of the buildings were large stands advertising the chess-match. At the rear of the auditorium stage were ten giant chess wall-boards, each measuring about six feet square., five of these rested on high stands, with the other five on scaffolding directly above. Large movable figurines were in the starting positions on the mammoth boards. At the fore-part of the stage were ten tables with regular chess boards and men set up for the contestants. Signs on each table told the names of the contestants and their respective countries. Tellers were ready to transfer the moves from the players' Boards to the wall-boards for the audience to follow.

Meanwhile, an informal meeting of the Russians and Americans took place behind the stage. Top board for the USSR was Michael Botwinnik, who, besides being one of the world's foremost chess masters, is an electrical engineer. He played the American champion, Samuel Reshevsky, who was a boy-prodigy of chess and is now an accountant. Board #2 on the Russian and American teams were Paul Keres, Lithuanian master and Reuben Fine, mathematics instructor at USC, respectively.

The Soviet masters enjoy a cultural and professional rating because of their chess ability., this affects their earning power considerably. Money credits, clothes, and housing credits are

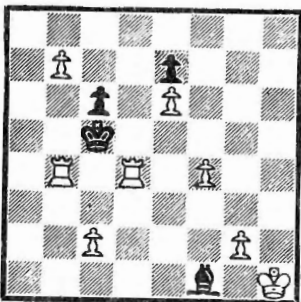

Interzonal Chess Tournament to chose 6 players to join Korchnoi and Petrosian in Canadates Matches started November 8 at Palma de Mallorca, Spain. Players are: Geller, Polugaevskij, Smyslov, Taimanov all of USSR, Gligoric, Ivkov, Minic, Matulovic of Yugoslavia, Filip Hort of Czech., Najdorf and Panno of Argentinian, Larsen of Denmark, Uhlmann of East Germany, Portisch of Hungary, Hubner of West Germany, Suttles of Vancouver B.C., Canada, Jimenez of Cuba, Mecking of Brazil, Ujumen of Mongolia, Naranja of Philliphines and William Addison Samuel Reshevsky and last but certainly not least ROBERT J. FISCHER of USA. Fisher got in when FIDE Congress at Olympiad voted to allow him to play if one of the USA Players who had qualified from the USA Zonal would drop out. Benko agreed to do so. He will be paid the same amount of money as if he would have played. USCF also asked William Lombardy if he would step aside as he was 4th place in USA Championship the zonal. He did. Fischer said he would only play if Col Edmondson USCF Executive Director accompanied him, USCF said yes it could be done. So Fischer is playing and at last report I have is leading after 6 rounds. Event will be over December 14<sup>th</sup>. Associated Press is carrying reports call them and ask for results if your papers are not printing them. Arpad Elo of Minneapolis is Secretary of Qualifications Committee and Ken Harkness is a member of Rules committee. Title awards were that of Grandmaster to Walter Browne of Australia, Gurgenis and Karpov of USSR. Among those awarded International master title was Zuckerman of USA. Elo rating system will be applied for the acquisition of FIDE titles and evaluations of tournaments. The 1972 Olympiad will take place in Skopje, Yugoslavia, with playing schedule arranged so Fischer and Reshevsky can play all matches in no matches on Saturday and those on Friday and before sundown. 1974 Olympiad will be held in Leningrad of Haifa. Cuba will hold 1971 World Junior and Puerto Rico the 1971 Student Team Championship. 1971 FIDE Congress will be at Vancouver, B.C.

Mark Taimanov and Eugeni Vasiukov both of USSR topped Skopje, Yug. international event 11-4. Florin Gheorghiu of Romania was next with 10. Next was International Master Drazen Marov of Yug. then Balashov of USSR. Gligoric did not to well with only 807 tied with Matulovic and Forintos of Hungary. Walter Browne scored 7½-7½ as did Matanovic of Yug. Samuel Reshevsky of USA was off form with 3 wins 4 losses and 8 draws.

Tibor Weinberger won 1970 California Open over 166 other players with 6½-4. Tied for 2nd were Walter Cunningham, Jeff Kent and Alex Suhobek.

Larry Evans and Robert Byrne tied in Continental Open held in Los Angeles October 24-25 with 5½-4. There were 203 players. They drew with each other, both beat other grandmaster in event Walter Browne who scored 4-2. Third place went to Dr. Anthony Saily 5-1. Julio Kaplan, Tibor Weinberger, William Batchelder Carl Pilnick and Irving Rivise. The big prize fund really brought out the players. Don't know how many took part in each section of the two section event. According to November 6th DEAR CONFERRERS Letter form USCF President Dr. Leroy W. Dubeck the Tournament Director Certification Program is progressing. Col Edmondson will be working in it while in Spain. The program will be announced in March of April CL&R. There will be written exams for part of the program. There will be no 1970 USA Championship. 1971 event will be held in Mid 1971. The USCF rating committee has made some changes to combat the deflation caused by large growth of USCF. The changes of the rating system will be printed in January CL&R.

## Years Ago

FROM THE PAGES OF W. C. L.

### November, 1950

This month the standings of the Puget Sound Chess League were announced, and on top resided Univ. of Wash. Chess Club and the Y.M.C.A. Chess Club both with perfect 3-0 team records. Among the members of the "Y" club were such great Washington players as Mr. Charles Joachim, and Mr. Dan Wade. (with top boards like that, how could they lose?) From our neighbor to the northeast (like across the Atlantic!) came the news that R.J. Broadbent gained the crown of the British Championship over 36 other players. He came out of the scrap with a  $8\frac{1}{2}$ -2 $\frac{1}{2}$ . Second went to E. Klein with an 8-3 score. From Florida came the news that Clarence Kalenian won the Florida State Championship over a field of 22. His score was  $6\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ . 6th place went to Mary Bain with a  $4\frac{1}{2}$ -2 $\frac{1}{2}$  score. The International Tournament was a site of a victory for Kotov of the USSR, the Russians also took second. The highest ranking American was Herman Steiner in 5th place.

Ballantine again dominated the top of the Postal Chess ladder with 1629 points. 18 pages in this issue.

### November 1955

This month the results of the Washington State Open championship were put in print, and the winner was O. Ulvestad. Olaf won with a  $3\frac{1}{2}$ -1 $\frac{1}{2}$  with no losses. Second place went to Rober Edberg with a 3-2. If you think we have problems in the results of our Chess Tournaments, in the 1955 US Open both Reshevsky and Rossolimo tied for first money (or a car) and both had equal Median and then the Solkoff system points. So turning to the S. B. system they found out that Rossolimo won by the the overwhelming score of 76 $\frac{1}{2}$ -76! (Boy! Would I hate to have been the one to tell Reshevsky!) People don't deserve to lose by that close a score. Believe it or not, there is not much more in this issue of 14 pages. Baron dominated the top of the Postal Chess Ladder.

### November 1960

The finals on the Chess Olympics were published this month, with the United States placing second to the Soviet Union (who else?). The Russian team finished with a 34-10 score, while the United States achieved a 29-15 record, and Yugoslavia with 27-17. Ivars Dalbergs struck again! This time the Oregonian picked up the trophy for the Central Washington Open. Topping the field of 27 with a score of  $5\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$  Dalbergs led a very strong field. Gordon Cornslius took home the second place money. Mike Franett won the Puget Sound Invitational with a 4-1 score over a field of players that included Richard Schultz, Dr. A. A. Murphy, Dan Wade, and Charles Joachim. The results of the first three rounds of the Puget Sound were announced, with the leaders being the North Seattle Club (3-0) and the Latvian Club (2-0). Abrahamson was on top of the Postal Chess Ladder with 1950 points, and the issue contained 12 pages. 24

Ron Smith placed first in the Ruse De Guerre Chess Tourney in Cemas. He won the money with a  $4\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$  score. The paper announced that the WCF would enter a bid for the 1966 U. S. Open, and that if they were able to net this juicy prize, three major tournaments would not be held in '66. They were the Puget Sound Open, the Seattle Open, and the Seafair Tournaments (that's what I call dedications). Can anyone tell me if they were successful in the bid? While I talked about a close U. S. Open finish earlier in this column, it didn't hold a candle to the finish of the '66 Peace Arch Open. Viktor Pupols and Dume an Suttles both finished with  $5\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$  scores, (the draw was between the two of them.) equal Median and Solk points and S. B. points. So resorting to ol' lady luck, a coin was flipped and Pupols won! Mr. Suttles later stipulated that he had a perfect record going with coin flips, he never won! At the Portland State College Tourney Leon Sage won with a  $3\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$  with second place going to Ruben Saez with a 3-1 score. Morris was on top of the Postal Chess Ladder with 2295. 22 pages this month.

Russell 's Chess Chats go back 5 years according to my records. In my opinion his efforts of five years ago and today are in the same class, exceptional!
