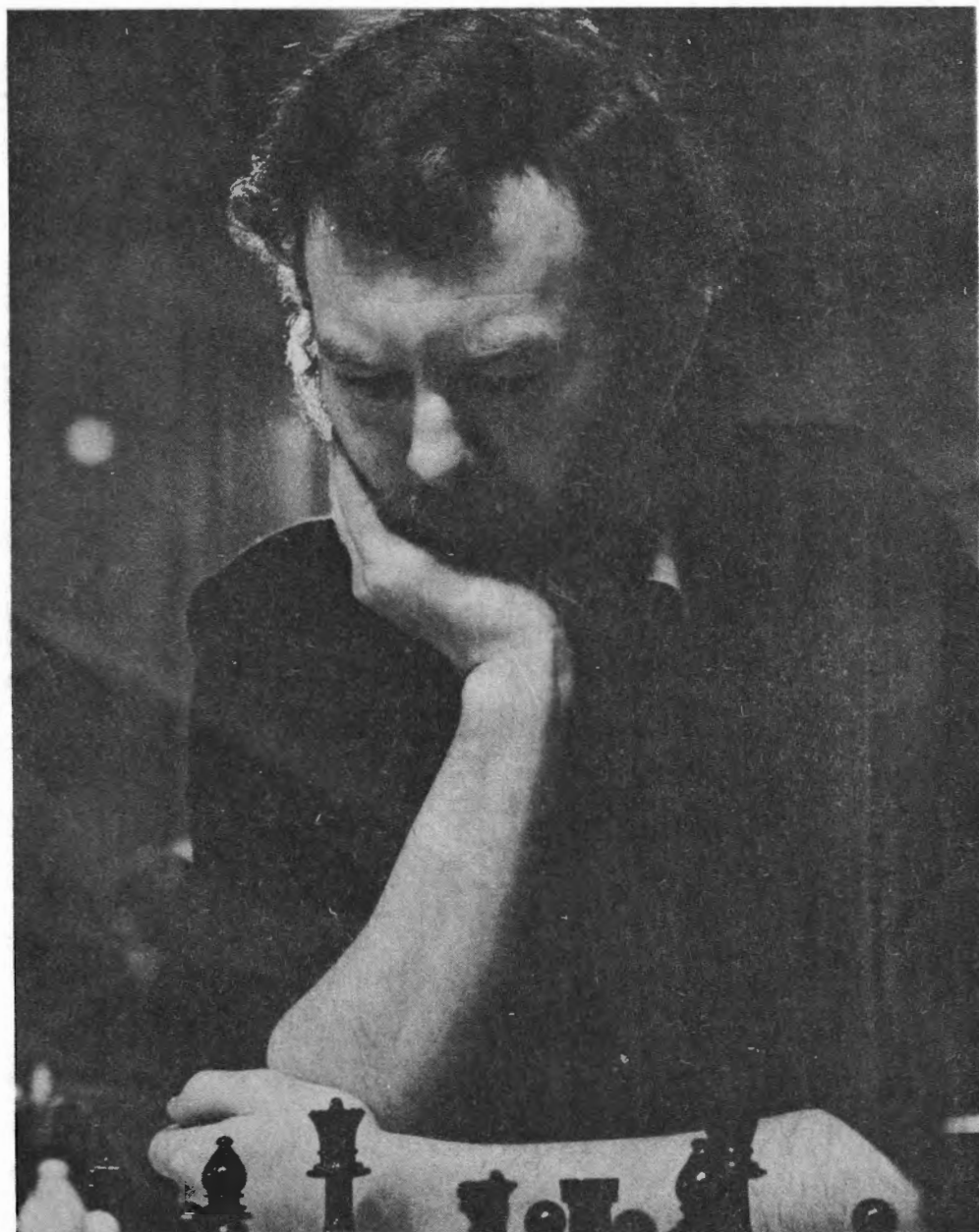

Photographs and artwork from any source are welcome. Hand written material should be sent well in advance of deadline for typing. Letters for publication are encouraged. DEADLINES: March issue, February 26th; April issue, March 26th EXCEPT For remarks on issues and candidates in the WCF elections; that material must be received by April 2; May issue, April 30th.

Junior Champion edged out Mike Franett, the Washington State Champion to take second place on tie break. Depending on the outcome of the remaining six qualifying tournaments, both Bruce and Mike could possibly qualify also, but this will not be known until after the Nanaimo Open (May 1-2). Alan Hill took the top Expert prize, Peter Peto the "A" class and Alex Eason the "B" and below class. The junior prize was split between Harry Satanove, Brian McLaren, and Nigel Fullbrook.

In the B Section as already stated, Bill Miller surprised a few of the higher rated and easily won. Second and third was split between Barry Thorwardson and Ken Baker. Top 1700-1799 went to Paul Brown, top 1600-1699 was divided between Larry Kirstein, Anthony Knott, and Jim Cookson. Top 1599-below was won by Peter Skucas. The Junior was divided between Colin Ticehurst and Harvey Wong.

I was very glad to see the better turn out for this event, I believe the reason can

be found in the facts that six Washington players entered and fourteen juniors took part.

Hopefully Lyman Johnston, who came up all the way from Tacoma, will not hold his first experience in B.C. Chess against us, he had the misfortune of being given the BYE in the third round and then the next morning his opponent for round four didn't have the courtesy to inform me of his withdrawal, didn't show up. To say the least, Lyman decided to catch the earlier bus back home. That's a long way to travel for only two games!

This tournament had two less Masters than the "B.C.-WASH." held last month, but with six more experts and ten "A" class no one seemed to notice. With the exception of a few blunders, there was an awful lot of first class chess played.

Last but not least, my apologies to all for the very tight time allowance, or should I say the lack of allowance. It was a question of having to pay seven dollars an hour over time for rent, if we exceeded the time limit the community centre had agreed to. I will never, "I hope", get myself into that kind of a mess again!

Dear Editor Skubi:

I see that the November NWC carried yet another horrible "High School In Chess." I am now wondering if Mr. Chin realizes that there is a difference between chess and football. Do such factors as "tradition" have any effect on a school's performance? I sincerely doubt it. Mr. Chin seems to think that a chess team is a "squad," like a football team, but, in reality, it is no more than a number of individuals playing chess (against an equally heterogeneous group of other individuals). Such things as "team spirit," and "team pride" I find, interfere greatly with a person's ability to win. When I was in high school in Vancouver, there was no "team unity" among the top teams. The top board would often deride in public the 5th and 6th board players, even if they won. Each individual did his best. The proof of the pudding, of course, is the production, and I don't think anyone could doubt that B. C. has the greatest number of strong juniors in the Northwest, with 2 NW masters and a handful of experts. Mr. Chin hints at a poor quality of play by his "Her teams can be hopelessly lost, but fight back with admirable gallantry to turn defeat into victory or draw." What this has to do with serious chess, I don't know, but if I was on that chess team, I would either take it as praise to my endgame skill or as a sharp insult to the quality of my chess.

Another thing I don't understand is the importance placed on coaches. In Vancouver I can only remember one instance where a coach was a stronger player than the 1st board. One championship team didn't even have a coach! Last, but not least, I would like to remark on Mr. Chin's literary aerobatics. Looking at the November issue, we find such things as "the Trojan war god has blessed Auburn with..." "The broken Trojan phalanxes..." "#5 Franklin:

Frankly speaking." If Mr. Chin payed as much attention to his grammar and spelling as this backfield stunting, I am sure that the column would approach readability. Although the jungle may be the place for Tarzan's breast-beating, NWC is not the place for Mr. Chin's.

As for constructive suggestions, I think it would be a good thing if Mr. Chin went to the trouble of harassing a strong player to annotate carefully an instructive game for players of high school age. This, carefully done, would eliminate the rest of the column.

Just to put my foot where my mouth is, I have enclosed such an example.

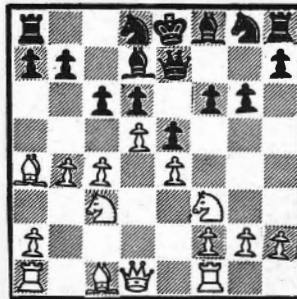

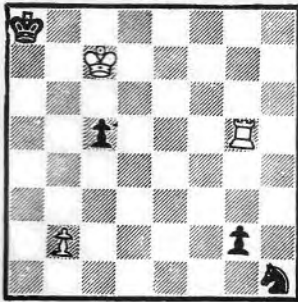

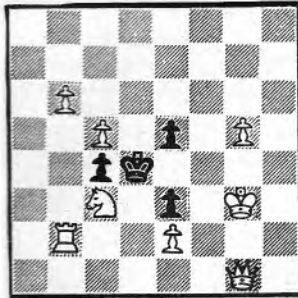

Top scoring Class "B" was DARREL HUNT, 2nd Class "B" was RUSSELL MILLER, 3rd Class "B" was JEFF HANSON. Then top Class "C" was GARY PIPPIN, 2nd-TIM STEWART, 3rd-TOM SPETTER.

The tournament took place January 2-3 at Sorrento Hotel in Seattle under sponsorship of East-West Tournament Assoc. of Portland, Oregon and directed by HANON RUSSELL.

Note on cross table there were a number of draws in fact 5 players did not lose a game. VIESTURS SEGLINS came back to the chess wars and proved he is still hard to beat, he had two wins and three draws. GREG KERN is also back after a long absence and gave a good account for himself, 4-1. DENNIS WATERMAN back from a stay in Bay area had trouble winning games but didn't lose either. Three players ZUK, PUPOLS and JAMES MCCORMICK all had 4-0 going into round 5. PUPOLS won quickly from RAY KERR. MCCORMICK decided then, I judge, from what he said after his game with ZUK, that he had to go

February 1958,

February 1956  
I really wish that everyone had a copy of the old annuals from WCL, because of the games that they review, if nothing else. Featured on the first page was one of the shortest games in tournament history. It was played at the championship of Paris (no date given.). It was a four mover, and started out with a P-Q4, ~~N-KB3~~ N-KB3 opening. Well, back to business (sorry about that!) Seattle Chess Club downed the U. of Washington's 7½-2½. Then the Seattle Club took on Boeings club which was in first place, and won again 7½-2½. Also mentioned was West Seattle Team's victory over the Tacoma Chess Club. Also in a prestigious position in the magazine was an article on Chess in a Japanese Prison Camp. This article by Mr. Kenneth Day.

This article was very informative as it showed some of the things some of us enthusiasts would go through to play the game. Top of the Postal Chess was Mr. Weaver, followed Baron and Howard in a close race. 15 pages in this issue.

February 1961  
The final standings of the Puget Sound Chess League were published this month. North

Seattle wrapped it all up with a perfect 6-0 record. Their nearest competition was from the Golden Horde Chess club with a 4-2 record.

From the tournament results: Dr. Dave Groenig won the 1961 Spokane City Chess Championship with a 5-1 score. Frank Ashby took second, with a 4½-1½ score. It also was elaborated that Neil Power won the Snohomish County Chess Tourney.

Also, from the tournament standings came the news that Mr. Viktor's Pupols won the 1961 Washington State Chess Championship. He finished with a 4½-1 score. Arthur Wang scored a like 4-1 score but ½ Sokoff point behind Pupols. Abrahamson was on top of the Postal Chess League with 1950 points. 15 pages in this issue.

February 1966  
Bard Hoover won the 1966 March of Dimes Tournament with a 4-1 score and walking off with the trophy only after the Tournament Director had to separate a four way tie for the artifact. Also finishing with the 4½ score were Eddie Sonier, Jack Scharder and John Hoover. Would you have liked to have been in Mr. Buzz Eddy's shoes? Not me! That sort of mess would seem to be to much of a mess for the normal-type tournament director to stand. Mr. Duncan Suttles walked away with the trophy of the 1966 Washington Open. He finished with a 5½-½ behind him was a 6 way tie for second!! (Ouch!) University of Washington's Chess Club was proving to be the team to beat in the Puget Sound Chess League. With a perfect 5-0 record they were followed closely by the Boeing Chess Club who had posted a 4½-½ score. Having played this system Black now has second thoughts. His game is shot anyway.

The main plus in this move is its reduction to animal status of Blacks' Knight. Q-Q3, B-N2 and P-K4! would seem to be more thematic, preserving the central tension and opening the game up for Whites' Bishops.

12. - - - N - B1

This spasmodic animal will be the cause of much Grief for Black.

13. P - K4! Q - K1 14. B - B4! - - -

This diagonal is nice to have. A defect in Blacks' position is his excessive mobility.

14. - - - Q - R4

Hoping to exchange Queens, but...

The Knight limps around looking for a home.

18. B - Q6! - - -

Preventing K-R1 and N-N1-B3

Note that White has sacs at Q5. Perhaps this was the reason for Q-B2, but K-R1 was better. Whites' plan is to re-establish the tension he dissipated with 12. P-B5?!

White has no wish to exchange Rooks, as he is not constricted.

Best must surely be BxB and B-K3. The game is still lost but a breakthrough for White is hard. Black does not seem aware of the danger. Checkout the line up on the N, Q and K and the focus on the QP. The click in Satanoves' head was clearly audible.

Striking at the basis of Blacks' game, his strongpoint on Q4.

As mentioned above, Black doesn't realize the seriousness of his situation. He could at least have moved his King.

24. KR - K1 P - KR3??

Black persists with his King side attack, which of course is illusory. White now brilliantly demonstrates the unsoundness of Black's game.

See above note.

The Knight capture loses, but so does everything else. eg: BxB 27. RxB, PxN; 28. BxP, R-N1; 29. Q-K3!; winning back the piece.

29. P - B6!! Resigns.

A few statistics serve to show how constricted Black was. His "bad" Bishop can't move, while no other piece may move more than two squares in any one direction. Also significant is the fact that Black never left his half of the Board, but unfortunately White was not as content.

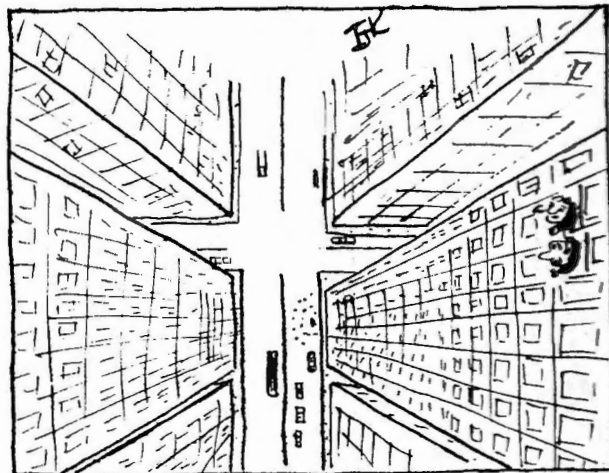

It was getting very difficult to concentrate on the game, and I had a terrific urge to go to the rest room. I was starting to get into time trouble, and I was dying on the spot. The pressure was unbearable; the spectators were breathing down my neck. The clock was driving me crazy. I could stand it no longer; I had to go, no matter what the cost.

Ten minutes later I came back. Physically my problems were solved, but as far as the game was concerned, I had little hope. Sadly I sat down and looked at the clock. Four minutes left and 10 moves to go.

I slowly focused my eyes on the board. Then I almost fell out of the chair. He walked right into a pawn fork. I almost didn't dare to believe it. My hand shook as I pushed the fateful pawn up attacking the King and Rook. I said "check" in a shaky voice, and watched his mouth fall open. He moved his King with disgust. Soon after he moved into another fork.

He resigned a few moves later. I shook his hand and said the traditional "good game" to which he mumbled something like "it was a cruddy game." I stood up feeling triumphant. But I felt strange. I shook all over. I was sweating heavily; I felt

weak and tired, like I had been running all day. Yet all the exercise I had was when I got up and walked to the rest room. I never had any idea how strenuous chess was. At any rate I was glad it was over.

That is, until someone reminded me that there was still four rounds to go. I still have to laugh when I think of how old chess players reacted when I yelled my head off.

The Jan. NWC contained an interesting version of the Victoria-Nanaimo match. The Nanaimo writer neglects to mention that Strong of Victoria blew an easily won game against Jones, and that Shiu was lucky to draw. Furthermore, Lassen gave McLaren a draw as the latter had to return home early. As for the Kerr-Schulz encounter, Ray simply pitched a piece; and was hardly "deservedly punished".

I write this only because of the obvious bias running through the Nanaimo report; to show that such after-the-fact moaning contributes nothing to a match report.

Also in the Jan. Issue, the game Vogler-Biyasas reaches an interesting stage after Black's 27th move. Vogler gives 28. NxBch, RxN 29. QxR, BxR 30. RxB etc. But instead, 30. QxBch, K-N1 31. B-Q3 wins easily as Black has no checks, and also no defence to the threatened 32. B-R7ch, K-N1 33. B-N6 disch.

Another point: I am unaware, as I am sure many others are, of the exact way in which the NW rating system works. I would like to suggest that the system be outlined in a future issue.
