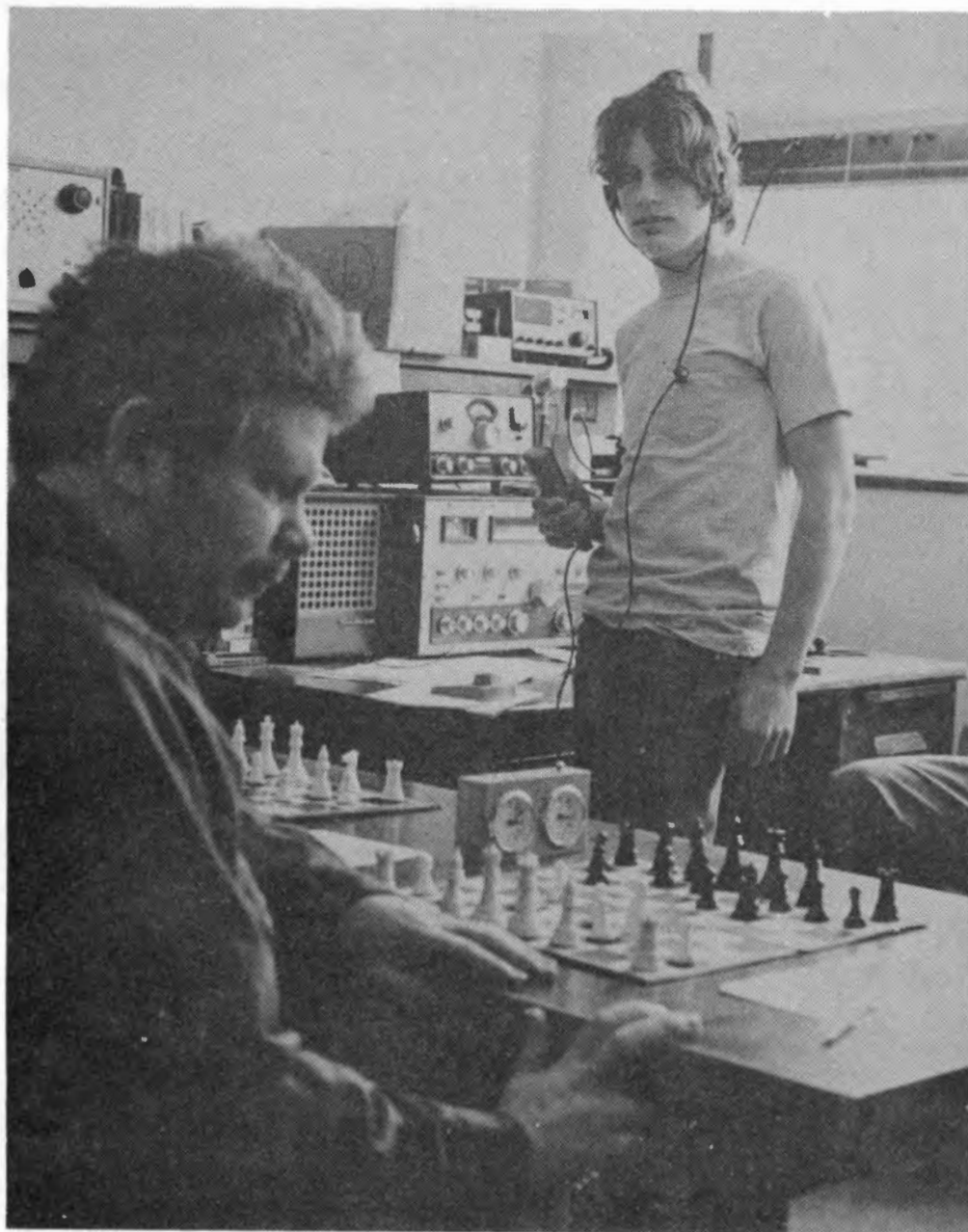

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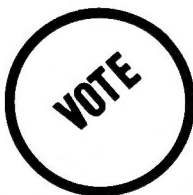

On January 16th the Seattle Chess Club and the Spokane Inland Empire Chess Club played a four board radio chess match, with Spokane winning 2½-1½.

4. Because his nomination was uncontested, S.M.C. Duncan assumed the role of Secretary for the duration of the meeting.
5. Items of Old Business-

A. Committee Report

The Awards Committee (W. Skubi, D. Collyer, W. Lathrop, L. Allyn) reported that it had decided to institute two special awards, as yet unnamed, to point out persons of "exceptional merit". The awards would consist of life-time memberships in the WCF; they would replace the old "Oscar" award. Russell Miller and Vic Keiser were suggested for first and second award; research will determine if there will be other nominees.

B. Treasurer's Report

The present Treasurers Report was submitted by the President for the absent treasurer; the report showed a slight deficit. Willie Skubi asked for clarification of the "Miscellaneous In and Out" heading. Most of the "Miscellaneous IN" was found to consist of minor awards of money, \$0g memberships, and money from Jude Acers Simultaneous exhibitions. The "Miscellaneous Out" was found to be mostly plane fares for Jude Acers, who presently owes the WCF \$96.50. Willie Skubi criticized the buying of \$116.00 of paid articles for Northwest Chess Magazine.

6. Willie Skubi asked if it might be permissible for candidates for WCF office be allowed to give short presentations of their platorms to the assembly. The President allowed this, and the following candidates spoke in their own behalf:

7. New Business

A.) Ballot Items

#1. Motion to Abolish Office of WCF Publicity Director.

"The Office of WCF Publicity Director is Hereby abolished"

The motion was defeated.

#2. Restrictions on Ratings Submissions by Tournament Directors.

"Moved that a condition of acceptance of events for NW Rating be that a legible rating report be recieved by the Rating Director no later than 30 days after the

last day of the event. The Ratings Director entitled to make exceptions at their discretion."

The motion was adopted.

#3. Constitutional Amendment by Affiliated Organizations.

"State Chess organizations fully affiliated with the WCF may submit amendments to the WCF constitutions to be placed on the mail ballot, provided that the WCF President may exclude any which, in his opinion unduly effect the internal workings of the WCF."

"Amendments shall be approved by a majority vote at the affiliated chess organization's annual meeting or by such means as the WCF Board of Officers might specify."

"The WCF shall publicly announce and read any such amendments as submitted, with a statement of whether he intends to exclude the amendment, at the next WCF Annual Meeting following its submission."

The motion was adopted.

#4. Exclusion of Membership from Voting on the Annual Mail Ballot.

"In order to preserve the WCF Annual meeting as a fair way of assessing the wishes of the membership, the WCF Board of Officers is authorized to exclude from membership and participation in WCF affairs and events individuals who, by a two-thirds majority of the said Board, are found guilty of flagrant violations of the WCF election rules."

The Motion was adopted.

#5. Abolition of the Office of WCF Secretary.

"The office of WCF Secretary is hereby abolished. The WCF President may appoint a temporary secretary to take and distribute minutes when needed, but such a person will have no vote in the WCF Board of Officers."

The motion was rejected.

#6. Inclusion of Revised Constitution on the annual mail ballot.

"Moved to place the revised constitution of WCF as printed in the March NWC Magazine be considered on the Annual Mail Ballot."

The motion was adopted.

#7. Motion to make non-washington residents ineligible to vote on internal matters of WCF.

"Move to amend Article V section VII of the WCF proposed Constitution by striking "of those state chess organizations with full affiliate status with "the" and, following the first two words, "regular members with "the"."

The motion was adopted.

#8. Annual WCF Meeting date to be changed.

"Moved that Annual WCF meeting be held Labor Day Weekend starting with 1973 meeting. Meeting shall be held in conjunction with a chess tournament. Tournament site to be decided by WCF Board of Officers."

The motion was carried.

#9. Election of High School WCF Branch Coordinator.

"The election of the WCF High School Director shall be conducted among the High School Branch by schools affiliated with the WCF, each school having one vote, in accordance with regulations to be approved by the WCF Board of Officers."

The Motion was carried.

#10. Payment of the Editor of Northwest Chess Magazine.

"Moved that NWC Editor be paid \$20.00 per issue. Payment has nothing to do with Editor expenses incurred by the Editor personally in performance of his duties."

The Motion was carried.

#11. Appointment of USCF State Directors.

"That as long as the USCF requires nominations for Directors to be in before we can complete the usual mail ballot, we elect those Directors at the Annual meeting if it is before the date appointed by the USCF. If the AM is not before that date, the President shall submit his nominations to the various (sic) WCF officers and unless a majority of those officers object that nomination shall stand."

The Motion was carried.

#12. Life Membership Awards

"WCF Board of Officers is empowered to award life memberships in the WCF as it sees fit to a maximum of two per year."

The Motion was carried.

B. Some criticisms of the NWC policies concerning non-Washington news publication were voiced by Pat Maloney, Secretary-Treasurer of the Oregon Chess Federation. He maintained that Oregon news had been incorrect, ignored, or inadequate as they appeared in NWC. This allegation was further quantified by Angus R. Pitt of the Puget Sound League, who claimed that League results were many issues late; he added that he had yet to receive either of his two regular subscriptions.

C. Duane J. Polich proposed that High Schools wishing to be sanctioned for play by WCF be made to become members, as individuals, of the WCF so that they might receive NWC. A long discussion of how much this would cost or how the money would be divided between WCF and the HSB.

D. Jack Love, Assistant Ratings Director, made a few announcements concerning the new rating system in the absence of Mr. Bailey, who had to leave.

1.) Mr. Bailey has been in contact with Dr. Arpad Elo, the originator of the rating system which bears his name. Dr. Elo has made some suggestions as to possible modifications that might be helpful in determining the ratings. Mr. Bailey hopes to cause the entire USCF to adopt this system, which would make Northwest Ratings obsolete.

2.) It was suggested as a matter of course that only members of the various affiliated organizations that use Northwest Ratings be allowed to receive this privilege. Tournament Directors should be watchful of all the people under their direction to insure that this does happen.

8. The President entertained a motion to adjourn; the motion was carried and the meeting ended about 4:55 p.m.

VOTE !

For too many years now I have felt that the W.C.F. has lacked a Treasurer with the willingness to pull the chain when unreasonable demands for money have been made. Last year when Rusty Miller was Treasurer, more than \$150.00 was squandered in one instance alone, when a certain W.C.F. officer violated the WCF constitution by spending this amount for tournament programs which no one wanted to buy without obtaining the required approval of the Board of Officers.

The Treasurer took no action.

This year the W.C.F. President, Rusty Miller, spent more than \$115.00 of WCF money to pay Bob Zuk and Jude Acers to write a series of annotated games for Northwest Chess. When questioned at the WCF Annual Meeting, Miller said that both, "Needed the money." In an obvious conflict of interest, Miller is the financial agent for Mr. Acers' nationwide tour of simultaneous exhibitions. Mr. Acers is not a Northwest area resident. Bob Zuk has won several hundred dollars in N.W. tournaments in the past year.

Furthermore, Mr. Miller did not consult the Northwest Chess Editor nor the Washington Chess Federation Editor as to the desirability of buying these articles. As WCF President, Mr. Miller has no authority that I can find to intrude in this area.

Nevertheless, a pliant W.C.F. Treasurer spent the money.

It is a principle of good financial management that the accountant managing the books have as little contact as is reasonable with the people who spend most of the money. Last year, Rusty Miller and his wife Kathy were responsible for spending more than \$3,500.00 of WCF funds, the largest portions going to publish and mail the magazine and other ongoing expenses.

Included in this were travelling expenses for Jude Acers' nationwide tour, a demonstration board for Mr. Acers and other expenses for Mr. Acers. Most of this has subsequently been repaid, and Mr. Miller assured those who attended the Annual Meeting that it will all be repaid. But the question remains: Why did the WCF Treasurer approve what amounts to an interest free loan for Mr. Acers' travel? Why was this private business venture of Mr. Acers and Mr. Miller's run through the WCF books?

Last year Rusty Miller supported a friend of his, Herman Moya for WCF Treasurer, and he won. This year, Mr. Miller is again supporting a friend of his for this office.

Let me emphasize that I am not in any way accusing Mr. Miller, Mr. Moya or anyone else of unethical practices. But I do believe that poor judgement is in evidence. I believe Mr. Miller identifies the WCF's interests too strongly with his own, and that the selection of Mr. Vaughn for Treasurer would be a mistake because Mr. Vaughn, having no experience in WCF politics is not in a position to judge which expenditures his friend asks him to make are good and which are questionable.

I, in seeking the Treasurer's post, do not claim to be an expert accountant. I know I can do the work.

I have served as the N.W.C. Editor, Publicity Director, Circulation Director, High School Director and as a tournament director for the WCF. I have been a WCF Officer continuously since 1967.

Since I know the WCF inside and out, I am in a position to make a judgement as to the legitimacy and necessity of an expense. Furthermore, I have the intestinal fortitude to say "no" and make it stick.

I would like your vote for WCF Treasurer.

His opponent is a college student who has done much for chess in the past and would have his hands full doing a job on publicity director post. Willie Skubi is a political science major not a business or accounting major. He does not always pickup his mail. There is quite a bit of work to treasurers job which I have help lessen by having distribution director be in charge of mailing cards out and keeping mailing list current. Note distribution director also lives in Yakima area.

Last year Willie Skubi was for Frank Grgurich for treasurer, and main issue was more control. This year it will probably be the same idea. Main question he brought up at annual meeting about treasurers report was our paying Jude Acers and Robert Zuk at total of \$116.00 for articles appearing in NWC. Skubi feels that chess should get work from every one for free except tournament directors and rating directors. I don't agree. We are getting big enough and strong enough that we can afford to pay atleast a little something for things. \$5.00 per article does not seem like too much to me. Also both we in need of the money quite badly at the time of payment. Also one might question and Herman Moya's going along with use of WCF funds in helping Jude Acers tour of USA last year. He owes WCF \$96.00 from 1971 which I can assure you will be paid back this May as the 1972 is going very well. If you think I have done wrong in putting some of our idle funds to work for chess then vote for Skubi and his type control. His idea of lot of advanced planing is okay but a number of things must be done now, right then. Maybe every time an officer wants to spend some funds it should be okayed but that takes time. If you feel I have used WCF funds unwisely in the past vote for Skubi to control the money.

EXPANDING VOTING TO NON-NW AREAS

At this election all OCF, BCCF and WCF members who subscribe to N.W. Chess are eligible to vote in the WCF Mail Ballot. This is our community. We play against and with each other, our officers know each other. We win each other's prizes.

Visitors to the United States, even if they pay taxes, cannot vote here. Similarly, I do not believe that a Texas resident, or someone who played in one tournament before returning to New Jersey or Tim Buk Tu can be familiar with the arguments, the personalities, or feel a part of our organization.

Two years ago I introduced at the WCF Annual Meeting a Resolution which enabled OCF and BCCF members to run for certain WCF Offices (such as Editor) last year I introduced a resolution which enabled OCF and BCCF members to vote in WCF elections. This year I urge you to exercise your vote to defeat this measure.

VOTE FOR PAYING NWC EDITOR.

We are big enough and strong enough that we can make at least this token payment to the person who spends a large number of hours each month getting together NWC. Russell Miller will not accept this post unless this issue passes.

Willie Skubi is for all free labor which I don't feel we need to have. If Editor is paid then he in turn can pay people to help him with his job. When you pay someone then you can expect him to do a job. Hard to bear down much on a person who is doing something for nothing.

Editor of NWC has been paid in past but not for several years.

Despite the quantity of work involved in editing the magazine, I oppose writing into the constitution a \$20.00 per month fee to go to the editor. This is undoubtedly the most prestigious office that organized chess has to offer in the Northwest, and despite the work, a creative and rewarding experience.

It is also the most popular office. For two years now there have been three candidates for this office, attesting to its many fringe benefits.

The Editor now has all his expenses paid by the WCF. It does not cost him anything but his time to hold the post.

The Treasurer's report presented at the WCF Annual Meeting indicates we had an income the past year of \$4,076.55, and expenses of \$4,137.77; we lost \$61.22 last year. Next year we can expect a substantial increase in our \$650.00 bill for postage. It will be (probably) eighteen months before the next WCF Annual Meeting. That means we would lock ourselves into a \$360.00 expense.

We can't afford it.

I ask you vote against this measure. Let the WCF treasurer decide the matter, whoever it is. I ask you to vote against this because I know both the time involved in holding this office and its rewards: I was the N.W.C. Editor for fourteen months until last May.

Of course, the continuum of cartoons will remain!

VOTE FOR ROB HANKINSON - N.W.C. EDITOR

I believe my record as Editor speaks for itself. If you have back copies of about two years ago, when Russell Miller was editor, you can see the difference. Berry and Miller state that state/provincial editors do not have complete control over the contents of their bulletins. This is true - but it is not due to any policy of mine. There seems to be no possible way that all residents of a state submit their material to their state editor instead of sending it in direct. The former Oregon editor Pat Maloney felt very strongly about this - and threatened to submit his resignation airmail if I ever printed anything from Oregon that had not been sent to him first. In Washington, Tim Kauppila has found that it's hard to be a state editor when people don't send material to you. In B.C., former B.C.C.F. President Dave Wight appointed Bruce Harper B.C. Bulletin editor after one of my cartoons raised the wrath of a former B.C. Champion. To give Harper complete control over the B.C. Bulletin would be ridiculous. What material he does submit (sporadically) consists mainly of pseudo-humor articles designed to amuse 4 or 5 U.B.C. students. While the bulletin would be full of Kruger games and Blyssas semi-cartoons, it would not reflect B.C. Chess. Of course it would be nice if the Editors could paste up their own sections, but I cannot foresee this happening successfully. I understand that some OCF officials have complained to the WCF that some Oregon material doesn't get printed on time. I don't know to what specific article(s) they refer, but I do know that material often comes from Oregon several days late, and incorrectly submitted. The current Oregon editor likes to double-space his material. Other material, which is submitted untyped, and often late to boot, has a very slim chance of appearing "on time". Last month there was a notice to Oregon organizers after 2 T.A.s were submitted without either name or date of the event. This month there was another dateless announcement sent.

Originally, when I took over as N.W.C. Editor, Russell Miller was doing the tournament announcements. He wanted to quit that job, so I took over. Now Miller is running for Editor mostly on a tournament announcement platform. Figure that one out. Anyone with some spare time and a good typewriter can do the job if they volunteer. I really don't know what Miller or Berry are talking about when they promise to "improve the layout". All those little dubs and dabs of errata and chess magazine covers are put in by Miller after the magazine has been sent to the printers. I suspect Berry wants to have control over his articles - which have sometimes been rejected for messiness and illegibility. The only way to improve the layout as I see it is to have the Editor retype a lot of material (on a good typewriter, of course). This won't happen unless the Editor - whoever he is, receives payment. There is very little to be done with the material the way it is now except cement it in as well as can be. Berry is naive when he thinks that "leading players" will heed his call for contributions. I know, I've tried. They want money. As for the foreign publication bit - well, we've been through that before, and the consensus was that NWC, being a regional magazine should stick to regional news, with left-over space allotted for foreign material. If I am re-elected, I want full control of the magazine. As it is now, WCF President Miller has the habit of adding or deleting material from what I feel is the finished magazine. I also support the motion to pay the N.W.C. Editor. There is quite a considerable amount of work involved in the job, and as the Rating Director receives payment (albeit not from the same source) it is certainly reasonable that the Editor does too. I have gathered, after several attempts to stir up some interest in the magazine by the readership, that there is widespread apathy. I know some of you really care about Northwest Chess - and so I urge you to ensure that it does not lose its quality or its chance to improve. Vote for me, Rob Hankinson, and vote for paying the Editor.

Matches: Berry 3 - Harper 3, Lee 3 1/2 - Zwitzer 2 1/2, Berry 2 1/2 - Macskasy 1 1/2, Zwitzer 10 - Freeburger 0, Zwitzer 5 - Freeburger 5, Zwitzer 9 - Freeburger 1, Seid 5 1/2 - Barbeau 1/2, Seid 4 - Van Camp 1.

A few facts and figures may be of interest. This month's rated events contain roughly 3200 games, or over 100 every day of the month! That's a lot of chess, considering our population. I wonder whether such chess Meccas as California and New York can match us on a percentage basis. And we are growing! The events for this month included 154 Unrateds which brings my computerized file to 1100 active players (there are roughly 3000 more inactive players with Northwest ratings). The average rating of the active players is 1618, with 91 players rated 2000 or above. Interestingly, the USCF scale is a normal distribution from roughly 600 to 2700, yielding an average rating of 1650. Those of you who feel that Northwest ratings as a whole are inflated take note! It seems to be true that our higher rated players have significantly higher NW ratings than USCF, but I believe this is because our scale is more attenuated than the USCF's. More on this, perhaps, in future issues.

Visits to chess clubs will familiarize players with conventional practices of club play and rating systems.

Game analysis will introduce players to game-thinking processes of tourney players.

A visit to MIT and Mac-Hack, the chess playing computer will be included in the schedule. Club organization will be stressed so that the participants will be able to promote play when they return home.

Participants will live in Roger Williams College dormitories beside the bay and take meals in the campus dining lounge. Leisure activities will include sailing, tennis, swimming, and golf. Adventure in the arts activities may also be included in the program. Small, informal workshops offer art, music, and drama and crafts to high school students.

Roger Williams College is an independent, coeducational institution offering contemporary two year and four year programs in the liberal arts, in business administration and in engineering. The college, enrolling over 3,00 students, is a member of the Union for Experimenting Colleges and Universities.

This program is being offered during a two-week period, July 2-15. The tuition of \$125 a week includes the cost of room, board, instructional materials and access to library and recreational activities.

Judson Junior High, Salem, Oregon, was the scene of the 1st Annual School Chess Tournament on March 25. The 5-round event, co-sponsored by OMSI and Salem Community Science Board, was limited to Junior High and Elementary School players.

Although 51 players were paired in the first round, only 46 youngsters actually participated, which resulted in several forfeit wins. The hectic pace of the tourney, allowing only an hour per round, prevented any reparings of players whose preregistered opponents failed to appear.

At the end of three rounds, only 5 players remained undefeated. In the fourth round, Casey Johnson lost to Mike Poulsen, while Mark Turner gained another point from Bill Ferguson. The fifth perfect scorer, Kirk Hill, proved his mettle by downing Gary Clawson, who was only a half point behind the leaders.

The fifth and final round saw Turner pitted against Hill and Poulsen taking on Wayde Schroeder. Hill garnered higher tie-breakers to edge out Poulsen, as these two finished with a 5-0 sweep to claim the first and second place trophies. Tied for third through eighth places were: Casey Johnson, Les Rowell, Kevin Kieley, Mark Turner, Jay Schrader and Rachel Schrader. Johnson and Rowell received the third and fourth place trophies.

In addition to the individual competition, 7 teams were hotly contending for the traveling team trophy. Waldo Junior High (Hill, Johnson, Ferguson and Steve Taft) posted an impressive 15 points, closely followed by the Salem Heights Elementary team (Jay and Rachel Schrader, David Dagg, and Greg Moreland) who chalked up 14. The other 5 teams finished: Leslie Junior High - 11½; Pratum - 10; Washington - 7; McKinley - 6½; Cummings - 4½. Although the four Judson Junior High players were not registered as a team, they scored 11½ points.

Salem Chess Club awarded a year's free membership to the top-finishing junior high and elementary players (who did not already belong to SCC) -- Kirk Hill and Garth Lowther. SCC conducted the tournament, with T.D. Esther Schrader ably assisted by Larry Bergquist, Sief Poulsen, Bill Schalk, Jack Schrader, Don Turner, Gary Turner, and Sam Zysset.

N.C.W. CHESS SCENE by Larry Allyn

The Community Center in Quincy was the setting for the "First Annual Columbia Basin Open" chess tournament February 26th. So far as I can tell, this is the first rated tournament ever to be held in Quincy, and only the second in Grant County.

The event was organized by the newly formed Quincy High School chess club. And since this was Harold Moye's first attempt at tournament directing, he asked me to assist him. He must have been studying the "Official Chess Handbook" because there was very little I needed to show him. I predict that Moye will become a very active young promoter.

Incidentally, Quincy's Community Center is one of the finest tournament facilities I have seen. It could easily accommodate 100 players--maybe more. The lighting is unexcelled--fluorescent fixtures spaced closely enough that there are no dark areas or shadows. I am hoping to use this facility some time in the future for a larger tournament.

First place trophy was captured by Dave Delp from Monroe High School. Unrated Sid Porter from Oroville High School, playing in his first tournament, shocked everyone by going undefeated and drawing with Delp in the final round to pick up the second place trophy.

Patti Allyn, from Cashmere High School, took a trophy for highest scoring girl, and Bob Allyn from Orchard Junior High in Wenatchee took first for those under 15.

Perhaps the biggest surprise of the tournament was the playing of Jim Klingele, elementary school student from Yakima. He nearly drew his first round game with Phil Smith, highest rated player in the tournament. In the next three rounds, he gave up only one draw. His biggest win was against Murlin Varner, who plays first board for Eastmont High School. This performance won him first place trophy for those under 12. I think this was only Jim's third tournament and I'm certain his 1220 provisional rating doesn't reflect his true ability. I always keep an eye out for young players with promise and feel Jim is the strongest eleven year old I've seen.

Since this was intended as a developmental tournament, three trophies were offered to unrated players. First place was taken by Fred Reeves, Moses Lake High School. Second trophy went to Mark Shomler, Brewster High School. First unrated under 15 was won by Steve Sterling from Leavenworth.

Incidentally, the demand for chess from the young people in this area is growing so fast we can't keep up. Peshastin-Dryden High School will hold its first rated tournament April 22. Young people from Oroville, Brewster, Pateros, Chelan, and Grand Coulee have all expressed an interest in hosting tournaments.

Because all our growth is so new, nearly all Central Washington players are young. We have an acute shortage of adult leadership. Anyone in this area (high school or older) who would like to organize or direct rated tournaments or perhaps coach a junior high or elementary school chess club, please contact me. Desire is more important than experience. No one will be asked to direct an event by himself until he has worked with a qualified director.

A small and somewhat inexperienced field turned out for the O.S.U. OPEN held on Mar. 25-26 in Corvallis. The field consisted of 18 players with 9 being unrated!

Your writer (Jerry Weikel) won the tourney on secondary tie-breakers but the credit goes to Charles Ballantine (an unrated player that finished in 2nd place) who supplied the damage by scoring 2½ out of a possible 3 against the top three rated players including a 5th rd. win over expert Perala. He almost made it a perfect score when he had the exchange over Mische but accepted the draw after Mische forced the exchange of the last pawn. Ballantine just simply out-combined his opponents. It should be noted, however, that Perala was in serious time trouble in their game.

On the other hand your writer was fortunate to finish as a co-winner with Ballantine. I should have lost the exchange against Loughlin but saved the game in a time scramble and I also had a bishop trapped against Mische but a swindle presented me with a mating attack.

An unusual occurrence in the tourney was the fact that out of the top 3 finishers two were unrated players!

Ballantine and myself finished with 4½ pts. Charles Kang (the other unrated player that finished high) was all alone with 4 pts and third place. Best B went to Wayne Matsen and Best C went to John Loughlin, both scoring 3 pts and both edging out their respective competition for the trophies, John Billey and Kevin Chambers. Best Jr. went Jon Mische who scored 3½ pts.

One last note is that Michael Schemm probably would have changed the outcome of the tourney had he been able to finish but, somehow, got his car stuck Sat. night up in the coastal range and had to miss the last 2 rds. in order to get it out! (He never did tell me the reason he was up there in the first place)

Due to the lack of participation and the quality of the trophies the prize fund was understandably quite low. Myself and Ballantine split \$23, Kang received \$9, and Matsen, Loughlin, Billey, and Chambers received approx. \$2 ea.

OREGON WOODPUSHER

Chris Bowen sends me the following report on the Oregon Woodpusher, which he directed, Mike Schemm won the 25 player Oregon Woodpusher with a perfect 5-0 score. The tournament featured three first round upsets that really stirred up the ratings. In the first round, Doug Grisham (1516) defeated top rated Byron (1905), Jeff Running (1185) beat Rick Haynes (1640), and Tom Kuge surprised pre-tournament favorite Don Grisham (1860). After that the tournament settled down with Schemm coming out on top as 6 players were bunched Espey won the 'B' trophy and \$7.50, Jeff Running was top with 3½, Sief Poulsen, Alan Dvorshak, Rod Espey, Fred Byron, Rick Haynes, and Don Grisham. Top school honors and trophy went to the Scenic Jr. High School of Central Point with 27½ wins. Second place school was Butte Falls Elementary, 15½ wins. They were awarded an Official Chess Handbook. Sams Valley Elem. placed third, 15 wins, and were awarded an Official Chess Rulebook. Hedrick Jr. High of Medford and Grants Pass Sr. High tied for 4th & 5th with 14½. South Umpqua High School scored 13 wins.

Gary Vinyard, 5-1-0, won 1st place High School Trophy. Ray Boldway, 4-2-0, won 2nd and Mitchell Johnson, 4-0-2 took 3rd. All three were from Grants Pass. William Nulf of Gold Beach Union High School, playing his first tournament was awarded a tournament board for traveling the farthest.

Marvin Ansted from Gilchrist Elem. in Klamath County, 5-0-1, won 1st place Jr. High trophy. Ron Bryson of Scenic Jr. High, 5-0-1, won 2nd. Greg Cunningham of Hedrick Jr. High, 5-0-1, took 3rd. Three top boys all scoring 5 wins and only one loss. All three names will be those to remember in high school years to come. Tommy Graves of Sams Valley, 4-0-2, won 1st place Grade School Trophy. Steve Gandee of Sams Valley, 3-1-2, won 2nd. Bob Larson of Roosevelt Elem., Medford, 3-0-3, captured 3rd trophy.

The final award of the third place High School Trophy and all three of the Jr. High Trophies hung in the balance till the finish of the last game to be completed. This was in round six between Brian Anders of Scenic Jr. High and Marvin Ansted. Anders had middle game difficulty, losing points, while Ansted did not seem to know how to play out the end game. The game took an hour longer than all others. Ansted finally realized he could give up a bishop for a pawn and still have enough strength to checkmate, and did.

Bids must include site, entry fee, prize fund, round schedule, financial assistance desired from the O.C.F., if any, and memberships required. If possible, please submit bids earlier, as twelve weeks notice is required to Chess Life if the tournament is U.S.C.F. rated, and the tournament committee will need time to study the bids.

The First Annual Bathtub Open proved to be a great success. As usual only a handful of players turned up from the mainland, but Nanaimo yielded up a large number of players, especially new players taking advantage of the free B.C.C.F. membership which was offered. The low turnout from Victoria was disappointing, although there were some players from that area.

The tournament was won by B. Harper, although only on tie-break. Second was B. McLaren, a rising Nanaimo Junior. Third was another familiar face, J. Berry. The 1st and 2nd B prizes were taken by J. Clarke and G. Davis respectively, while G. Warren took the C class prize. P. Bokis convincingly captured the Unrated prize.

On February 28, 1972, a speed tournament was held at the Vancouver YMCA Chess Club, entry being restricted to those rated under 2000 (NW). Vancouver Club correspondent Hee Seid reports:

"In this speed tournament, a tense struggle developed between K. Morton and B. Kruger after Round 4. Since B. Kruger lost both his games to R. Chow, he had to play catch-up the rest of the way. The top two received a prize while the third had to sit out on a diet. Though R. Chow coasted his way to a fine victory, the other ticket was not decided until the last round, with K. Morton edging out B. Kruger by ½ a point. Unrated player H. Frei made a respectable showing."

(Editor's note: The prizes to this particular tournament were free passes to a meal at one of Vancouver's finer Chinese restaurants.)

After Biyiasas, playing in his customary over-sharp style lost to Pakosta, it looked like Zuk might win the tournament, but Hill dispelled that prospect when he drew Zuk, in a game the former should have won. Top A honors were divided between Ernie Kryzowski, Ivan Ratkai and Robert Fancett, Top B went to Bill Edie, and Dario Vazquez of Barcelona was top Unrated. Rob Hankinson directed.

Again not the best as it chases the Q to a better square, opens the diagonal and weakens the pawn structure. 17.NxP was good and its hard to find a reasonable move for Black.

There is always an inherent danger in players of less than master calibre writing about chess - either of incorrect analysis or assumptions.

In this book, one cannot help but notice how the Editor constantly injects his own personal views into the text, beginning with "...Emmanuel Lasker was the greatest chess player of all time".

Beginning the book are 4 pages of biographies of the contestants, unfortunately, the Editor's pro-Lasker bias distorts this otherwise fine feature.

Fifteen annotators are given credit for analysis in the text, but it is mostly George Thomas and the contestants whose work is seen. On this note, it is a disappointment - what with the John G. White collection to use as bibliography, one expects something along the line of Gligoric's "Selected Chess Masterpieces" rather than intermittent annotation.

The games themselves have aged gracefully in the 51 years since the match took place. As the definitive work on the match, if that is what it is intended to be, the book fails. There can be no comparison between it and the books on the Botvinnik-Smyslov, Botvinnik-Tal, Botvinnik-Bronstein matches. But then it is reasonably priced and is certainly better than no book on the subject at all.

If the next book in the series is Alekhine - Capablanca, I hope the author will use more time in research and preparation, and more discretion in editing, and the publisher I hope, will exercise more patience, and not produce another premature pamphlet.

THE CHESS PLAYER

This new magazine has been compared to Chess Informant as both cover the same subject - International Chess, and both use figurine algebraic with coded analysis, usually by one of the two players involved. However, Informant's two \$6 issues a year cover about 1250 games whereas the Chess Player covers about 1600! Volume I of the Chess Player, covering the latter half of 1971 contained 1596 games, including 8 complete events (the 39th USSR Championship and Alekhine Memorial to name 2) and is now available from Chess Digest for \$3.00. In addition, The Chess Player contains photos of the players and important theoretical articles...really a fantastic magazine, and worth the price. I would suggest subscribing air freight. Single issues will be available from Chess Digest for the fussy or frugal. Order from either Chess Digest or Tru-Test.

If you have the Dec. '71 edition, you may be interested to learn that the misnamed photo of Radulov was identified by Peter Eiyasas as "Kavalek, wearing a wig!"

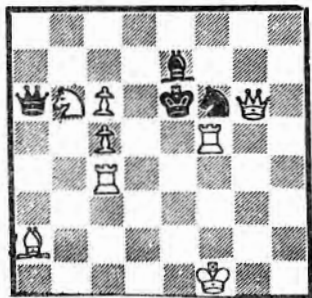

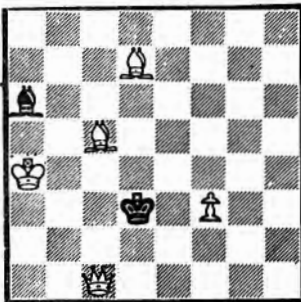

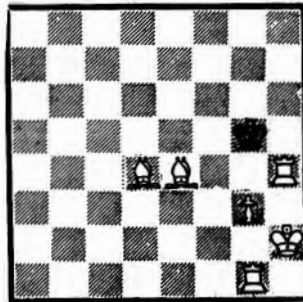
