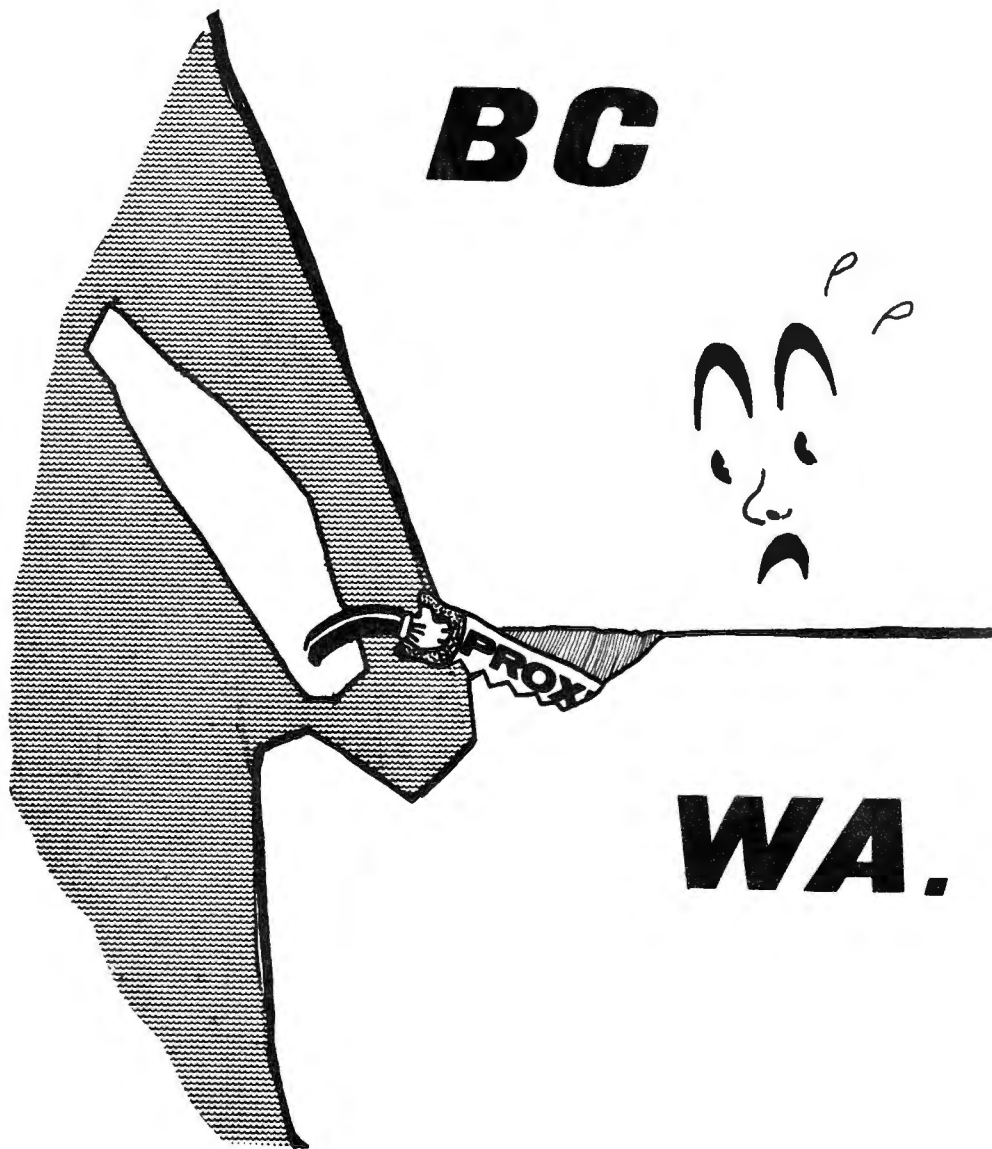

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Submissions to Northwest Chess must be typed single space within borders of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  inches. Plain white paper should be used - oil-impregnated "glossy" or "ripple" paper does not accept adhesive. Northwest Chess is printed by the photo-offset method with size reduction of  $\frac{1}{3}$ . Lay-up size is  $10\frac{1}{2} \times 15$ ". Crosstables that are wider than  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " should be accompanied by a column article to fit alongside. (eg., crosstable 7", story  $2\frac{1}{2}$ ", always leave  $\frac{1}{2}$ ".) Crosstables should include player's name and rating - place of residence should be abbreviated. Annotated games and articles are welcome. Notation may be either English Descriptive or Algebraic. Photographs for publication should be sharp and printed on high contrast paper. Tournament Announcements must include the name, date, site, entry fee, time control, registration time, prizes, and name and address of the organizer or director. They must also be typed within borders of  $4\frac{1}{2}$ ". Material must be mailed two to three days before the deadline. There is no mail delivery on Saturday in Canada. Until further notice,

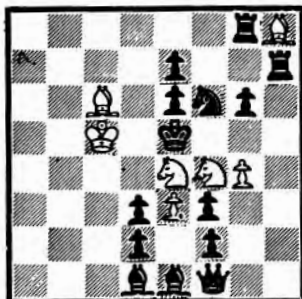

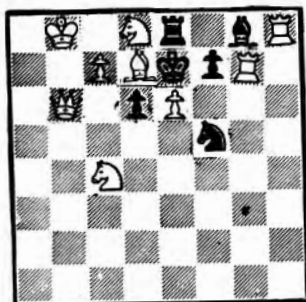

So, if anyone needs an extension, you had better OK it with the director then notify your opponents.

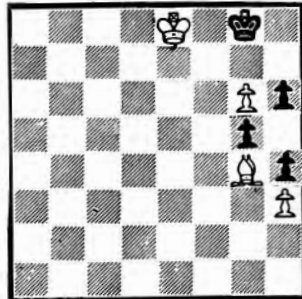

### Explanation:

Subtract the scores of the two players. If the game is drawn the lower rated player gets the points in column 4. If the game is won the winner (if higher rated) gets the points in column 2, but if lower rated he gets the points in column 3. The loser loses a corresponding amount.

# Jude Acers on tour

Jude Acers started his 1972 nationwide chess exhibition tour in Yakima, Washington with a 30 minute TV program "Jude Acers on Chess" on the educational TV channel in Yakima. The program was well planned in advance, enough to be listed in TV Guide but with wrong time and spelling of "Acres". Started the program with a couple of positions to show one of his themes of teaching, accurate play even when it does not count. Acers was interviewed by Frank Roberts and then Jude showed a game with lots of comments. Seemed to go quite well and we have a video tape for anyone who would like to see it.

Then the Jude Acers Chess Show moved to five grade schools in the Yakima Area. Acers is quite good with youngsters. He could give a beginners' talk or any level that would fit the group. The Nob Hill School had him talk in the auditorium to the whole school and then he played some of the 6th graders. We were a little late for the next school.

Saturday, April 29, was his appearance at Yakima Mall, to be the first of many shopping center appearances this year. Here he played 43 games winning 40, drawing with Dave Andreotti of Yakima, Herman Moya of Moxee City and losing to Charles Skone of Wapato.

Besides giving free exhibitions at grade schools, Acers likes to promote chess in prisons and jails. He went to Washington State Penitentiary in Walla Walla. We thought the visit had been set up in advance. It had but only with the prison officials, they had not told the inmates we were coming. Learned a lesson there, be sure the inmates know about the event. The few inmates that were available in the family living group were treated to playing two individual games with the master. Probably no one else this year will get that. Acers won all 10 games.

Dan Bailey set up an exhibition at Whitman College outside the College Library. We started at 6:30 pm and it was cold. Players borrowed coats from Bailey to ward off the cold. In two hours of play Ted Warner got a draw and 10 others lost. Next year we hope to hold the exhibition during the day as part of an annual Renaissance Fair at the College.

Franklin High School turned out quite a crowd for Acers and the simultaneous play took so long that his appearance at King County Jail was a couple of hours late. Score was 19-1 at Franklin and 28-0 at the Jail.

The journey was then on to Oregon for exhibition set-up by Earl Eason at Tektronix Chess Club in Beaverton. In a beautiful playing site Acers played 23 games. Players able to win were Lynn Abrahamson of Vancouver, Gene Cowan of Beaverton plus in consultation Mark Dodds-David Potter, Aloha High School students. Two draws were gained by Rick Glad of Vancouver and Earl Eason of Beaverton.

Back to Seattle for a Saturday appearance at Aurora Village Shopping Center. The publicity for this one had been goofed up with ads having the wrong date in them. Still Acers played 29 games. Pat Hessen got a draw while Don Christensen and Pedro Garcia-Pelayo both won games but they had both lost games also.

The Federal Penitentiary at McNeil Island was next on the schedule. Their chess club is a USCF affiliate. The exhibition was given in the library and Acers won 11 and drew with Spencer. It takes a boat ride to get to McNeil and hopefully more chess players will make the effort to play against the McNeil group. Write to Mr. Zeigler, P.O. Box 500, Steilacoom, WA 98388.

Harold Moya held Acers to a loss in Wenatchee while the master was winning 22. In the afternoon before Acers had electrified the fourth, fifth, and sixth graders at Chelan

Grade School. Boeing Chess Club group nicked Acers for a loss to Alan Clark and four draws. Mike Murray had the most exciting game which ended in a draw, other draws were Ward Smith, an unknown student, and the Club President, Frank Davenport.

Then it was on to more free exhibitions at Oregon Correction Institution with 14-0 score and Oregon Penitentiary with 18-0 score. Both events were in Salem, Oregon. Those exhibitions plus the Salem Chess Club appearance were made possible by Jack and Esther Schrader. Acers only allowed two draws at Salem Chess Club with Leon Sage of Portland and Mike Vinyard of Salem while winning 11.

Saturday in from of Wards in the Triangle Shopping Center in Longview Acers downed 30 players losing only to Ray Blums of Longview.

Monday was a busy day for the chess promoter with appearances at all three St. Helen's grade schools and then a 22 board simultaneous at the High School in the evening. Two high school students, John Ridenour and Ron Hamilton, downed the master while Patti Runyan drew. Lee Clark, the high school club advisor worked long and hard on these events. There were stories in every paper (locally) each week for about 2 months before the event. Mr. Acers will be back in St. Helens on May 16, 1973.

None of the 11 players at the Bremerton Chess Club could hold Mr. Acers. The afternoon before, thanks to arrangements made by club president, Tom Slinger, Mr. Acers was able to have a tooth pulled that was bothering him a great deal, in such a manner that he gave the lecture and exhibition with no problems.

We then made the mistake of driving straight from Bremerton to Spokane arriving there about 5:30 am with no reservations for a place to stay. After checking several places we finally did find one, but that is a mistake we shall not repeat. No one could hold Acers at the Inland Empire Chess Club but there was one draw with Peter Torkar at Northtown Shopping Center. 27 games were won by Acers there. No winners at MERit Mart in Bremerton. Four grade schools in Tacoma were treated to talks by Mr. Acers before his appearance at the Tacoma Chess Club. The score at the Tacoma Mall was 47-0 in Acers' favor. Mr. Acers is the only top player in the USA that gives so much time and energy to promote chess. He gives, willingly, of his time to give talks for free to grade schools, prisons and jails. He will be back in the Northwest from April 1, 1973 to June 1, 1973. I hope more groups in the Northwest will book him during this period. Mr. Acers has some very firm ideas about how chess masters should be paid to play in tournaments and he is going to hold out until someone pays him before he plays. He is also a firm believer in the study of four chess books that can make any player an expert. He has quite an ego that is fed by large crowds at chess exhibitions. He thinks he is a great player and he is one of those who likes to tell it to all who will listen. He will share his ideas on how one should study chess to improve and those methods do make a lot of sense to me but I don't have time to try them. Acers is a full time chess professional and giving exhibitions all over gives him the funds he needs to live and work on chess. He firmly believes that no player in the world can beat him in a clock game. Acers may not win but he won't lose either. He has quite a chess library but I believe I have talked him out of trying to carry "the whole thing" around the USA with him this year. He has a degree in Russian from LSU and has been brushing up on his Russian when "64" comes each week. He is most interesting to talk to and has firm opinions on all the chess players past and present. He has worked very hard to prepare his lectures for his tour, he has four and will have different ones for next year's tour. It is quite an experience to see him at work in a grade school and he really does work hard to try to get across his points to the children. No question is too elementary and he does his level best to explain things. He is much in favor of algebraic notation. He has a weekly chess column in BERKELEY BARB on which he works really hard to make it something that all levels of players will look at. He uses algebraic in that. They did want to play so Rod & Sunny Espey set up the Rose City Delight and Rod won it 3-0. He beat his wife in round one. The tournament was nearly a success. Needed more Master/Expert players. Guess maybe the 85 or so players in the Northwest who could have played in that section are not prepared to do so. Have two more similar events set up. If they don't go then there won't be anymore. So if you are a master/expert rated player who would like to see more of these event please support either of next two East-West Events. Maybe three days was to much. Independence Day & Sunfair are both two day events. \$500.00 in Sunfair. There will be other Amateur and Novice events but I am about to change to straight Northwest Ratings for pairings and prizes. I would welcome comments and suggestions. Got one recently that there should be low entry fee events with very low prizes. Tournament went smoothly until some players dropped out without letting us know about it. One fellow had the gall to call up on the phone to register just before pairings were made and then after he said he would appear after I explained just what the fees. Sure enough he did not appear so his opponent had to wait an hour to win by forfeit. Don't plan to allow that again. A suggestion was made that when you have an odd number in both sections of the tournament that you pair the two byes together so they can have a rated game. You will note quite a few new players in novice section. Keep them coming, bring your friends. Someone came in during Sunday night after everyone had left and stole a chess clock and several chess books and this seems to be happening every tournament. So mark your equipment and keep an eye on it. East-West Tournament Assoc is no longer able to supply sets for all games so be sure to bring you sets to tournaments and don't leave your clock at home.

America is represented by six players: Bornholz (Pitt.Pa.) - Callaghan, Jr. (Charlottesville, Vir.) - Cross (Woodland Hills, Cal) - McLellan (Omaha, Neb.) - Muir (Salem, Vir.) - Tullus (Sunnyvale, Cal.)

Players in section 1972A4 are to note that there are two such sections. In one Running, Skarsten, VanNatta, Groschl. In the other Groschl, Moye, Wagner, Hayami. The Running section is to be changed to read 1972XA4.

I'm going to ask for the fee to be raised to \$1.00 per section. So order what you want while it is still cheap!

Those winning or co-winning sections (noted by \*) are to say whether they want a new free section or 3 months extension to the MWCL. You have one month after publication to tell me.

You will notice that the sections have been changed to simply A,B,C.

Also, future sections assigned will also read simply A,B,C - there will no longer be AH,AM,AL,AA etc.

Any new player can enter at 1600 or 1300 points however he sees fit to do. The charge will be 50¢ per section until I can get this changed to \$1.00 per section. I hope to have this change in effect as of the July publication date of the MWCL.

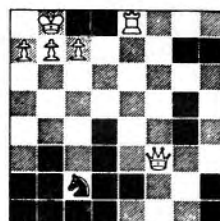
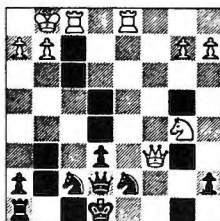
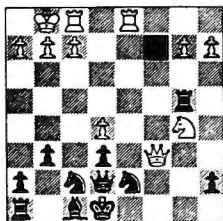
**Intelligence & Chess**

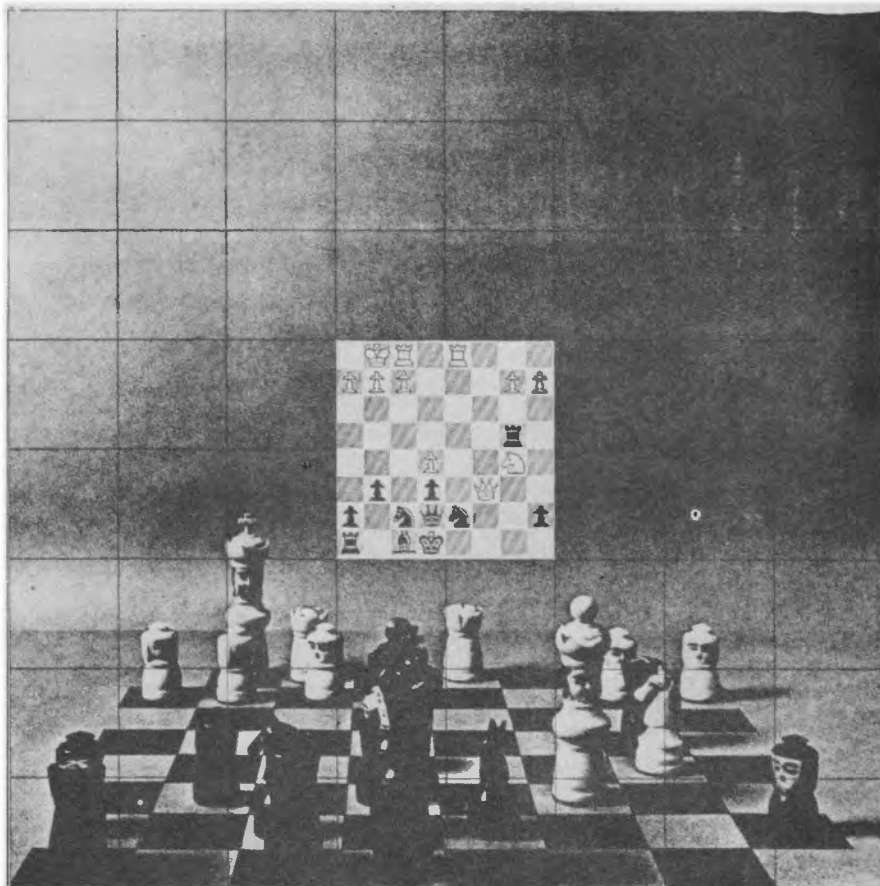
Non-chessplayers regard the chess expert as a kind of super quiz-kid who is sure to be a success in any intellectual endeavor. There is no evidence from psychological studies or personal reports to substantiate this claim. An admittedly crude Russian study of the competitors in the 1925 Moscow international tournament failed to yield any support for the idea that chessplayers are more intelligent or have better visual memories than non-chessplayers of equal age and education. The chessplayers, however, did better than non-chessplayers in remembering and reconstructing chess positions, which seems reasonable enough.

De Groot, an experimental psychologist and former member of the Dutch Olympic Chess Team, has recently described some similar experiments with chessplayers of various strengths. In one of these, they were shown an unfamiliar chess position from an actual game for five seconds and then were asked to reconstruct it from memory. Differences in chess ranking showed dramatically. Try yourself out with the chess position taken from *Thought and Choice in Chess* [see illustration opposite page]. After five seconds of examination, ex-world champion Max Euwe reconstructed it perfectly and a lower-ranked master made only one small mistake, but experts and average players made all kinds of errors. Apparently the master perceives the setup in large units, such as pawn structure or cooperating pieces, and can even decide which side has the advantage. When he does make an error, it is often one of putting a piece on a very desirable square for that type of position.

However, we cannot draw strong conclusions about the general intellectual skills, if any, which combine to produce a great player. It is de Groot's opinion that masters would score highly in "spatial imagination" tests of non-verbal intelligence, but he does not believe that exceptionally high verbal intelligence is an indispensable requirement. (On the other hand, a blockhead like Czentovic, the hero of Zweig's *The Royal Game*, probably could not become world champion.) Actually I don't think a chessmaster would score any higher on an IQ test than a lesser player, or a nonplayer with comparable education and background.

NO DECISION IN NEW YORK

Reshevsky, R. Byrne and Kavalek tied for first in the U.S. Zonal

"All over "is not just a famous theatrical play of an American playwright, Edward Albee, but it was a cry of one spectator who came late at 6:30 p.m. on Sunday, May 14, to the second floor of the Group Health Incorporated building in the middle of Manhattan in New York City to see how Reshevsky, R. Byrne and Kavalek were doing in the last round of the 21st U.S. Championship. He was really unhappy, because he expected a fight for the qualification for the Interzonal - two places are just reserved for the U.S. chessplayers and there were three candidates. As a matter of fact, there was even a comical possibility that six players would tie for the first prize, if Lombardy, Evans and Benko would win and Reshevsky, R. Byrne and Kavalek would lose. But nothing extraordinary happened. DRAWS shot out all dreams and all sensational stories. It was Reshevsky who made a rocket start from the beginning of the tournament with 5,5 points out of six games. But I caught him in round 7, when I turned down his offer of draw in move 10 and outplayed him with black pieces and won the game. But then again Sammy was fighting for the title, for his ego and for all whatever was important to him. He won next game, but then he lost again to Robert Byrne in round 9. This very round was black round for Larry Evans, who lost to Bisguier and lost hopes to qualify for the Interzonal. Reshevsky, Robert Byrne and Kavalek took the leadership. I was half point ahead of those two but had to play Evans, R. Byrne, Lombardy and Benko in last four games. In another critical round - it was round 11 - I tried to beat R. Byrne and I was pretty close to victory and missed win at least twice. The game ended with a draw and it meant for me the end of running away alone. In round 11 "Larry Evans beat Bill Lombardy and took him away of there three on the hill." And at the end there was a silent run of those three. They finished together giving no chances to each other and there are co-winners of the U.S. Championship of 1972. Their names remain in brains of every day spectators as such: Reshevsky, R. Byrne and Kavalek. They have to play two-round match to play off for two places in Interzonals and R. Byrne and Kavalek have better Sonneborn and both will represent the U.S.A. if the match ends undecidable. But there is always fighting Sammy Reshevsky who at the age of 62 is not giving up his hopes and the world has to wait to the fall of 1972 when the match will be played for two candidates for Interzonal. It was very strong and fighting tournament, even so, that Bobby Fischer did not take part. And it was probably the strongest Zonal from Zonals all over the world since the Soviets have already their eight best players in Interzonals and two Candidate matches. The prize fund was 6700 dollars and the first prize was split between Reshevsky, R. Byrne and Kavalek - each got 1,350 dollars. The tournament was sponsored by the U.S. Chess Federation and the American Chess Foundation. The tournament director, Paul Brandts, who is a good U.S. master, had not problems and the whole tournament ran well. From the other unknown players was Greg DeFotis from Chicago a nice surprise and he deserves such a good

place. It is pity that two very talented young American players - Soltis and Roggof could not take part in this Championship. With them and Fischer it would be a real summit chess event.

# russell's chess chats

It appears that the Fisher-Spassky World Chess Championship match will take place July 2, 1972 in Reykjavik, Iceland. But since Fischer is one of players and what has gone on the last few months I will believe it when they set down and make the first moves. CHESS NEWSLETTER of May 15, 1972 has an interesting report that does not completely match with one in CHESS EXPRESS no 7. CHESS NEWSLETTER comes first class every 15 days from Chess Digest, P.O. Box 21225, Dallas, TX 75211 for only \$3.12 and CHESS EXPRESS airmail 24 issues a year for \$10.00 per year from East-West Tournament Assoc., P.O. Box 1631 Yakima, WA 98907.

No after giving the plugs the following <sup>are</sup> the important points. CHESS EXPRESS gives the full match rules as agreed upon March 20, 1972 between "the Chess Federation of USSR (Mrs. A Ivushkina and grandmaster E. Geller the latter being authorized to sign for grandmaster Spassky) of the USA (Mr. E.B. Edmondson, authorized to sign for grandmaster Fischer ((writer note: wonder if USA has something in writing to that effect?)) of Yugoslavia (Mr. P. Basaraba and Mr. M. Molerovic) of Iceland (Mr. C.G. Thorarinnsson and Mr. Fridjonsson and approved by the President of FIDE. The Chief Arbiter is grandmaster Lothar Schmid. There are rules on lighting, filming ventilation, noise, how to protest a decision of Chief Arbiter, only three playing sessions can be postponed without penalty, player is not to distract his opponent, games are to be played on Sunday, Tuesdays and Thursdays with adjourned games played off the same day. At this March 20 meeting all details of the Fischer-Spassky match were to be settled including money matters. But this was changed according to article in CHESS EXPRESS "Why Belgrade pulled out" by Rudolf Maric of Belgrade. It includes the telegrams ~~about~~ about the match arrangements. Here is Fischer's of March 23 to the Belgrade organizers "I have just spoken with Ed Edmondson regarding the financial arrangements for the match. Unfortunately due to my preparations for the match I was unable to attend the meeting in Europe ((writers note: That was sure a big mistake on his part what did he think was going to take place at the Amsterdam meeting. Surely USCF told or showed Fischer the FIDE telegram which stated that. One telegram from FIDE states that "FIDE will not communicate with Fischer personally, only through the intermediate of the American Chess Federation")) Mr. Edmondson was not authorized to make the financial arrangements with you that he did. I will not abide by them. Unless you can considerably improve you offer by a group of FIDE comptrollers and agree that all monies over your total expenses of the match go to me and the Russians I will not play your match in Yugoslavia" Ken Smith says in CHESS NEWSLETTER "At no time did Bobby Fischer cancel the match either in Belgrade or Iceland" That does not match up with Bobby Fischer telegram of March 28 to Belgrade "Your financial offer is out of the question and I will not play Spassky in Belgrade." Fischer sent this to Ed Edmondson on March 27 "Dear Ed, This is to inform you that as of today you or any other USCF representative may not represent me or make any negotiations or agreements in my name, I personally will handle all" ((Writers note: That appears a little late because agreement had already been signed. I am glad it appears that FIDE and USSR have tried to work with Fischer to get the match played. Fischer tried to get more money and it did not work so now it appears that he will be playing for less in Iceland but will he. July 2 we will know.)) Belgrade, rightly so, wanted written guarantees that both players would show up. While some of this was going on FIDE President Euwe was on his East Asian Tour which sure did not help matters. Belgrade & USSR wanted FIDE to hold Fischer to the March 20 agreement. Belgrade withdrew from holding the first half of the match when they were not assured by March 31 that Fischer would play under agreement of March 20. "Yugoslavia is not prepared to jeopardise its reputation in the world as excellent organizer of important chess events" They did not feel enough time was left to setup to event properly. The telegram on May 6 to FIDE from USCF says "Bobby Fischer agrees to play in Iceland as scheduled under protest. Edmondson/Marshall" Peter

Marshall is Fisher's lawyer. Most interesting series of events and I will be most interested to read the account in Chess Life and Review of the events. USCF has spent a lot of time and money getting Fischer this far on the path to World Championship. Besue to see LIFE magazine for May 19th for pictures and story on Fischer especially Fischers thoughts on Iceland. Fischer has gotten a lot of publicity for chess on his road to the world championship and it sure can't hurt but only help the game. We must all thank him for putting up with the reporters and cameras but I suppose he got paid something for everything that he did and that is probably only right. He has done a lot to raise playing standards for tournaments around the world. I certainly wish him the best in his match with Spassky. The International Tournament at Teeside England was won by Bent Larsen with 11-4 followed by Ljubojevic 10, Portisch 9½, Gligoric, Tringov 9, Parma, Andersson 8½, Georgorghiu 8, Keene, Sax 7, Wade, Bilek, Hecht 6½, Ree 6, Bellin 4, Cafferty, 3.

Line for Las Palmas in Canary Island is Larsen, Portisch Smyslov, Bronstein, Georghiu, Benko, Pomar, Andersson, Lehmann, Medina, MARTZ of USA, Huguet, Menvielle, Dominguez and Valcarcel. Event runs May 28-June 18. Rukavina of Yug and Smejkal of Czech tied 9-4 for first in Number 3 European Zonal and so qualify for 1973 Interzonal. Hartston of England was 3rd 8½. 4 players did show up that could have played. Players to take part in 1973 Interzonals are starting to make their names known. A selection committee of Averbach, Euwe, Kashdan, Najdorf and Trifunovic selected the following 8 players: Gligoric, Hort, Keres, Polugawsky, Portisch, Smyslov, Stein, Tal with replacements in order are: Panno, Bronstein, Reshevsky, Ivkov, Olafsson and Mecking. From Candidates matches of 1971 are Geller, Hubner, Korchnoi, Larsen, Taimanov and Uhlmann. Then the World Jr and this is Karpov but Swiss Federation from which Hug the 1971 World Jr comes is protesting this. Hug and Karpov 1969 World Jr were suppose to play a match. Swiss will present a proposal at 1972 FIDE Congress to try to change agreement reached at 1971 Congress. There are 2 Interzonals of 16 players each with top three from each advancing to Candidates Matches of 1974 which will be played under the formula of number of wins 3 in quarterfinals, 4 in semifinals and 5 wins in finals. It is 6 wins in 1975 World Championship with only problem to set is the total number of games of each match that can be allowed to play. Organizers must know just how many games they must allow for. Western Europe Zonal should be held soon from which 2 advance. Helsinki is site of Zone 2 event also 2 advance. Zone 3 reported above. Zone 4 is USSR usually the USSR Championship which is usually in the fall from which 3 can advance which will mean 12 Russians in all will fill places. Zone 5 is USA and Reshevsky, R. Byrne and Kavalek must playoff to decide which two advance. Zone 6 is Canada with the tournament to be June 10 -25 in Toronto in which I assume Duncan Suttles and Robert Zuk will be taking part. Zone 7 Central America event was won by Miguel Cuellar of Columbia 11½-3½. Estevez of Cuba scored 11 and Rodriguez also Cuba 10½. Zone 8 South America started May 22 at Sao Paulo and 2 advance. Zone 9 Western Asia event is to be held in Teheran with one to advance. Zone 10 is Eastern Asia with one qualifier from tournament to be held in Hong Kong.

John Heathcote of Seattle and the Marines scored 4-1 won "B" section of CCCA's March Congress held in SF area. He won a trophy and \$100.00.

In CHESS May 1972 issue there is an interview with Tal by Bjelica. He was asked who will be top ten players ten years from now. "At least seven out of the present ten will 'survive' while the other three will be: Karpov, Mecking and perhaps Browne."

John Grefe, 2206 Haste St. #19, Berkeley has done tournament book on 1972 Lone Pine event with 117 games over 30 annotated for \$2.60.

CCCA, P.O. Box 1622, Oakland, CA 94604 for \$4.00 per 6 months has a monthly THE CALIFORNIA CHESS TOURNAMENT BULLETIN with over 5000 games per annum from USCF tournaments held in California.

1972 Chess Olympiad starts September 25 in Skopje, Yug.
