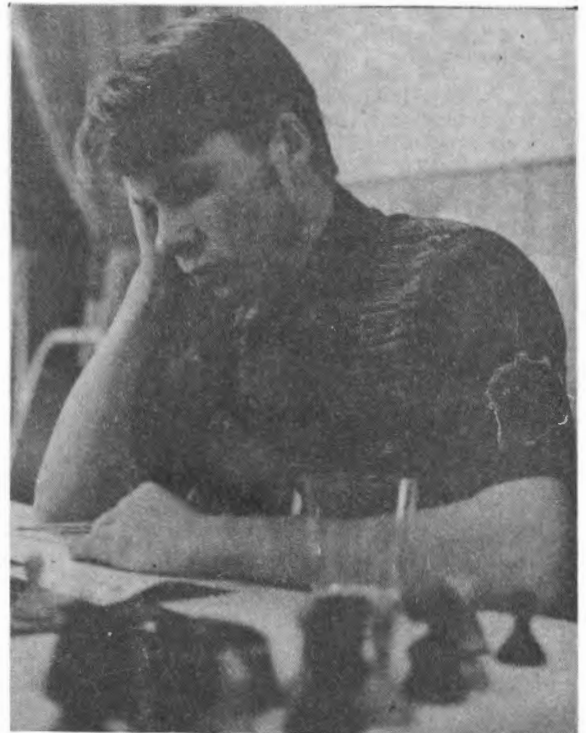

Dear Sir,

I would like to draw the attention of B.C.C.F. members to the results of the Special General Meeting held on Sep. 9/72. A report should be found in this issue of Northwest Chess.

Motions 4(A), 7 and 10 were defeated. These would have encouraged tournaments and limited monies paid to individuals. Motion 11, distributing lump sums to certain strong players, was passed.


You will note that motion 4(A) was defeated because the treasurer felt that the Federation could not afford it - yet we can afford \$300 minimum to our junior players wishing to enter the Junior Championship on top of \$600 paid to four Canadian Championship entrants.

I can safely predict that with motion 7 defeated very few tournaments will be held in the Vancouver area this season - simply because a T.D. could lose his shirt. The way it is now he is financially responsible for the tournament except for a paltry \$20 towards the rent! No wonder we have a new amateur association in B.C.

If you are concerned with the way the B.C.C.F. is being run all it takes is five signatures on a letter to the President requesting a Special General Meeting.

Submissions to Northwest Chess must be typed, single space, within borders of 4½ inches. Plain white paper should be used; oil-impregnated "glossy" or "ripple" does not accept adhesive. Northwest Chess is printed by the photo-offset method with size reduction of 1/3. Layout size is 10" x 15". Crosstables that are wider than 4½ inches should be accompanied by a column article to fit alongside. (eg., crosstable 7", story 2½", always leave ½"). Crosstables should include player's name and rating, place of residence should be abbreviated. Annotated games and articles are welcome. Notation may be either English Descriptive or Algebraic. Photographs for publication should be sharp and printed on high contrast paper. Tournament announcements must include the name, date, site, entry fee, time control, registration time, prizes, and name and address of the organizer or director. They must also be typed within borders of 4½". Material must be mailed two to three days before the deadline. Until further notice:

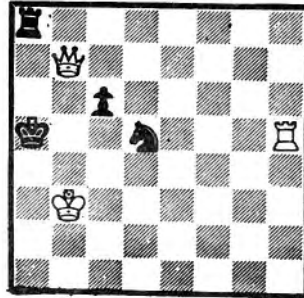

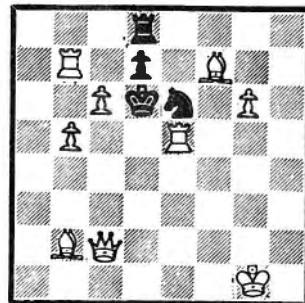

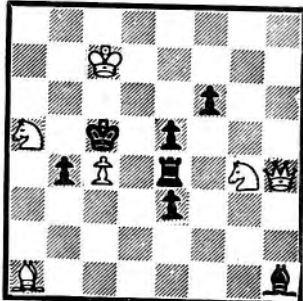

# WCF bulletin

The following resolutions were voted upon by the WCF Board of Officers on the motion of Willie Skubi.

**Resolution 1:** "The WCF accepts the BCCF resolution requiring adult members to subscribe to NWC and accepts the the WBCC on the basis established by the BCCF, provided that all adult WBCC memberships shall include a subscription to NWC."

This has the effect of restoring the BCCF's affiliate status, and giving certain elements of the WCF's affiliate status to the WBCC.

**Resolution 2:** "Wilfred Skubi is appointed as the WCF Circulation Director."

**Resolution 3:** "The WCF Distribution Director is authorized to make available to chess clubs copies of Northwest Chess for sale. The minimum sale to chess clubs shall be 15¢ per copy, and ten copies, to be paid in advance. The retail price shall be 50¢ per copy. As a condition of sale, those chess clubs participating shall agree to sell WCF memberships if the club is located in Washington State."

**Resolution 4:** "The WCF annual mail ballot shall have the return postage paid by the WCF for Washington State residents. Oregon and the BCCF shall be invited to participate if costs and arrangements are made by the affiliated organization."

The SEATTLE AMATEUR class was basically a class event, run as an open Swiss. The players were given an option to split into two at the 1500 rating point, and still keep the same \$50 1st prize in each section, but it was decided to adhere to the published announcement of a single section. Instead, the prize fund was voluntarily raised by the AMERICAN CHESS SERVICE from \$250 to \$395. This was noted by a few persons as rather unusual for the Northwest, the custom being either to give only the guaranteed amount or (when not guaranteed) to lower the advertised amount due to insufficient entries.

WALTER J. GENTALA earned \$85 first prize, \$35 top 1800, plus Certificates for both. TIMOTHY J. KAUPPILA relaxed slightly to let the win slip in the final round, took the Certificate for 2nd place but shared \$\$ with D. LEO STEFARAK (top 1500), JACK E. LOVE (top 1600) and FRED NEDELL. JAMES E. KENNEL was 2nd 1600 and received a "twin" portable chess set. Other prize winners are shown in the cross-table.

The event was a success in several ways, serving to introduce the new WCF TD, ROBERT A. KARCH, and his son DAVID, who co-directed in the 4 co-joining rooms on the 2nd floor of the Edgewater Inn. A superb microphone hook-up, carpeted floors, and an acoustical ceiling kept playing conditions under smooth control and muffled extraneous noise. The competitors were wonderfully cooperative and there was an absence of incident. A few had to skip their Saturday night game, which accounts for the double dash in the cross-table.

Four players reached the fourth and final round with a perfect score. Schrader scored a hard-fought win over third-finishing Wayne Matsen, while Turner matched wits with fellow-Expert Leon Sage to emerge victorious long after all other games were concluded. An unbreakable tie between Turner and Schrader resulted, due to identical tiebreakers, which was resolved by the flip of a coin (see Official Chess Handbook, Kenneth Herkness, page 143) in order to award the first- and second-place trophies.


The Willamette Open, Salem Chess Club's first attempt at a one-day, four-round open tourney, was held on the Willamette University campus on October 14. Half of the 31 entrants had no previous tournament experience, which must be some sort of record.

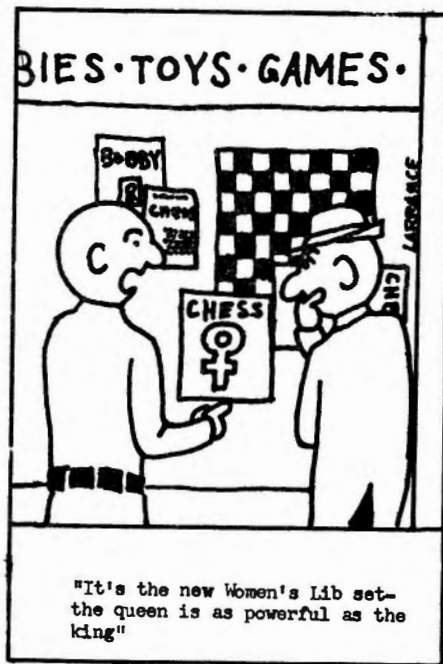
The result of all the moving was a late start of round one. Thankfully, all the players managed to keep cool. I must say that I have never seen such a good group of chess players.

Unfortunately, MCO ELEVENTH EDITION is very superficial in it's treatment. Possibly, the undertaking was to great for Walter Korn alone. MCO-11 is only two-thirds the size of MCO-10, and many important lines have been omitted. The price, \$12.95, is too much, although the paper is of a very high quality and the binding is excellent. All in all, the student is advised to spend his money on pamphlets dealing with the openings of his choice that are available from various sources at reasonable prices.

and \$15.00 1st unrated up to 1399 rating. Pat Dolan was able to take home \$15.00 for 1st 1400-1599 group. 2nd prize of \$7.50 in this group was split up by Dave Wong and George Capwell. Randy Sukkau won \$7.50 as 2nd best unrated-1399.

Closest game I can remember for some time that was almost lost on time was Capwell-Tento. Capwell just barely made the 40/1½ time control. He made his 40th move as black and punched his clock with flag hanging. We did not know just how short of time he was until Tento made his 41st move and punched the clock. Capwell's flag fell immediately. I found out later that Capwell had been thinking that the time control would be reached at move 45!

Don't know where the chess players were, seems to me that there should be more than 48 for Portland event. Remember that if you register in advance and can not make the tournament, all you need do is let the tournament director know before he makes the first round pairings. They will refund the full amount of your entry fee. I suppose that the low turnout was caused by lots of tournament activity, players do not have to travel much any more to get to play tournament chess quite often, high entry fee and no guaranteed prizes. I can not afford to guarantee prizes anymore as I have lost money to many times when that has been done. I do work hard to try to get publicity out about the tournaments but I am making a mistake by not getting an announcement into CL&R. I do think that the awarding of prizes to every 100 rating points should have lots of appeal. A number of tournament-

ents are doing it. It makes for lower total amounts for say a rating group like in this event. "A" 1st prize would have been \$65.00 and that looks better than \$35 for 1900-1999 and \$30 for 1st 1800-1899 but the latter makes for less players competing for the prizes. Remember that the player no matter his class wins the first overall prize when his score is the best in the tournament and also 1st prize in his rating group.

## THE B.C. OPEN - 90 PLAYERS !!!

An unusually large entry of unrated players turned the 1972/3 B.C. Open from what was expected in some circles to be a financial disaster into a moderate success. Credit for this must go in some measure to the publicity attendant upon the Spassky-Fischer match but the efforts of local chess addicts also played a considerable part.

Due to the Canadian Thanksgiving holiday not being recognised in the United States not a single U.S. player appeared so this tournament will go down as the largest local entry to date, far surpassing the Canadian Open of about 60. A strong contingent of 7 masters and 10 experts vied for the top prizes, including the unexpected appearance of Lionel Joyner, now living in B.C. The field proved to be too large to allow a clear winner to emerge so Bruce Harper, Daniel Scoones and Stan Pakosta divided the major spoils of victory between them. A fine performance by Ken Morton which consisted in part of wins over two higher rated players was good enough for a clear first in the A section. First B was similarly taken by J. Mach who rallied after a poor start and beat three higher rated entries in the last three rounds. Section C was the surprise of the tournament with only 8 players showing up which included everybody down to unrated! When two withdrew we had the anomalous situation of 6 players eying \$50 while the unrated section of 22 tried for \$25. The final round was a heartbreaker for N. Forbes as his only rival for first B. North lost early. Neil only had to draw to take it all but one Earl Kong was determined to share 2nd B so defeated him after a protracted endgame. Lucky for North since his clock was stolen sometime after the sixth round and his \$25 prize was a consolation.

The bottom heavy unrated section deserved consideration for their part in making the tournament a success so the Tournament Committee decided to award 2nd and 3rd prizes of \$15 and \$10 respectively. A. Bood and R. Harper shared 1-2 with R. Kent winning 3rd. place. Junior prize was awarded to N. Fullbrook who started shakily with a loss to F. Fogarassy over 200 points below him. Other upsets were Paul Brown over J. Berry in the first round and G. Morin's win over O. Friedl in the third.

Generally the event went very smoothly with very little friction to mar the well-nigh perfect playing conditions and good weather. The hall had ample room, excellent ventilation and lighting a sound proofed ceiling and private toilet facilities for both sexes adjacent. Unfortunately no women players entered so we could not prove that the usually deplorable playing conditions can be bettered. The food concession was not well attended by the contestants, many choosing to either bring their own or preferring hot food at a local drive-in.

Despite a warning that clocks would not be provided many strong players arrived without one and the early rounds were extremely wearying for the T.D. in attempting to satisfy the demand for clocks by those very players who are too cheap to buy a clock. Thanks are due to the many players from lower sections who freely lent their clocks after they had finished with them. Also to the Vancouver City Chess Club for loaning four clocks without which we would have been in real trouble with no clocks on the top four out of six boards. No thanks to the people whoever they are who stole one of these clocks and the one belonging to E. North after the sixth round.

Other persons non grata with me at the time was one B. Harper who could not understand why he had to be black against I. Joyner in round 7. His vociferous objections coerced his opponent into tossing for colour quite unnecessarily. Mr. Joyner was very gentlemanly about this and deservedly won the toss. Mr. Leemans also could not be persuaded that his USCF rating precluded him from staying in the unrated section which he had been directed to enter by some misinformed helpers at the registration. The unrated section is for previously unrated players and once rated, always rated - as long as we can prove it. Mr. Lazzarotto was also put into the unrated section but didn't make a fuss about being booted up to the B section. Thankyou! Despite the lack of clocks only four games had to be adjourned which helped the pairing problem. The Hill-Zyk game in the fourth round produced the worst pairing mistake. Alan started the game well but faltered in the middle game to go into a two rook versus queen and two united passed pawns endgame. Since the pawns were on the f and g files this had to be paired as a loss for Alan but he managed a neat swindle when Bob erred by creating a stalemate position. Joyner also found a similar swindle against Macskasy when a bishop down.

Since this was the first tournament your T.D. had tackled alone things got a bit hectic at times. My heartfelt thanks to all of you who accepted jobs without question and did them right. Apologies to those I may have offended in trying to keep the noise down which, incidentally, was remarkably low most of the time. Gratitude to many willing hands in clearing up afterwards. R. Potter P.S. In case any of the winners wondered why you had incorrect Christian names in the paper I plead guilty to inventing them. Apparently two initials or first names are required and as I didn't have either....?

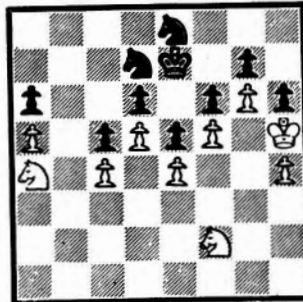

## THE KELOWNA CHESS CLUB

Kelowna had an active Chess Club in the middle 1940's with the A.J. PRITCHARD CUP being the trophy for the Club Champions in 1945-6-7. That club seems to have disintegrated but the cup remains today, used by our new Club.

The present Kelowna Chess Club started around Christmas 1967. It immediately engaged in a Club tournament, then proceeded to have two matches with the Kamloops Chess Club (one on home soil, one in Kamloops) and one with the Oliver-Osoyoos Chess Club. It also started a small chess library, including a few books and some subscription magazines. Chess instruction was given on request. In 1967, as well, a brief T.V. appearance by two executive members and two players (our oldest and youngest) gave the Club a boost.

The K.C.C. then moved to its present location, the Board Room of the Okanagan Regional Library 480 Queensway, where it meets each Sunday and Tuesday (except the first Sunday and first Tuesday of the month) at 7:30 PM. We usually close down in the summer months when out-door activities prevail. With a regular membership of 10-15 players, varying in calibre from very weak to quite strong, our Club welcomes all interested parties whether beginner or expert, old or young. Coffee is served. Members have been charged a fee of \$1.50 per month, Students 50¢ per month and retired pensioners no charge, and are urged to become BCCF members by a special Fee-decrease incentive and by our requiring BCCF membership for Club Tourneys.

Our eagerness to be actively rated BCCF members has helped obtain financial aid so that we have for the last four years sponsored a large Kelowna (Swiss) Tournament. The Club owes a debt of gratitude to the unflagging efforts of Kon Kleemaier, who has each year arranged the Tournament and borne the greatest organizational load. The first such Tournament, called the Central B.C. Open, put Kelowna on the Chess map with representation from Prince George, Kamloops Salmon Arm, Kelowna, Penticton, and Osoyoos. Each year thereafter the Kelowna Open has been held at the Capri and has had (except for this very unsettled past year for BC Chess) good representation from the coast as well.

The Club has been more active since settling in its present site, having held yearly Club tournaments and proper matches, both within the Club and with Kamloops, it has enlarged its library of books and has subscribed to more magazines. Most of its members now have NWC ratings (and some have CFC), we are organized into several leagues to facilitate round-robin tourneys; in 1969 we had a second longer T.V. interview (about 20 minutes) for a local-interest program, shot on location in the library and involving virtually the whole Club - at that time we took the opportunity to tell viewers about other Interior Chess Clubs; and in 1970 we adopted a formal constitution. Although by adopting it we have gained the advantage of splitting the labour and organizational load amongst five officials and two committees so that the "reins of power" do not slip into the hands of one or two individuals, we have also had to suffer the disadvantage of some loss of communication and concerted action, mis-understandings, and on rare occasions even disputes!

Our Club welcomes any visitors interested in Chess. Please drop in if you come by the Sunny Okanagan!!!

Philidor's Defence

- 1.P-K4 P-Q3
- 2.P-Q4 N-KB3
- 3.N-QB3 P-K4!

Psychologically a good idea, as the Philidor's Defence certainly leads to a different type of game than does the Pirc, which my opponent was probably prepared for.

It is also obligatory to enter the Philidor's by this order of moves, so as to avoid the variation 1.P-K4,P-K4; 2.N-KB3,P-Q3;3.P-Q4,N-Q2;4.B-QB4,P-B3; 5.O-O,B-K2;6.PxP,PxP;7.N-N5!;BxN;8.Q-R5,P-KN3;9.QxB,QxQ;10.BxQ, with a definitely superior ending for White. The ending following 4.PxP,PxP;5.QxQ, KxQ; leads to only a temporary advantage for White due to his better development, as Black has no weaknesses.

- 4.N-B3 QN-Q2
- 5.B-QB4 B-K2

The result of Black's move order has been to avoid any uncomfortable variations based on the potential weakness of his K32 square, and also perhaps a psychological discomforting of his opponent.

- 6.B-N3 .....

Admittedly it is convenient to have the Bishop protected, but this is better accomplished by Q-K2, which also defends the KP. At N3 the Bishop occupies only one diagonal, and there was no necessity to commit this piece in this way.

There are a number of moves that Black must play in the Philidor's so as to set up his formation, and the fact that the order is not critical lends a certain flexibility to the defense.

White restrains expansion on the Queenside. Black has made plans for other counterplay, however.

Correctly assessing the possibilities of the position. There is no danger in making this move, as the strong point on K4 is in no danger, and if White opens up the Q file he cannot penetrate.

White reacts immediately to the possible danger to his King along the soon to be opened Knight file, but in doing so admits to a certain inferiority out of the opening. Still, the position will be blocked and Black will not find it an easy task to win.

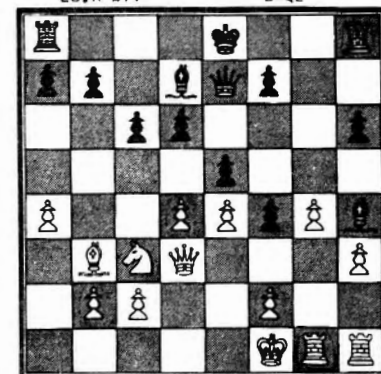

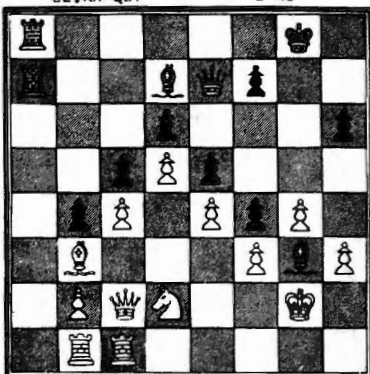

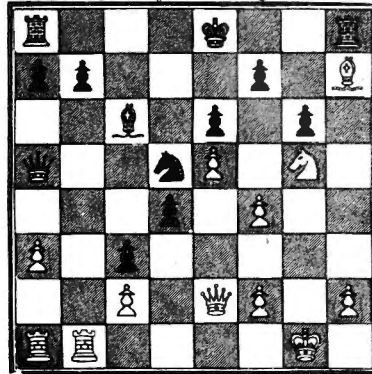

ELECTION GAME ANNOTATIONS

by Kipy Poyser

Game 1 - Candidate's Match - Humphrey-McGovern

McGovern, playing black, demonstrated his mastery of defensive technique by replying to the California Gambit with the Illinois Counter-Gambit. Spectators crowded about TV sets during the tense middle game, but with the fall of the Daley castle, McGovern had only to push his pawns to achieve a clear win. A perennial contender, Grandmaster Humphrey was nevertheless so shaken by the defeat that he forfeited the remainder of the match.

Game 1 - Championship Match - Nixon-McGovern

Nixon defended passively, hoping to catch the challenger in the poisoned Eagleton variation. McGovern blundered into the trap, and cautious observers began to reconsider his avowed penchant for the open, straightforward game.

Games 2 & 3

McGovern capitalized on Nixon's inability to defend against the ITT and Watergate attacks to move ahead 2-1. However, the public reception of the victories was offset by the champion's previous success at international tournaments played in Moscow and Peking. Election-watchers, though suspicious of Nixon's weaknesses, looked in vain for a more aggressive approach from the challenger.

Games 4-9

McGovern's success was short-lived. He lost the next six games resoundingly. Ill-prepared Welfare and Economy openings cost him four points, and cramped Financial end-games cost two more.

Game 10

Poor development and misplaced attacks proved the undoing of McGovern in this all-important game. His sorties down the middle weakened his position on the left flank, and he succumbed to a mating threat on the right.

Games 11 & 12

McGovern rallied for two points, Nixon being unable to defend adequately against the sweeping Vietnam attack.

With the score at 4-8, the match appears lost for McGovern. He must win at least 8½ points in the final 12 games to take the crown from Nixon, and his chances are negligible. He is reportedly working feverishly with his second, Sargent Shriver, to strengthen the Vietnam attack, but unless his other openings improve, his one strong attack will not garner the necessary points.

## A CODE OF RULES FOR FIVE-MINUTE CHESS

by Tim Kauppila

Five-minute chess has swept the globe as a popular form of chess competition. Here in the Northwest the quick pace of five-minute play has become a favorite form of playing the royal game in many circles.

What is needed is a code of rules for five-minute chess play. In our area we have a distinct way of playing the game. In many places touch move applies to five-minute chess as well as to the slower game. In local play it has been this writer's experience that most prefer "touch move on the clock." This is just one point that needs clarification.

### Rules:

1. The clock must be pressed by the hand used for moving the pieces. The player giving the handicap has the right to select the side of the board, left or right, that the clock is placed. With equal times on each clock, the player with the Black pieces selects on which side of the board it is placed. (For one player to start with a handicap in time may counterbalance difference in strength.)

2. The ordinary rules of chess apply, except where implied by these additional rules. In particular, a piece need not be moved when touched, but a move must stand once the clock is pressed.

3. If the clock is pressed before a legal move is completed (for example, after an illegal move is completed, or before pieces that have been inadvertently knocked over have been correctly replaced), then the opponent is given an extra minute on his clock, provided that he claims before he himself has made his move and pressed his clock.

4. A player is to press his clock before his opponent moves.

5. If a player puts his king into check, as for example by moving a pinned piece, the opponent can take it (ending the game). If a player leaves his king in check it can be taken (It is not compulsory to announce check).

6. A player wins if he administers checkmate or captures his opponents king, even if his flag has fallen.

7. A player cannot win, but can only draw, if he cannot demonstrate a win against some play however bad, but legal in normal chess, even if his opponent's flag has fallen. For example, (i) he cannot win if he has already been checkmated, or if his king has been captured, (ii) he cannot win if his own flag has fallen, (iii) he cannot win if he is left with only king and bishop against a lone king; but it might be possible for him to win with king and bishop against king and pawn, or against king and bishop when the bishops are on squares of opposite colors.

It is however considered unsporting to play on for many moves in a position which would certainly be drawn in normal chess.

8. If a player's flag falls, it is his opponent's responsibility to point it out.

There might be some exception taken to rule three, but feel it is reasonable considering the confusion on this point. Reader's opinions are warmly invited.

Editor, Northwest Chess:

Evans claims a draw for Fischer in Game No. 1 after Spassky's 40.K-R4 (NWC, Aug. p.22): "As Evans pointed out Black can now force a draw with 40....K-Q4! e.g. 41 B-N4, P-K4; 42 K-N5, P-B5; 43 PxB, PxB; 44 KxP, K-B3; 45 P-R5, K-Q2! followed by K-B1 with a draw no matter what White does. Black simply keeps his king close to his pawns and is stalemated if White ventures too near."

But, instead of 45.P-R5, White can break the stalemate threat with 45.B-R5! which seems to me to win in all variations, e.g.:

- I 45.B-R5, K-Q4; 46.K-B5, P-N4; 47.KxP, K-B5; 48.K-B5, K-N6; 49.K-K6, KxP; 50.K-Q7, KxB; 51.K-B7 and wins.
- II 45....K-Q4; 46.K-B5, K-B5; 47.K-K6, P-N4; 48.K-Q7, P-N5; 49.B-K and wins.
- III 45....K-Q2; 46.K-B5, K-K2; 47.K-N6, K-B; 48.B-N4ch, K-K; 49.KxP, K-Q2; 50.K-B8, K-B3; 51.B-R5, K-Q2; 52.K-B7, K-Q; 53.K-K6, K-K; 54.K-Q6, K-Q; 55.B-N4, K-B; 56.K-K7, K-N; 57.K-Q7, K-R; 58.K-B8, P-R4; 59.K-B7, PxB; 60.P-R5, P-N6; 61.P-R6, P-N7; 62.PxB mate.

Among our number was Baron Munchausen, who had been regaling us with tales of the fantastic events in which he had so often chanced to become involved, and one of our party, observing two locals playing chess in a corner, turned to the Baron and asked if he played the game.

'Naturally', he replied, 'for it is part of a liberal education not only to play chess but to play it well'.

Soon my strong game, and with it my untiring tongue, made me unbeatable. Once, while watching a game and following my usual habit of discussing in a loud voice the merits and demerits of various moves, I noticed a stranger who apparently took exception to my ironical remarks. Irritated, I decided to teach him a lesson on the spot. 'Sir', said I, 'will you play a game with me? No, no! Do not dream of robbing yourself', I cried, seeing he had it in his mind to refuse. 'We will play at once. Here is a free table'. With a frightened look he sat down and I led off with the white pieces: 1 P-K4 P-Q4; 2 P-K5 P-Q5; 3 P-QB3 P-KB3; 4 KPXP QXP; 5 PXP PXP+; 6 BXP BXP; 7 N-KB3 N-QB3; 8 N-B3 N-B3; 9 N-K2 N-Q2; 10 N(3)-Q4 N(3)-K4; I saw I could win his Queen and played 11 N-K6, but he replied 11...N-Q6mate. 'One game proves nothing', I said. 'Let us play again'. I took the white pieces again. 1 P-K4 P-Q4; 2 P-Q3 P-K3; 3 N-KB3 N-QB3; 4 B-N5 B-N5+; 5 K-K2 Q-Q2; 6 N-B3 N-B3; 7 P-QR3 P-KR3; 8 B-R4 B-R4; 9 P-K5 P-Q5; 10 N-R4 N-R4; 11 N-B5. Having gained control of this important square, I was stupefied when he mastered me with 11...N-B5mate. The news had spread that I was losing and by this time the gallery was enormous. Everybody had stopped playing in order to assure themselves of the incredible fact of my defeat. I hastily set up the pieces and began a third game with the white pieces, playing for an exchange variation to avoid complications. 1 P-K4 P-Q4; 2 P-Q4 P-K4; 3 P-QB4 P-KB4; 4 P-B4 P-B4; 5 P-KBP P-KBP; 6 P-BP P-BP; 7 QBXP KXP; 8 BXP BXP; 9 BxQN BxKN; 10 BxN BxN; 11 QRxB KRxB; 12 RxB RxB; After consideration I exchanged Queens with 13 QxQ+. Imagine my astonishment when he answered 13...KxK. 'What on earth are you playing at?' I cried. 'Put my King back at once'.

'But you played that move', he said.

'Surely you know the King from the Queen by now?' I remarked in my most crushing manner.

'No', he replied, 'I don't play chess. I tried to tell you at the start but you wouldn't listen. I just copied your moves. When you moved two squares to the left on your side, I did the same on mine'.

'Imagine the roar of laughter from the spectators. I never felt less like laughing. 'Well', I said, 'I doubt if a stranger thing has ever happened to any chessplayer. It could only happen to an extraordinary man like me! - My honour was saved but I didn't play chess for a long time'.

## RUSSELL'S CHESS CHATS

There will be two Interzonal tournaments held in 1973 at sites to be announced. Each is to have 16 players and each is to be as equal in ratings as possible taking into account the fact that players from some countries should not play in same event. That is going to be a hard one on Yugoslavia which will have 4 players and USSR with 12 players. Assume that means these will be split in half. No problem with other nations as most anyone else has is two. EXPRESS

CHESS EXPRESS reports the following players can take part if they want to: Biyiasas (Canada), Cuellar (Columbia) Geller (USSR), Gheorghiu (Rumania), Gligoric (Yug.) Hort (Czech.), Hubner (West Germany), Ivkov (Yug.), Kagan (Israel), Keres (USSR), Korchnoi (USSR), Larsen (Denmark) Ljubojevic (Yug.), Mecking (Brazil), Polugajevsky (USSR), Portisch (Hungary), Radulov (Bulgaria), Rukavina (Yug.), Smejkal (Czech.), Smyslov (USSR), Stein (USSR), Taimanov (USSR), Tal (USSR), Torre (Philippines), Uhlmann (E.Germ-any), plus winner of playoff between Kavalek, R. Byrne and Reshevsky, plus 3 from Soviet Union Championship, plus winner of match between Panno-Quinteros plus World Jr. Champion Karpov. At FIDE Congress the Swiss asked that Hug be allowed to play which would make 1 interzonal have 17 players.

As expected Soviet Union won both mens and womens chess Olympics. Men scores in finals: 1. USSR 42, 2. Hungary 40½, 3. Yugoslavia 38, 4. Czechoslovakia 35½, 5. West Germany 35, 6. Bulgaria 32, 7. Rumania 31½, 8. -9 USA 29 & Hollan 29, 10. East Germany 27½, 11. Spain 26, 12. Poland 24½, 13. Denmark 23, 14 -15. Argentina and Sweden 22½, 16. Switzerland 21½. USSR lost some games for an change and even lost the match with Hungary 1½-2½. Only 4-0 score they made in finals was against Switzerland. They beat USA 3-1. Hungary lost only to Sweden 1½-2½. They beat only Argentina 4-0. They beat USA 2½-1½.

Hastings England International tournament will have Larsen, Geller, Tukmakov, Hort, Andersson, Barcza, Uhlmann, Huebner, Bobotsov all Grandmasters plus IM's Westerinen and Rajkovic plus some England players. An Internation Junior Team Tournament held in Munich during Olympic games was won by England ahead of Hungary plus 14 other European teams, no USSR team. Kim Commons, California State Champion, won 1972 California Open with perfect 7-0, the first ever. Event drew 215 players. Jim Tørjan came clear 2nd 6½-½ while at 6-1 were T. Weinberger, John Grefe, our own Robert Zuk of Surrey, R. Gross and E. Kennedy. Bill Lowrie of Tacoma finish 51st with 4½-2½.

In the Canadian latest rating list the follow top players are given: D. Yanofsky 2484, Duncan Suttles 2453, Peter Biyiasas 2430 are the top three. No. 13 is Robert Zuk-2287, 18. Elod Macskasy 2235, 21. John Berry 2202, Bruce Harper as No. 23 2191. Berry and Harper are number 2 & 3 on top Jr List. USCF NEWS (from a report sent out by USCF Sec. Martin Morrison)

USCF Policy Board will ask FIDE to hold Chess Olympiad every four year insted of 2. Other matters decided at meeting held at US Open: V-P George Koltanowski is to be head of Publicity Committee, Peter Meschter is to be chairman of Guidebook Committee, USCF was to express and interest in holding 1975 FIDE Congress, encourage Fred Townsend to sponsor US Match Championship, there will be a US Class Championship held in Spring or Autumn of 1973, a week event with national titles at stake. 1973 US Junior Open will be held in Milwaukee. US Team Championship will be held in Allentown, PA. US Amateur will be held in Philadelphia.

It was reported to USCF Membership meeting the following Publication Statistics: From 9/70-9/71, 540 pages were printed during next year 600 pages. The Tournament Life section has jumped from 6½-10 pages in a year. A change in printing technique has saved 26% in space of printing ratings. The membership survey report said that Here & There was least popular so it will be cut down, readers wanted more and more games, they hope e to get Pachman to contribute an opening analysis column and there maybe a column by Shelby Lyman for weaker players. 1973 US Championship will be held in late spring or early summer.

The USCF Bylaws have been changed to add that: The state affiliates are responsible for the payment of membership dues of all the directors they appoint.

The bylaws committee WILL LOOK INTO " That any organization or individual desiring to conduct USCF-approved chess activities in any state in which a corporate USCF affiliate exists, be required to obtain permission from such state affiliate not less than 60 days prior to the scheduled date of such activity, and that any chess activities conducted in violation of this article shall not be rated by the USCF.

New set of USCF Tournament Rules has been adopted and a copy of these rules would be mailed with the certification examination. TD Certification will proceed on schedule, to be implemented by 1/1/73.
