


8th International Tournament at Palma De Mallorca ended in a three way tie just like San Antonio. Panno of Argentina won on SB tie-break when he and Smejkal of Czech and Korchnoi of USSR all scored 10-5. Panno and Smejkal lost once and Korchnoi twice including a game to Panno. A very strong event average rating of 2503 for a category 11, it took 6½ to make IM norm and 9 for grandmaster norm. Anderson of Sweden came 4th with 9½ then Averbach of USSR, Gheorghiu of Rumania and Polugajevsky of USSR all with 9.

In voting for Chess Oscar of 1972 of course Robert J. Fischer game first with 264 votes. Boris Spassky with 171 and then Lajos Portisch with 159 and the young star Karpov with 143. This is an annual award made by members of International Association of the Chess Press.

World Team vs USSR Team match is to be held in Holland in May 1973. Will Fischer play?

BY EXCHANGE: We welcome exchange with editors of chess publications (at least six issues per year). Our policy is that anything can be extracted or quoted from NWC, if full credit is given to both the writer and to the publication. Exchange implies reciprocal agreement to this effect.

Lewis Richardson, President of Oregon Chess Federation is now Region VIII United States Chess Federation Vice-President filling out term of Martin Morrison who is now National Secretary.

Martin Morrison in his new post has been sending out a Secretary's Notebook to USCF directors and officers. This information is to be spread out to USCF members which is reason for this report. USCF tournament rules were in this lastest report (They maybe printed in this or future NWC). USCF Rating Regulations have been changed: a) for tournaments of 5 rds or less reduce the bonus limit to 24 points b) events of 6-9 rds retain present limit of 32 points c) raise limit to 40 for 10-12 rds d) set the bonus value at one point for each point gained above the limit for all tournaments regardless of length. US Open prize fund for 1973 is raised to \$10,000.00. USCF has a Tournament Director Certification Committee with duties to oversee the adminstration of TD Certification Program, to impose penalties for unsatisfactory directing performance. Chairman is Lt Col Edmund B. Edmondson, 479 Broadway, Newburgh, NY 12550. There is also The Tournament Rules Committee with Martin Morrison as head (P.O. Box 1622 Oakland, CA 94604). They are to issue interpretations of FIDE Laws of Chess and The FIDE Interpretations of these Laws and of the USCF Tournament and Pairing Rules upon written request of a certified TD. Also to decide appeals submitted to the Committee in accordance with USCF Tournament Rules and to recommend to the TD Cert. Com. appropriate discipline for a director, if justified on the basis of an appeal. Also they can authorize the use of experimental rules under close control to gather data for possible rules changes.

The First V-P for Region VIII of USCF is Charlene A. Ross, 2435 W. Indian School Rd., Phoenix, AZ 85015

The Tournament Director Certification Program has been delayed because the rule books are out of print. Something should happen this Spring on this. For time being TD are to go on running events as in the past getting rating reports in promptly. If you have not applied for certification go ahead and do so for sometime in near future all USCF tournaments are to run by Certified TDs.

Eugene Tornado, Pilchuck Mountain Amateur, Kelowna CC Swiss; Aberdeen Open, Spokane Quadrangular (10 sections), Grant County Open, Jenatchee Winter Open, Northwest Junior Championship and Junior Supporters Open, Kings Knight Kristmas Krush, Preskitt 5 1/2 - Grondin 2 1/2, Holiday Tornado, LeMoine 2 - Grigsby 5, Harold Brown 7 - Harry Moore 3, Eugene Area Experts Invitational, Washington Open (two sections), Salem CC Championship (two sections), Barnett 4 - Mulford 1, Salmon 2 1/2 -Eggers 3 1/2, East Wenatchee Open (two sections), Kelowna Open (two sections), Portland Winter Open, Poyser 5 - Davis 3, Poyser 5 - Davis 2, Manastash Snow Ball, Airport Open. Quite a few this month. The list contains all players active since 11/18/72.

Another change in the rating rules this month, effective with the above events. The bonus point rules now provide for a sliding scale dependent on the number of rounds in the event. Specifically, one now gets one bonus point for each point gained over N, where N is 24 for a 5 or fewer round event, N = 32 for 6 - 9 rounds, N = 40 for > 9 rounds. For instance, if you gain 30 points in a 5-round event, your bonus is 30 - 24 = 6 for a total of 36 points in all. So says USCF; so follow we.

A few words about the rating of the Airport Open are necessary. TD Bob Karch did not origionally intend to have that event Northwest rated, and so told a few players at the event who asked. However, in view of the large turnout and the exceptional sporting importance of the event, he decided to have it Northwest rated after the event. Therefore any player who a) was told that the event was not Northwest rated, and b) now feels betrayed to find out that it was, can send me a postcard asking me to de-lete the effects of that event on his rating. But be honest about it; just because you didn't do so well don't write to me. Write only if you really did not want the event Northwest rated, for yourself at least. Only requests received within 10 days after this hits your mailbox will be honored.

Honorable mentions department: Valt Nelson, 15th seed, who gained 143 points in 5 rounds by sweeping the NW Junior Championship; Neil Salmon, 9th seed, 118 points for his. \irport Open sweep; and Dave Villiams. For the morbidly curious, Dave dropped 126 points in one event, the Washington Open.



DAVID L. BROWN JOINS STAFF



This will introduce our new Problem Editor, DAVID L. BROWN of Rockford, Illinois. He has been composing problems since 1965, and has had over forty published in newspapers and magazines throughout the world. In July 1972, he won First Place in a composing tourney conducted in "THE PROBLEMIST" (a world famous British publication which specializes in the problem art).

According to Brown, chess problems are arrangements of the White and Black chossmen on the board so that the White must do a set task in a fixed number of moves, such as "White to play and mate in two moves." Generally, an unusual maneuver is needed to solve the problem. Purpose of the problem is entirely different than the play of the game of chess.

"Some problems require unorthodox pieces to illustrate an idea that can't be shown by regular chess pieces." he writes, and he invented the Orphan as a chess piece to show power ranging from "great power to almost none." The BRITISH CHESS MAGAZINE described the Orphan: "On an otherwise empty board it is a dummy piece, with no powers whatsoever. It acquires the ability to move and capture only when attacked by an enemy unit." The Orphan is a "reflecting piece," according to Brown, acquiring the same power as that of the chesspiece attacking it, a sort of "mirror image" of that power. The Orphan has no particular shape and can be represented by anything. In problem illustrations, it is printed as a pawn lying on its right side.

Brown has invented another piece, called "Friend." It is also powerless when standing alone, but when guarded by a piece of its own color, it acquires the powers of that piece.

David is single, 27, writer and artist in a rather unique field of wood-burning. He is Secretary of the Rockford, Illinois Chess Club. He has some blindfold capability, and sometimes composes an entire chess problem in his mind.

AIDS IN SOLVING: There is the natural inclination in solving to want to get it done quickly: find the key and immediately go on to the next. It is so often the design of many Problems to catch the impatient solvers who do just this! The result is a waste of time and a poor score.

The successful solver is not as intent on finding only the key as he is in enjoying the Froblem on the whole. The key is only half the fun; and to be truly accurate and to fully appreciate Froblems, he will look for the many

other elements. Here are just a few:

Rather than rushing to find the key first, get a "feel" of the position. Evany potential keys look very promising but there are too few variations and several pieces which have no function. Every good Problem uses every piece on the board in some way, and this is why they all should be given notice first. Note how the Black king is guarded, and what white pieces might give mates. Look for pinned pieces and how they might be unpinned, or how certain vital lines may be interfered on by both sides. Curious set-ups of various pieces will usually indicate a theme. Once most themes are familiar, it takes little practice in detecting what the main idea is. Check deeply, for only high self-demand will cleanly unravel an idea which was so neatly wrapped-up!

Of course, Cooks must also be considered, but only, after the intention of the composer is clear. The most familiar cook is in the form of a second and obviously unintended solution. Another type of cook is the Impossible Fosition, i.e. one which never could have resulted from a "possible" same. And lastly, there is the most frustrating cook of all, No polution! If any of these cooks are ever found, they should be noted in full.

13 are examples of the Half-Fin Theme. los. 11, 12, The idea is defined as: two pieces (usually black) are said to be half-pinned when one of them becomes completely pinned when the other moves. In No.11, in the set-play, If Black plays 1... Rxd6, the e7-S becomes pinned (as well as the R), and allows mate by 2.Rd5; and, if 1...Sc6, pinning the R, there follows 2.Pd7! In the early part of this century this theme was extremely popular, and in the 60's It saw a revival through Changed Play. Notice that, as in the Grimshaw, each Black man permits mate, in turn, by limiting the power of the other. Sheppard's No.12 may well be the best Half-Pin Problem ever! He was a quaker and a farmer. As irony would have it, after a long day of work in the fields, he composed this remarkable Problem in haif an hour! -One of those rare tursts of inspiration where a Froblem almost composes itself!-(E.H.) Vincent L. Faton, on the other hand, during a joint-work with G.F. Anderson spent over three hundred hours on a 1st Prize winner in 1953! Here, No.13 is also a brilliant work.

ALL unquoted Problems in this column are Originals, especially contributed to NaC.

Anthony J. Taffs (Nos. 14215) has been referred to as the King of Letter-Froblems, and is superior to Benkot



No. 2 is an original for the English endgame magazine "EG". The composer is the first, and so far, only, study composer to be awarded the title Grandmaster of Composition. It may be that he was inspired by the 1st game of the Fischer-Spassky bash. The game score is given in NWC 8&9/72, see also the interesting notes on p. 27 of NWC 11/72. If you're really serious, look at No's 167, 167c, and 168 in Fine's "Basic Chess Endings".

Folerio, of course, was one of the original greats of the game. The strongest player of his day and a fine analyst. He left behind a few manuscripts containing both opening and endgame theory.

HINTS: Should be HINT as there aren't any for the simple pawn studies. For No. 2 take a look at No. 153, Walker, in BCE. No's 153c and 161a are also helpful. For those of you who are BCE-less here is Walker's study with the solution: White; Kf3, Bb6, Pa5. Black; Kd7, P's b7, a6. 1. Ke4 Ke6 2. Kd4 Kd6 3. Kc4 Kc6 4. Bc5 Kc7 5. Kd5 Kb8 6. Kd6 Kc8 7. Bb6 Kb8 8. Kd7 Ka8 9. Bc7 (9. Bc5 Kb8 10. Bd4 b5 11. ab also wins) b5 10. ab Kb7 11. Kd6 wins.

SOLUTIONS: For No. 2 the complete text of Kasparyan's article in "EG" follows.
"Walker's win position is well known to endgame theory. The position has considerable significance as being important for theory and at the same time of value for practical play. It is also interesting that in Walker's position the placing of the kings does not affect the result and that White wins wherever the kings stand. This shows how solidly White, with his great advantage, is placed.

But would it not be possible to strengthen Black's position a little so as to alter play? Yes, it is! After analysis, I concluded that the addition of a Black pawn on e6 calls for subtleties before White can win. Thus arose (No. 2), which could be of theoretical significance as well as being a study.


White has the opportunity of transposing into play as given by Walker, but Black tries to use the strength of his pawns to avoid this.

1. Bf6 (1. Ke3? e5! 2. Bf6 b6 3. ab Kc6



The 1972 Northwest Junior consisted of 51 Washington state entries and 3 from Oregon. British Columbia was not represented. The 54 total was an increase of 3 over the 1971 tournament in Portland. Last year there was one girl; this year there were five.



The 1972 Washington Open was divided into two sections, with the bottom section having as many (59) as the 1971 entire event!

Even though the Tournament Director had announced in advance (both in NWC and on the printed announcement sheet) that he intended to split the event into sections. there was some discussion and disagreement when it turned out that he intended to do what he said he would do. The prizes for the top section were increased, but it does not seem to show because of the tie score.

With respect to personalities, there were some interesting sidelights but I am inclined to think these were really a form of psychological warfare directed at the opponent rather than at the TD who just "happened" to be in the middle.

In the final round, for example, David Powell at one point refused to record the moves of his game but decided to do so when the TD said he would otherwise forfeit the game to his opponent, Jim McCormick.

David N. Williams, who wrote the letter of protest to the editor last month (see back page of January issue), was the only player in his 2100 rating group and thus was guaranteed a \$30 prize. He lost every single game. As a result, future American Chess Service tournaments have largely cut out the free appearance money for those in the Expert and Master Class because we feel they should be able to win a prize on their own merit, and have instituted a minimum score for each rating group prize.

Cash prizes were, of course, immediately paid, but the certificates you see shown have yet to be made up and mailed out. If not before, you should definitely have yours at the President's Open.

We also had fine newspaper coverage, both during the event by the SEATTLE POST INTEL-LIGENCER and two weeks later by the SEATTLE TIMES. I received phone calls from around the city due to both articles.

Time is short now, but next issue will have a selection of games from the WASH-INGTON OPEN, including one annotated by David Powell of his last round win from Jim McCormick.

The "quiet" draw between Jim Nelson and Jack Schrader was anything but -- first Schrader was leading by two pawns and almost sure to queen, then he pitched a piece and the tide swiftly turned in favor of Nelson. Grimly battling it out past secondary control, in a rook and pawns vs. same ending, Schrader pulled out a draw. (TD was overheard to say "Phew" at this point.)

Another tough game occurred between favored Gary Turner and unrated Rick Siaron. Turner's winning chances went up in smoke when Siaron's better endplay gained him the Upset Prize.

The prizes for the tourney consisted of credit certificates to be applied toward chess books or equipment available through Chess Digest.

The report on the Emerald City Open, held October 7-8 in Eugene was sent in shortly after the tournament, but apparently was lost in the mail or otherwise misplaced, so we are resubmitting it so that the players can see the results.

This was a most interesting tournament, with 54 players in contention. Because of the large turnout the prize fund was increased to a total of \$195.00. At the beginning of the tournament, a new player from Europe, Eivind Stensholt registering and told us that he had a high Elo rating. Since he had no NW or USCF rating, however, and since no actual reested of his European rating was available, it was necessary to consider him as unrated. This made for some most interesting games, and some surprised players.

first and second place prize money was shared by Waterman and Kiplinger, with each taking home \$45.00. The 1st Place trophy went to Waterman because of higher tie-breakers. There was a four way tie for 3rd, so Mike Schemm, Joe Brandenburg, David Jones, and Eivind Stensholt split \$25.00. All had 4-1 scores. Ron Cotton also had a 4-1 score, but elected to take the Class A money, \$20.00. There was a five way tie for the \$15.00 Class B money. Gary Bricher, Albert Leong, Ron Merrill, Charles Murphy, and Vince Bricher split it, with the trophy going to Merrill, for their 3-2 finish. Class C trophy and \$15.00 went to Gary Gilmore for his 32-12. The Class D \$15.00 prize went to George Jones and Robin Pfeiffer, with Jones receiving the trophy. The Unrated prize of \$15.00 and trophy went to Robert P. Mitchell after Stensholt declined to accept the prize. Robert Bjorge received the Junior trophy.

Prize \$120 Third Annual Portland Winter Open is now history with a clear victory for University of Oregon Student Joe Brandenburg, his first clear tournament win ever. It was expected that fight for first would be between Robert Zuk and USCF Rated Master \$15 Ken Fitzgerald. It was not to be for illness forced Zuk to \$15 withdraw and Fitzgerald dropped a game to William Button. 315 Only Brandenburg and Bill Kiplinger had perfect scores after \$30 4 games. Brandenburg won a rook and pawn ending, which was the last game to finish. \$10 23 players split the \$500.00 prize fund. Quite a few Portland area players came in at various times to watch play. Among them were Arthur Dake, International Master and top USA player in 1930's. He is planning to play in Lone Pine Masters \$10 Experts event in March. He retires end of May and maybe we will see him play in some Northwest events. Oregon Champion \$10 Clark Harmon was another who came by to watch a couple of times. No TV coverage this time but they were told about Seven unrated players taking part in their first Northwest rated event. Three had played in House of Chess events. \$10 61 players is one less than 1972 turnout and the organizers had hope for 80-100, maybe at Portland Spring April 7-8. \$10 Event ran smoothly and rounds were on time as near as I can remember. Players seemed to like my pairing board with the \$15 colored pairing cards. It is a little hard to tell from the crosstable but there were a couple of rating groups that had only a few players in them. For second weekend in row there was only one 2100 rated player. Only two players in 1300 rating group so they both split the prize as they scored the same 11/2-31/2. Ken Fitzgerald is from New York and California and places inbetween. He is living at Mt Angel, Oregon for next 6 months or so and will probably take part in other events. 5th player finisher Kurt Granat is 15 years old and should make next USCF under 16 rating list for top 25.

Best finish from starting point of rated players is William Button's 21 starting and 7th place finish. Several started at same place they finished, or nearly so: Kiplinger 3rd, Bill Heywood 8-9, Tom Kuge 12-11, Gary Singer 13-12, Brock Harreschou 45-46 and Jeff Wilson 46-47.

Event was sponsored by American Chess Service of Seattle \$15 under direction of Russell W. Miller and wife Kathy of Yakima.

There were two women players, Sunny Lou Espey and Cinthia McBride tournament regulars. Hopefully there will be more in future events, Washington does not have hardly any females

at all turnout.

Gentlemen:

I received the January issue of Northwest Chess but for some reason missed the December issue. In the hope that you may have a copy of the December issue to spare I enclose postage.

Also I take this opportunity to express my support, along with that of most players I know, of Mr.Karch's new system of rating prizes. Contra the view of Mr.David N.Williams as expressed in his letter in the January issue of NWC, I wish to point out that this more equitable system of class prizes is in line with a similar trend in tournament all over the country, as anyone can see by looking at recent tournament notices, for example in the latest issue of Chess Life & Review. Tournament sponsors are taking this new approach for the simple reason that is is desired by the majority of chessplayers, and therefore answers the popular demand. The old 'winner take all' prize formula, with its limited appeal to the average player, too often in the past led to the tournament sponsors taking a loss and making up the prize fund from their own pockets. Furthermore, in the older type tournaments with the top cash prizes going to only the winner and runner-up, a very few players won nearly all the time, and even many experts found the 'fishing' very poor. The new system has the effect of creating growth in chess interest and participation, and this seems best for all in the long run, including those 'aspiring Masters' referred to by Mr. Williams.

One reads in NW Chess numerous complaints by TDs that people won't buy clocks or won't bring them to tournaments. One also reads accounts by the same TDs of clocks which are loaned to the TD at a tournament and broken or stolen. Perhaps the one accounts for the other. After all, if you were approached by somebody who said: "Please let me borrow your clock. There's a good chance you won't get it back, but I refuse to take any responsibility for it," what would you do? You wouldn't loan it to a close freend on those terms, let alone a TD who is a perfeat stranger.

The only solution is for TDs to take the responsibility for the clocks they borrow. I reslize they are very short of time, but it wouldn't be that hard. Most tournaments have numbered boards. The TD need merely, for each clock he borrows, note the numbers of the board it was borrowed from and the board it was loaned to. The players at the latter would be required to return the clock with their score sheets. All this takes is writing down two numbers per clock and making an announcement at the players meeting. It might not solve the problem completely, but it would help.

Dear Ron.

For the TD to "accept responsibility" for the chess clocks means that he would be financially liable for any damage to them. Tournament costs are already high enough, without adding in the replacement price of two or three clocks. This is the principal reason I do not provide clocks nor set up any system to handle other people's clocks.

In my opinion, the best solution is for each player to buy and bring his own chess clock!

Dear Sir,

I earnestly hope that the layout of the January issue of NWC does not signify even a possible return to the infantile cartoons, helter-skelter presentation, and absence of games that typefied the worst of the Hankinson period.

It is quite natural that chess players like to see their names and achievements in print, a service performed by crosstables, but to put crosstables as a <u>first</u> priority can often lead to few games being published, and the fewer the games, the higher the quality required.On first sight, this system sounds quite good, <u>except</u> for the fact that the vast majority of subscribers to NWC are rated below 1999 and are looking to the magazine for as many games of all types as possible, even those with errors which prove that all chessplayers are human.Catering to some degree to this majority of subscribers should in no way prevent the inclusion of well-played, error-free games for those players of expert strength or higher, but these surely should not be the only sort accepted for publication.

To summarize, I believe that NWC magazine should be as informational as possible, and to that end it should:-

(a) include crosstables, but <u>not</u> to the exclusion of games.

(b) have many games, good and bad, annotated and unannotated.

(c) Keep related information (i.e. Oregon, Washington, B.C. Northern, B.C. Interior, tournament announcements, etc.) together in one continuous, clearly titled section for each.

(d) exclude cartoons, except perhaps those with a general appeal, used as fillers when short on games.

(e) continue the excellent practice of regularly providing ratings and information on forthcoming tournaments.

With the 1973 Northwest Women's Chess Championship scheduled for the weekend of 14-15 April at the Masonic Hall in Everett, Washington (at the same time and place, but separate from, the Puget Sound Open), I have been asked "How many will enter?" My answer is that there are a lot more ladies than you think, and I estimate between 15 and 25.

The 1972 Oregon Women's Championship, held in August at Forest Grove, was won by ESTHER SCHRADER 3-0 in a field of seven players. I'm not sure that Washington State even held an official women's event in 1972. However, in September 1971 the Chelan County Open had a Girls Section of five players, won by PEGGY WATT 4-0.

Ten players were in the 1972 Northwest Women's Championship, held on 20 May in Wenatchee, Washington. PATTI ALLYN, a high school student, won 4-0.

.This list of 59 potential competitors (we may be missing some!) was taken from the card files of the American Chess Service. One of the primary goals of ACS is to help qualify a Northwest lady into the U.S. Women's Chess Championship, and eventually bring home the title! As we go to press this issue, there were 70 losses due to expirations but offset by over 130 new/renewal subscriptions. One of our goals is to reach 1,600 subscribers, and then switch from newsprint to regular white paper.

BC News by Larry Kirstein.

A number of changes appear to be occurring in the Northwest with the recent take over by new Editor and T.D. for the W.C.F. - Robert Karch. A number of events in Jashington, which includes all the big ones no longer require just BCCF or Northwest State Memberships to play. The appear to all now require USCF membership as well. So much for our reciprocal agreement for membership requirements in playing in each others events. As everyone knows we have dropped the CFC requirement in bC and it was felt that players would be able to play in events anywhere in Washington Oregon and EC by holding their respective Federation membership. This is possibly no longer the case.

It appears there might be a danger to Northwest Chess on the horizon. This would be the American Chess Service which appears to be a semi-professional organization on the move. The danger is that it may be in the process of taking over Northwest Chess, not just the magazine but Chess in general. Many people in the WCF might not feel this way but it does present a threat to the BCCF. The CFC is presently going through a change in policy and have presented a report on ratings and monthly bulletin which they hope to bring into effect by July 1st. This would be included in their membership fee structure of \$5 adults and \$3 juniors. If this in fact goes through the ratings will be done, possibly in Seattle by Eoeing computers, and published perhaps bi-monthly to start but then down to monthly once organized. This is brought to all the membership for good reason. If the breach tetween the WCF and BCCF grows from what we now have and IF we can't work something out then a switch might be in order just to preserve our identity.

I am against charges on the Tournament announcements and have been advised the CFC plan to include them in their planned tulletin at no cost, also included in their no cost policy is rating of events but that remains to be seen. I hope the JCF will reconsider and put many of these issues to a vote before having them accepted so quickly. Rusty Miller has enquired in a letter dated January 11th quote " I am going to be most interested to see how up to date the USCF monthly ratings will be. Are they going to be so up to date that we are going to want to drop Northwest hatings is the big question. Only time will tell.
DO ANY OF YOU HAVE FEELINGS ONE MAY OF OTHER AEOUT
DROPPING NU RETINGS." I hope that isn't the writing on the wall I think it is. It should be known that a big reason we are here is the ratings, at least thats what many players tell me.

At any rate I'm looking for someone else to do the editors job to N.C for our Province. THIS IS MY I'm afraid I don't agree with the change it is going through under Robert Karch and the American Chess Service.

Robert may be a good man but not for Chess in BC. Should no one step forward to do this job by the next deadline then those who send material will have to do so direct to Robert Karch for publishing.

This however is not my reason for stopping as BC Editor. A problem has developed in the printing of BC material in that we no longer have control over what we want printed in the BC Section. This complaint has been expressed to the various officers of the WCF and it appears Robert Karch is to have over all control over the content of the Magazine. If this is the wish then so be it. I have had a complaint from Vancouver in the matter of turning over the position of Magazine Editor by the WCF.

EGOTISA GOLOMEIA

It was apparently felt that with the election of editor last year the peoples choice went Hankinson 1st, Miller 2nd, and Berry 3rd. However Jon advises he was not consulted on taken over the position but Karch brought in.

Enough on that. If you want the job advise me or send your material direct to Robert Karch before the next deadline.

The CFC have advised the dates for the Canadian Open to be held this "ear in Ottawa from July 28 to August 6th at Clark Memorial Centre, Riverside Drive in Ottawa. The Tournament will be an Eleven-round Swiss and will be directed by Michael Byrne of Ottawa. Time control will te 45 in 21 hours and apparently student accommodation is available at the University Residence at \$3.00 per night. Not as yet listed are the entry fees and prize fund. Round one begins Saturday July 28 at 3:00 PM.

THE CANADIAN JUNIOR CHAMIONSHIP

The Canadian Junior did not turn out too well for the British Columbia entrants Jonathan Ferry and Eruce Harper, who were rated 2nd and 3rd at the commencement, but who finished in a tie for third place at the end.

MacPhail played quite well against the other top contembers, although he was arrite careless against the tottom players. His opponents, however, made up for his mistakes in spaces. Kevin Spraggett is a relative newcomer, but played like an old vateran, making very few mistakes. Its only loss was due to a time pressure blunder in a relatively aven position (in the first round, after a long train rice of twelve hours...). Berry and Harper dutifully destroyed the bottom half, but found theaselves pressing too hard in their encounters with the other too players. Peter Hurmi played quite the opposite, and if you think that string of draws looks unusual, keen in mind that they all should have been zero.

Of the others, the most promise was shown by Jean lebert, who will be eligible for the next championship in two years, as will be Burmi, Jenkins and arvanitis.

Another couple of newsy notes. Feter Biyiasas, Canadian and EC Champion is putting on several Simultaneous exhibitions one of which set for Victoria January 27th is expected to draw 50 or more boards. He may also play in Manaimo and other lower mainland points. The Suttles-Biyiasas Match is cancelled as the tacking for it fell through. Bruce Happer has advised me of a number of other events including speed events simultaneous and other goodies to take the place of the match.

Everyone should take notice of the Big event set for Victoria Silver Threads for Experts and below. This will be an Open Class Championships and it will be hoped that this can be a continuing yearly event so that we don't only have a BC Champion but Class Champions as well. The way registrations are coming in it looks like there will be close to 32 entries in each class, which is the limit set. So if you are from out of Victoria and wish to compete in your Class get you name in to Larry Kirstein right away. The Classes will be run in 5 or 6 rounds Swiss to obtain clear winners in each Class. We could have more than 150 players in this event so count on it this spring.

Eruce HARPER forwards two more games from the Canadian Junior Chambions his play between Christmas and New Years in London. Like Jon's games these are annotated by truce. Then I have still two further games won by the Champion NacPhail which are unannotated and received from Eruce's column in the Friday Province, Spotlite addition.

Is the Rat Sound? by Bruce Harper

The Rat, the abbreviation for the Robatsch Defense, has been derided by many players, but I am quickly coming to the strange conclusion that the "g sneak one" defence may be sound after all.

I had an opportunity to test this thesis twice at the Canadian Junior, with positive results. In the second to last round I played Peter Nurmi, and I needed to win to have a chance to tie for first place. I played the French, and got a completely equal, and drawn, position. Naturally I lost, having to try to win. Which can only mean I should have played the Rat again.





The Olympia CC began its first annual club championship on Jan 22nd, one swiss round each Monday for six consecutive weeks. USCF membership for winner, and WCF memberships for tops in Class A, B, C and D. TD is A. EDWIN KIVI.

Moses Lake CC defeated Royal HS in a team match Wednesday, Jan 17th, score 10-6. Results follow (Moses Lake player listed first): Luther Paulson 2, Teddy Garoutte O; Alan Stuckey ½; Rob Washburn ½; Kevin Dirks 2, Joe Hughes O; A. A. Hutchinson 1, Tom Rex 1; Robert Schaden 1, Jeff Gettmann 1; Jim Southwood 2, Rick Jensen O; Ed Yamamoto 1, Cruz Martinez 1; and Keith Scxton O, Arnie Martinez 2.

A history of the Everett CC reveals that this club has been extremely influential upon chess within Washington state, and yet has been through some dry periods of almost no involvement whatsoever.

During the war, the Everett Chessletter began to appear in circulation with news of chess events throughout the world, and what was happening in Everett. The magazine was soon very popular, and attempts were made to broaden its scope. But during the 1950's the magazine was purchased by the growing Washington Chess Federation, and this magazine has become our NORTHWEST CHESS letter of today. The Everett CC began to wane, with several attempts to revitalize the club, but always in vain. There was a resurgence when George Koltanowski came to visit and give his Knight's Tour, and the Marysville Strawberry Open helped too, but only for so long.

The long dormant club has now begun to grow in leaps and bounds. The new 1973 leader-ship of Stephen Chase, Charles Matich, Tom Shanley, Lou Fesl, and Neil Power (Neil has been with the Everett CC for over 25 years) has set a goal of 100 players coming on a regular basis every Tuesday and Thursday nite, 7 PM, at the Forest Park Field House. The players fee is 25% a night.

Thursday, Jan 11th, the Everett Open drew 24 players, of which 15 were new to the Club. This now makes 46 members, of which 42 are on the CC ladder. The Club will hold another such tournament on February 8th, before the Everett Winter Open, which hopes to draw 40+ players. Cost of the event will be \$2.50 with registration from 6:30 - 7 PM, with the tournament finishing about 10 PM. Certificates will be awarded to each winner of two or more games, and every other person will be awarded a WCF membership.
