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An Introduction to USCF-Rated Tournaments for New Members

Now that you have joined the USCF, you are entitled to play in USCF-rated tournaments. This leaflet is an attempt to explain to you the basic procedures of rated tournaments, so that you will feel at home as a contestant. We hope you will be able to enjoy to the fullest your privilege to participate in USCF-rated tournaments in a more informed way with the information this leaflet will give you.

Any affiliate of the USCF or the USCF itself may sponsor a USCF-rated tournament under the supervision of a certified tournament director. All entrants in a USCF-rated tournament must be individual members of the USCF on the starting and finishing dates of the contest. Play is governed by the Laws of Chess of the World Chess Federation (FIDE) and by USCF regulations which supplement them. Basically, there are two forms of tournaments in common use, the Round Robin and the Swiss System.

The Round Robin Tournament. Each contestant plays one (two in a Double Round Robin) game with each of the other competitors. One popular type of Round Robin is the "Quadrangular," in which players are arranged according to playing ability into groups of four. Sometimes players draw lots for identification numbers and are paired round by round according to pairing tables.

The Swiss System Tournament. This type of tournament is by far the most popular type of tournament in the United States. It resembles a knockout, or elimination, tournament (familiar in other sports) in that winners play one another, but in a Swiss System no players are eliminated. Swiss System tournaments are either open, in which all entrants play together, or class, in which entrants are divided into sections according to their playing abilities and play according to the Swiss System within their class.

In the first round, the players are ordered according to their last-published ratings. Then the top player in the upper half is paired against the top player in the lower half, and so on down to the bottom player in each half. The color of the top player is allocated by lot, and colors alternate down the halves. In the second and subsequent rounds, each player is given one point for a win, one-half point for a draw, zero for a loss, and is paired according to the following ordered rules of the Swiss System:

- 1. A player must not be paired with any other player more than
- Players with equal scores after each round must be paired as much as possible.
- 3. Colors are assigned by the director as equitably as possible. Although colors may not alternate or even out after every round, at the end of the tournament each player should have received the white and black men an equal number of times.

If there is an odd number of players in any round, one is given the bye. He has no opponent in that round, but scores one point. As a rule, if a player continues to win, he will get harder opponents, and if he continues to lose, he will get easier opponents, so that toward the end of the tournament he is playing opponents at his own level of ability.

At a Swiss System tournament you will most likely see a "wall chart," which lists all the players with their identification numbers, USCF expiration dates, last-published ratings, opponents, colors, and cumulative scores for every round. The following is a sample wall chart entry:



The entries show that player John F. Anderson has an identification number for the tournament of 1, a USCF expiration date of March 1975, and a last-published rating of 1852. In round one he had white against player 35 and won (for a total of one point); in round two he had black against player 21 and won (for a cumulative total of 2); in round three he had black against player 3 and lost (for a cumulative total of 2); and in round four he had white against player 12 and drew (for a cumulative total of 21/2).

You will feel more comfortable at your first tournaments if you know also some of the more important tournament procedures.

The Chess Clock. In USCF-rated play it is common to have a chess clock at each board (usually all equipment is provided by the players). A chess clock consists of two separate movements and dials in a single case. When a player makes a move, he presses a button which stops his side of the clock and starts the opponent's side. Thus there is an exact record of the time used by each player for his own moves. In a tournament, any player who has not completed the prescribed number of moves in the time specified loses, whatever the position on the chessboard. Some typical time controls are 40 (or 50) moves per two hours, 40 (or 45) moves per one and one-half hours, or, for more rapid ("tornado"' play, 40 moves per hour, which is the fastest rateable time

The Laws of Chess requ re that players record the game (their own moves and those of their opponents), move after move, on the score sheet

prescribed. Either the algebraic system, recommended by the World Chess Federation, or the descriptive system may be used.

Conduct of the Players. Players are forbidden to have recourse to the advice or opinion of a third party, whether solicited or not, and to distract or annoy their opponents. Conversation, rapid-transit games, and other noisy activities should not take place in the playing

Defaults. In a Swiss System tournament, any player who does not notify the director in advance that he will be unable to play in any round may be fined \$5.00 and barred from tournament play.

Ratings. The Annual USCF Rating List is published in the December issue of Chess Life & Review, and monthly USCF Rating List Supplements are mailed to every USCF Affiliate. New ratings take approximately two months to process.

The above should give you all the basic information you need to enjoy your first experiences in USCF-rated tournaments. We hope you will become a confirmed USCF tournament-goer.

Yasser, who ranges between 11 and 13 years de-pending on your source), showed up for the highly publicized game in yellow cutoffs, a red gaucho-hat and a well-tanned bare chest. His older opponent was dressed slightly more conservatively in slacks, dress shirt and tie.

But as each man set his well-oiled chess brain to the immediate task of victory, spectators, who had been amused at the dissimilar appearance of the two, soon realized that with appearances the dissimilarities ended

Yasser, who walked into the American Chess Service game-room, with a 2-0 advantage over Seattle chess champion Karch, walked out an-hour-and-ahalf later with the match score 2-1.

According to chess kibitzers analyzing the game from a large magnetic chess board mounted in another room, the game was very sloppy.
One of them remarked.

"It was a very poor game, I saw at least three major blunders."

Playing white, Yasser opened with a standard pawn to King 4 opening (P-K4). Karch's responding move (N-KB3) left the crowd excited with the prospect of a different kind of game.

the ninth move he had
complete control of the center of the board. But it was far from over, as Karch was well dug in with a variation of the French Defense, a game-plan designed to defend against a strong center at-

By the middle game. both men were bogged down. Where Yasser had once sat sucking on a pop bottle he now began to fidget. But Karch was not the picture of calm either. At one point he snapped "Do that on your own time" at Yasser, who was adjusting his pieces to the middle of their squares

during Karch's move.

Near the game's end
both players made several both players made severa-errors according to kibitz-ers, and the game could have gone either way. On the 47th move Yasser re-signed, picked up his hat and quickly left. For Karch it was a well-needed win. Had he lost again he would have

had little chance of coming ba back to win the

After the game Karch said, "It was a close game." His statement revealed little, but the smile which came along with it said a lot.

The match will resume Thursday, 1 p.m., at The Last Exit on Brooklyn, a University area coffee shop where Yasser has been coached from rags to a challenger of the holder of the Seattle City champi-

Original Problems this month are received from Chris Becker, a Yale Professor; Messrs. Sans and Duberant in a joint effort; and E.W.Beal and J. Coombe-Tennant.

NW readers are encouraged to try their hand at composing and will receive all the help this editor can provide. Who

will be the first to appear in this column?

The main points to remember in creating a Problem are to have some idea, like having as many of the same strategic elements as possible (unpins, checks, interferences, etc.), then introduce these with a subtle key, preferably noncapturing and non-checking, which either threatens a mate or waits for any and all these black moves. The final position should be economical, using each piece for the most purposes possible. Look for other solutions (cooks) or dual continuations by White and find ways to eliminate them. Polish, then polish more. Studying other Problems in how they were constructed will help; look into why certain pieces are where they are, in fact, every piece. Not all variations and see the function of each to the minute detail. This will take time at first (just as entering any new field requires), but the next time it will be easier. And once the knack of using the basic principles is fully acquired, you'll find inventive new thoughts coming to mind which will need a form of expression. Good Luck!

IN THE SELFMATE (No. 64) White must FORCE a Black Pawn to mate him. It's a simple and very economical idea. The correct solution (key only) is worth five points.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To the Editor: A Final Reply to Angus Pitt.

I am pleased that Angus now feels that the rating situation is not as bad as he forecast; knowing the contents of the system he criticizes has apparently reassured him. But while he concedes that his major point was in error, he continues to raise unfounded doubts about the Elo system. Let us take a look at the points raised in his letter in the July issue, "A reply to Bruce Bailey."

First, the myth that improving players play above their ratings "for a considerable period." I shouldn't really have said "myth," for there is some truth to it. As a player improves his rating reflects this improvement, but after the fact. In order to raise one's rating one must play better than it would predict, so in one sense improving players always play better than their ratings. The myth arises when one believes, as Angus apparently does, that the discrepancy can get large - say 200 points - and can last for any length of time. For anyone who plays regularly the discrepancy cannot get to be large; in no case can it persist for very long. The Elo system puts primary emphasis on recent results, ruling out any such happening. Instead of giving the relevant math I will examine a case study of an improving player.

I have chosen the case of Yasser Seirawan, partly because he is topical at the moment; partly because in Yasser's case we have a complete rating history, from beginning to date; and partly because he is indisputably a rapidly-improving player. If there is in fact a significant rating lag effect it should show up clearly in his case. (Just for the record let me point out that he is not the most rapidly-improving player around; there are several others who show a bigger increase in playing strength over the same period of time. Yasser is certainly the youngest such rising star, however.)

How are we to compare Yasser's ratings to his playing strength? How do we measure "playing strength" except by ratings? One could argue that Tasser is really of Master strength but just doesn't have the results to prove it; one could just as well say that Biyiasas is really a Class A player who just happens to win a lot of games. The answer is clear: The only indication of strength that counts is results. So let's look at results. The tool we will use to measure Yasser's results in individual events is the performance rating, the average of his opponent's ratings plus or minus 400 points or 0 depending on whether Yasser won, lost or drew. Two preliminary points about performance ratings: they are only rough approximations, strongly affected by one's pairings (losing to a 2400 gives you a higher performance rating than losing to a 2000 does without saying anything about your playing strength), and one cannot get a high performance rating in a weak event without winning every game. But then if one really is an underrated toughie one should win every game in a weak event. So on to Yasser's rating history.

Yasser has played to date 71 rated games in 15 events. He started in last September at the 3nohomish County Open, where his PR (performance rating) was 1512. His initial R (rating) is therefore 1512 also. In his next event he dropped to R = 1448. Thereafter his results have been as follows:

Note: Cases where his PR is lower than his pre-event rating yet he gained points - such as the Last Exit Amateur - arise because he beat very low-rated players, thus lowering his PR through wins; conversly his high PR in the NV Open arises because his two losses in that event were to Biyiasas (2400+) and Harper (2300+). Had he played and lost to two 2100's instead his PR would be much lower.

The first thing we can say is that his initial strength was about 1750 (impressive for a youngster!). After his first two events his PR's show consistent results at that level. His R adapted to that level very rapidly indeed; no lag there. He then shows a sudden jump to Class A strength, starting with the Seattle Spring Open. Again his R follows closely. Most recently (last two events) he shows a composite PR of 1946, another apparent jump; his most recent R is 1912, only 34 points behind. Again no lag worth mentioning in rating value.

How about timeliness? His published ratings follow his PR's by six weeks or less, the normal lag between event and report in NVC. There is no apparent time lag in his rating from any other cause. The deduction I draw is that far from ingus' hypothesized lags, the Elo system has coped with this rather extreme case very well indeed. Yasser's ratings have reflected his development quite faithfully and as timely as could possibly be expected. There are no 200-point gaps, nor any "considerable period" of lag.

Now I will turn briefly to Angus' other points. First, why do the rules "keep changing"? The basics don't, only details. These changes are not decided on by Elo himself, but by the USCF Policy Board, and do not take place necessarily for sound mathematical reasons. Also, it is a living system not cast in concrete and is of course fine-tuned in responce to changes in the environment: For instance the sudden lead in the number of Unrateds following the Fischer-Spasski match. Next, the admissability of matchs for rating purposes has nothing to do with the rating system; matchs were ruled out because of a suspected high percentage of falsification. Incidentally Martin Morrison tells me that USCF is considering rating matchs played under the supervision of a Certified TD, so this may change again. Finally, Acer's permanent 2399 is between him and USCF and has no relevance at all to the Elo system that I can see.

Angus' last point, the 8 - 1 vs 15 - 1 business, I do not understand. He apparently refers to a single game, not a match. For a single game such a difference is really insignificant; he might as well complain that the system does not discriminate between odds of 16 - 1 and 20 - 1. A mismatch is a mismatch is a mismatch. The Elo system quite correctly assumes (not really an assumption, but a computation related to the size of one rating point) that at such long odds an upset is an upset is an upset, and attempting to attach varying significances to these cases is silly. An Expert does not have to play better to beat a Class C than to beat a Class D player; the difference is not significant to him.

As for the old 50% bonus for new highs, it resulted in unrealistically high ratings for single good performances. Having set such an overly high mark a player could not reattain it for quite some time, which in effect slowed his rating improvement, not helped it. The Elo method of incremental bomuses is much more realistic.

In closing I would say this to Angus: study the Elo system before you criticize it. His writings are available from USCF at cost. If you wish to continue this debate let's switch from opinion and guesswork to hard, cold analysis: choose a Boeing event in which your rating system was used, with before and after Pitt ratings, and one in which the players also have established M ratings. I will rate that event a la Elo; then we can compare in detail which system ester predicted the course of the event. That procedure, tying ratings directly to observed results, is the soid test.



LETTERS TO THE EDITOR Our chess boom hit its high point right after the Fischer-

Just received your May <u>NWC</u> and, as usual it's quite interesting and well-done. One of yor letters -to - the - editor caught my eye and I feel that I must comment on it if I could. The letter I refer to was sent in by Angus Pitt wherein he pushes the panic button on the USCF rating system (unjustifiably,so, I might add) First of all the USCF does jump you to 1200 the first time you play over 1200 strength and therefore opponts of players below 1200 seldom suffer as a result. Furthermore, the bonus system (see <u>Chess Life & Review</u>, March 1972, Pp 171 - 172) up until recently allowed a half-point bonus for every point above 32 gained by one player in a single tournament. This was introduced to prevent under-rated players from gaining ground solely at the expense of everyone above him. It was dffective ratin system prior to the Fischer- Spassky deluge. Since that time, however, thousand of new chessplayers have come on the scene and, as expected, continue to improve as they gain experience. This would in time lead to overall depriciation of everyone's rating as Mr Pitt fears if the USCF had not taken corrective action. But, (see NWC, Feb 1973 Pg 2, R.W. Miller's column), the USCF did alter the bonus system to wher a player now gaining 24 or more points in a 5 round tournament gains a full point bonus for every point gained above that number. The "under-rated player" does not stay that way very long and it has been statistically proven that the average and median USCF ratings of the total population of rated players has not changed singnificantly in the past year, I'm sure that our fathers in Newburgh are keeping a watchful eye on the situation and will not allow the system to falter. Incidently I noticed in the April rating supplement that Robert Bawser of Illinois has a rating of 373. (note also that over 95% of all ratings under 1000 are provisional) If he were to beat me (1511) in his next tournament while losing to four other 1500 players, his rating would climb 861 points to 1234 while mine would drop 27. Seems fair enough to me!

I was just reading the May 1973 NORTHWEST CHESS and roticed Mr. Pitt's inquiry (p.141) on the ratings. The regulation which Mr. Bailey evidentally referred to is USCF Rating Regulation No. 6, which reads as follows:

"For the player with a pre-event rating below $1200\ \text{who}$ has completed his schedule in an event of at least three rounds:

 a) If the player's preformance rating will be computed normally by whichever equation...applies.

b) If the player's performance rating in the event is higher than his pre-event rating but below 1200, the performance rating becomes his new rating.

c) If the player's performance rating in the event is above 1200, his pre-event rating whill be assumed to be 1200 and his new rating will be computed by whichever equation... applies"

This regulation would allow for rapid increases in the ratings of players below 1200 and accounts for the phenomenton Mr. Pitt observes.
