BOOK REVIEW CHESS WITH THE MASTERS

By Martin Beheim Arco Publishing Company, Inc., 219 Park Ave S. New York, NY 10003 paperback \$1.95 271 pages

This is a reprint of 1963 hardback edition. Cover says annotations are " with move-by-move comment and description". To me this means after each move as in LOGICAL CHESS MOVE BY MOVE. That is not the way this book is and notes are not very deep. There are 100 games from Anderssen to Fischer divided up under the following headings: The Mating Attack, The Art of Positional Play, Victory on ' The other wing', Defensice Triumphs, Hand to Hand Fighting, the Art of Endgame Play and a Peaceful Conclusion. Beheim gives an introduction to each game to set the scene and tell a little about the players. All the great names of chess can be found in this collection. There are 10 games of Alekhines, 8-Botvinnik, 9-Tal, 5-Fischer etc. Good clear diagrams at critical positions in every other game. There is an index by player and by opening. A good inexpensive collection of great games of the past. By Russell W. Miller

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This appeared in March 1974 issue Vol III No. 3. In giving premission Helen Warren, Tournament Director for APCTNB wrote the following background material on the article," Korchnoi is a fascination gentlemen-- thoroughly at home, an excellent command of English, and with a charm too seldom seen. Frankly, I think he possesses the same degree of substance as Gligoric does veneer. The dditing job on this piece was incredible. It entailed reconstruction of notes, transcribing of tape (with no 18 minute or 18 second gaps!), deleting, working with Korchnoi's analysis delivered with board in sight at the Chicago Chess Club where Jim tapled and took notes, and empanding them to the format of written analysis."

KORCHNOI IN CHICAGO by Jim Warren

An exclusive...Korchnoi comes to Chicago.. He analyzes his third win with Mecking.. His observations on the approaching semi-finals, Fischer, and an assessment of his own chances... Victor Korchnoi, the fifth ranked player in the World, came to Chicago after his match in Augusta, GA., as a guest of the Chicago Chess Club. Before his simul exhibition (46 wins 6 draws, 2 losses) he chatted informally with his audience, then gave an analysis of his final victory over Mecking. Clearly Korchnoi was "at home" in Chicago: he spoke remarkably good English, seemed relieved that Augusta was behind him, and showed his broad good humor to his audience.

First of all, I want to introduce myself. I am one of 36 Soviet Grandmaster. I was born in Leningrad in 1931, and have lived there all my life. I got the title of National Master in 1951, that of International Master in 1954 and the tile of International Grandmaster in 1956, so you can see I've had the experience of being a grandmaster for 18 years. I've been Champion of the USSR four times, in 1960 '62, '65, and '70, and I've played several matches with rather strong players. I won watches against Reshevsky, Tal and Geller, and I lost two matches, to Spassky and to Petrosian -- I will tell more about that later. As to my match with Mecking, I knew the expression, that Mecking was one of the "bad boys of chess"; I knew of his fame and when I was preparing I read all the interviews he made. He was not very polite. Generally speaking he doesn't know much about courtesy. You know, I'm 20 years older than he, but during the match when, for instance, before the game he was sitting at the table, and I was coming to the board, he stretched his hand toward me, sitting on the damn chair! He could rise up just a little bit -- and I was his opponent and 20 years older! During the match, I had on a suit and tie and was properly deessed, but he had on some kind of underwear! And there was an inscription on it, "Cafe de Brazel". My second, Mr. Osnos, International Chess Master, suggested I put on my pants and write on them, for instance, "Drink Vodka Moscova!"

In his interviews he (Mecking) confirmed he is one of the strongest players, and that there are only three players in the world now: Fischer, Karpov, and Mecking himself! All other Grandmasters are patzers or kibitzers! He confirmed that he knows me, and he says that I am rather strong, but I have a lot of flaws and he knows how to beat me. It was not very polite. By the way, I may say frankly, that I made a mistake, too. Before the drawing of lots, when the pairings were not known, in some interview I said that Mecking is rather weak player, that he should lose to anybody he meets in the first round. It was my mistake! I did not know that I should play him; and then when it happened that I had to play him, later on I said that I had never made such a statement! I had to prove now that my statement was right, I had to prove it myself! Mecking grew up in chess very, very quickly, and he learned a lot of things about chess. He knows how to play openings properly; he knows a lot about strategical fight and it's true, he learned how to play, for instance, in Petrosian's style, Fischer's style, even how to imitate my style, maybe, but he hasn't his own face in chess, he doesn't have any new ideas. Maybe I'm not too objective now, excuse me, because I had a very serious match, a very psychological fight, and even now I'm a little bit angry about him! Maybe next time, a month later, I will tell you just the opposite, but now, it's my oponion that

I played badly in that match -- I'm not satisfied with the quality of my play.

Well, first of all, I was probably not accustomed to the difference in time and climate between Moscow and Georgia, and also I may say, that Mecking is very nervious. He is really nervous! There's dead silence in the hall, but nevertheless, Mecking complained every day and every hour, about some noise in the corridor, some whistle or fan and so on. And his nervousness transferred to me. I felt that I played much worse than I usually play. I won three games, but it was possible only with the assistance of my opponent--I could not do it myself, you know! That match was a very difficult task for me.

Very often Mecking is compared with Fischer. Now the behavior of Fischer is rather strange, but I'm not inclined to say the same. Fischer had a very difficult childhood, and he is nervous too, of course, but I understand all his deeds, his behavior, and his thoughts, and I can talk to him; I have common subjects to talk to him; but I have nothing in common with Mecking. I don't understand his behavior. His father is a rich man and his behavior is that of a very naughty boy, but he is now 22 years old and he has to be responsible for his behavior. When we played, the situation was very nervous. Usually I tried not to be at the board during his thinking, so as not to disturb him; but it was one of the last games of the match, and time pressure was coming for both players. I was sitting opposite him and it was his turn to think and to move, and suddenly he made such a gesture (breathing hard) -- it meant that I was not to breath too loud, you know! I became like a mouse during the match; it was difficult for me to play such a match.

I want to mention now that I have to play Petrosian and Spassky will play Karpov. Spassky, although he has achieved good successes recently, he won the Championship of the USSR and beat Byrne easily -- but it's my opinion he did not recover from the blow which he got from Fischer. Spassky is not that Spassky who played, for instance in 1965 or '67; at that time he was the best player in the World. Now I don't think so. Karpov is a very steady player; he is now able to beat anybody, even Spassky or me, for instance -- but he does not have much experience. It's my opinion that he will play much better three years from now, and then it should be the match of the century between Fishcer and Karpov. But not now. I think that my match with Petrosian will be more important, because I think the winner of our match will meet Fischer next year. Well, for me, it's not easy to play Petrosian. He's not a pleasant partner for me. He doesn't go forward when he plays chess; he waits for his opponent's mistake -- no more, no other tactic. Well, I don't like to play such an opponent, and it was funny about that match in 1971. when I played Petrosian, We made eight draws and then I lost the 9th game. When I lost the match, everybody in my country or outside was sure that I lost that match deliberately, because I did not want to play Fischer, because I was sure Fischer players better than anybody now and I was sure that I would lose! Well, it was rubbish, of course, but I couldn't reasure anybody! And I played that match in Moscow, where Petrosian lives. There were excellent conditions, but I was a guest there, and it was some handicap. I got the feeling every day that I was spotting him a Pawn, you know! Also he had played a rather easy match against Huebner, while I played a strong, fighting match against Geller, and I was exhausted and couldn't recover. That was the reason I lost the match to Petrosian. Now, I don't think I'm playing better than I did three years ago. I'm not getting younger, of course, but, for instance, I gave up smoking one year ago, and I feel some force poured into my lungs. Also, now I'm

going to play that match in my town, Leningrad, or at least in anneutral one, and I think my chances to beat him maybe more than they were three years ago. As to Fischer, I think he is undefeatable now. Nobody can beat him. But, of course, to play Fischer is not an easy task -- it's rather dangerous! I may remind you, that during the first match that Fischer played, his opponent Taimanov was in the hospital because of blood pressure! And then during the second match, with Larsen in Denver. Larsen asked for medical help; and after the match, he spent several months in a psychiatric hospital! Everybody that played Fischer suffered soem strong blow; maybe only Petrosian was able to recover quickly -- perhaps because he already had an idea what his fate would be. and he didn't put forth any effort to beat Fischer -- he hadn't any hope -- and that's why he played the same way after the match as before. Anyway, to play Fischer is a wonderful task and it sould be a good lesson for every player to play him. Although of course, it's necessary to be prepared psychologizally for such a match. Well, I'll show you the last game I played in the match with Mecking. Of course, we were exhausted because it was the 13th game and we were on the edge of starvation, you mightsay, starvation of mind. Mecking thought he hd more forces than I because he was younger, and he won the 12th game, and he played the 13th for the win. I played White.. But it was proved by the next game that the resulting position is better for White and I was going to prove it to my opponent -- maybe he didn't know! That's why I made this move .. 11 QB2 It's the wrong move! I'm convinced that the best move is 11 PQR4. But of course he didn't play the bad move 11 ... NR4? but played 11....NK4 Now I undersood the differance between 11 OB2 and 11 POR4, After 11 POR4 NK4 White can play 12 PB4 N/4-N5 13 NB4 and the move 13...PQN4 is not possible because of the P on QR4. Also NxKP isn't possible, with the N on N5 unprotected. That position would be clearly better for White. Now I make this maybe strange move.. 12 PQN3 But I have to develop the pieces on the Q-side. 12...PKN4Of course he did not invent this move himself. It has been played several times and is a good plan to inhibit White's PB4. 13 BN2 PN5, Now it was necessary for me to play NQ1, with the idea of N-K3-B4 to exchange Black's very strong N on the central square K4. Or perhaps N-K3-B5. It was the right plan and maybe White has better Chancws. But I made the wrong move and I lost a very important tempo. 14 KRK1 I had some thought of keeping from exchanging the Bishop after 14..NR4,15...NKB5 with BKB1. When Fischer played Spassky, he was accused of not using chess methods of fighting. There were even rumors that he consulted some computers for help! That's nonsense--but those were the rumors! Well, when Tal was World Champion, you remember Benko played against him with dark glasses because he was afraid of being hypnotized by Tal! Well, there's something real in this -- I may tell you, it's true, because, just now. I had seen the may for Mecking to win; but I made myself to be quiet, absolutely quiet; because he was thinking that I should be nervous, since he could win a Pawn immediately (19...NxQP) without any chances for me.

Well, I was quiet, and he was thinking that maybe I had some resourceful defense. He thought for \$5 minutes and atlast he chooses the wrong way! Besause of my quiet. I will show you how he could have won; not very complicated for a chess grandmaster. 19... NB6+ 20 NxN (Not PxN PxP+ leading to mate) PxN 21 PN3 BxB 22 QxB QxP! (22...NR6+ K moves, QxBP is bad for Black -- the Knight is badly disposed) I can't play 23 FxN because of the immediate mate. And while he was thinking, I thought, "He has a Pawa more but his K is open and maybe I have some chances. His P/B6 is strong, but it is weak, nevertheless in the ending. Also, I thought RK7 would be very strong, but later I saw the defense KRK1! was very, very strong; because I can take with the Rook once, but I cannot retake with the B because of QR6, leading to mate. After the exchange of R's, White's position would be very poor; White's QP is very weak. Well, it's sometimes difficlut to calculate long and complicated variations. We sometimes gauge a position after 1st, 2nd or 3rd, sight we accept or reject variations based on a common understanding of the position. <u>19....N/4-Q6 20 BxN BxB 21 QRQ1</u> Not 21 QxB NxB. <u>21...BQ5</u> Now if I were to play 22 BK4 to protect the 2 P's Black would play R-K1-K4, the other R-Kl and White has nothing to do -- White has a lost game. NWC EDITORS COMMENTS: For all Korchnoi-Mecking games see April issue of <u>NWC</u>, if you don't have one send \$.30 for one. Korchnoi won his match with Petrosian which was held in what I guess you would call a netural site, Odessa. Now can Korchnoi beat Karpov who looks like he will beat Spassky when I write this (score 3-1 Karpov and 10 game ad]). I have typed several Korchnoi-Petrosian games from the 74 match just completed which you can find in this issue.

If Korchnoi gets past Karpov or Spassky to play Fischer I would bet he will be ready in every way to do so. He will psych himself up to play Fischer. That would be some match. I have just read Frank Brady's revised book on Fischer and I just wonder as many of you do I am sure, will Fischer even play another title match, will he show up even if he signs for a match, now Fischer wants 10 wins instead of 6 to decide the title. According to March 1974 CHESS the 1975 title match will start June 1,1975. The FIDE committee has voted 341 to have winner be first to win 6 with the number of games not to be limited. The players must agree & venue, location, by 2/17/75 and accept regulations by 3/31/75. If you want to bid to hold the match you send your offer in by 1/2/75. If players fail to agree on the site within a month then match will be held first 15 games in USA and balance in USSR.

After this game Crookes withdrew from the tournament, with the sad result of: 1 1 1 1 0 0 F = 4.

Morin-McLaren 1.Nf3 f5

The week before this game Chow announced that he too was withdrawing from the tournament, even though he was awarded

a win in Round 6 by forfeit. This decision had two effects: It meant that, by winning the present game, Morin could win the tournament, and it also meant Morin would not get 30 rating points from the last round.

With this in mind it was clear that this game was an all-or-nothing encounter for Black. White consequently had prepared a line against the Dutch, which is known to be used in such situations. (ie. Game 10 of the Korchnoi-Tal match.)

2.e4!

Turning the tables. White will now be attacking. In the spirit of the opening would be 2....e5!, going into the Pupols special, although I'm not sure if it's really sound. As the game goes, McLaren plays much under his usual strength.

Round 7

Because of the withdrawal of Morton. Chdw; and Crookes, McLellan, Morin, and McLaren were all awarded points automatically. Therefore the only game to be played was Fullbrook-Kruger, for second place. And what a game. Fullbrook-Kruger 1.e4 d6 2.d4 Nf6 3.Nc3

g6 4.f3 c6 5.Be3 Nbd7 6.Qd2 b5 7.0-0-0?! Gross but consistent. Only true devotees of the Pirc would know whether this is the best move, although I seem to remember it being a line. Or is that with the Bishop on g7? There is a significant difference, for here Kruger has an extra tempo.

7....Qa5 8.Kb1 Nb6 9.b3 Virtually forced, but this weakens the King position. 9.... b4 is now a possibility, although where is the Black Queen to go to allow a5-a4xb3? 10.Ncg2 Qa3?!! 11.Qd3? Ba6! and Bb5 is an option, although a permanent posting of the Queen at a3 is dangerous and its viability can only be ascertained by the theoreticians (and I don't feel like being a theoretician in public today.) 9....Bg7?

This is silly, though, for the Bishop

is clearly better at f0. 10.g4 Bd7?! 11.h4 0-0-02!?! Black tenth and eleventh moves constitute an original idea which probably isn't any good, although the position seems to be about level. But shouldn't Black have a right to expect more out of the position? 10....h5 is the standard move, and after 11.g5 Nfd7 b4 and c5 could have been played, the White King being partially subjected to the sieve

down the long diagonal.

12.Nh3 Ne8?

This seems also to be ignorant. Why not 12...Be8, to be followed by e5? If the d Pawn can be destroyed, then Black can profitably boot with b4 and c5, opening up the diagonal for his Bishop. Black has evidently forgotten that this is the objective of the entire opening.

13.Ng5 Be6 14.Nb5?!

Good grief! This sacrifice is cer-_____ tainly in character for the Mad Dog, but it can hardly hope to prove sound. Is Fullbrook just living off his reputation? 14.h5 was possible, trying to boot the Bishop with 15.h6, making d5 realizable. On the other hand, Fullbrook thought for three minutes before sacrificing, so maybe he figured everything out.

14....Qd2 15.Na7 Kb7 16.Rd2 Ka7 17.f5 h6 18.a4 c5 19.a5 Na8 20.de6 hg5 21.Bc5 dc5 Material clearly is not being counted for a brief interlude. Do not adjust your chess sets.

22.Rd8 fa6 23.h5 Nac7

The smoke has cleared a little, and it is hard to say who has the edge. White's weeknesses on the dark squares may prove to be a serious handicap if Black ever gets going.

As far a other support for organizers is concerned, we believe that the CFC and BCCF do a reasonable job, considering their limited resources.

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

The final leg of the tour took me to Guadalajara Mexico for the 1974-1975 Mexican Open. It had always been a puzzle for me why the Mexicans never announce their tournaments in GL&R. It turns out that the tournaments are never organized until the last minute. Apparently a month before the start of the Open, there was still doubt as to whether the site would be Mexico City or Guadalajara.

This time I came terribly close to losing in round 3, when I won a piece in the middle gaue, but then succeeded in getting into a lost position in the ending (I was anxious to get away and get to sleep), but was the glad recipient of an oversight on my opponent' part on the next move. Subsequently I kept out of trouble, allowing only a draw with Kenneth Frey. The two of us finished on top with $7\frac{1}{2}$, a full point up on the field, which included all of Hexico's top players (Mario Campos Lopez got 6-2).
