Well hi there folks, it's your old curmudgeonly ratings director again, pleading yet again for good reports. You probably won't believe it, after all these dunning columns, but of the above rather small list of events, fully SEVEN contained no notice of the unrated players, and EIGHT did not give states of residence for the players. I really really really do need both bits of data. Maybe nobody out there ever reads my column. Maybe nobody out there can read?! How about it, guys, please!

Something just a bit less usual this time, in hopes of increasing my audience. (If this doesn't work I'll try Braille next.) Two recent additions to my library please me so much I cannot resist recommending them to all local aficionados with a few bucks to spare: Pawn Endings by Y. Averbach and Nimzowitsch: A Reappraisal by Raymond Keene. Both hardbacks, I fear, but skip your next planned tournament and buy these instead. The Averbach book proves that chess is even harder and ever so much more fascinating than anyone ever suspected, while the Keene book is an absolutely delightful exposition of the play and practices of perhaps the most original player in our game's history. Sound dull and dry? It isn't. The Keene book is absolutely the best-written volume I have ever seen about any game - a sheer delight just to read over! Almost as a bonus you get insights into a player who invented everything (Nimzoindian, Queen's Indian, 3. P-K5 against the French and Caro-Kann, Botvinnik-Panov attack against the Caro, Nimzowitsch's Defence and 1. P-QN3), to name a few openings) and a superb selection of games. So run right out and buy it!

PS: If you didn't read the above you missed something you should have seen; either that or our Editor, whoever he may be, considered it too commercial and edited it out!

Re; Chess Life and Review (October 1974)

Dear Mr. Cramer;

I read with personal interest the article printed in Chess Life and Review, regarding the FIDE Congress meeting of June this year.

I have received several phone calls regarding this travesty of justice involving the World Championship Match, and the unfortunate political implications of the decision rendered by what appears to be either a rather non-caring or totalitarian group of FIDE officials. Which ever it may be, it is not good for Chess. The countries that walked out of the meeting without even casting a vote and the countries that preferred abstentions are showing either a political policy or a total disregard for the game of Chess itself. In either case it appears to me that Chess is not to benefit by any vote or ruling by FIDE. In a Democratic society the people must have the vote, in this case, the Grandmasters (World Championship Class) ARE the people. We must know where they stand before we can reach any kind of objective conclusion. Unfortunately, it appears that there will be held a "World Championship" match, Without a World Champion participating! It appears that FIDE has put a "bust" on the Title in it's own right.

We as the chess playing populace either must accept their decision of arrogant authority or do our best to convince them of the importance of a TRUE World Championship. We have reached a problem here --- so very few of the Chess players in the world reach quality of play that the only arbiters involved should be those that preside in over the board play --- NOT before.

MINUTES 1974 OCF BUS MEETING

The 1974 business meeting of the Ore. Chess Federation was called to order by President Robert Larrance at approximately 8:07pm on 1 Sept. 1974. The secretary, Harry Glidden, read the minutes of the 1973 meeting. They were approved as read. The treasurer's financial report was read: \$311.56 cash balance on hand in bank. 620 letters during the year with office expenses totaling \$160.50. 1973 Class Championship Tournament resulted in a loss of \$217.39. 1974 Class Championship Tournament resulted in a loss of \$175.20 without including a pending bill of \$160 for use of Portland Community College rooms. Robert Larrance gave a short talk on the expectations he had at the start of the year and stated he had been unable to carry them out due to lack of cooperation. He said he would not be a candidate this year. Vice-President Hal Andrews gave a short speech on his office, which he said he liked very much and would appreciate being reelected. Election of officers was the next order of business; Clay Kelleher was the only nomination for the office of President. He was elected unanimously and took up the duties promptly. Address 4620 NE 84th Ave., Portland 97220. Nominations for Vice-President were: Kenneth Fitzgerald, Pat Maloney and Hal Andrews; Pat Maloney withdrew in favor of Andrews. Fitzgerald & Andrews gave short talks indicating their desire for the position, especially in view of the Editor job that went with it. Both then left the room and after some discussion the elections were held. Kenneth Fitzgerald won the V-P and Editor job for the coming year by a wide plurality. Address: P. O. Box 10398, Eugene 97401. Harry Glidden was the only nomination for the Sec. - Tres. post and was elected by a wide plurality. Address: 243 S. Stage Rd., Medford 97501. Under old business the secretary presented a bill from Portland Community College for the use of their rooms during the 1974 OCF Class Championship tournaments. After some discussion the bill was tabled for handling by the elected officers. This was done with the understanding that Cheryl Hooker, a member of the PCC as well as OCF, would take up the matter with the school officials. The OCF executive committee was to take care of the matter as it finally evolved. Mark Turner made a motion that the OCF officers should obtain plaques of appreciation to be presented to the Oregonian and the OMSI for their help in promoting chess in Oregon. Motion was seconded and carried. Cynthia McBride, 1620 SW Davenport, Portland 97201, gave a short talk on a Senior Chess Tournament she was promoting. The event to be held the latter part of October at the Portland Civic Center. She stated she would appreciate help from the OCF but did not expect any monetary assistance. Mark Turner made a motion to correct one of the Charter articles but after a short discussion withdrew the motion.

Kenneth Fitzgerald was elected unanimously as OCF's #1 delegate to USCF for 1975. Harry Glidden was elected unanimously as OCF's #2 delegate for 1975.

Alternates for delegates were elected in the following order: #1 Clay Kelleher #2 Joe Mihara #3 Brian Atkins. Mihara from Portland and Atkins Bonneville. Mihara made a motion that article #3, A, Sub #3 be changed to allow OCF membership to be purchased for \$1.00 per year with a subscription to NWC to be by the individuals choice without requirement. Seconded by V. McMahan. There were 26 present when the vote was taken. This being a charter change would require 18 yes votes. Vote was 3 yes - 19 no - 4 abstained.

The new President Kelleher made some comments about the need to change the date for the Ore. Jr. Open by the tournament committee. He also advised watching NWC for the announcement as to who the new tournament committee would consist of. Further comments were that he felt the OCF needed a historian and he is looking for someone to take on the job.

Meeting adjourned.

I plan on putting my thoughts here on a monthly basis starting with this issue. If I am to communicate effectively with Oregon Chess Federation members, this is my best single channel.

My first major act as President was to select this year's OCF Tournament Committee. They are Brad Anderson (Chairman), 4610 - 12th St. N.E., Salem, OR 97303; Bill Hardy, 205 E. 6th St., Eugene, OR 97401; and Cheryl Hooker, 5825 S.E. 17th Ave, Portland, OR 97202.

Chess clubs, organizers, and potential organizers take note...the Tournament Committee exists to help you to help yourself throughout Oregon.

If you want to hold a fair-sized tournament but are afraid to risk all of your capital, ask the Federation to co-sponsor it with you. Do so by sending the Tournament Committee a list of projected income, prizes, expenses, and other such details. State the percentage of the risk (or profit) you want OCF to assume. If the request is reasonable, you will get the backing you need.

If you live in an isolated community and want to try holding your first chess tournament, but don't know how to go about it, ask the Tournament Committee for assistance. While they are not in the business of running tournaments, they will find somebody who has such experience to help you or to do it all if necessary. You can even ask the Committee to get OCF to fully back it up money-wise. (Your request should not be too extravagant.)

But in either case plan well ahead. Allow at least two weeks for your request for financial assistance to get through the mail and to get through the red tape.

I have established the special post of OCF Historian to catch us up on decades of chess history in Oregon and to set up an archives. This is a temporary job, but "temporary" may mean anywhere from five months to five years. I have appointed Cynthia McBride to this post. She will rely largely on her ingenuity to dig up and organize the data. The obvious starting place is in back issues of Northwest Chess and, before that, the Washington Chess

Letter. But these magazines only go back so far. If you have something in your chess attic that could be called "history", maybe a recollection of the 1940 Portland Chess Club champion or something like that, write to Cynthia about it. Her address is 1620 S.W. Davenport, Portland, OR 97201.

POPULAR STUDENT TOURNAMENT BACK FOR THIRD YEAR

While there is still time to draw a full breath, we would like to take the time to tell you about the 1975 Oregonian/OMSI Chess Tournament. The tournament itself is dedicated to providing an enjoyable and enriching competitive playing experience for the students of Oregon and Clark County, Washington. Important too is its recognition and commendation of young chess players who demonstrate superior skill.

The participation has been fantastic. The estimate of players in last year's tournament ranges from 15,000 to 21,000. This estimate alone ought to bring a smile to many a wizened woodpusher wondering whether or not today's youth have an interest in chess. The answer, of course, is a resounding "Yes!"

The Oregon Museum of Science and Industry is enthusiastically at work once more. The skeletal organization remains true to past tournaments. The Oregonian/OMSI Chess Tournament is in fact played at three levels beginning with the local school level and progressing through the regionals to the state finals. The local level tournaments are held during the last months of this year and in early January of 1975. The necessary materials are provided by Oregonian/OMSI with the suggestion that a Swiss System be used. It is realized that the chess situation varies from scant interest to hyperactive chess clubs, and so it is felt it would be harmful to impose an inflexible tournament form on every school. Here our basic concern is to help those schools which ask for assistance, and most of all, encourage everyone to give it a try. Try! At the local level as well as the regional level, competitive play is grouped in the following sections: lower(K-6) intermediate (7-8); and upper (9-12) for both individual and four-man teams.

At the regional level the tournament preparations hit full stride. Each school having selected a maximum delegation of six epr section travels to the appropriate regional tournament. There are 19 regional tournaments this year which roughly follow school district boundaries with allowances made for geographical barriers, hence the increase of regions by two for this year's tournament.

Learning by process of trial-and-error, the Oregonian and OMSI have established excellent facilities for tournament play around the state. Many of the past tournament directors have already expressed their willingness to share their directing talents once again. Something we learned from past regionals was that site preparation and player registration definitely overworked the directors. These difficult, but vitally important, tasks of site organization and registration are now to be given to the regional host. Clay Kelleher, president of the O.C.F. is to thank for this significant innovation.

The regional tournaments are scheduled for the last weekend of January and early February. Region finalists will be determined by a four or five round Swiss System. They are then eligible for the state finals to be held at OMSI on March 7,8, and 9 of 1975.

All in all, the 1975 Oregonian/OMSI Chess Tournament looks to be a vigorous and exciting event. We shall be submitting another article in early 1975 with news of the tournament in progress. We went pass the Empire State Building, pass the McAlpin Hotel, pass the Statler Hilton (where in a mere 43 hours, we would be competing in the 1974 U.S. Open.), and yes, even pass the Madison Square Gardens until, there, shining in all its radiant, glorius gold brilliance, stood a McDonald's. Now came the hard part about surviving in New York, trying to avoid getting food poisoning. Skipping town, amazingly still alive, Mike and I arrived in Boston, from where we were going to continue up to Portland, Maine, there we had planned to split up, I was going on to Montreal and Mike was going back to N.Y., to meet Wayne Hatcher. A few minor incidents such as the bus being an hour late and a few good looking chicks getting on the bus, changed Mike's mind. He decided to go all the way...to Montreal that is. We got to the Canadian customs about 4 in the afternoon. "May I see your identification, please", said the custom's officier. I showed her my driver's liscense and Mike showed her an old, torn Highline C.C. Student Body I.D. card. (I've gotten into Canada on a library card before, but this is ridiculous.). "How long do you expect to be in Canada?" she asked, "Oh, about 4 hours." we replied, that pysch her out, probably thought we were going up there to make the drop. We were allowed to continue and after a short meal in Montreal we turned around and headed back to New York. We got backed to the Statler Hilton Hotel about 1 in the afternoon and checked into our 16th floor room, which overlooked Madison Square Gardens. I had time to catch up on some sleep and get my fins wet from a bath.

13 senior masters, 57 masters, 71 experts, 118 A, 109 B, 91 C, 54 D, 14 E, and 18 unrated comprised the 540 players who had turned out to play in the 1974 U.S. Open. Of the more notable players were Vlastimil Hort, Sammy Resheveky, Jan Timman, William Lombardy, Pal Benko, Arthur Bisquier, Jon Grefe, Julio Kap-

lan, Norman Weinstien, Craig Chellstorp, Kim Commonns, Joaquim Durao, Larry Christiansen, Hans Bohm and Ruben Rodriguez. From Washington there were. Duane Polich, Mike Mulford, Wayne Hatcher, Leo Stefurak, Yasser Seirawan, Chuck Johnson and Gary Houlahan. The breaking point was in the high 1700's and Wayne Hatcher got paired with G.M. Arthur Bisquier. I was paired with off all people D. Leo Stefurak, here I had travelled 3 thousand miles to play in my first big national tournament and who do I get paired with in the 1st round? somebody from my own town, who I could play any time I wished! A quick talk to Tim Redman, and my pairing was changed, I got an expert from Colorado instead, who somehow I managed to draw. Leo and Yaz won thier first game, Mike lost and for a while it looked like Hatcher was beating Bisquier, but the G.M. experience enable him to swindle his way out, and finally win. That night we all managed to get a good sleep, despite all the honking horns and screaming sirens. We had six people in our room, Leo and Yaz, Mulford and I, Wayne Hatcher and Miloslav Nekvasil (whom we had met at the U.S. Junior). Milo was the unlucky one, he had to sleep on the floor all the time. The rest of us rotated between the floor and the 3 beds, of which we payed for a

double room. Everday we got up to late to take advantage of the "breakfast specials". So we settle for McDonalds for breakfast and McDonalds or Kentucky Fried Chicken for dinner. Money became a problem since Yasser money supplier did not come through with a check, I had lent them some money at the U.S. Junior for food and know I was running out of dough. It got so bad that Leo and Yaz had to go down and hustle some dude in speed to get money to eat. Entertainment was mostly TV. Onetime we all went down to the NBC studios to try and get into one of the game show, however, they were videotaping any that day. Later I went back and got in the audience of Jackpot.

The 2nd round I had another expert and got into a variation that I could refute in my sleep, unfortunately I was awake. In the next few rounds I dropped out of 1st place in my class and never did make it back into the running. I will have to learn to play the Swiss Gambit more carefully since I was either winning or drawing the crucial games, that I needed to lose. In about the 4th round D. Leo was paired with I.M. Joaquim Durao from Portugal, Leo pull out his Informant and the daily bulletins and proceeded to go over the

games of his next opponent, commenting to himself, "He fell for this cheapo" and "Look, he gophered this cheapo!" "This guy can be cheapoed! I going to cheapo him off!!" That night Leo entered the room and said triumphantly "I cheapoed off Durao!" and then showed us where he had won Durao's queen and the game. Another one of his fine performances was against Tom Wozney, a master who he drew with. After 6 rounds of play I had 3 and 3, Mulford score was unspeakable and I can't recall the others. Saturday was a day of rest, so Mulford, Milo and I went to Washington D.C., which is Milo's home town. Mulford and I then took a short tour of D.C., we went past ex-president Nixon's ex-home, a quick breakfast and we were back on our way to N.Y., where we were got in a huge downpour, if you think Seattle is bad, out here it just like a shower and I didn't even have a coat. Mike and I continued on to Providence Rhode Island, on the way I nearly froze to death, because the bus had on its air conditioning and I was totally soaked. We spent about 20 minutes in Providence and turned around and headed back to N.Y. to the warmth of the hotel room. It was funny to note that the only bad weather we had was during our day off. The play continued the next day, the grandmasters just warming up to the battle after taking care of the fish in the earlier rounds. One of the not so fishy players was Hans Bohm of the Netherlands, who beat Resheveky and Benko and drew with Timman, before succumbing to the pieces of Hort. I kept up my earlier performance by drawing lost games, winning lost ones, and losing the majority of my games, if, you can understand what I just said. Mulford started winning some games and Hatcher who had a good first week went into a slump, but later pulled out of it by defeating 2 class A players. Other notable performances of the Northwest players was by Chuck Johnson who defeated George Kane, Marshall Chess Club Champion. Yasser Sierawan beat two masters in a row. The last round finally came and I had 5½ points, there was one guy in my group with 6½ and there were several with 6 points. I needed a win and actually had a pretty good game until I looked and saw the guy with 6½ points winning and one of the 6 pointers was winning also, I immediately dropped a piece and so resigned. That ended for me the 75th U.S. Open, a tournament that I enjoyed very much, but now the time had come to return home.

Mulford had lost his game and he finished with 4 1/2 points. Wayne, Leo, Yaz, and Chuck were still playing as Milo, Mike and I caught the 10:45 bus to Pittsburgh. When we got there early the next morning, we had a quick breakfast and then saying goodbye to Mike who was going to St. Louis and then to Texas, Milo and I continued on to Charleston, W. Va. where we had lunch, at off all places, a McDonald's, I thought we were sick of them. We continued on through Kentucky and Indiana, to Missouri, across Kansas and Colorado to Wyoming, where we had a funny bus driver whose best joke was, when we told him that it was difficult to get "to sleep on the bus, "Oh, it's easy"he said, "Just watch me. The bus rolled along to Billings and finally to Butte, Montana where Milo and I split. Milo was going to Calgary and I on to Seattle. I got to Spokane that night and in to Seattle early the next morning. I sat sadly outside the bus station in the pre-dawn blackness contemplating where I had been, I was all ready to go back, but a red monster was coming down the street ready to take me on my last bus ride, this time I had to pay for it.

November is the month for one of the finest tournaments of the year. The Capitol City Open held each year, will this year with its \$1950 prize fund, be bigger and better than ever. A lot of the big name players will be there, so plan to attend. Here's an example of what you may be able to do. This game was one of the more famous games played last year at the 1973 Capitol City Open.

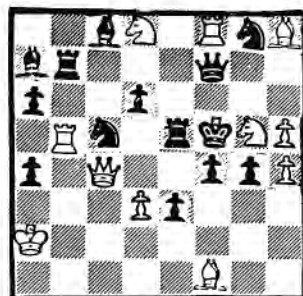

A very nice mutate: the setting is a Complete Block (a mate is provided for all black moves) both before and after the key, but changes occur on the two self-blocks 1...Bd3/Pe5, 2.Rf4/Sg5 and after the key 2.Bf3/Bf5. No.158 (SEETHARAMAN) 1.Se7 was the intention followed by an incomplete BS-wheel which included five interferences (seven is the record). However, there is no mate after 1...Sd2! Therefore, the correct solution is No Solution; this is the only claim which can receive the 3 points. Since much of the artistic detail lies in the strategy of the variations, solvers (and editors!) should examine all possibilities thoroughly. Most editors merely examine the content of an original and then leave it to the solvers to find any flaws. No.159 (MOORE) 1.Qf3! (2.Sc6) Many solvers were hooked by the try 1.Ka7? (2.Qc4) which has enough lines to make it appear sound. But, 1...Bd5! foils all this! Except for this try, the problem has only minor merit.

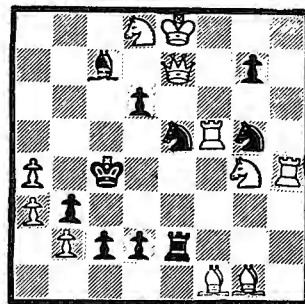

No.162 (SWINDLEY) 1.Kg1 (2.R-any) This is an attempt at the full Fleck theme in which each random move in the threat is separately forced. Moves like 1...Ra1/Qc1 leave the theme incomplete unfortunately. No.163 (STEIN) 1.Se7! (2.dS-any+) Similar to No.162 but minus the Fleck effect. Here, specific black moves force the full white-knight wheel, i.e. all 8 moves are made, and is therefore called a Partial Fleck. Some good tries are 1.Qa6/b7/b8? QxQ! and 1.dB-any? Se8! No.164 (DINWIDDIE) 1.Qf2, waiting. A Complete Block with an added variation and two unpins of the BQ give this a nice touch. 1...Qxf3/Pxf3/Pxf2, 2.Qg2+/Qh2+/Rxxg3+.



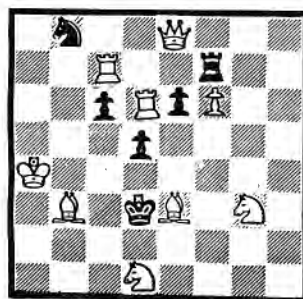
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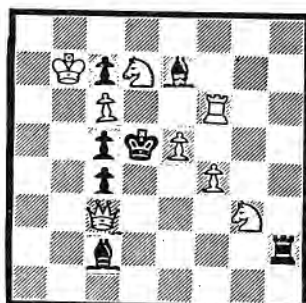

A. Karpov V. Korchnoi
Retroff's Defence

As in the second game, Korchnoi, playing black, again aspired to tactical complications. One would think this to be the correct strategy against such a positional chessplayer as Karpov, who likes clear positions with a small advantage, just as Capablanca did. But in this match Korchnoi's plans are not materializing, as his opening preparations aren't good enough to grant him what he is after. On the other hand, it appears that Karpov has prepared for any surprises his opponent may have readied for him; even at this early stage in the match he appears to me to be the likely winner.

Personally, I prefer 8 B-QR3 in order to trade off the 'good' black bishop. The text, of course, is playable, but just watch how slippery that bishop becomes!

In the 1971 match Petrosian played 5... Nf6 against Fischer, but such quiet positions are not the kind for which Korchnoi strives.

Up until now both sides have been playing in a very logical and commendable manner. This last move of white's seems a bit rash, however. It would be more logical to hold back the K-side pawns and await developments in the centre and on the other flank with QR-B1, KR-Q1, perhaps B-QR1, and only then try to break open the position. The text, however, is not that bad.

6 Bd3 Be7 7 O-O Nc6 8 Re1 Bg4 Q c3 It is senseless, of course, to continue 9 Bxe4 dxe4 10 Bxe4 in view of 10...Bxf3 11 Qxf3 Nxd4 12 Qd3 Ne6 and black has a free position.

I do not like that move. White now has a free hand on the Q-side. Better, in my opinion, is 1 ...PxNP 20 PxNP PxBP PxP, and white's pawn structure is all sliced up. Although he does have a space advantage, it is not that kind which one is able to make rise like a loaf of bread.

9...f5?!

This complicated out risky move intensifies the battle, inasmuch as, after Karpov's response, black is forced to sacrifice his b pawn.

Neither of these moves makes any sense. 21 B-Q4 P-QN3 22 P-QR4 P-QB4 23 KPXP

10 Qb3 O-O

This gambit, first used by the American Grandmaster Harry Nelson Pillsbury against Emanuel Lasker in 1896, was later judged to be in correct. Capablanca shared this opinion. Karpov, who in many respects is a follower of the great Cuban demonstrates in the present game a line of play to back up Capablanca's opinion.

An interesting idea, but why does this natural move have to be part of a combination?

12 Nbd2 Kh8

Karpov threatened to take twice on e4. Korchnoi could not shirk the gambit continuation, as after 11...Nx42 12 Nxd2 Rb2 13 Nf1 (threatening 14 Ne3) 13...f4 14 Be4 Be6 15 Bxh7ch white wins a pawn.

Now comes the main reason for the inclusion of this generally well-played, but otherwise pedestrian game- the unexpected sacrifice.

12 h3 Bh5?

Korchnoi should have taken advantage of his opponent's unwarranted haste (12 h3) by playing 12...bxf3 13 Nxf3 Kb8. It would be difficult then for white to fight against the well-placed knight on e4.

If 35 K-R2, then just P-Q6, and black will soon queen his pawn.

13 Qxb7 Rf6 14 Qb3 Rg6 15 Be2

This strong defensive move makes it difficult for black to find attacking continuations.

White resigned. A fine conception by one of Vancouver's up-and-coming juniors

15...Bh4 16 Rf1 16 Nxh4 Qxh4 17 Nxe4 Qxe4 18 f3 is erroneous, due to 18...Bxf3.

This not only forestalls a check on g3, but wins a tempo due to the threat of 21 Nf7ch.

White was not planning to immerse himself in the complications which follow 25 Bxe4, fxe4 26 Ne5 Kf6 27 Nxc6 Rxf4ch.

25...Rf6 26 Qe5 g5 27 Nxc6 In this manner white returns two pieces for a rook and two pawns, thereby simplifying the position.

27...hxg5 28 Bxg5 Ree6 29 Rel Qg8 30 h4.

Karpov does not find it necessary to regain the exchange; his bishops are strong enough to decide the outcome of the game. If 30 Bxf6ch Kxf6 white would have to contend with defending against the threat of 31...f4.

30...Kg6 31 hxe6 Here Korchnoi overstepped the time limit. In the present position this is but one of many ways of losing the game. After 31...Rxe6 Karpov could win a third pawn with 32 Bb5 Nd8 (even worse for black is 32...e8 33 Qxd5) 33 Qxc7, and white's material advantage combined with black's open king position would assure a victory.

AN OPEN LETTER TO:

World Champion R. Fischer, international grand masters, the World Chess Federation and its allied Federations, the German Chess League and its regional leagues, chess magazines and the chess-orientated public.

Dear Chess-Friends!

For thirty years I have been playing international chess games; I gained the title of international grand master; seven times I won the championship of Czechoslovakia, and I was first in fourteen international tournaments. For ten years I was active in the World Chess Federation - editor of its magazine.

During the so-called "Cold war" I was a committed Communist and a top official of the Czechoslovak tradunions. This was generally known in the western world. In spite of this I was cordially received in all the countries of the West and nobody hit upon the idea of boycotting me because of my strong political activities. Later I retired from politics and was merely active as chess grand master and sports journalist. I hope I'm not exaggerating when I say that I have friend in every country: in the U.S.S.R. as well as in the U.S.A., in Yugoslavia as well as in Israel, in Cuba as well as in Puerto Rico.

On August 21st, 1968 I felt compelled to return to the sphere of international politics on the side of those who had just been defeated. In spite of all the consequences it has been the happiest decision of my life.

Later, while languishing in prison with a broken skull and backbone, hovering between life and death after a 6-weeks' hunger-strike, I realised that many people saved my life and helped me to regain my freedom by their protests. Among them were J. P. Sartre, Heinrich Boll, among them were thousands of members of Amnesty International, among them were pupils from the Anne-Frank-School in Utrecht. Not among them, however, were my friends - internationally known grand masters and masters. Nor the World Chess Federation and its allied Federations.

I did not bear a grudge against my old friends because of this. Chess players want to devote themselves to their beautiful game and are entitled to their desire to have no interference from the uproar of this world. Before Christmas 1972 I wrote a letter from Solingen to the President of the German Chess League, Mr. L. Schneider, to the effect that I was quite determined to keep chess and politics in strictly separate spheres, to seek only friends through chess and, in the spirit of the FIDE watchword "Gens una sumus"

to meet all the world's chess players in a spirit of friendship.

However, I soon realised that others are not prepared to separate chess from politics. I was no longer invited to the big matches, I was not even invited to matches played at Dortmund, 60km. away from my home. It was feared that if I attended, the Soviet grand masters, next to Bobby Fischer the best chess players in the world, would stay away.

Spassky and Polugayevsky, the Soviet grand masters, came to Solingen on the 6th July for the international tournament of my club. They announced that their Federation had instructed them to return immediately if I took part in the tournament. The representative of the grand masters of the DDR (German Democratic Republic), Wolfgang Uhlman, joined their action and I was excluded by my club. I consider that my treatment was tantamount to insincerity and hypocrisy. Consequently I consider myself forced to leave the club and the town and to settle down elsewhere.

In my initial disillusionment I wanted to

CODE OF ETHICS FOR CHESS JOURNALISTS

Adopted by Association of US Chess Journalists

The chess journalist is subject to the same general code of professional ethics as other journalists. He should be truthful, honest, and fair. He should keep the interests of his readers uppermost in his mind in all decisions concerning his publication. The following points merit special attention.

1. He should not knowingly distort facts either by what he states or what he omits nor permit others to do so in his publication.
 2. He should distinguish between the statement of facts and the expression of opinion and make the distinction evident to readers.
 3. He should refrain from accusations without evidence and from direct or indirect personal attacks designed merely to discredit an individual. Necessary criticism should be expressed temperately with truth and fairness.
 4. He should not use his publication to hurt or embarrass anyone unnecessarily. Reader interest alone is not a sufficient criterion in this matter.
 5. If he is an editor of a publication financed by an association, federation, or other dues-paying group, he must not use his office in the service of personal ends which might conflict with the objectives of the group, and he should avoid conflicts of interest between his role as chess journalist and other roles. Furthermore, he should provide a "Letters to the Editor" column or other means for responsible expression of views opposed to his own.
 6. He should fulfil commitments to publish, and on time.
 7. He should cite sources for information or material where appropriate (a) to give credit where it is due, (b) to permit readers to evaluate the reliability of the information, and (c) to permit readers to trace the information further if they wish. Non-credited items are assumed to be the work of the editor.
 8. He should acknowledge and correct significant errors when he becomes aware of them.
 9. He should regulate his journalism by good taste and decency, recognizing that chess publications are nearly always available to and read by a mixed audience, including young children.
- Generally the chess journalist should dedicate his efforts to the advancement of chess, strive for the best quality of which he is capable in all aspects of his or her publication.

—These are considerations anyone under pressure is likely to lose sight of. Please hold me to these, citing them in any disagreement you may have with me.

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give up chess altogether and look for a different vocation. But I have decided against this. It is not so easy to write off thirty years of one's life and I am convinced that I am still able to play chess. Furthermore, it would only prove that even in chess boycott and blackmail, arrogant despotism and brutal power politics would emerge the winner.

Therefore, I shall not do this voluntarily. Only you, dear chess-friends, can force me to withdraw by keeping silent, by not doing anything within the World Chess Federation, by continuing to play chess without caring whether someone is prevented from playing; someone for whom chess means his livelihood.

This time I am to be excluded from chess and my livelihood is to be destroyed because I am unwilling to accept in silence the Soviet occupation of my country. Tomorrow someone else might be excluded because of voicing his opinions in another question and the day after tomorrow demands might be made to the effect that all internationally recognised grand masters should acknowledge only one ideology or confess to only one religion. Freedom and justice are usually destroyed in small steps, are devoured in small portions, so to speak. This can apply to chess, where there is hegemony of one country and one power group.

For this reason I turn to you with a request: with the request to prevent situations like the one in Solingen in the future and to give me the opportunity of being boycotted.

The member federations allied to FIDE are urgently requested to present this case at the next FIDE congress for discussion and for a decision in principle.

LUDEK PACHMAN

SOLINGEN, 13th July, 1974

Ludek Pachman rather glosses over the nature of his "return to the sphere of international politics". He is referring, of course, to his vehement protests against the invasion of Czechoslovakia by forces from other communist lands followed by the degradation of Dubcek and his colleagues.

We referred more than once in CHESS to the troubles these protest brought upon him. Our announcements were tempered by the fear that the more loudly his name echoed around the West, the worse might be his treatment - a fear obviously borne out by events.

An ugly business.

Before we condemn the German organisers for their apparently cold-blooded action we should like to hear (and, indeed we welcome and invite) an expression of their point of view.

Much International Chess Federation time has been taken up by requests from communist countries which resulted in the suspension of Rhodesia and South Africa, because of alleged discrimination against chess players on account of their colour.

The Soviet Chess Federation is now accused of debarring a player from a tournament because of his political beliefs. A very serious accusation which must be investigated without delay.

Frankly, we cannot imagine any British or U.S. organizer giving in to such blackmail from the Soviet Chess Federation.

Kavalek left Czechoslovakia at the same time as Pachman for the same reason; settled in the U.S.A. and took first board in the American team in Nice. The Soviet chess newspaper "64" had a photograph of Kavalek playing Karpov and gave the game with annotations. The contrast is strange indeed! B. H. WOOD

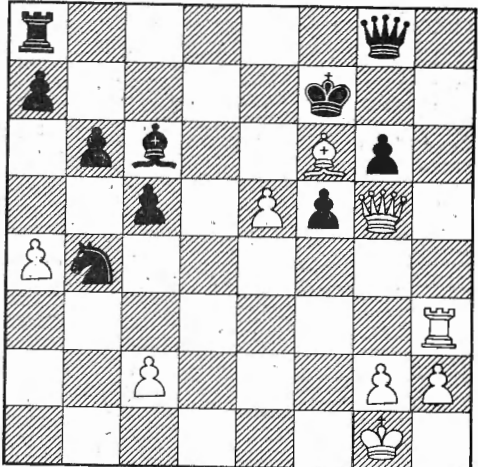

Additional Clarification of the Rules:

5. SCHEDULE. 30 March 1975 falls on Easter Sunday, so that final round will be moved to 6 April. Playoffs (if necessary) remain scheduled for 13 April.

15. CHAMPIONSHIP DIVISION. Unrated players may be placed on any board. Provisionally rated players may be placed the same as unrated players.

15 and 16. BOTH DIVISIONS. Board prizes count for results on the same or higher boards. For example, if a player ends the season as a "Board 3" player (most season games played on that board), he gets credit for all wins and draws on boards 3, 2, and 1. And of course, Board 5 can count all the way up. Board 1 can only count that board. // When the team line-up is made, do not give any names for those who are absent and forfeit. Since forfeits are automatically placed on bottom boards, their ratings are immaterial to the lineup. On the side with the players present, the ratings and the lineup IS material (in the Championship Division).

Maybe I could sac the Rook for a mating attack. Let's see: 14 NK4 BxR 15 BN5 PKB3 - no good. Black would have more to defend that f6 square than I could to attack. Worse, his King Rook gets developed. 14 BQ2 BN2 15 QN3 PQ4 16 BN5 White is trying, but there is still nothing there. ...QO2 Ho! Ho! Do you see a potential Knight fork on f6? 17 QRO PQB4? White has two possible combinations: (1) 18 NK4 BxR 19 NB6+ NxN 20 BxN and mate soon follows with the Queen on g7. Or (2) what I played. 18 PK6 QB3 White has a choice between (1) NxP (2) QxR (3) PK7 or 19 PxP+ KR 20 QxR PQ5

This is hardly the best League game, but it is the only one available.

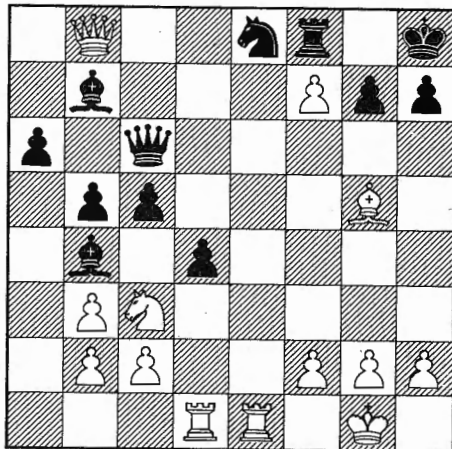

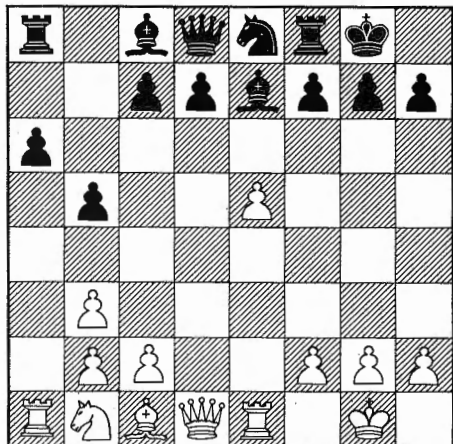

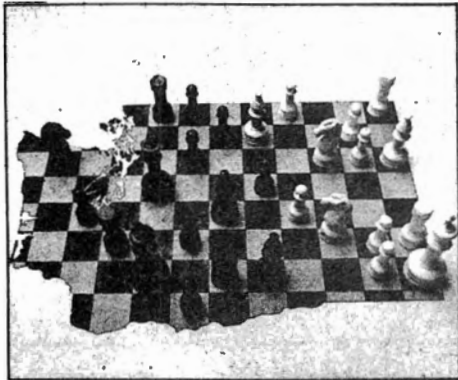

Having played it so much as Black myself, I knew where the points of risk were and what Black would be trying for. ...BK2 6 RK PQN4 7 BN3 00 Now come some lousy White moves! 8 PQ4? With 8 PB3, Black would get the Marshall Attack, which I wasn't ready for. ...PxP 9 NxP? NxN Oops! White has clumsily stumbled into the Noah's Ark trap. If 10 QxN PB4 and ...PB5. 10 PK5 NxB White is now two pieces down. I thought it was hopeless and didn't even see that both pieces could be recovered and White would only be a pawn down. 11 RPxN? 11 PxKN BxP 12 RPxN gets the piece back. ...NK.



21 QxB Black Resigned. From rags to riches in ten moves. Since this was the first game finished, morale on the rest of the team perked up and we won with two wins and three draws. Recent elections of officers were as follows:


