## From the WCF Tournament Coordinator

February is here, the month of the WA State Championship and Premier. This invitational event is the most prestigious of all WA State events. Every year, the highest rated chess players of the state who meet the residency (183 days in WA State) and the activity (3 USCF tmnts played in WA without withdrawal or default, completed in time to be included in the USCF Annual Rating List) are invited to participate. The event consists of two concurrent round-robins. The Championship section is made up of the seeded players who accept and the remainder of the ten spots is filled by the highest rated players in the state who qualify and accept. The same procedure is followed for the next highest rated players in the state to fill the Premier section. The Winner of the Championship Section claims the Title of WA State Champion, currently held by Senior Master Slava Mikhailuk. The winner of the Premier is seeded into the following year's Championship section.

These events are sponsored and organized by your WCF, with the site being contributed by the Oki Foundation. All rounds will be held at the Oki Foundation Meeting Center, 10838 Main St, Bellevue, WA, on the weekends of February 12-13 and 19-21. Round times will be 10:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. each day, except for the final round, which will be at 1:30 p.m. on Presidents' Day, Monday, February 21st. Spectators are welcome at all times during the five-day event. You are invited to experience some of the State's best chess playing!

Ideas with e4-e5 are becoming possible as ...dxe5 would allow d5-d6!, taking advantage of the pinned Black e-pawn.

This was my idea, as after 14.exf6 or 14.exd6, Black simply recaptures and White has two pieces hanging.

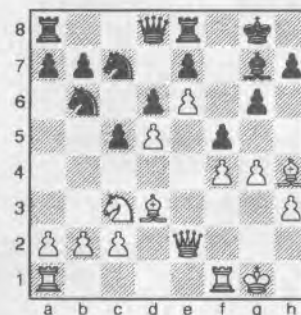

I'd anticipated having a "pleasant choice" between two moves: 14...fxg5 and 14...♗b6. However, on 14...fxg5 15.exd7 ♖xd7 16.f5! (this is what I'd missed on my 12th move), my weak light squares are cause for alarm.

Necessary. I'd wanted to play 15...♗bxd5 16.♗xd5 ♗xd5, but after 17.f5! (again!), my dark-squared Bishop is in some trouble.

At this point it was clear that I had achieved a "David Bragg Position" — a

position that looks completely dreadful, is, in fact, probably quite bad, but is also surprisingly resilient when put under inaccurate pressure. Considering Bragg's history of winning lost positions against Gale, I was quite optimistic about my chances.

many French specialists like. The process of shopping around for your chess mentor will therefore help you update and flesh out your repertoire.

Once you pick out one or two mentors, you'll see additional benefits. If you're afraid of facing a certain line, or are confused how to face it, see how your mentor deals with it. He's put a lot of effort into ensuring there are no chinks in his armor. Take his choice as a GM suggestion on how to deal with that line you're afraid of. Even without your own independent research, you've got a solution you can have confidence in.

Worried about keeping up with theory in your repertoire? Again, just see how your mentor deals with the latest wrinkles.

If books and magazines were your only previous source, playing over all your mentor's games from a tournament will be a real eye-opener. You'll see a lot of ugly wins, complete with blunders and cheapos. Your mentor is always tactically alert, looking for opportunities no matter what his position looks like. To beat your mentor, the opponent has to keep finding good moves, sidestepping many pitfalls.

Many of your mentor's victims won't know how to resign. This is often a good thing, because, in contrast to most games between GMs, you'll get to see some practical demonstrations of basic endings like R+P vs R.

The number of GM games readily available is overwhelming. By selecting one or two GM mentors, you automatically organize and filter those games into a resource you can use.

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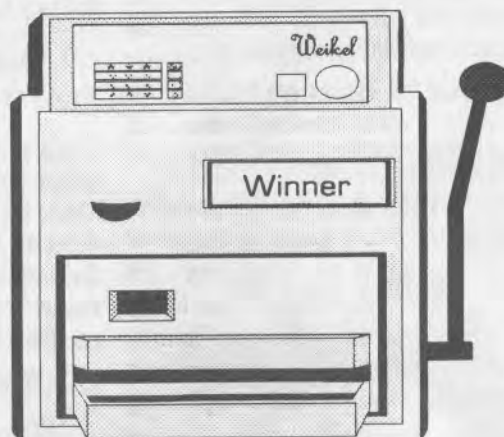
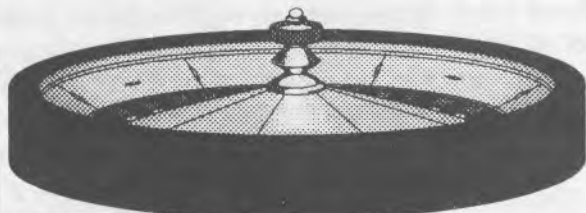

# Ferguson and MacGregor Tie in Lynnwood

Local chess players have a new tournament option that can't be beat—LWCF President Kent McNall's "Apropos" tournaments. These tournaments are sponsored by Kent and are held at his business, Apropos, near Alderwood Mall. There is no entry fee, generous prizes, and a tournament site that is quiet and spacious. The tournament is four rounds at the reasonable time control of 40/2 and SD/1.

The second such event was held in early December and drew a strong field including local Masters and experts such as Nat Koons, Curt Collyer, Mike MacGregor, Matt Fleury, Michael Oshiro, Clint Ballard and Eduard Shamilov. I had flashbacks to my childhood-playing days when I got my first look at local grade school star (and future state champion) Michael Lee who, despite having trouble reaching across the board to the eighth rank, turned in another strong performance and displayed a chess maturity far beyond his years.

As for me, I had few expectations for this tournament other than to enjoy the competition. I play very infrequently these days and my recent experience in the Seattle Chess Club Championship was most discouraging. But the Apropos brought out some positive chess and I tied for first with MacGregor with 3.5/4.

Even in years past, when I played chess seriously, winning tournaments invariably involved at least one game in which the advantage went back and forth. In this tournament, however, I managed to play all four games without ever standing worse. I don't recall ever having that experience before.

My last round game was against FIDE Master David Bragg. David had just tied for first in the Washington Class

one week earlier, so I knew he was in good form. The winner would tie MacGregor for first and I sat down prepared for a long, tough struggle. Surprisingly, the game was largely decided on move ten.

## Caro-Kann Fantasy

Until this tournament, I had never faced the Veresov. In my two games with Black, however, I faced it twice! In round two, Matt Fleury played it and we had a short draw, as I had no idea what I was doing. After the game, he suggested 2...c6 as a good response, if I didn't mind playing a Caro-Kann after 3.e4. I play the Caro, and decided to follow his advice. After the game, Bragg said he hadn't seen my Fleury game, so the two Veresovs in one tournament was apparently a strange coincidence.

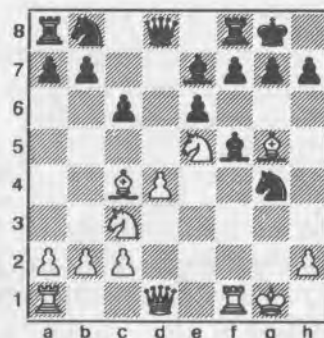
2...c6 3.e4 dxe4 4.f3

I've played the Caro-Kann dozens of times, but have never faced this variation; so I am back on unfamiliar territory. Frankly, in a must-win final round, I was pleased to see this.

During the opening, I was trying to decide whether to castle short or long. I concluded going kingside was best, but was now worried about 10.g4. I didn't particularly like 10...♙g6 11. ♘xg6 hxg6, exposing the h-file to an attack from White's heavy pieces. After a bit of analysis, however, I realized a tactic prevents 10.g4.

9...O-O 10.g4? ♘xg4!



Winning.

What else? Of course, if 12. ♘xg4 ♖g5 recovers the piece and Black's attack will net the point shortly.

Yes, Black is winning fairly easily. But, in such positions, it is important to remember that a Master is sitting on the other side of the board. I never underestimate the power of desperation. Consequently, I used plenty of time to find the best way to eliminate any hint of counterplay.

This seems better than the obvious 15...♘b6. After 16. ♙d3 ♙xd3 17.cxd3, White has some opportunity to cause problems along the open g-file and can swing his Knight into the attack via e4 and g5/f6. Unlikely? Sure. But the text prevents White from using the e4-square and also prepares to capitalize on the exposed White King.

16. ♖f2?

White's position is bad, but this offers no resistance. 16.b4 is forced to prolong the game. Now Black crashes through.

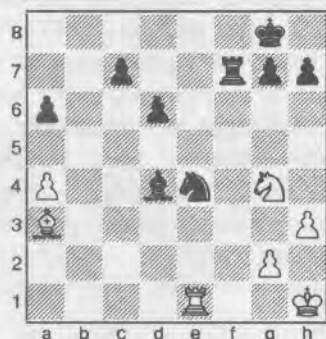

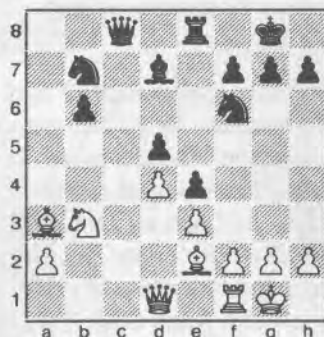

In round three, I was scheduled to play Mark Ryan. Mark and I had a good laugh. We haven't played since the Washington Junior Championships back in the early 1980's. Mark was off to a good start with a draw against Oshiro and a win against defending Apropos champ Clint Ballard. After 20 moves, we reached the following position. Mark had already offered a draw, and was soon to offer a second, but I was determined to play to the last pawn.

I felt I had a slight edge here, but wasn't sure I could convert the full point. My control of the a3-f8 diagonal is annoying for Black. His b7-Knight is inactive. But how to proceed? Patience is required, and I decided to place some more pressure on the b7-Knight.

25.♗a6

Black cannot move his Queen, b7-Knight or Bishop.

25...h6 26.h3

I did not make this decision lightly, as I worried about Black's Bishop eventually reaching f1. However, I felt that in the upcoming endgame I needed to prevent Black's Knight from bothering my kingside pawns with an eventual ...♘g4 after my King wanders over to the queenside.

26...♘h7

Black slowly untangles his pieces.

27.♗e7

I didn't like trading my powerful Queen for Black's passive Queen, but didn't see how else to make progress.

27...♗xe7 28.♗xe7 ♘g6 29.♘f1 ♘f5 30.♘e2 ♘e6 31.♗f8!

It is important to preserve this Bishop which cuts off the coordination of Black's pieces. Also, it ties down the Knight to the defense of the kingside pawns.

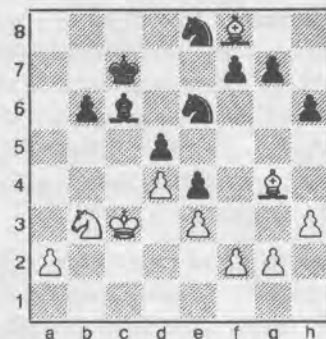

My plan is to bring my King to b4 where it will prevent the Black Bishop from popping out to b5 on its way to f1 to create counterplay.

Black should free his Knight via ...g7-g6 and ...h6-h5, followed by ...♘c7, ...♘d6, and eventually ...♗b5. Black tries a different plan to eject the Bishop, but it doesn't work as well.

Black falters at an important juncture. After I capture on e6, I have a new weakness to exploit, as well as the useful g6-square for my Knight to infiltrate. Also, Black no longer has the chance to try for counterplay with ideas like ...f5, ...g5 and ...f4. Necessary was 35...h5!

# Finding and Using a Chess Mentor

**F**ace a GM over the board and you'll probably think the cards are stacked against you. Maybe, but he's stronger than you despite a big advantage *you* have over him.

A GM's play and his games are an open book to anyone who wants to look. Pick any GM and you can download, for free, hundreds of games he's played. You can study in the afternoon games the GM played that morning.

So, you can prepare to play Kasparov more easily than he can prepare for you. Is that the big advantage I'm talking about? Hardly. Preparing against any particular GM has little practical value for most chess players.

The big advantage you have over GMs is that you can grab any GM you choose and turn him into your personal mentor. You don't need his permission and you don't need to pay him anything. He does most of the hard work. You steal as much of the benefit as you can.

Shopping for a chess mentor means looking at lots of chess games. If you're still trying to get by without a chess database program like ChessBase or the free Scid, here's another reason to take the plunge. A chess database program is virtually indispensable for browsing large numbers of games.

Finding the right chess mentor isn't quite as simple as checking near the top of the latest FIDE rating list. Most SuperGMs make poor choices as mentors. Too often, their play and preparation is geared towards playing other SuperGMs. Drawing as Black and unleashing opening innovations at move 25 as White might work great in SuperGM tournaments, but such preparation is not relevant to a weekend Swiss.

Start your search for a chess mentor by focusing on GMs who regularly play in open tournaments. They face both strong

and weak opponents, same as you and I do. They need to try to win every game, a good approach for all of us to emulate.

Give preference to chess mentors who have fairly narrow opening repertoires that they've remained faithful to for years. This is a great way to identify an aggressive repertoire that is absolutely rock solid.

Narrow the field of candidate mentors to those whose repertoires intersect yours. This is normally a multi-step process. Start by picking the opening at the heart of your current repertoire. Use your chess database to see which GMs specialize in that opening. Then see what else they play to find close matches to your repertoire.

Start playing over some recent games of your mentor candidates. Discard any candidates who play a lot of short draws or who play in a way that's contrary to the way you'd like to play.

Even before you find a promising mentor, you should see some benefits from the search process. You should start to notice how certain openings fit together logically in how they match up with the GMs' style. Modern GMs tends towards a universal style, playing whatever works, but some openings seem to fit together and some openings don't.

Consider, for example, the Grünfeld. Many aggressive, tactically oriented GMs play it regularly. Many aggressive, tactically oriented GMs play the French. However, hardly any GMs regularly play both the Grünfeld and the French. Consciously or unconsciously, most GMs have decided that those openings don't fit together.

There are many questions to consider to determine which openings fit together in a repertoire. Do the positions tend to be open or closed? Do they tend towards tactical or positional play? Do they require accepting positional weaknesses to get active play? It may be educational to try to answer all those questions for potential repertoire openings, but you don't have to. You can, instead, follow what your mentor candidates have decided. If you like the Grünfeld, take a look at the Sicilian, because that's what most Grünfeld specialists play. If you like the French, you may want to consider trying the Dutch, which

## Washington Chess Letter

February 1955

The Seattle Open Championship is set for March 20 and 27 at the Seattle CC. During the past two years this event was held as "a tourney within a tourney." The annual meeting of Washington Chess Federation will be held April 17 at Student Union Building at the U of W.

Round 7 results for the Puget Sound League play were reported. Kitsap with C. Magerkurth on 1<sup>st</sup> board beat West Seattle 7-3. Max Mage lost twice to Magerkurth. The Seattle CC, lead by Olaf Ulvestad, downed McNeil Island, 9.5-0.5. Ulvestad played four games in this match. The U of W, with G. Patterson on 1<sup>st</sup> board, downed the Tacoma CC, 5.5-4.5. Patterson drew with Vernon Holmes 1-1. The Latvians downed Olympia, 5.5-4.5. Elmars Zemgalis and Pupols, the top two boards, were 3-0 against Charles Joachim and Ken Day. In round 8, the U of W traveled to McNeil Island for a 5.5-4.5 victory. The Seattle YMCA beat the Seattle CC, 7.5-2.5. On 1<sup>st</sup> board William Bills and Ulvestad played two draws. Olympia topped West Seattle, 8-2. Charles Joachim took the measure of W. B. Cowan on 1<sup>st</sup> board 2-0. Kitsap came out on top against Tacoma, 5.5-4.5. R. Collins of Tacoma downed C. Magerkurth twice on 1<sup>st</sup> board. The U of W team leads the league at this point with a 7-0 match score.

Zemgalis won the 14-player 1955 Puget Sound Open, scoring 6.5 from seven. Hugh Noland was 2<sup>nd</sup> at 5-2. Ulvestad and Pupols shared 3<sup>rd</sup> at 4.5. Pupols had won the event in 1954. The entry fee for the event was \$10.00 and 1<sup>st</sup> prize was \$100.00.

State Champion William Bills won a 9-player speed event at the Seattle CC. Leon Svensson downed Gordon Cornelius 1.5-.5 to win the Spokane City Championship. This was a playoff, as they had tied in the regular tournament.

The "Chess in Review" reports Paul Keres and Vassily Smyslov as winners of annual Hastings Congress. The top three in the US Championship were Sammy Reshevsky, Larry Evans, and Art Bisguier. In Montana, Gerald Moore and John Barto tied for 1<sup>st</sup> place. The Vancouver (BC) City Championship was won by Eugene Butkov 7.5-1.5 and 2<sup>nd</sup> place went to M. Zursevskie. The Tennessee Open drew 24 players and Norman Whitaker won.

# Scholastic Checkup with Dr. Leo

**Could you please discuss student learning and training gained from participation in a simultaneous chess exhibition?**

**S**imultaneous play provides an opportunity for students to compete against highly-trained and practiced chess Masters. Students, by participating in a simultaneous exhibition, can experience competition against a dedicated opponent, while also seeing a range of relatively sophisticated chess ideas put into play. Students should seek to play their very best against the master exhibitor by using their best opening preparation and by playing with discipline, undivided attention and with a ferocious will to win.

A chess Master engages a group of players each playing their own game against the Master. The master moves from board to board (and therefore from game to game) in consecutive fashion: making a single move at each board before moving to the next. Each player has the resultant time for his move that it takes the master to circumnavigate the entire collection of games in progress while thinking about and making a move at each. If the Master takes 15 seconds at each board, on average, and there are 20 boards being played, then it will take the Master  $20/4 = 5$  minutes to return to his or her starting point.

This time advantage, per player, is the compensation that participants enjoy as they seek to counterbalance the Master's skill and experience. Each player should seek to think and concentrate for the full time period during which the master is away from their board. A simultaneous exhibition is a contest of relative concentration and discipline between the Master and the players.

Students who focus on their own games, who interrogate their own positions, and who act to seek out and find all checks, captures and threats will do well in such an exhibition. It is easy to become distracted and to attend to other boards and to your neighbors' positions (which almost always seem more interesting than your own!). A discipline of heart and mind is required to keep to the task at hand and to maximize the imagination and visualization process when it is the player's turn to move.

The student should never immediately and finally decide on his own next move as soon as the Master makes a move and leaves the board to go down the line. Instead, the student is advised to be patient and to go through the full mental checklist of steps which the student would use, say, in the play of a tournament game. Simultaneous play is unrated, but provides a student the chance to practice tournament-level attention and concentration with a team purpose in mind.

Each player should view themselves as a member of a team whose objective is to win a single game against the Master. To do this means maximizing the time the Master needs to spend thinking about his move against you! If you, as a participant, can make the Master spend just 5 more seconds at your board, then you have created an additional time for your teammates to concentrate on their positions. In a 20-board simultaneous, this is more than a minute-and-a-half additional thinking time ( $5 \times 20 = 100$  seconds), collectively, for your compatriots to use in finding the winning moves, solving the chess tactics, or seeing the defenses needed to save their games.

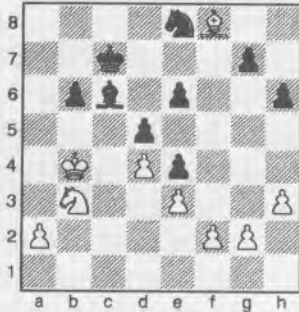
The procedures for each simultaneous exhibition differ. Before play begins, determine which, if any, of the following procedures are in place. Usually the Master takes White on all boards, but this may be made optional, especially in a scholastic simultaneous where all of the participants are students. Usually, the touch-move rule is in force, except that the Master can 're-play' his move at your board as long as he has not made a move at the next board. Usually, each player will be given a certain number of passes, per game, to permit an additional circumnavigation of boards by the Master before the player is required to make his move. Use these passes wisely and sparingly: they give you additional time to consider your most important moves. Use these passes when a critical moment has arisen on either offense or defense. And try to retain one final pass for future use in the game, should it be needed.

When the Master is away from your board, do not give or solicit advice: this will just confuse you and other players. Keep your hands to yourself, do not move the pieces, and concentrate fully on the decision-making now at hand — figuring out your next move! Do not wait until the Master is approaching your board to begin the seeing, thinking and deliberation process. Rather, see and think during all the time the Master is away at other boards, and then begin to finalize your decision as the Master approaches your board. Move only when the Master steps in front of your board and can see the move which you have chosen to execute.

Play in a simultaneous exhibition is an exercise in time management. The Master seeks to move as quickly as possible at each board, so as to allow the players less time to consider their moves. Your intention should be to set early and significant problems for the Master: make the Master take time while at your board! Slow the Master down! Give the Master something to think about! Even if you are not ultimately benefitted with a draw or a win, you have contributed to your fellow players' efforts! You may have given another player, perhaps 10 boards down the line, those few additional needed seconds to visualize the check or capture in a winning variation! Stand united with your fellow participants!

Naturally, Dr. Leo advises players to record their games! Dr. Leo remembers well his first encounter with a Grandmaster! GM Kavalek was kind enough to come to the Seattle Chess Club many years ago and it was against this living legend that Dr. Leo first saw the maturity, dedication and professionalism of a Grandmaster at work. Even though Dr. Leo lost his game against GM Kavalek, your chances are very good to win or draw! Believe in yourself and be confident that it is moves and ideas that matter over the chessboard — not titles nor ratings. And be aware of the tide of recent history: students from around Puget Sound have now defeated International Masters and Grandmasters in every simultaneous exhibition held here this century!

Dr. Leo congratulates all students who choose to demonstrate the courage of their convictions in simultaneous play against Master exhibitors. Congratulations to the students who have won or drawn games and also to all of the students who supported them by slowing down and tiring out the Master by the problems they set. Dr. Leo suggests that the motto of all simultaneous participants should be "All for one and one for all!"
