

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Franett Memorial Northwest Grand Prix

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ne of the biggest tournaments on the Grand Prix schedule has been added to the standings. The Washington Open had a guaranteed prize fund of \$8,000, giving it a multiplier of five. This has resulted in some noticeable changes in the standings. The June rating supplement has also moved some leaders up a class. Nearing the half-way mark, we are on pace to meet or exceed last year's results in players active, total entries and entries per event.

Looking at the schedule, there are many opportunities to add to your point totals over the summer with local events in Seattle, Spokane, Portland and Tacoma, with single or double points available. The summer closes with the traditional Labor Day event, the Oregon Open, which should have a 3 or 4 multiplier. Make plans, get points, and move up in the standings. Most classes and state overall are still wide open. And if your town doesn't have any FMNGP events on the schedule, start one!

Serper, Orlov, and Perez Tie Atop 168-Player Washington Open

The story of the 2006 Washington Open began last year at the close of the previous WA Open in Lynnwood. Perhaps the small increase in attendance was due to the larger-than-usual prize fund and the special door prize of a tablet computer, and the presence of two Grandmasters in the field that year. Nevertheless, the increase did not warrant adopting the same format in 2006, especially as the membership numbers of the WCF have stayed more or less constant over the past year. This year, we were going to present an attractive prize fund, but one that would not require the financial support of \$6,000 or more from the WCF President, Kent McNall, as the previous one had. And we arrived at the \$8,000 guaranteed prize figure that we thought we could support.

Where to hold it? Most of you know the usual places to investigate. Downtown Seattle: Extremely expensive when the space is available. The airport area: Parking is limited . . . and heavily competed for. What about Bellevue? We were reaching for an attendance number that seemed to be at, or beyond the capacity of the Red Lion Inn that we have used previously. The Lynnwood Convention Center was unavailable on Memorial Day weekend. The Bellevue Convention Center, also used previously, was close to reasonably priced, but had an incompatible event, a concert, already booked. This tournament

coordinator was running around at the very end of January, and in early February, doing extra work trying to make sure that the State Championship had a place to be held when the Seattle Chess Club changed its plan about holding a weekend of the tourney at its site. Fortunately, I was able to use the services of the Seattle-King County Convention and Visitors Bureau to lighten my tasks, and through it I was able to get some bids from hotels interested in serving us. The officers did think that there was great potential in the Everett site, which gave us the ability to combine a chess event for juniors, the Washington Open Scholastic tournament, with the Washington Open, mainly for adults, but with a large and growing participation of juniors as well, and we could aim for getting a larger attendance. By the way, there should be a report, elsewhere in this issue, on the Scholastic event that was organized and directed by David Hendricks, WCF Scholastics Coordinator.

Our goal was 200 or more players in the Open and we did pretty well: 168 distinct, paid individuals. The players were fairly equally distributed among the four sections that had been created. That, I think, was fairly unusual, but it also was

Next year, no matter where it is held, we need the players to believe that the WCF has a track record of doing its best to present a tourney that offers chess in some great surroundings, and to urge their friends to come and support the WCF by playing in the event and staying in the hotel for at least one night if it makes any sense at all for them. We need the support of BC players, as well as Oregon players. Keep this in mind: For 2007, we have tendered the possibility of a unique presenta-

tion of the event simultaneously held in Spokane as well as in the Puget Sound region. The former could also draw some Idahoans. Ask the new WCF President how he will make that happen, and then support him.

I could go on about the little details, but let's say that we are very fortunate that Robert Giffords, a NTD, is now residing in our state, in Gig Harbor. He has extensive experience with organizing and directing large scholastic tournaments. This was gained while living in Idaho and Arizona. He agreed to direct this event for us, and he brought also a very capable friend and TD, Dan Gregson, of Covington, WA. We had about 55 players register in person on Saturday, and we mostly staved on track with our schedule, but with introductions and making sure that we had covered the details, we started smoothly, albeit a little late at about 11:25AM. The rest of the tourney went as scheduled, with one exception, the Blitz tourney. More about it later.

Most participants will agree we had a marvelous facility, and if you weren't there, you really missed out on having a great place to play in, and to analyze in. The skittles rooms were ample and very comfortable. We did not have any vendors present, except for the wonderful initiative of Siva Narayanan who led us to obtain T-shirts with the logo: Washington Open & Chess Festival 2006. There still may be a few available through the WCF if you are interested.

The big moments of the tourney that I can recall were the upset of Nick Raptis by Corbin Yu in the fifth round and smaller nicks, i.e., draws, on GM Gregory Serper by Paul Bartron and David Rupel. The biggest battle was the sixth round match between Serper and IM Georgi Orlov. GM Serper has provided some notes on his victory in this game elsewhere in the article. Also interesting was the game between NM Nat Koons and Orlov, which is among the games included in this report. Notable but not included here was the sixth round game between Michael Lee and Nick Raptis. An upset was surely in the making, only to become a brilliant swindle by Nick.

May I recommend that we continue to have side events in our large events for those players who want even more chess activity, and so that we provide another way to attract new players, as well as bring former ones into our midst. This year, there was not much of a groundswell for the novice tourney, and it was eventually deleted from the schedule. The Fischer Random Chess or Chess960 tourney was designed after the other side events had largely taken the best schedule times, and the hours available for Chess960 were hard for the players to comply with. So there were forfeits in the third round, scheduled for the unchessic time of 8:30 on Sunday morning. The winner was Joshua Sinanan, who was undefeated in four games. He won \$60 and a ticket of participation in both the Fi-Net Open and the Ordix Open in Mainz, Germany, to be held at the Mainz Chessic Classic August 15-20, 2006. All he has to do is get there. Games from the Chess 960 tourney are also included with this report (see p. 15).

The Bughouse under 3000 Championship was held on Saturday, about 90 minutes after the close of the Scholastic event. I did not understand the fine art of this kind of event, and I thought that the main participants would be scholastic players and I sought to encourage them, and dissuade the higher rated players whom I thought would want to focus on

their games in the Open that were scheduled at the same time, unless a player was planning for the two-day schedule, but corrections to such a program will have to be made next year with some of the experience gained here. The winner of the six-round tourney was the team of Eric Hufnagel and James Mulligan. Nine teams participated.

The Blitz events were were in two sections. Eventually we had 13 players for the U1700. Although we had some problems getting started, with the assistance of Murlin Varner and his skill with using pairing cards the old fashioned way. this six-round event finished a little before midnight on Saturday. The winners were Alex Glass and Alec Ho. The Open Blitz was also designed to be a six-round swiss, but with two divisions. Then the division champs were to play a doubleround match on Saturday for the Open Blitz Championship. I had patterned this after the 2006 US Closed Championship, and I was looking forward to presenting to all who were interested in Blitz chess a real spectacle in between the fifth and sixth rounds of the main tourney. It did not turn out exactly as planned, but I recommend that the format be considered for next year with some modification to make it go better, and much more smoothly. There were 18 players who participated, but originally we had 21. The scheduled starting time of 9:30 p.m. was too early for many of the Open players. This made

found that there was a two-way tie in each section, and the players involved wished to settle the title of 2006 WA Open Blitz Champion by means of a double round-robin, even if it might impact their readiness for the sixth round of the Open. They wanted to play what was likely to be one hour of intense Blitz chess. This final event began at 2:00 p.m. on Monday in one of the side rooms packed with many spectators. The players were Nick Raptis, Ignacio Perez, Nat Koons, and David Rupel. That is the order in which they finished. In fact, Ignacio

and Nat had to have another playoff to resolve their tie. The guys love their Blitz..

The WCF's annual general membership meeting began around 3:15 PM on Sunday, between the third and fourth rounds of the Open. It was not well attended at first, and the apathy that this seemed to portray was cited during part of the meeting as a big and ongoing problem for the WCF. Although it may be a problem, there was a context for it, because the setting thus created seemed to be like a Western movie plot with, at the appropriate moment, a posse of members coming into the meeting to sweep Geoffrey Gale into office as the new President of the WCF, replacing Kent McNall, who after two years at the helm was not seeking re-election. - The general level of organization was very good (means the WCF does care about this tournament!);

- My results get worse the further the tournament gets.

Judge for yourself:

WA Open 2001. Microsoft (walking distance from my place) 5.5/6 and 1st place

WA Open 2004. The Red Lion in Bellevue (15 minutes drive from my place). Still 1st place, but the score is only 5/6.

WA Open 2005, Lynwood (30 minutes of drive from my place). 4.5/6, tie for 3rd place

WA Open 2006. Everett (50 minutes drive from my place). 5/6, tie for 1st. I guess this is the exception that proves the rule (I could never understand this saying!).

So, it is fair to assume that the next WA Open will take place somewhere in Tacoma and my result will be around four out of six. Fortunately, I've realized that I have such a pattern. Therefore, I'd be wise to skip next year's tournament, if it gets further away from my place and just wait out till the cycle starts again somewhere close to my place!

Ok, now lets get back to the game.



And here I got the explanation of 9.e4 - Georgi offered me a draw. Since it was the last round game and a draw would clinch victory in the tournament, Orlov's decision is quite understandable. He wants just to trade the pieces off the board and reach a quiet position. Still, such a strategy can easily backfire, as has been shown in many similar situations. It is recommended to play your regular chess instead and forget about the draw for a while. Well, I used this advice in the decisive game of my knockout match with late Lev Polugaevsky. All I needed was to make a draw with the White pieces in the last game to win the match. I played some very complicated stuff and . . . lost anyway. Then, in the tiebreaker, when I didn't have the above-mentioned psychological burden, I managed to win the match but that's a whole 'nother story.



The last two moves had the goal of creating a target on the queenside (the b3pawn) and then attacking it with my Rook pawn. It is easy to see that Black's position is already preferable, as he has a clear plan and White has no real counterplay. 18. @f1!

Georgi gets full credit for this strong defensive move. It is counterintuitive to move the Bishop back from the major diagonal, but White's plan is very logical: he needs counterplay: that's why, after Black plays ... a5-a4, White will respond with bxa4, opening the b-file for

Corbin Yu Wins First OSCF Championship

The Oregon Scholastic Chess Federation State Championship was held on April 1, 2006 at the fairgrounds in Salem, Oregon. 176 of the best scholastic chess players in the state attended the event from grades K-12.

Varsity Division Champions

Grand Champion, 16-year-old Corbin Yu of Lake Oswego received a \$1,000 savings bond. Corbin had a perfect score of four points out of four games in the Open Division of the Varsity Section. A significant accomplishment since, with a rating of 1813, Corbin went up against players who were older and rated significantly higher.

In an exciting blitz playoff for first place, 15-year-old Marcus Robinson of Portland was declared Class B Champion and awarded a \$250 savings bond. The Class C Champion, and also a recipient of a \$250 savings bond, was 16-year-old David Breckenridge with a score of 3.5 out of four. The Class D Champion and recipient of a \$250 savings bond was 11year-old, Justin Hooker of Eugene who had a perfect score of 4.0.

Tournament Summary:

Players spent the day playing chess in either 4- or 5-round divisions. A total of \$1,750 in scholarships in the form of savings bonds were given to the top finishers in the Varsity Division. Over 100 trophies were awarded, along with gold stars and pins for courage, good sportsmanship and great attitude.

A giant chess set was available between rounds for families, friends and chess players.

Twelve members of the Society for Creative Anachronism (SCA) from the kingdom of An Tir attended the event. The SCA is an international organization dedicated to researching and re-creating

> the arts and skills of pre-17th-century Europe. The Salem chapter, An Tir, (dressed in costumes from the middle ages) brought chess sets from that time period, held sword fighting demonstrations and even allowed some of the chess players to do battle with a real live knight! Families enjoyed learning more

The night before the state championship, a bughouse tournament was held in the conference room of the Shilo Inn in Salem. 40 players matched up in teams of two players each. Teams then fought head-to-head in a wild and crazy speed chess variation where pieces can be passed back and forth and placed on the board. Players are encouraged to talk and give advice to each other. It was wild, it was crazy, and a whole lot of fun! Trophies with giant wasps on them were given to the 1st and 2nd place winners in each section.
