# **Bellingham Open**

n April 22, Western Washington University (WWU) and the Washington Chess Federation (WCF) teamed up to co-host the inaugural Bellingham Open in the spacious multi-purpose room of the Viking Union Building of the WWU campus.

Participants and spectators were treated to an amazing view of Bellingham Bay from the playing room, which easily accommodated the 86 players taking part. Chess players from throughout the Pacific Northwest were represented in the twosection, G/30;+10 five-round Swiss from cities including Bellingham, Tacoma, Lynden, Seattle, Custer, Renton, Lake Stevens, Kenmore, Ferndale, Lakewood, Sammamish, Kirkland, Bothell, Portland, Shoreline, Snohomish, Eagle River (Alaska), Anacortes, Blaine, Redmond, Burlington, Lynnwood, Olympia, Fall City, Mount Vernon, and Oak Harbor. The tournament was co-organized by Western Washington University Chess Club President Harrison Toppen-Ryan and Washington Chess Federation President Josh Sinanan, who also served as TD. The field was split evenly between two sections, with 39 players in the Open and 47 in the Reserve U1700.

Abrief awards ceremony immediately following the last round concluded the day-long chess fest, which featured an intense schedule of five games in one day, each spaced about an hour and half apart with a short break for lunch between rounds two and three.

Alex Kaelin of Mercer Island, a strong 22-year-old Class A player and Seattle Chess Club regular, emerged victorious in the Open section with an impressive five points from five games to be crowned the first ever Bellingham Open Champion! Along the way, Kaelin scored key victories

against Blaine's Carson Roesch (1782), Anacortes' Michael McGrath (1813), and Redmond's Harishkumar Karthikeyan (1811). Congratulations Alex!

A quintuplet of chess kings shared =second/third/U2000/U1800 honors a full-point back with four points each: Harrison Toppen-Ryan of Kirkland, Miles Kuipers of Bellevue, Harishkumar Karthikeyan of Redmond, Sam Maurer of Bellevue, and AFM Sridhar Seshadri of Bothell. The Best Female Player prize was awarded to Deeksha Shankaranand, who achieved a tournament performance rating (TPR) of 1440. The Best Dressed Player in the Open section, as judged by the Bellingham Open organizers, was local stud William Watts of Bellingham.

Jeremy Roesch of Blaine was awarded the prize for the biggest upset win by virtue of his astounding first-round 590-point upset victory!

Ignatius Frost of Sehome and Thrinay Subramanian of Bellevue topped the Reserve U1700 section, each with a perfect five points from five games. Frost won a dramatic fifth round-game on time due to an unfortunate mishitting of the clock by his opponent that caused him to lose on time in a superior position! Subramanian's first round opponent was a no-show, which meant that he only needed to win four games to keep pace with Frost. Subramanian proved to be up to the task, as he won against top seed Bert Rutgers (1656) and against the unpredictable Ethan Temple (unrated) in third and fifth rounds, respectively.

Five players shared =third/U1600/U1400/U1200/U1000 honors a full-point back with four points apiece: Ethan Bosch of Lynden, Owen Scollon of Bellingham, Judah Taitano of Burlington, Alexander Blue-Day of Tacoma, and Braeden Travaglio of Lynnwood. Newcomer Ethan Temple of Bellingham earned the Unrated prize with an impressive 3.5 points. The biggest upset victory was achieved by Hunter Hoye (727 points) from Seattle. Sofia Brown of Custer won the Best Female Player prize with a TPR of 1138.





The classiest, best dressed player of the Reserve section was Judson Moore, who graciously donated his prize winnings back to the organizers. A total of 13 WWU students played in the tournament and received free entry into the competition, as the tournament offered free entry for all Western students.

Congratulations to the winners, and many thanks to all who contributed to this fantastic event. We look forward to hosting more events in Bellingham in the years to come!

# Closed But Not Forgotten

he following game from the Idaho Closed State Championship was submitted for the April issue. It could have made it in had the submission not gotten routed to my SPAM folder without me even seeing it; I didn't discover this until the day after the issue went to print. — Editor.

# Josh Price (1857) – Eric Hon (2109) [A58]

Idaho Closed State Championship Boise, ID (R3), February 19, 2023 [Josh Price]

### 1.d4 Nf6 2.c4 c5 3.d5 b5

A Benoni; I expected this and was quite confident in my preparation.

### 4.cxb5 a6 5.bxa6 g6 6.Nc3 Bg7 7.a7

This is a great move to misplace his rook.

# 7...Rxa7 8.e4 0-0 9.Nf3 Oa5?

This was the first move I wasn't expecting. I expected the mainline 9...d6 10.Be2 Ba6 11.0-0.

#### 10.Bd2

In some scenarios Bd2 isn't good in the Benoni because of ...Qb4, hitting b2 and

my pawn on e4. However, in this variation it doesn't work, and I gain two tempos.

### 10...Qb4?! 11.a3

And because of my move 7.a7 the rook isn't defending his knight on b8!

# 11...Qb6

11...Qxb2 12.Rb1 which would allow me to win the knight.

### 12.Oc2

And as you can see, I get

Bd2, a3 and Qc2 while he only got his queen to b6! This gives me a large lead in development and improvement in the position.

### 12...d6 13.Nb5

Another tempo-gaining move allowed by my move 7.a7.

### 13...Ra8 14.a4 Ba6 15.Ra3

This is a common move in the Benoni, allowing me to comfortably move my b-pawn, not having to worry about Black's dark-squared bishop.

### 15...Nbd7 16.Bc3 Rfc8

Black's idea is a common one, to sacrifice a second pawn with ...c4! so that he can plop a knight on c5 with activity.

### 17.Nd2!?

Although Nd2 is good, I shouldn't have allowed ...c4 to happen at all; I needed to play Bc4 and castle ASAP!

## 17...c4 18.Nxc4 Qb8 19.Na5?

I was actually very confident with my move Na5, and was happy with my position, but I underestimated the following combination.

### 19...Bxb5 20.axb5 Rxa5

Taking advantage of my pinned bishop

### 21.Rxa5 Nxe4

This is the move I missed in my calculation. I am still in a good position, but there are tactics with Qxe4.

### 22.Ra3

I decided I needed to defend my bishop with Ra3 and avoid complications.

22.Qxe4 Rxc3 23.bxc3 Bxc3+

## 22...Nxc3 23.bxc3



Position after 23.bxc3

### 23...Ob7

In this position, although I am up two pawns, his knight on d7 is very good, and my pawns are very weak. Also, we can't forget! The position opened up, and I haven't castled yet! 23...Qc7 24.c4 Qc5 25.Rb3 Qxd5 26.cxd5 Rxc2 27.Be2 Nc5

### 24.Od2?

This was my first major mistake in this game, in my opinion. Allowing the exchange sacrifice wasn't great either, but this made things worse for me. I should have given up a pawn immediately and developed! 24.Be2 Qxd5 25.0-0

### 24...Nb6?

24...Ra8!

# 25.c4

Another weak move by me, desperate really. I calculated so much with ...Nxc4, I somehow forgot about the simple ...Rxc4!

# 25...Rxc4 [0.88/0]

25...Nxc4 26.Bxc4 Rxc4 27.0-0 Rc5 (27...Rd4 28.Qa5! and this would be crushing) 28.b6 Rxd5 (28...Qxd5 29.Qxd5 Rxd5 30.Ra8+ Bf8 31.b7) 29.Ra7. I calculated this line, and decided that it was completely winning.



# 26.Bxc4 Nxc4 27.Qd3 Nxa3 28.Qxa3 Qxb5 29.Qa8+ Bf8 30.Qa2



Position after 30.Qa2

With regret, I offered my opponent a draw in this position. I knew I wasn't worse, and wasn't happy with a draw because I was winning a fair amount of the game. However, I knew winning chances were slim for me here. Especially because I cannot castle. However, he declines.

## 30...h5 31.h4 Bg7 32.Rh3

Needing to stop the large threat of Bc3 and developing my rook of course.

# 32...Qb4+ 33.Kf1 Bf6 34.Qb3

After some calculation I wasn't worried about a queen trade and losing a second pawn. The rook can hold it's own in this endgame, and the bishop and king are clunky with my strong pawn on d5.

## 34...Qd4

34...Qxb3 35.Rxb3 Bxh4

# 35.g3 Qe4 36.f3 Qd4 37.Rh2 Qa1+38.Kg2 Qe1 39.Qd3 Be5 40.f4 Bf6 41.Rh1 Qa5

Now I have solidified my position, it is finally comfortable. However, there isn't a clean way for me to break through. Still a drawish position.

# 42.f5 Kg7 43.Rf1 Qb4 44.Rf4 Qb2+ 45.Rf2 Qe5 46.fxg6 fxg6

I keep trying to push.

## 47.Re2 Of5

Here he offers the queen trade, and I took it knowing I have nothing to lose. But also know that if he shuffles his king from f7—

g7 over and over I cannot break through.

### 48.Oxf5 gxf5



Position after 48...gxf5

# 49.Kf3?

I missed a chance to play Re6 which would have been winning by zugzwang eventually. 49.Re6 Kf7 50.Kf3 Be5 51.Rh6 I missed that he could not stop Kf4 AND prevent Rh6.

# 49...Be5 50.Ra2 Kf6 51.Ra8 Bc3??



Position after 51...Bc3

After this move he allows Rh8! which will win me one of his pawns! I guess he wanted to push for a win.

### 52.Rc8 Bb2 53.Rh8 Ke5!?

53...Kg6 54.Rg8+ Bg7 (54...Kf7 55.Rg5! winning one of the pawns at the least.) 55.Kf4 Kf7 56.Rxg7+!

# 54.Rxh5 Kxd5 55.Rxf5+ e5 56.g4

But this position is too strong for me; the rook is too good in the endgame.

# 56...Ke6 57.Rf8 d5 58.Rb8 e4+ 59.Ke3 Bc3 60.Rb3 Be1 61.h5 Bh4 62.Kf4 Bf2 63.h6 Kf7 64.Rb7+ Kg8 65.Rd7 e3 66.Kf3

I wasn't happy with the mistakes I made throwing away my great opening position. However, he kept pushing, and instead of a draw I got a win. I was never worse in this game, but should have been a cleaner win. GGs

A phenomenal crowd of 280 scholastic chess players in grades K-12 took part in the event from throughout the Pacific Northwest, including the cities of Bothell, Sammamish, Woodinville, Redmond, Mill Creek, Duvall, Olympia, Snoqualmie, Bellevue, Kirkland, Seattle, Renton, Lakewood, Issaquah, Snohomish, Kalama, Camas, Monroe, Medina, Clyde Hill, Edmonds, Auburn, Bellingham, Mercer Island, Vancouver (Washington), Gig Harbor, Ridgefield, Puyallup, Fall City, and Ravensdale!

# Washington Girls Championship

Washington Girls 2023 Championship took place at the Orlov Chess Academy in Redmond on April 8-9. Female chess warriors from throughout Washington State were represented in the 23-player field, including the cities of Bothell, Redmond, Richland, Kirkland, Sammamish, Bellevue, Vashon, and Issaquah. The event was hosted by the Washington Chess Federation and organized by President Josh Sinanan. WCF Scholastic Director Rekha Sagar ran the tournament with assistance from WCF Member-at-Large Ani Barua. The fiveround Swiss tournament featured an even mix of ten players in the Championship section and 13 in the Reserve U1400 section.

Lily Deng, a freshman from Hanford High School in Richland, won clear first place in the Championship section with a commanding 4.5/5 score, allowing only a single draw against runner up Varnika Jammalamadaka. Lily has been Eastern Washington's strongest female player for several years now, and she regularly makes the hours-long drive to Western Washington in search of the strongest competition. Along the way, Lily scored wins against her nearest rivals Iris Zhang (1714) and Shuyi Han (1635), resulting in a solid 25-point US Chess rating gain. For her victory, Lily receives the title of 2023 Washington State Girls Champion and a \$750 travel stipend from the WCF to attend the 2023 Haring National Girls Tournament of Champions, taking place concurrently with the US Open in early August in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Congratulations Lily!

Varnika Jammalamadaka, an eighth grader from the Overlake School in Redmond, earned second place honors with an undefeated four points, drawing with Deng and young up-and-comer Kate Wong. Timberline Middle School eighth grader Iris Zhang finished in third place with a solid "plus one" score of three points from five games. A quadruplet of chess queens shared fourth place honors with an even 2.5 points: Shuyi Han of Bellevue, Kate Wong of Redmond, Aashi Mathur of Sammamish, and Deeksha Shankaranand of Redmond. Deeksha also claimed the best upset win prize with her 322-point upset victory in the first round.

In the reserve U1400 section, Kseniya Fedorova of Sammamish and Kaavya Lakshminarayanan of Bellevue dominated the field win impressive 4.5 scores from five rounds, each winning four games and drawing against each other in the penultimate round. Five players shared third/fourth place honors a point-and-a-half back with three points apiece: Anika Kulkarni of Redmond, Hana Mullen of Vashon, Ananya Sabarish of Redmond, Kriti Alamuru of Bothell, and Rebecca Li of Kirkland. Kriti was also awarded the best upset-win prize for her second-round 230-point upset win against Kulkarni. Congratulations to the winners and many thanks to all who contributed to this fun event.

# Aashi Mathur (1364) – Deeksha Shankharanand (1313) [C54]

### 17.Nb3 b6 18.Nh2

We do get this opportunity again to play a3. 18.a3 Ba5 following the same plan.

### 18...f5??

This move is an obvious blunder. Black traps their own bishop which is defending the c6–knight as well.

#### 19.e6!

A great move which traps the bishop and threatens to win the c6–knight as well.

# Washington Senior Championship

2023 Washington Senior Championship took place at the Orlov Chess Academy in Redmond over Tax Day weekend April 15-17. As luck would have it, many of the senior championship players are either fully or semi-retired, so their tax returns are not too complicated! Veteran chess warriors from throughout Washington State were represented in the respectable 13-player field, from locales including Tacoma, Anacortes, Brier, Bellevue, Olympia, Seattle, Portland, Mineral, Federal Way, Kent, and Edmonds! The event was hosted by the Washington Chess Federation and organized by President Josh Sinanan. WCF Member-at-Large Ani Barua, in his inaugural event as chief TD, directed the five-round tournament over the course of two-and-a-half days.

Leonid Gavrysh, the Ukranian chess wizard now living in Brier, emerged victorious with an undefeated four points from five games, allowing only two draws against Larson and Levine in rounds three and respectively. Leonid's FIDE rating peaked at 2237 in 2014 before he moved to the Pacific Northwest. Leonid is a regular player at the Seattle chess club in Greenlake and is equally adept at classical, rapid,

and blitz chess, though these days he often opts for the faster time controls. For his victory, Leonid receives the title of 2023 Washington State Senior Champion and a \$750 travel stipend from the WCF to attend the 2023 Irwin National Tournament of Senior State Champions,

which is held concurrently with the US Open in early August in Grand

Rapids, Michigan. Congratulations Leonid!

Three Seattleites, National Master David Levine, US Chess Expert Gerald Larson, and Women's Candidate Master Mary Kuhner shared second-place honors a half-point back. Portland's Phil Long made the trip up from Oregon just for





this event, and it was well worth it, as he captured the U1700 prize with 2.5 points. "Uncle" Henry Louie, originally from Sitka (Alaska) but now living in Mineral (Washington), won the U1400 prize with half a point. The State Scholastic Championship is also a qualifying tournament where Idaho selects the Rockefeller, Barber, and Denker representatives that get to compete at a higher-level nationally with other state representatives. Because of this our state champions are for grade level with our overall State Champion selected the following day in a tournament hosting the top three players in each of the sections—elementary, middle school, and high school.

It was clear that organizers were not prepared for the numbers of on-site registrants so we would always like to emphasize pre-registration is important to start events on time. The first round for the elementary section started nearly 45 minutes late! Most people were patient, however, because that is one of the pre-requisites of chess... patience! Nevertheless, tournaments got back on track and the event was over when it was planned to end...in the end.

Each round included raffle prizes: chess clocks, executive chess kits, and hardcover score booklets. Seniors that are graduating this year were also presented with varsity letter pins just before the high schoolers began their last round. The elementary and middle school sections were G/30;d5 and the High School sections started at G/30;d5 and then switched to G/60;d5 for rounds 3-5.

The State Scholastic Championship has become a prestigious scholastic event as players must work to qualify for the honor to compete here. Players could qualify by placing in the top three of their



grade in regional tournaments or play in two or more regular ICA events that include all ages and abilities. In this way, players become more able to understand the nuances of tournament chess without the intimidation of being a first-time player at State.

he 2023 Washington State Elementary Chess Championships (WSECC) were held at the Greater Tacoma Convention Center on Saturday, April 29. This year's event grew by over 500 players from 2022, which marked the return to state hosted over-the-board after occurring two years online due to the pandemic.

The event kicked off on Friday evening with two fun side-events, a bughouse tournament and puzzle solving competition hosted at a nearby hotel!

On Saturday, everything then moved to the Greater Tacoma Convention Center, which housed the entire event, with chess happening on all three levels of the enormous facility. The two-day Middle School Open players continued with one more day on Sunday, with their final two rounds hosted just across the street from the convention center at a nearby hotel.

Based on the latest guidelines from the CDC and State and Local health departments for large gatherings, face masks were now optional for all participants and attendees, with

many still choosing to wear a mask for extra protection. Thanks to a booming scholastic chess season and a last minute surge of entries over the last two weeks, this year's State attracted 1219 players competing in the five-round Swiss tournament across 14 sections parsed by grade level and rating: Kindergarten, First Grade, Second Grade, Third Grade, Fourth Grade, Fifth Grade, Sixth Grade, Middle School U1100, Middle School U1500, Middle School Open (two-day), I Love Chess Too First-Third Grade, I Love Chess Too Fourth-Sixth Grade, I Love Chess Too Ninth-Twelfth Grade. and I Love Chess Too Adult U1500.

Hosting an event of this magnitude presented many logistical challenges and required collaboration and teamwork by a group of experienced chess organizers. The event ran incredibly smoothly in large part due to the efforts of the WSECC Organizing Committee, the Tacoma Convention Center Staff, and numerous supporters and volunteers! We would especially like to thank lead organizer Jacob Mayer, the pairings team of Ben Radin, Todd May, and Gregg Dillingham, floor chief Norm May, chief of staff James Stripes, MS Open TD Sloan Setiadikurnia, K section assistant Thu-An Lai, Chief Tournament Director Randy Kaech, Kindergarten Section Chief Lane Van Weerdhuizen, Kindergarten Section Assistant Siva Sankrithi, lead runner Heather May, help desk supervisor Donna May, hand pairings team of Brad Stensland and Tim Campbell, and lead sections TDs David Hirschowitz, Stone Kaech, Bert Rutgers, Rekha Sagar, Daniel Wilke, and Daniel Shubin. Chess Enrichment Association (CEA) board members Josh Sinanan and Edith Lau provided additional support along with a plethora parent volunteers, scorekeepers, and floor judges including Chouchan Airapetian, Angela Agaian, Shri Humrudha, Suresh Balaji, Detective Cookie, Kai Pisan, Olin Martin, Kelsey Hollingsworth, Ani Barua, Valentin Razmov, Suzanne Mayer.

Special VIP guests included International Master Georgi Orlov, SettleKing founder and sponsor Srikant Vemparala, parent sponsors Haiyong Wang and Joanna Jiang, the parents of National Third Grade Champion Ted Wang.

Several courageous Tacoma Convention Center staff were in charge of securing the entrances to the playing hall, which only players and designated personnel were permitted to enter after the start of each round. While waiting for round two to begin, an angry mob formed outside the playing room when several kids began chanting "Let us in!" which was quickly handled by chief organizer Jacob Mayer. Meiling Cheng was our official photographer once again and took many phenomenal photos over the course of the day, all of which can be seen on the CEA Facebook page.

Our wonderful vendors—John Dill from Spokane and Northwest Designs Ink from Bellevue—greatly enhanced the prestige of the event. John offered high-quality chess equipment at bargain prices and brought over some new prototypes that are sure to please any chess enthusiast, such as the new "Knight light" and an impressive collection of chess neckties. Northwest Designs Ink, a customized apparel company based in Bellevue, was onsite selling t-shirts and other customized chess-themed apparel!

IM Georgi Orlov was present for most of the day analyzing games and taking on all challengers in speed chess. Coach Ryan Ackerman from Spokane was also present on-site playing blindfold chess games with a high-tech iPad interface setup in which he could not see the pieces, but his opponents could!

Other vendors present on-site included Chess4Life, which provided complimentary game review and practice games, in addition to the Tacoma Chess Club, a local-area club which runs regular tournaments and casual chess events.

At the chess board, the play was fast-paced and exciting amongst the younger players, but more deliberate and thoughtful amongst the older ones. As usual, the Kindergarten section, which took place on the fourth floor of the convention center, was run on a separate schedule from the other sections and wrapped up just after 1:00pm, about twice as fast as the other sections. With many players still quite new to chess acrossthe-board, players were reminded about proper ethics and behavior appropriate for playing chess, and for the most part everyone followed the rules and was on their best behavior.

When the dust settled after over eight hours of play, a brief awards ceremony was held around 5:30pm to honor the top-

scoring players and teams. Those with a "plus" score of 3.0, 3.5, or 4.0 points were awarded their point-award trophies immediately following the final round at the scoring tables. Special congratulations to the Champions!



# Washington vs. British Columbia Intermat

he 32nd Annual WA vs BC Intermat ended in a narrow 28-22 victory for Team British Columbia! The Washington vs British Columbia International Scholastic Chess Match, known informally as the Intermat, was hosted in-person at the Lansdown Centre in Richmond for the first time since 2019! After three

consecutive years of the Intermat being hosted online via <a href="mailto:chess.com">chess.com</a> due to the pandemic, it was nice to return to chess across the board!

The Lansdown Centre, a mall located in the heart of Richmond, BC, was a fantastic venue to host the Intermat, with many food options available nearby in the mall food court just a few steps away from the playing room. A separate skittles room located a short distance from the playing room was provided for parents to hang out and for players to analyze their games between rounds.

At the start of the match, Team WA was short one player in Grade 5, as Arjun Yadav, one of the fifth grade honored representatives, was nowhere to be found! The captains and tournament directors met briefly to discuss what should be done, and it was decided to make the match out of 25 boards instead of 26, a gracious gesture by the BC Team. As a substitute, Washington Team Captain Chouchanik and her daughter Angela Agaian took turns playing against the BC player who was due to play against Yadav in each round, a nice compromise.

Team BC played White on all boards in the first round and obtained a modest 14.5-10.5 lead, with especially dominant performances in grades 8-12! Notable results were the clean 2-0 sweeps in Eighth Grade (Jingyun (Ryan) Yang + Ethan Song), Ninth Grade (Ethan Su + Aiden Leong), Twelfth Grade (National Masters Neil Doknjas + Patrick Huang)!

In the team match format, playing hard in every game helps the team, and each move is important, which WA Team Captain Chouchan Airapetain stressed to the players before each round.

In the second round, Team WA tried their best to mount a comeback with the white pieces, but were unable to gain momentum outside of the middle boards in grades six and seven. The BC players proved to be especially well-prepared in the high-school grades, with Team WA's Emerson Wong-Godfrey (ninth grade), being the only Washington player to score the full point. Team BC's impressive 2-0 sweeps in the Kindergarten and Third Grade sections proved crucial, as they led Team BC to a narrow 13.5-11.5 victory in the second round and an overall match victory by the score of 28-22.

Congratulations to Team BC on the fantastic performance and a well-deserved win!

Despite the match already being decided on paper with a few games still going, players from both teams fought hard and stuck around until the very end to support their teammates. A short closing ceremony concluded the day's festivities, wrapping up just before 7:00pm, after which Team WA players and families headed home back to Washington.



n Wednesday, April 19, the Issaquah Highlands Chess Club was honored to host young chess superstar Ted Wang for an unforgettable evening of chess! The event took place at the fantastic Blakely Hall, located in the Issaquah Highlands, an urban village community in the foothills of the Cascade Mountains.

Ted gave a brief presentation in which he discussed his chess journey so far and provided tips for budding chess players seeking to improve their game. After his presentation with some pizza and refreshments provided, 30 players squared off to play in Ted's simul, which filled up quickly. The Issaquah Highlands Chess Club and Washington Chess Federation co-hosted the event, which featured complimentary pizza from Flying Pie Pizzeria in Issaquah along with some soft drinks to keep the players well hydrated during their game with the young phenom.

The evening kicked off with a brief presentation in which Ted told his own personal chess story so far and offered tips for young up-and-coming players. I will present it here:

## Why Chess?

- 1) It teaches you real lessons in life.
- 2) Chess is a fun game.
- 3) Chess teaches you to think deeply.
- Chess teaches you to be decisive.
- 5) You must learn to solve problems, which is fun to do.

# Experiences - Things I Learned

- It is almost never a good idea to offer a draw in a practical game unless it is a dead draw.
- Managing time is essential.
- Even if your opponent plays fast, NEVER play fast.
- If you play instantly, you will miss things, like when I blundered checkmate at Nationals.

# **How to Improve**

- Play slowly NEVER play fast.
- Never give up.
- Always play for a win
- Play what you like, even if it is worse.

After a short break, the 30-player simultaneous chess exhibition began shortly after 6:30pm. Players of all ratings (unrated – 1600) participated in the 30-player simul, and 10-15 willing players who could not fit in the simul played a five-round rapid tournament the same evening.

When the dust had settled, Ted had won 25, drew four, and lost only one game. All of the games were finished by 9:30pm, mostly thanks to Ted's incredible speed and accuracy. Congratulations to the following players who scored a win or a draw against budding chess star Ted Wang!
