# Chess: Art, Science, or Sport?

There has been this question going around, whether chess is an art, science, or sport, but no one had asked us, the kids... So, in this article, we are going to share our opinion, based on our own chess experience. Our short answer: Chess is all of them! Let us explain...


Before we dig deeper, let's define science, art, and sport. Science is based on logic, experiments, and data. It is objective. It follows a clear method, and results aren't accepted until they're repeated over and over again. Art is subjective; it's more creative, intuitive, and not based on the right answer. Science thrives within boundaries. Art is boundless. Sport is challenging yourself, trying to push your limits by working hard, experimenting in your training, and being creative in your play. When we combine art, science, and sport, amazing things can happen. Space travels, for example, wouldn't be possible without all three!

Leonardo da Vinci, the greatest artist and scientist of all time, used his scientific skills to take his art to a masterpiece level. He observed nature with his artistic eye, and came up with discoveries in biology, engineering, and physics. Albert Einstein famously said that imagination (another way of saying creativity) is more important than knowledge. Advances in science inspire creativity in art, and creativity in art motivates advances in science. And let's not forget Einstein's famous photo, where he is riding the bike! Score for the sport!

To become a great chess player, you need to find a good balance between

art and science! To become a chess champion, you need to appreciate sport.

### The Myth Sarang:



When I play a chess game, I am not really playing my opponent, but the positions that are in front of me on the chess board. It's really me versus me. Most of these positions follow certain patterns that I've studied and analyzed many times. I like to set up positions when I'm playing that follow ideas I've studied a lot. That way I am ready to push for strong results.

After each game, I analyze it with coaches and engines. In this analysis, I'm looking to learn from my mistakes, particularly in those critical positions that deviate from patterns I'm familiar with, so I can be better prepared in the future. In many ways this is science. I experiment with ideas I've studied, reflect on those experiments, learn from them, and then iterate to keep improving.

### The Legend Vivaan:



When I play a chess game, I like to play in crazy creative ways that no one has ever seen before. This makes my opponents feel unprepared and not ready for my wild ideas! This is just like art! My brain rapid fires ideas, and I like to think about what my opponent will most likely do when I make a sneaky move. My favorite games are ones where I have fun and sac pieces!

Engines and coaches often don't love the piece sacs, but I still do them anyway because they're so pretty and fun! Now that I've gotten a lot better though, the engines tend to call my piece sacs brilliancies! Chess is all creativity for me. I learn from my coaches and calculate, but they know I'm a wild man, so they help me build my attacks and help me coordinate and improve my creative ideas.

### The Man Benji:



I love volleyball as much as I love chess (don't make me pick one!). When I'm at a volleyball practice or a tournament, and someone asks me: "What other sports do you play?" without hesitation, I say *Chess*. Their reaction? *Oh, cool!* Chess *is* a sport on many levels! Let me highlight those levels, drawing from my tournament experience playing chess and volleyball.

- 1. Chess is a mental sport while volleyball is a physical sport. When you play volleyball and you try your best, your muscles get sore, which results in them getting stronger. In chess, when you think hard about a position, you're working your brain, which means you're building new neuron connections. But in both sports, you're getting pushed to your limits, whether it's physically or mentally.
- 2. In chess and in volleyball, you dedicate lots of time to practice, which is key to improving. In all sports, chess and volleyball included, we start at the same place. Someone might have a natural talent for the game, but if you want to get anywhere, talent is not enough. You have to practice day after day, whether it's getting reps at the gym or at chess tactics.

- 3. We test our practice at competitions. During a tournament game, it's you and your opponent, on the other side of the board, or the other side of the net. At first, it might seem like your opponent is someone who you have to "beat", or surpass. In reality, like Sarang said, it's me versus me. Your opponent is there to push you, to test your preparation, just like you do this for them. I am grateful that there are people to challenge me and help me get better.
- 4. Then, there are emotions. In volleyball and in chess, they are the same: elation with a win or frustration with a loss (let's skip a draw for now, since in volleyball, it's not a possible outcome). In volleyball, my teammates and I cheer each other during and after the match, sometimes very loudly! During a chess game, I would love to come to Vivi's board and start dancing and chanting Let'sgo-Vi-vi-let's-go! But I can't. A chess game is all on you. Sure, we have our parents and chess friends to share emotions with after the game, but only you know how bad the mistake you made was. I think that's a reason why I tend to get more frustrated when I lose a chess game than a volleyball game.
- 5. Why do we play sports? During my first few years of playing chess and volleyball, the answer seemed obvious to me. I play because I have fun! Later, when I got more competitive, I realized that's not the only answer to this question. I play because I want to play in the Olympics, or I want to be a Super GM. You become driven by your goals, but you shouldn't think about them too much or else you will crumble under pressure. Reach for the stars, but grab the lowest hanging fruit on the way there! Also, never forget why you started playing your sport—for fun—whether it's chess or volleyball, or something else!

For our scientist chess readers, lean into the art! For our artist chess readers, lean into the science! For all our readers, enjoy the sport!

Now, if you made it this far, through the serious business part of this article, here are some knee-slappers! As they say, come for the information, stay for the jokes!

Highest Finishing WA Resident in the Polgar section becomes WA State Women's Champion and is seeded into 2026 WA State Championship, Invitational section. If there's a tie for 1st place, G/90 playoff games will be played later in the year.

Format: A Swiss-style tournament in four sections. Sections with <6 players may be merged.

Polgar Championship: A 5-Round, G/90; +30 Swiss over two days (Sat-Sun). Tri-rated in NWSRS, US Chess, and FIDE. Rounds: Sat. @ 9am, 1:30pm, 6pm. Sun. @ 10am, 3pm. Awards ~ 7:30pm.

Wenjun U1300: A 6-Round G/75; +10 Swiss over two days (Sat-Sun). NWSRS & US Chess dual rated. Rounds: Sat. @ 9am, 12:30pm, 4pm. Sun. @ 10am, 1:30pm, 5pm. Awards ~ 8pm.

Koneru U700: A 1-day, 5-Round G/25; +5 Swiss. NWSRS & US Chess dual rated. Rounds: Sun. @ 10am, 11am, 12:30pm, 1:30pm, 2:30pm. Awards ~ 3:45pm.

**Botez Casual/Unrated:** A 1-day, 4-Round G/30; +10 Swiss. Open to players unrated – 999. Unrated; no memberships required. Rounds: Sat. @ 11:30am, 1:30pm, 3pm, 4:30pm. Awards ~ 6pm.

**Rating:** Highest of October US Chess or current NWSRS rating will be used to determine section, pairings, and prizes.

**Entry Fee:** \$50 by 10/4, \$60 after. Less \$20 for Koneru U700 & Botez Unrated sections. Free entry for WGMs, WIMs, WFMs, or US Chess Queens rated 2000+ USCF. Players rated 1200+ and 600+ in both USCF and NWSRS may play up 1 section into the Polgar and Wenjun sections, respectively. Maximum of 80 players total and 30 players per section, please register early.

Byes: Two half-point byes available. If interested, request before the end of round 2.

# 2025 Mid-Year Scholastic Cup

fourth annual Mid-Year Scholastic Cup was held June 28-29 at Grand Knights Chess Academy in Bellevue. As conceptualized by Mid-Year Scholastic Cup founder and WCF Tournament Coordinator Valentin Razmov, the purpose of these events is to provide Northwest junior players with opportunities to face strong competition and develop their chess skills, especially as they transition to longer time controls. Up-and-coming chess players from throughout the Pacific Northwest were represented in the 57-player field from cities including Sultan, Sammamish, Redmond, Newcastle, Gig Harbor, Bellevue, Woodinville, Bellingham, Bothell, Surrey (BC), Everett, Clyde Hill, Mercer Island, Lynnwood, University Place, Seattle, Kirkland, and North Bend!

The event was co-hosted by the Grand Knight Chess Academy and Washington Chess Federation, directed by WCF Member-at-Large Ani Barua and WCF FIDE Liaison Mani Atikankhotchasee, and organized by WCF Tournament Coordinator Valentin Razmov, Grand Knight Director Gelareh Golanbar, Grand Knights Founder Sloan Setiadikurnia, and WCF President Josh Sinanan. The five-round, G/75; +15 Swiss tournament occurred over two days and was split between six sections grouped tightly by rating: Section 1 (1560+), Section 2 (1454-1534), Section 3 (1345-1437), Section 4 (1221-1313), Section 5 (1061-1184), and Section 6 (U1050).

Many thanks to our wonderful photographers Gelareh, Mani, Valentin, and Ani for taking pictures throughout the weekend. As usual in these prestigious junior events, the stakes were quite high. The highest finishing Washington player in each section earned a seed or free entry into the following tournaments, respectively: Section 1 → 2026 Washington Championship, Challengers; Section 2 → 2025 Washington Class Championships; Section 3 → 2025 SPFNO; and Sections 4-6 → another

2025 WCF tournament of the player's choice.

In Section 1, Bellevue chess king Thrinay Subramanian emerged victorious with a perfect five points from five games, vanquishing his nearest rivals Syal (1649), Li (1620), and Chen (1596) along the way. Somerset whiz kid Shawn Li captured second place honors a point and a half back with 3.5 points. Lincoln High School Chess Club President Gavin Shi earned third place for his efforts with

a solid three-point score. Chess warriors Yash Syal of Sammamish, Andy Chen of Bellevue, and Krishang Gupta of Everett shared fourth place honors with an even 2.5-point score.

In Section 2, Redmond chess queen Aarya Patel was crowned champion with an undefeated four points from five games, winning her last three games in a row against Evin (1508), Pai (1471), and Lai (1454)! A quadruplet of rising chess stars shared second-fourth place a full-

point back: Naaditha Nawagamedewage of Lynnwood, Terrick Evin of Redmond, Vihaan Pai of Sammamish, and Viraj Dhawan of Sammamish.

Three chess musketeers topped the nine-player Section 3 with a solid 3.5 points: North Bend's Rushil Singh, Redmond's Yash Bhaskara, and Bellevue's Harvey Wang. Four chess foot soldiers—Aiden Zhu of Seattle, Kruti Thanikonda of Sammamish, Arjun Moghe of Redmond, and Inura Nawagamudewage of Lynnwood—split the fourth place prize, covering their gas money.

In Section 4, Clyde Hill chess prince Kyle Jiang reigned supreme in the tenplayer field with an undefeated four points from five games, allowing just two draws against Rengrajan (1243) and Sreraman (1313). A duo of rapidly improving chess prodigies split second and third place honors with three points apiece: Rohit Sreraman of Sammamish and Jake Bravenboer of Newcastle. Four chess golfers shared the fourth place prize with a 2.5-point par score: Alisa Rachiba of University Place, Justin Lee of Seattle, Jizhou He of Bellevue, and Anirudh Rengarajan of Gig Harbor.

Emerging chess pop star Jackson Rish-Brown from Gig Harbor dominated Section 5 and won first place with a round to spare! A trio of chess trumpeters shared second-fourth place accolades a half-point back with three points apiece: Patrick Zhang of Sammamish, Jayden Wu of Kirkland, and Rahul Sreraman of Sammamish.

Section 6 saw two players take their games to the next level to edge out a narrowly shared victory with four points each: Seattle's Jonathan Wu and Sammamish's Saahan Chadha. Seattle sensation Siana Razmov captured the third-place prize a half-point back, drawing against Wu and winning her last two games in the clutch. A pair of chess princes—Evan Dolar of Bellingham and Sebastian Lam of Mercer Island—shared fourth place, each with a regal "plus one" score.

While it may not always be possible to play the sharpest moves, it is within the realm of possibility to dress sharply for a chess game and make deliberate choices when selecting the next move in one's wardrobe! The classiest players to grace the playing hall at this year's Mid-Year Scholastic Cup included Shawn Li

+ Rian Raja (Section 1), Riaan Babbar + Vidur Ganesan (Section 2), Skyler Qin + Ziliang Ma (Section 3), Kyle Jiang + Jake Bravenboer (Section 4), Rahul Sreraman + Eason Chen (Section 5), and Phoenix Armitage-Selig + Evan Dolar (Section 6).

Other special prizes included the Highest USCF Rating Gain in each section, as well as the Best Female Player (by tournament performance rating). The "fantastic four" players with the highest USCF rating gains were Krishang Gupta (Section 1, 39 points), Inura Nawagamedewage (Section 3, 23 points), Anirudh Rengarajan (Section 4, 45 points), and Richard Rogov (Section 5, 2 points). The Best Female Prizes were awarded to Bellevue's Zoe Xu (Section 2), University Place's Alisa Rachiba (Section 4), and Surrey's Fedora Gong (Section 6).

Congratulations to the winners, and many thanks to all who contributed to this amazing event!

Niall and Cody played a playoff game to determine who received the physical championship plaque, which could not be split, and in the very intense playoff game, Niall became victorious, taking home the plaque, with both players earning \$55 each.

# Seattle Seafair Open

he 2025 Seattle Seafair Open and Seattle Seafair Blitz tournaments took place at Hotel 116 in Bellevue on the weekend of July 12-13. For the second consecutive year, the event was organized as a joint effort between the Seattle Chess Club and the Washington Chess Federation. Hosted in the spacious playing hall at Hotel 116, the venue easily accommodated the substantial attendance of 148 players, a Seafair record!

Players from throughout the Pacific Northwest were represented in the twoday chess extravaganza, including the cities of Kirkland, Bothell, Redmond, Sammamish, Kent, Portland, Seattle, Bellevue. Mount Lake Terrace. Lynnwood, Gig Harbor, Brier, Mercer Island, Silver Spring (Maryland), Belfair, Clyde Hill, Renton, Duvall, Edmonds, Issaquah, Mill Creek, North Bend, Pacific, Shoreline, Tacoma, Auburn, Spokane, Lake Stevens, Woodinville, Fall City, Hunts Point, and Kenmore! The busy slate of events was orchestrated by Seattle Chess Club President John Selsky, WCF Member-at-Large Ani Barua, WCF FIDE Liaison FA Mani Atikankhotchasee, WCF Scholastic Director Allen Messenger, and WCF President Josh Sinanan.

### Seattle Seafair Open

The Seattle Seafair Open, Seattle Chess Club's premier annual tournament and traditionally largest event of the year, spanned the two-day weekend. This year's superb attendance of 148 players beat last year's record of 123 when the event was hosted at Lakeside Upper School in Seattle. Several changes and additions were implemented at this year's Seafair to provide a first-class playing experience for as many players as possible as the event continues to grow. The field was split into two sections-Open and Premier U1600—to make for much more competitive pairings each round than the traditional one-section format would produce. The dual USCF and FIDE rating

of both sections was introduced to raise the prestige of the event and help players seeking to establish or update their FIDE rating in preparation for national and international events. Lastly, games from the top boards of both sections were broadcast on a 15-minute delay via the Clono app (clono.no), which spectators could follow to keep tabs on the top games.

Despite the new format, there were still plenty of upsets abound in every round due to the high density of underrated ringers populating the field. A star-studded lineup of titled players headlined the field, with such celebrities as NM Siddarth M. Sundaram, FM Aziz Degenbaev, Washington State Champion FM Ryan Porter, NM Vedic Panda, NM Yiding Lu, NM Brandon Jiang, NM Vidip Kona, CM Vihaan Jammalamadaka, CM Pranav K. Anoop, CM Leonid Gavrysh, and CM Ananth Gottumukkala. A trio of tournament directors ran the massive event, with Mani handling the FIDE rulings and Clono game broadcasting, Ani managing the pairings, and Allen running the floor. SCC President John Selsky represented Seattle Chess Club and brought over the beautiful Seafair Trophy, which stood proudly at the front of the room much to the amazement of many players.

After five topsy-turvy weeks sailing the high seas in the 73-player Open section, only two bootleggers survived the dangerous voyage and discovered the first-place treasure, each scoring 4.5 points from five games: FM Aziz Degenbaev (4.5, 2380  $\rightarrow$  2387) of Seattle and FM Ryan Porter (4.5, 2287  $\rightarrow$  2296) of Bellevue. For Aziz, who recently became an FM and is working on his IM title, this was his second consecutive Seafair title after tying for first with IM Ray Kaufman last year. For Porter, a strong FM who recently returned to the chess world after a long break and is now teaching his sons how to play, the victory kept the momentum going since his crowning as the 2025 Washington State Champion back in February!

A quintuplet of chess plunderers, not to be confused with blunderers, shared third/fourth/U2100/U1900 honors a halfpoint back: NM Vedic Panda (4.0, 2284  $\rightarrow$  2283) of Seattle, NM Vidip Kona (4.0, 2223  $\rightarrow$  2229) of Duvall, NM Brandon Jiang (4.0, 2191  $\rightarrow$  2191) of Bellevue, CM Vihaan Jammalamadaka (4.0, 2092  $\rightarrow$  2113) of Redmond, and Odbayar Yondon (4.0, 1885  $\rightarrow$  1929) of Sammamish.

A pair of chess privateers—Vihaan Pai (3.0, 1474 → 1607) of Sammamish and Zoe Xu (3.0, 1468 → 1603) of Bellevue—shared the first U1700 prize with a sensational "plus one" score thanks to clutch upset wins in the final round!

The biggest upset wins were achieved by the following chess marauders: Selina Cheng (round one: 339 points) of Seattle, Benjamin Frederick (round two: 421 points) of Seattle, Vihaan Jammalamadaka (round three: 323 points) of Redmond, Skandha Raj (round four: 267 points) of Bellevue, and Odbayar Yondon (round five: 309 points) of Sammamish. Chess starbuck Zoe Xu (TPR: 1833) of Bellevue won the best female player prize.

Elder chess serviceman CM Leonid Gavrysh (TPR: 1962) of Brier won the best senior prizes for his geriatric efforts. A pair of classy chess temptresses— Sophie Velea (Saturday) of Sammamish and Loida Guo (Sunday) of Bothellwon the daily best dressed prizes for their stylish ensembles.

Bothell chess raider Rian Raja (5.0,  $1501 \rightarrow 1576$ ) topped the 75-player Premier U1600 section with a perfect 5.0 points from five games. Despite the adverse conditions, Captain Raja navigated his chess ship safely through the 'Premier passage' and survived his encounters with unhinged chess looters including Miskelly (1190), Thanikonda (1229), Samara (1189), and Hirschowitz (1544)! Seven chess corsairs—David Hirschowitz  $(4.0, 1544 \rightarrow 1549)$  of Mercer Island, Pablo Manzon Jr.  $(4.0, 1500 \rightarrow 1506)$  of Kent, Kedar Venkatachalam  $(4.0, 1463 \rightarrow 1464)$  of Redmond, Riaan Babbar (4.0, 1318 → 1379) of Sammamish, Rushil Singh (4.0,  $1263 \rightarrow 1362$ ) of North Bend, Ziliang Ma (4.0, 1191  $\rightarrow$  1274) of Seattle, and Sachin Miskelly  $(4.0, 1190 \rightarrow 1263)$  of Seattle—distributed the second/third/ fourth/U1500/U1300 spoils amongst themselves.

Five chess pirates unearthed some buried treasure and shared first U1100 honors with three points apiece: Elina Khudyev (3.0, 1109  $\rightarrow$  1204) of Sammamish, Ann Jem  $(3.0, 902 \rightarrow 1032)$ of Seattle, Mithran Anbuselvam (3.0,  $877 \rightarrow 1040$ ) of Bothell, Liam Chang  $(3.0, 831 \rightarrow 1024)$  of Bothell, and Edwin Huang  $(3.0, 956 \rightarrow 1069)$  of Bellevue. Rookie chess recruit Gobindroop Mann  $(3.0, unrated \rightarrow 1254)$  of Pacific won the first Unrated prize with three points, recovering well after a first-round setback to finish undefeated in his last four games!

Five chess despoilers were awarded the best upset win prizes for their tricky efforts: Adheesh Sundaram (round one: 352 points) of Bothell, Liam Chang (round two: 548 points) of Bothell, Samuel Xu (round three: 283 points) of Bellevue,

Chess mermaid Andra Marinescu (TPR: 1383) of Renton took home the best female player prize. Veteran chess robber Pablo Manzon Jr. (TPR: 1494) of Kent won the best senior prize despite performing slightly below his 1500 rating. Two chess cavaliers—Damien Davies (Saturday) of Bothell and Michael Berg (Sunday) of Kent—cleaned up well and were awarded the best dressed prizes for their snazzy attire.



### Seafair Blitz

The Seafair Blitz tournament took place on Sunday evening immediately following the last round of the Seattle Seafair Open. A robust turnout of forty hardcore chess rovers took part in the nine-round single Swiss tournament, which was directed by WCF FIDE Liaison Mani Atikankhotchasee with assistance from WCF ironmen Ani Barua and Allen Messenger. The event lasted deep into the evening and featured players with ratings ranging from unrated to 2415.

The pace of play was measured and leisurely, with the 'long' G/5; +3 Blitz time control in effect for the dual USCF Blitz + FIDE Blitz rated games. With the extra time on the clock, players had the opportunity to ponder their moves for a few seconds before moving and could attempt to 'calculate' short combinations before playing them rather than just relying on their pattern recognition and intuition. Despite the leisurely pace, zeitnot still played a part in several games and pulled its victims into the depths of the chess abyss!

Kyrgyzstani chess crusader FM Aziz Degenbaev  $(8.0, 2353 \rightarrow 2355)$  dominated the field with an impressive 8.0 points from nine games to claim the first place prize, dropping just one game against dark horse Pranav K. Anoop (1793) in the seventh round. This victory rounded out a pretty good weekend for Aziz, who also tied for first in the main tournament. A trio of Bellevue chess troopers tied for second/third place honors a full point back with seven points apiece: NM Siddarth Sundaram (7.0,  $2232 \rightarrow 2228$ ), NM Brandon Jiang (7.0, 1813 → 1878). and soon-to-be master Pranav K. Anoop  $(7.0, 1793 \rightarrow 1922).$ 

Seattle chess spearman Gavin Shi  $(6.0, 1632 \rightarrow 1638)$  snagged the first U2000 prize with an impressive 6-3 score. Siddharth Shenoy (5.5, 1606  $\rightarrow$ 1598), a Seattle-based chess soldier who recently returned to competitive play, earned the first U1800 prize a half-point back. A duo of chess dogfaces shared first U1600/U1400 honors with five points apiece: Rian Raja (5.0, 1368  $\rightarrow$  1426) of Bothell and Andrew Inforzato (5.0, unrated → 1313) of Belfair. Lynnwood chess legionary Inura Nawagamudewage  $(4.5, 1177 \rightarrow 1326)$  won the first U1200 prize thanks to a clutch final round win against unrated ringer Anthony Lamb. Youngster Noble Schasteen (3.0, unrated → 1011) from Detective Cookie's Chess Club in Seattle captured the first U1000 prize with three hard-earned points.

Bellevue mortarman Adwik Shetty (2.0, unrated → 633) earned the first Unrated prize thanks to his determination and perseverance. Several biggest upset win prizes were awarded and won by the following draftees: Raghav K. Sundaram (round two), Pranav K. Anoop (round three), Ridhim Suram (round four), Illia Kalian (round five), Vihaan Padmanabhuni (round six), and Naaditha Nawagamudewage (round seven).



### 2025 Oregon Class Championships Chess Tournament

November 1-2, Daylight Saving Time Weekend

• Sponsored by the Oregon Chess Federation (OCF). Registration is at onlineregistration.cc

**FORMAT**: The tournament is a 5-round Swiss paired event with three rounds on Saturday and two rounds on Sunday and is open to everyone, regardless of residency or age. Up to two half point byes are available if requested before round one.

SECTIONS: There are seven sections, Master/Expert (2000+), Class A (1800-1999), Class B (1600-1799), Class C (1400-1599), Class D (1200-1399), Class E (1000-1199), and Class F and below (U1000). Players may play up one section for a \$35 play-up fee (can't play up more than one section). The official November US Chess over-the-board regular ratings are generally used for section eligibility and pairings. An unofficial US Chess over-the-board regular rating based on at least four games, US Chess online regular rating, or converted foreign rating is used for players with no official US Chess over-the-board regular rating.

TIME CONTROL: G/90;+10 (ninety minutes per player with ten seconds added for each move). PLAYERS MUST SUPPLY THEIR OWN BOARD, SET, AND INCREMENT CAPABLE DIGITAL CLOCK FOR TOURNAMENT PLAY. A limited number of sets and boards will be available to purchase at the tournament. Players are responsible for knowing how to set their clock.

**SCHEDULE**: A players meeting is at 9:45am on Saturday (there is no need for registered players to "check-in" prior to round 1). The rounds start at 10am, 2:15pm, and 6:30pm on Saturday and 10am and 2:15pm on Sunday. Remember to set your clocks back an hour on Sunday morning for the end of daylight saving time.

RATED: All sections are US Chess regular rated.

ENTRY FEE: \$80 if registered by Friday, October 10 \$90 from October 11 until Friday, October 31 at noon. Free entry for GMs and IMs with up to \$80 deducted from a prize won. US Chess membership is required for all players. Oregon Chess Federation membership is required for Oregon residents and will be checked by the tournament registration website. See the OCF Membership page for instructions on obtaining an OCF membership. Be sure to add your US Chess ID to your OCF membership. If you have issues configuring your OCF membership or with the tournament registration website checking your OCF membership, send email to support@oregonchessfed.org.

PRIZES: \$5600 total prize fund based on 100 players. The prize fund is adjusted proportionally if there are a different number of players except \$2800 is guaranteed. Each section has the following overall prizes: 1<sup>ST</sup>-\$400, 2<sup>ND</sup>-\$250, 3<sup>rd</sup>-\$150. Unrated players are eligible for all the prizes in their section. Prizes are combined and/or split if there is a tie. Prizes are paid via check or PayPal.

**QUALIFIERS**: The Master/Expert section is a qualifier for both the Championship and Challengers sections of the Oregon Closed. All sections are qualifiers for the Oregon Scholastic Chess Federation (OSCF) State Championship.

LOCATION: Lloyd Center DoubleTree Hotel, 1000 NE Multnomah St, Portland, OR 97232. The tournament this year is in the Pacific Northwest Ballroom (combination of Oregon, Alaska, and Idaho). There is free parking in the hotel parking garage (parking passes to be able to leave the parking garage for free will be available at the tournament). Hotel rooms for any of the nights of October 31-November 2 are available at a special chess rate of \$169 for a room on Friday or Saturday, \$139 on Sunday, not including tax. The hotel chess rate is not guaranteed to be available after October 1, or even earlier if the rooms are sold out. Check the OCF website (https://oregonchessfed.org/?p=1610) for information on reserving rooms.

REGISTRATION: Register online at <u>onlineregistration.cc</u> (no mailed or on-site entries are allowed). The deadline to register is Friday, October 31 at noon. Email <u>support@oregonchessfed.org</u> if you encounter any issues while trying to register online, need to modify or withdraw your registration, or are unable to pay the entry fee online via credit card, debit card, or PayPal.

TOURNAMENT RULES: US Chess rules are used. The following apply to all sections: 1) You must let the tournament staff know at least thirty minutes prior to the start time of the next round if you decide to withdraw from the tournament or skip that round. 2) Players are not allowed to have a phone or other electronic device capable of chess analysis or communication on their person during their games. Any such device a player has with them must be turned off and stored in the player's bag (backpack, chess bag, etc.). The penalty for possessing such a device is at the discretion of the chief tournament director. 3) As a courtesy to your opponents, please show up on time for the rounds. A player will be forfeited for a no-show one hour after the round has started.

# **A Conversation With** Akim And Valentyna Pikh

### Ken Lee

kim Pikh and his family moved to Seattle in July 2024. Akim quickly made his mark in the chess community, scoring impressive wins within two weeks of arriving in the Pacific Northwest.

Originally from Ukraine, Akim has relocated to three different countries in the last few years and has found that chess has enabled him to make friends no matter where he is in the world.

I sat down with Akim and his mother Valentyna to discuss his remarkable adventure.

**Ken:** Akim, when and where were you born?

Akim: I was born in 2014, in the city of Nova Kakhovka, Kherson region, which is located in the south of Ukraine.

**Ken:** When did you start playing chess?

**Akim:** I started playing chess when I was almost six years old. My mom taught me how the pieces moved and basic rules, and at first, I played at home with my family, just for fun. Then I joined the local chess club where my older brother was already playing.

**Ken:** Did you love chess right away?

Akim: Yes, I liked it, especially

playing in the club. I made many friends there. At that time, I was also super motivated to beat my brother, who kept teasing me that I'd never win against him. So beating him became

sun."

my personal mission. We had this friendly rivalry until, going on. finally, I won.

**Ken:** Why did you move from Ukraine?

Akim: The war started February 2022, and my family had no choice but to leave Ukraine. Our city has been occupied since the first day and is still under Russian control.

**Ken:** I'm so sorry Akim. What did your family do?

Akim: We first went to Estonia to stay with family friends, who helped us during the first months of the war. Then we decided to move to Ireland because they offered a lot of support to Ukrainian families who had lost their homes. It was

> also a wonderful opportunity our family to start learning **English** before moving to the United States, since none of us spoke it at all.

> Ken: Did vou continue to play chess in Ireland?

Akim: Yes. chess had my board with me on

the internet, and I kept playing with my mom and my brother. We found a few tournaments in Ireland that I could join, but it was not easy to get there since

we lived in a remote village. I did pretty well in those tournaments, played against some highrated players, and it really helped me earn and improve FIDE rating. At one of these tournaments. after winning a game, my "place in the opponent invited me to join his chess team! I played for his team once a month whenever I was in Ireland, and it was a lot of fun. I still play for his team in online


tournaments on Lichess.com, which helps me keep improving and enjoy chess with other players.

**Ken:** When did you start working with a chess coach?

**Akim:** There were no chess clubs in the village we lived in, and my English was limited back then, so we decided to find a coach online from Ukraine. My family connected with IM Sergey Pavlov, and I've been working with him online ever since.

**Ken:** When did your family decide to move to the United States?

**Akim:** My parents made the decision to move to the United States because of my brother and me. Our home town was destroyed, and there was nowhere to go, not even in the future. So they thought the best thing to do was to build a better future here in the US.

**Ken:** How did they decide on Seattle?

**Akim:** My parents did research online, comparing experiences of other families from Ukraine who had already moved to the US. From the start, they were thinking about two states, Washington and Florida, and Washington seemed a lot better to us. That's why we chose Seattle.

**Ken:** Well, that's lucky for us! How did you find your first chess tournament in Seattle?

Akim: My mom just googled "chess clubs nearby," and the first thing that popped up was Orlov Chess Academy in Seattle. When we got there, kind of randomly, we found out a tournament was about to happen, hosted by the Seattle Chess Club, and they told us I could join right away. That's how I played my first chess tournament in Seattle!

**Ken:** How did you do?

**Akim:** I shared first place with another player, and thanks to that tournament, I got my first USCF rating.

**Ken:** That must have caught people's attention right away.

**Akim:** Yes. I think so. I also got to meet Josh Sinanan, the president of the Washington Chess Federation. Since then, he has really helped me a lot to take part in Washington Chess tournaments. I'm very thankful to him and the *Northwest Chess* team for all their support.

**Ken:** Have you found the chess community here to be welcoming?

**Akim:** Yes, I've met some really nice people. They have helped us navigate the tournament circuit, introduce us to new friends, and made us feel at home.

**Ken:** How has your mom helped you with your chess?

**Akim:** My mom doesn't play chess seriously, just for fun, so she can't really give me advice on my game. She takes me to all the tournaments, cheers me on when I lose, and helps me feel better after tough games.

**Ken:** What does she say?

**Akim:** She tells me "Sometimes you learn more from a loss than a win." She also reminds me of the motto from my first chess club: "Never give up, and you will see others surrender."

**Ken:** Does that make you feel better?

**Akim:** Well, I get that, but I'd much rather win and skip the losing part.

**Ken**: Akim, last question for you today. What do you think is the biggest factor in your growth as a chess player?

Akim: Honestly, it is hard for me to talk about my strengths in chess, because I still have a lot to learn and improve. My coach, Sergey Pavlov, sees my strengths way better than I do, and he helps me get stronger and win more games. May I ask him to respond to that question?

**Ken:** Of course, that would be awesome.

**Akim:** Ok, here is how he responded:

"Akim calculates variations well and feels the dynamics of the game. He has natural intuition.

He is able to handle pressure and shows great patience. He can defend a worse position and develop a small advantage.

There is no doubt he has a bright mind. Moreover, at just 10 years old, Akim has already gone through difficulties that most children around him could never even imagine.

For him, chess is a form of compensation. In the game, he fights for his own "place in the sun."



# 12th Annual Vancouver Open

(Heath, Tang, and Cigan Victorious)

he 12th Annual Vancouver Open was hosted by the Washington Chess Federation July 19-20, 2025, at the Vancouver Hampton Inn & Suites. The splendid mid-summer tradition provides an opportunity for players from throughout the Pacific Northwest to play in a high-quality tournament hosted at a hotel conveniently located midway between Washington and Oregon. For those who choose to spend a night or two at the hotel, the event offers a mini-vacation experience without having to hop on plane!

A solid attendance of 56 players turned out to celebrate International Chess Day weekend and compete in the two-day chess extravaganza. An even mix of 27 Oregon players and 28 Washington players competed in the five-round Swiss tournament, with only Daniel Hyman from Silver Spring, Maryland representing the East Coast! Pacific Northwest cities represented included Vancouver (WA), Tacoma, Portland, Bothell, Hillsboro, Seattle, Battle Ground, Tenino, Camas, Happy Valley, Sammamish, Yakima, Culver, Redmond, Beaverton, Bellevue, Salem, Eugene, Gresham, Fall City, Kelso, Kirkland, and Mercer Island.

Despite a leak in the ceiling of the playing hall caused by a burst pipe, the tournament ran as planned! Several strategically located buckets throughout the room caught the stray droplets of water that seemed to get progressively bigger as the weekend progressed. By the fifth round, several adult players could be seen surreptitiously brandishing their umbrellas and rain gear while a few youngsters arrived wearing bathing suits underneath their clothes in case of a full-blown downpour!

WCF co-VP Rekha Sagar directed the event with assistance from WCF President Josh Sinanan and WCF Treasurer Robert Allen. The field was split evenly between two sections, with 30 players in the Lewis Open and 26 in the Clark U1700, named

in honor of the famous PNW explorers Captain Meriwether Lewis and Lieutenant William Clark. Headlining the Lewis Open were four National Masters - Jason Cigan, Josh Sinanan, Austin Tang, and Ryan Min—and two Experts—Rebecca Lampman and Derek Heath.

In the Lewis Open, a trio of chess trekkers emerged victorious, each with an undefeated four points from five games: Jason Cigan (4.0, 2232  $\rightarrow$  2236) of Portland, Austin Tang  $(4.0, 2153 \rightarrow 2163)$ of Portland, and Derek Heath (4.0, 2078 → 2098) of Camas. Cigan started red-hot with three consecutive victories against Maokhampio (1708), Witt (1906), and Lampman (2127) and led the tournament after Tang and Heath drew their thirdround game. This set up a key fourth round showdown between Cigan and Heath on board one, which ended in a draw, while Tang vanquished Pikh (1965) on board two.

Tang and Cigan then signed a quick draw in round five on board one while Heath won against Lin (1916) on board two to join them in the winner's circle. Two chess bushrangers, Karthik Bimod (3.5, 1900 → 1922) of Portland and Leonardo Wang (3.5, 1884 → 1893) of Fall City, shared first U2000 honors a half-point back. A quadruplet of chess

wayfarers—Ekam Sardar (2.5, 1523  $\rightarrow$  1607) or Portland, Stephanie Velea (2.5, 1603  $\rightarrow$  1637) of Sammamish, Bohan Li (2.5, 1497  $\rightarrow$  1533) of Portland, and Robert Allen (2.5, 1700  $\rightarrow$  1700) of

Tacoma—shared the first U1800 prize with a par score. Vancouver chess voyager Pranav D. Vijayaraghavan captured the biggest upset win (343 points) thanks to a surprise first-round victory. Bothellbased adventurer Becca Lampman (2.5,  $2127 \rightarrow 2107$ ) earned the Best Female Prize thanks to a tournament performance rating (TPR) of 1923. Veteran chess journeyman Roger Hanson (3.0, 1874 → 1887) of Tenino was awarded the Best Senior Prize thanks to his 1966 TPR. Two stylish chess settlers-Roger Hanson (Saturday) of Tenino and Stephanie Velea (Sunday) of Sammamish—were declared the Best Dressed players and rounded out the Lewis section prize winners.

Gresham chess discoverer Daniel Vasey (4.5, 1479 → 1559) topped the Clark U1700 section with an undefeated 4.5 points from five games, allowing only a single draw against Battle Ground's Mark Hanna (1431) in the penultimate round. Vasey's clutch final-round victory against fellow Oregonian Matthew Stevens (1655) sealed the deal and guaranteed him at least a tie for first place regardless of the outcome of Hanna's game against Kesavan (1333), which eventually ended in a draw.

A pair of chess pioneers—Mark Hanna  $(4.0, 1431 \rightarrow 1501)$  of Battle

Ground and Olivia Maokhampio (4.0, 1238 → 1322) of Beaverton shared second/third place honors a half-point back. Portland chess precursor Vihaan Kesavan (3.5, 1333 → 1413) and Seattle chess trailblazer Ferris Samara (3.5, 1305 → 1353) split the pooled first U1600/ U1400 prize with a solid 'plus two' score. A trio of up-and-coming junior chess frontiersmen—Pragit Arunkumar (3.0, 1224 → 1265) of Portland, Jayden Thein (3.0, 1095 → 1164) of Camas, and Rayansh Sharma (3.0, 923 → 1095) of Portland—captured the first U1200 prize with three points apiece.

 $(1.0, unrated \rightarrow 890)$  from the host city of Vancouver earned the unrated prize for his effort. Portland chess pathfinder Rayansh Sharma scored the biggest upset win of the entire tournament with an amazing 699-point surprise victory! The best female prize was awarded to chess trekker Eevie Tare  $(2.5, 1247 \rightarrow 1261)$ of Portland for her impressive 1326 TPR. Local chess medicine man Steven Hull of Vancouver, always a gentleman in victory or defeat, earned the Best Senior Prize for his 755 TPR. Chess homesteaders Corina Maokhampio (Saturday) of Beaverton and Allan Leland (Sunday) of Vancouver came dressed to impress and took home the best dressed prizes for their classy ensembles.

Congratulations to the winners, and many thanks to all who contributed to this adventurous event!

# NORTHWEST CHESS HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE ROBERT A. KARCH

(MARCH 24, 1930 - MARCH 23, 2010)

ob Karch got his start as a player in Tacoma in the late 1940s, but it was not until the 1970s he would make his mark on chess in the Northwest. Shortly after graduating from Lincoln High School in the late 1940s, he enlisted in the United States Army serving in military intelligence for twenty years before retiring. During his career in the Armed Forces, Bob found time to start the Northwest rating system in 1957, improving upon USCF efforts at the time, particularly in terms of timeliness. This rating system continued into the 1980s under various administrators.

Upon retiring from the Army Bob worked briefly for B.H. Wood at *Chess* magazine in England in 1972. Looking back, it appears Bob, who was always the optimist, had a long-term plan to be a chess professional with his stint at *Chess* the final preparation.

Bob found himself back in the Pacific Northwest opening a full-time chess center in Seattle just as the Fischer boom was starting. His American Chess Service facility only lasted a few years but hosted many events where players like the young Yasser Seirawan and future IM Eric Tangborn gained valuable experience. Peter Biyiasas, reigning Canadian champion at the time, won a number of Karch organized tournaments in the early to mid-1970s.

The greatest promotional event Bob Karch organized was undoubtedly the match he played with Yasser Seirawan. The battle between Fischer and Spassky might have been played a year before but the effects of the "Fischer Boom" were still being felt in Seattle when the 43-year-old Karch and the 13-year-old Seirawan squared off in a six-game match in August of 1973. Karch, normally a Class A player who occasionally slipped over 2000, was the reigning "Seattle City Champion" while Yasser was 13 and rapidly improving. They were far from the best players in the area at the time, but the newspapers didn't realize that. What they saw was a study in contrasts.

Lew Peterson, writing in the Seattle Post-Intelligencer at the time, described the scene. "Yasser, who ranges in age from 11 and 13 years depending on your sources, showed up for the highly publicized game in yellow cutoffs, a redgaucho hat and a well-tanned bare chest. His older opponent was dressed slightly more conservatively in slacks, dress shirt and tie." Yasser won the match, which attracted large stories in the P.I. for each of the games, 4-2. Bob, who always wanted to make chess more popular and appreciated the publicity, couldn't have been happier.

Bob served as the editor of *Northwest Chess* for 12 years in the 1970s and 1980s, and currently ranks number three on the all-time list, trailing only Jeff Roland and Dan Wade in longevity. He was also the editor of the correspondence chess magazine *Chess International* for several years in the late 1980s. Correspondence chess was a life-long interest of Bob who served five years as the US Secretary to the International Correspondence Chess Federation.

Besides editing, organizing and directing Bob also served in various administrative posts for the Washington Chess Federation for many years and as USCF secretary for a short time. Throughout his life he taught hundreds of beginner classes teaching thousands of people how to play chess.

Typically wearing a suit and a tie Bob was certainly more conservative than your average chess player but outward appearances could belie the dreamer that lay beneath. One need only look at the American Chess Service calendar for 1973, with close to (50!) weekend events on the calendar spread across hundreds of miles of the Northwest to realize that he was putting on the local version of Bill Goichberg's Continental Chess Association tour but with an infinitely smaller player base. These generous prize funds kept many semi-pros going but it was good that Bob had his military pension to fall back on when events lost money.

Bob was definitely a visionary who was ahead of his time.

# City of MONROE

Duvall-based phenom NM Vidip Kona (5.0, 2229 → 2235) topped the 18-player Monroe Championship section with a perfect 5.0 points from five games. Along the way, Kona vanquished his nearest rivals Guo (1466), Maharaja (1577), Shi (1723), and Yu (2100) in fine style, winning outright by a full point. Rising superstar Gavin Shi (4.0, 1640 → 1713) of Seattle captured second place with an impressive 4-1 score.

A quintuplet of chess gladiators shared third/fourth place honors with a "plus one" score: FM Peter Yu (3.0,  $2100 \rightarrow 2100$ ) of Bothell, Loida Guo (3.0,  $1498 \rightarrow 1493$ ) of Bothell, Avyaan R. Chowdhury (3.0,  $1226 \rightarrow 1335$ ) of Kirkland, Imai Maharaja (3.0,  $1427 \rightarrow 1487$ ) of Redmond, and Rushil Singh (3.0,  $1362 \rightarrow 1364$ ) of North Bend.

In addition to the overall prizes, several 'Special' prizes in the form of chess medals were also awarded as follows: Gavin Shi—Biggest Upset Win (377 points), Ananya Sabarish—Best Female Player + Best Dressed, Peter Yu—Best Senior Player, Prashant Savani—Kindness and Spreading Joy.



In the 13-player Snohomish U1300 section, Monroe chess marathon man Paul Victor  $(5.0, 1219 \rightarrow 1291)$  emerged victorious with a perfect 5.0 points from five games, scoring key victories against his youthful rivals Gui (1003), Zhang (971), Anbuselvam (1040), and Gu (973) along the way. Sammamish chess savant Patrick Zhang  $(4.0, 971 \rightarrow 1105)$  earned

the second-place prize with an impressive 4-1 score. A pair of future chess kings shared third/fourth place with three points apiece: Aariv Shah  $(3.0, 487 \rightarrow 674)$  of Issaquah, and Chethan K. Jayakrishnan  $(3.0, 736 \rightarrow 787)$  of Bothell. Chethan and Paul added to their winnings by virtue of claiming the Biggest Upset Win (144 points) and Best Senior Player prizes, respectively. Mithran Anbuselvam, a happy chap by nature, took home the Kindness and Spreading Joy Prize for his cheerful efforts.



In the massive 21-player Skykomish U900 section, a single chess warrior—Aaron Chin (5.0, 852 → 932) of Seattle—emerged unscathed after five rounds to

claim the first-place trophy with a perfect score. Sultan chess slugger Phoenix Armitage-Selig (4.0,  $507 \rightarrow 701$ ) took second place on tiebreaks, dropping only a single game to Chin in the penultimate round.

Monroe chess dancer Dinesh Poka  $(4.0, 642 \rightarrow 748)$  channeled John Candy, who cameoed as Gus Polinski, Polka King of the Midwest, in the 1990 hit movie *Home Alone*, by dancing the 'Chess Polka' along his way to winning the third-place trophy.

First grade chess wizard Kheiron Chin  $(3.5, 224 \rightarrow 521)$  of Seattle won the fourth-place trophy on tiebreaks, recovering well after a first-round loss against Sajeeth (484). Mill Creek mystery man Hridik Sarkar  $(3.5, 281 \rightarrow 509)$  took fifth place on tiebreaks thanks to his redhot 3.5/4 point start!



In the cottage-sized Snoqualmie U500 section, Richmond chess ringer Pengyu Chen (4.5, 459 → 532) came all the way down from British Columbia with his parents Siyang and Heming just to play in the tournament, and it was wellworth the trip as he won the first-place trophy with an undefeated 4.5 points from five games! Had it not been for an accidental first-round stalemate against Ghosh (112), Chen would no doubt have achieved a perfect score!

Sammanish chess stud Sushant Deshpande (3.5, unrated  $\rightarrow$  459) earned the second-place trophy with a fantastic 3.5-1.5 score, dropping only a single game along the way. Bothell chess bouncer Archith Jayakrishnan (3.0, 290  $\rightarrow$  384) captured third place on tiebreaks by virtue of playing against the top six players in his section.

Chess Dad Siyang Chen (3.0, unrated → 427) of Richmond, Pengyu's father, did well in his first chess tournament and took fourth place on tiebreaks. In a closely contested race for fifth place, it was Abhinav Manikandan (2.5, 205 → 308) of Snohomish who edged out his nearest competitors and claimed the fifth-place trophy on tiebreaks with an even score.
